




AERIAL VIEW - DANVILLE, KENTUCKY



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.



Centre College of Kentucky, located in Danville, was chartered in 1819 and began instruction in 1820. Founded under Presbyterian auspices, the college is independently governed but has maintained its Christian affirmation throughout its history. The college is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Association of American Colleges, the Southern University Conference, the Southern College University Union, the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB), and the College Scholarship Service (CSS). In 1970 a chapter of the National Council of Phi Beta Kappa was established at Centre College. The college offers two degrees, Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science.

Kentucky Business College, which has a branch campus in Danville, was established in Lexington, Kentucky, in 1941. The college has been accorded full accreditation as a junior college of business by the Accrediting Commission of the Association of Independent Colleges and Schools, Washington, D.C. The state of Kentucky has authorized the college to confer the degree of Associate in Science. Diploma courses and special courses are also awarded by the college. The Fall 1978 student enrollment of the Danville campus was 170.

RECREATION

Local

The city of Danville and Boyle County offer a wide variety of recreational opportunites. Public recreation facilities include two large parks, five mini-parks, nine playgrounds, two tennis courts, three baseball diamonds, four softball fields, four football fields, and two soccer fields. The Danville-Boyle County Recreation Department offers year-round recreation programs for all ages. A supervised playground program is available during the summer months and sports enthusiasts may participate in leagues for baskeball, football, baseball, softball, fast pitch softball and soccer.

Private recreation facilities in Danville include one country club, one golf course, two swimming pools, two movies theaters, one bowling facility, one skating rink, and a racket ball court.

Among tourist attractions in Danville is Constitution Square State Shrine, an authentic reproduction of Kentucky's first courthouse square, where Kentuckians first met to propose withdrawal from Virginia as a seperate state. The first post office west of the Alleghenies still stands in the square along with replicas of the jail, courthouse, meeting house and pillory.

The McDowell House, a registered national historic landmark adjacent to Constitution Square, is the home in which pioneer surgeon Dr. Ephraim McDowell lived and worked. The Apothecary Shop next door has authentic 18th and 19th century pharmacy items.

Centre College, established in Danville in 1819, graduated its first class in 1824. The school is rated among the top 100 colleges in the United States.

You can enjoy dinner and outdoor theater at Pioneer Playhouse. A unique 18th-century village, located on the theater grounds, returns visitors to a typical street scene of the time when Kentucky's constitution was adopted.

Approximately 13 miles west of Danville, in Boyle County, is the Perryville Battlefield State Shrine, site of the largest civil war battle in Kentucky and a national historic landmark. A museum contains battle relics and a diorama.

<u>Area</u> (Within 25 miles)

An area within 25 miles of Danville offers many tourist attractions.

Old Fort Harrod State Park, just 9 miles north of Danville, contains a reproduction of the original fort built 200 years ago. The

28-acre park also features a museum, federal monument, pioneer cemetery and the Lincoln Marriage Temple. The park amphitheatre is the scene of the annual summer production of an outdoor drama, "The Legend of Daniel Boone."

There are many other historical points of interest in Harrodsburg, Kentucky's oldest city.

The Isaac Shelby State Shrine is located 6 miles south of Danville. Shelby was chairman of the conventions in Constitution Square, forming the state, and was both Kentucky's first and fifth governor. Shelby was buried on the site of the early cabin on Shelby plantation.

William Whitley House State Shrine is located near Stanford, approximately 25 miles southwest of Danville. Called the "Guardian of the Wilderness Road", the Whitley house was a gathering place for the great frontier leaders - George Rogers Clark, Isaac Shelby, and Daniel Boone.

Pleasant Hill or "Shakertown" as it is best known, is just 7 miles northeast of Harrodsburg. Over 20 beautiful buildings and surroundings have been restored to display unique Shaker skills in furniture making, crafts and architecture.

Other tourist attractions are Camp Nelson, Herrington Lake and the Central Kentucky Wildlife Refuge which is open to the public.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Industrial and Commercial

Deerfield Plastics Company, Inc., a manufacturer of polyethylene film, began operations in 1978. Expansion projects have been completed at Rexnord, Inc., Royal Brake Products, and Royal Crown Bottling Company.

Recent expansions and remodeling of Danville's banking institutions has provided the community with modern facilities plus the convenience of drive-in windows and automatic teller systems.

Construction is under way on a tower, transmitter and studio for a new AM radio station. The station will begin broadcasting in August of 1979 under the call letters WOOP.

Utilities

A contract has been awarded for the construction of a \$3.1 million carrousel treatment plant with completion scheduled in 1980. The new treatment plant is designed for an average flow of 2.7 million gallons per day and a peak flow of 5.4 million gallons per day. In addition, new interceptor lines will be installed around the outskirts of the Danville perimeter. This will provide gravity flow for the area and will eliminate 17 pumping stations. The projected cost of this project is \$3 million.

The Danville Water Works has had a 400 H.P. raw water intake pump installed at Herrington Lake to replace a 200 H.P. pump.

Health and Public Safety

Construction of a five-story addition to the Ephraim McDowell Memorial Hospital has been completed. The old hospital building will be completely renovated.

The Danville Police Department facilities have been remodeled to provide space on an upper floor for investigations, finger printing, photography, dark room, evidence collection, experimental room, property room, and an additional office. There are plans to remodel the communication room and install new radio equipment.

An additional ambulance has been purchased for the Danville-Boyle County Rescue Squad.

Urban Renewal and Redevelopment

Main Street, from 2nd to 4th Streets in the central business district, has been improved with new sidewalks, curbing, landscaping,

pedestrian lights, street lights, and auto signal lights. Radius corners and ramps for the handicapped have been installed and overhead utility wiring has been placed underground.

Construction of a six-story apartment building for the elderly is to begin in the spring of 1979.

A \$2,435,000 project is under way to redevelop the Lebanon Road-Cowan Street area of Danville. The three-year project involves purchasing property, relocating residents, and redeveloping the area with improvements to streets and water and sewer lines. In addition, a \$75,000 park with a football field, baseball field and tot lot will be developed in this area.

A housing rehabilitation program is under way with 68 houses scheduled to be rehabilitated in 1979. Over 200 houses have been rehabilitated in the past three years.

Education

Kentucky Business College added a course in marketing management to its curriculum beginning in January 1979.

Construction of a new middle school facility for the Danville Independent School District was completed in August 1978. The new Bate Middle School houses grades 6, 7 and 8. A bus garage and storage facility which will accommodate ten school buses and two storage areas is planned for the future. A feasibility study will be conducted pertaining to the addition of a gymnasium at Hogsett Elementary School and renovation of the Danville Board of Education offices.

A new 14-classroom primary school has been constructed for the Boyle County School System. Ten additional classrooms, a cafeteria and kitchen, and offices for the principal are to be added to the school within the next three years.

Several major construction and renovation projects are under way at the Kentucky School for the Deaf in Danville. An upper school dorimitory facility which will accommodate 88 junior and high school students is under construction and scheduled for completion in 1979. Air-conditioning and new windows are being installed in the present middle school dormitory. Other projects which are under way and scheduled for completion in 1979 include renovation of Jacobs Hall and Rogers Hall, roofing repairs to nine buildings on campus, and installation of closed circuit T.V. and a security lighting system. In addition, funds have been allocated for a \$4 million multi-handicapped facility and a \$1.3 million middle school.

Recreation

Two new mini-parks have been developed in the city of Danville.

An 11-acre park is being developed at the Danville-Boyle County Fairgrounds. Facilities will include two tennis courts, softball and baseball diamonds, and volleyball courts.
