

MORGANTOWN, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Morgantown, the county seat of Butler County, is located in the Green River Valley of Kentucky's Western Coal Field Region. Morgantown is 87 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee; 113 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 251 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri. The city had a 1988 estimated population of 1,960 persons.

Butler County covers a land area of 431 square miles, and had a 1988 estimated population of 11,100 persons.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Butler County residents employed in 1988 averaged 5,626. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,648 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 333 jobs; 236 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 489 employees; contract construction firms provided 64 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 30,711 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1989 through 1993, 14,739 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - The Green River Parkway has an interchange 2 miles south of Morgantown. The city is also served by U.S. Highway 231 and Kentucky Route 79. There are 18 common carrier trucking companies authorized to serve Morgantown. The nearest commercial airline services are available at Nashville Metropolitan Airport, 93 miles south of Morgantown, and at Evansville Dress Regional Airport, 90 miles northwest of Morgantown. The Morgantown Municipal Airport has a 2,750-foot runway. Morgantown is within 20 miles of rail service provided by Illinois Central Gulf Railroad.

Power and Fuel - The Warren Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation provides electric power to Morgantown and most of Butler County, with Pennyrile Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation serving the remainder of the county. The Tennessee Valley Authority is the source of power for both companies. Morgantown Utilities, whose source of supply for natural gas is Midwestern Gas Transmission Company, provides natural gas service to Morgantown.

Education - The Butler County School System provides primary and secondary public education to residents of Morgantown and Butler County. There are eight institutions of higher learning located within 70 miles of Morgantown. Vocational training is available at Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School and Advanced Technology Center, 25 miles southeast of Morgantown, or at area vocational education centers located at Greenville, Hartford, Leitchfield, and Russellville - all within 35 miles of Morgantown.

The Morgantown Labor Market Area includes Butler County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Edmonson, Grayson, Logan, Muhlenberg, Ohio, and Warren.



1988







AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



TRANSPORTATION

Highways

The Green River Parkway, a multilane toll road, serves Morgantown with an interchange located two miles south of the city. Other "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways serving Morgantown include U.S. Highway 231 and Kentucky Route 79.

The Green River Parkway provides Morgantown with access to the Western Kentucky Parkway, 16 miles northwest of the city, and with Interstate Highway 65, a major north-south route, 28 miles southeast of the city.



Two projects were completed in 1987. Project 5, 26 miles of new water line, was completed in April costing \$815,000. Project 6, consisting of 32 miles of new line, new booster station, and a new storage tank, was completed in October costing \$1,400,000.

Construction of Project 7, 45 miles of distribution line and one booster pump station, is currently under way. The project is expected to be completed in January, 1990 and will cost \$1,000,000.

A preliminary study is underway for a water treatment plant costing \$650,000 with a completion date of July, 1991.

Morgantown is served by a mayor and six council members. Butler County is served by a county judge/executive and five magistrates.

Local Fees and Licenses

Morgantown levies an occupational license tax of one and one-half percent of wages and one and one-half percent of net profits of businesses. The city also levies a business license fee of \$25.00 per year for all businesses and professions inside the city.

State and Local Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky, except items exempted by the state constitution, is taxed by the state. Property which also may be taxed by local jurisdictions includes land and buildings, finished goods inventories, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and office equipment. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, and school districts.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

A wide variety of recreational opportunities is available in Morgantown and Butler County. Public facilities include the 40-acre Morgantown Municipal Park, featuring a swimming pool and bathhouse, six tennis courts, lighted baseball, softball and Little League fields, an outdoor basketball court, two picnic pavillions, bleachers, playground equipment, and restrooms. An amphitheater located at the park is the site of community theater productions.

The Butler County Park and the Green River Museum are located in Woodbury on the Green River, approximately 5 miles southeast of Morgantown. The Green River Museum features exhibits on Butler County's history and the riverboat heritage of the area. A restaurant is located on the park grounds.

Privately managed recreational facilities include a 9-hole golf course and a driving range.

Annual events include the Green River Catfish Festival, held during the July Fourth weekend, with activities including a fishing contest, a 5-mile road race, a canoe race, musical entertainment, a beauty pageant, fireworks, a golf tournament, and booths.

The George Dabbs Celebration of the Arts, an annual art and photography show and theater production, is held each summer. In addition, the Morgantown Community Park Theater presents several productions each year.

The Butler County Fair is held each August.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT

Recent

A sewer system rehabilitation project to reduce surface water inflow was completed in January, 1989 costing \$25,000.

Butler County Water System, Inc. completed two projects in 1987. Project 5, 26 miles of new water line, was completed in April costing \$815,000. Project 6, consisting of 32 miles of new line, new booster station, and a new storage tank was completed in October costing \$1,400,000.

A new volunteer fire station and ambulance service building was constructed in 1987 costing \$100,000.

Morgantown Utilities built a new sewer plant in March, 1989 costing \$1,000,000.

Three manufacturing firms located in Morgantown in 1989. J & V Stitches, Inc. employs 70 persons and makes men's, women's, and children's jeans. IMCO Recycling, Inc. employs 45 persons and recycles aluminum. American Rubber Products Corporation makes rubber seals and gaskets for the automotive industry and employs 35 persons.

A new digital phone system for Butler County has been installed at a cost of \$1,000,000.

Under Way

Butler County Water System, Inc. currently has Project 7 under construction. This project consists of 45 miles of new line and a booster station and is expected to be completed in January, 1990 costing \$1,000,000. A preliminary study is also underway for a water treatment plant costing \$650,000 with a completion date of July, 1991.


Planned

The Morgantown Municipal Airport is planning to construct a new 5,000 foot runway in April, 1990. The local airport board is also making plans to add fuel facilities, a hanger, an airport office and emergency lighting on the site.

The Butler County School System plans to start construction of a new high school building in Spring, 1990. The school is expected to cost \$4,000,000 and open for the Fall, 1991 school year.

Morgantown Utilities will begin looking for a site for a new 1,000,000 gallon water storage tank in 1990. They also plan to extend sewer service to the new high school.
