
GENERAL HIGHWAY MAP JESSAMINE COUNTY **KENTUCKY**

NICHOLASVILLE AND WILMORE LABOR MARKET AREA





Nicholasville is situated in the north-central portion of Jessamine County and serves as the county seat. Nicholasville is located 8 miles from Lexington, 88 miles from Louisville, and 89 miles from Cincinnati. In 1970, Nicholasville had a population of 5, 829.

Wilmore, the home of Asbury College, is located in the western portion of the county. Wilmore had a 1970 population of 3,466.

Jessamine County, with a land area of 177 square miles, is located in the center of the Bluegrass Region of Kentucky. The Bluegrass, well known for its Thoroughbred horses and white fenced farms, is emerging as an important industrial, educational, and research center. Jessamine County had a population of 17,430 in 1970, having experienced a growth in population of 28 percent since 1960.

The Economic Framework

Total employment in Jessamine County averaged 3,770 in 1972, with agriculture providing 850 jobs, manufacturing 380, government 440, and trade and services 795. Since 1963, manufacturing employment has increased by 27 percent or 91 jobs. Major industrial products are paper folding cartons, locks, and men's and boys' jeans.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1971 was \$3,035, a 107 percent increase since 1961.

The Nicholasville and Wilmore labor market area includes Jessamine County and the five surrounding counties. Area employment in 1972 totaled 140, 810 jobs with agriculture accounting for 7, 470 jobs, manufacturing 25, 290, government 31, 590, and trade and services 40, 930. Manufacturing employment in the area has increased by 78 percent since 1963 with the sharpest gains in the machinery and metal products industries.

Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 8,570 men and 10,190 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition 12,750 young men and 12,160 young women will become 18 years of age by 1980 and will be potentially available for work.

- 2. Nicholasville and Wilmore are served by the Southern Railway System with a variety of services. U. S. Highways 27 and 68 and several Kentucky Routes serve the county. In addition, Interstate 64 (east-west) and Interstate 75 (north-south) intersect approximately 12 miles northeast of Nicholasville. The nearest commercial airport is at Lexington, approximately 12 miles north of Nicholasville.
- 3. Electric power is provided to Nicholasville by the City of Nicholasville Utilities. Wilmore is served by the Kentucky Utilities Company. Jessamine County is served by the Blue Grass RECC, whose source of supply is the East Kentucky Power Cooperative.

Nicholasville and Wilmore are provided natural gas service by the Delta Natural Gas Company, whose source of supply is the Tennessee Pipeline Corporation. There are four distributors of propane and butane gas, and six distributors of distillate fuel oil in the Nicholasville-Wilmore area.

4. A consolidated school system operates in Jessamine County. Asbury College and Asbury Theological Seminary are located in Wilmore. Eight universities and senior colleges, two junior colleges, and a technical institute are located within 35 miles of Nicholasville. The Central Kentucky State Vocational Technical School, offering 19 courses, and the Fayette County Area Vocational Education Center, offering 10 courses, are both located in Lexington, only 8 miles north of Nicholasville.

Community Programs for Improvement

Nicholasville

Recent:

- 1. An addition to the water system of a 10-inch loop line encircling the city and the construction of a new 750,000 gallon water tower.
- 2. The location of two new industries.

Underway:

- 1. An engineering study to determine needed improvements to the sewerage service.
- 2. Improving the electrical system by the addition of a new generating plant and more power lines.
- 3. A new industrial plant.

- 4. Three new subdivisions.
- 5. A 40-acre park, including a playground and a baseball field.
- 6. A branch bank.

Planned:

1. To increase the intake and the filtration capacity of the water plant.

Wilmore

Recent:

1. The water system improved by increasing the treatment capacity and by the addition of more pumps.

Underway:

- 1. A sewage treatment plant with a design population of 5,000 to be completed by the end of 1974.
- 2. New lighting for the playground.

Planned:

1. Street improvements.

Jessamine County School Improvements

- 1. Additions to the high school include a materials center, a library, two biology laboratories, a physical science laboratory, an art laboratory, a large instructional room, and city sanitary sewer.
- 2. The high school now offers phase elective social studies and English.
- 3. The junior high school now offers a home economic laboratory, foreign languages, and a language laboratory.
- 4. The elementary school now offers a physical education area, an art class, a music room, and an ungraded primary block.
- 5. Planned improvements for the football stadium include: new bleachers, public restrooms, a refreshment stand, and dressing room facilities.

Recreation, Entertainment and Livability

Nicholasville and Wilmore both offer supervised recreation programs during the summer months. Little League baseball, playground equipment and picnic areas are available. A new country club has recently been constructed between Nicholasville and Wilmore with an 18-hole golf course, swimming pool and clubhouse.

Tourist attractions near Nicholasville and Wilmore include: Fort Boonesborough State Park, Fort Hill State Park, Old Fort Harrod State Park, and several historical state shrines.

Fort Boonesborough State Park, a 261-acre park on the Kentucky River, is on the site of a pioneer fort built by Daniel Boone in 1775. The park has a restaurant, a swimming beach, sundeck, bathhouse, first aid and lifeguard station, boats, docks, motors, playground, picnic area, and primitive camping.

Fort Hill State Park consists of 124 acres with Civil War fortifications throughout the park. Picnic areas are available.

Old Fort Harrod State Park is a full-scale reproduction of the original fort that was built 200 years ago. The 28-acre park contains a pioneer fort, a museum, a federal monument, a cemetary, and an amphitheatre where a summer production of the "Legend of Daniel Boone" is held.

Other historical attractions include: Constitution Square State Shrine, Isaac Shelby State Shrine, Perryville Battlefield State Shrine, Waveland State Shrine, White Hall State Shrine, and William Whitley House State Shrine.

Jessamine County lies in the center of the Bluegrass Region, which is well-known as the capital of the horse world. World famous horse farms, such as Calumet, Spendthrift, and Idle Hour, are close by; many of the area's more than 250 farms welcome visitors. Lexington, 8 miles distant, boasts two fine race tracks: Keeneland and the Big Red Mile trotting track. The American Saddle Horse Museum is also located at Lexington.



WAGES

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 130 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eight regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

HISTORY

Jessamine County, the thirty-sixth county formed in the state, dates from 1798. Its territory of 177 square miles was taken from Fayette County. The Kentucky River forms approximately one-half of its boundary from the southeast to the southwest. The topography of Jessamine County ranges from gently rolling land in the north to hilly and broken surface along the river. The palisades along the Kentucky River are among the most beautiful in the country. Perpendicular cliffs rise to heights of more than 300 feet in many places. Jedidiah Morse, a geographer, wrote in 1789 that the area which now includes Jessamine County "may be called an extensive garden ... the banks of the Kentucky and Dix Rivers are to be reckoned among the natural curiosities of the country ... (and) these rivers have the appearance of deep artificial canals."

The first settlers in Jessamine County were Joseph Drake, reputed to be a descendant of Sir Francis Drake, and Colonel George Nicholas. Drake settled about six miles west of Nicholasville in the early 1780's, while Nicholas settled within the present city limits during the early 1790's. About the same time Matthew Patton and his sons moved from the Potomac River valley in Virginia to Jessamine County near Nicholasville and brought a herd of purebred cattle with them. It was from this herd that the American strain of shorthorn cattle had its beginning in Kentucky.

The county was named by Colonel John Price in honor of the flower... the Jessamine ... which grows along the creeks in the area. (There are erroneous legends that the county was named for Jessamine Douglas, a beautiful girl who was murdered by the Indians and also that it was named for Jessamine Creek.) Soon after its formation, Jessamine County began to build a government which has, with several improvements through the years, proved to be efficient and progressive.

Nicholasville, the county seat, was named for Colonel George Nicholas, a native of Williamsburg, Virginia, who settled there in the early 1790's. He was a member of the Convention in Danville that wrote Kentucky's first Constitution.

In 1812, Edward Phipps became the first saddle and harness maker in Jessamine County. About 50 distilleries were in operation by 1825. Meredith Wright built a powder mill in 1826, and Robert Young opened a factory for the production of silk and fur hats the next year. Campbell

Steele set up a flour mill in 1830. Thomas Bryan erected the first paper mill in 1837, and John Barkley established a hemp factory about the same time. Henry Metcalfe, a son of John Metcalfe, opened the first Sunday School in the county in 1843.

Jessamine County's population has increased from 5,461 in 1800 to a high of 17,430 in 1970. From 1960 to 1970, the population experienced a growth of 28 percent.

In 1972 total employment averaged 3,770 with 2,920 people employed in non-agricultural jobs. Manufacturing provided 380 jobs. Major industrial products are paper cartons, locks, and men's and boys' jeans. Largest among Jessamine County's industrial plants are: Gulf States Paper Corporation, which makes paper folding cartons; Sargent & Greenleaf Inc., which makes locks; and Tococo, Inc., which makes men's and boys' jeans.
