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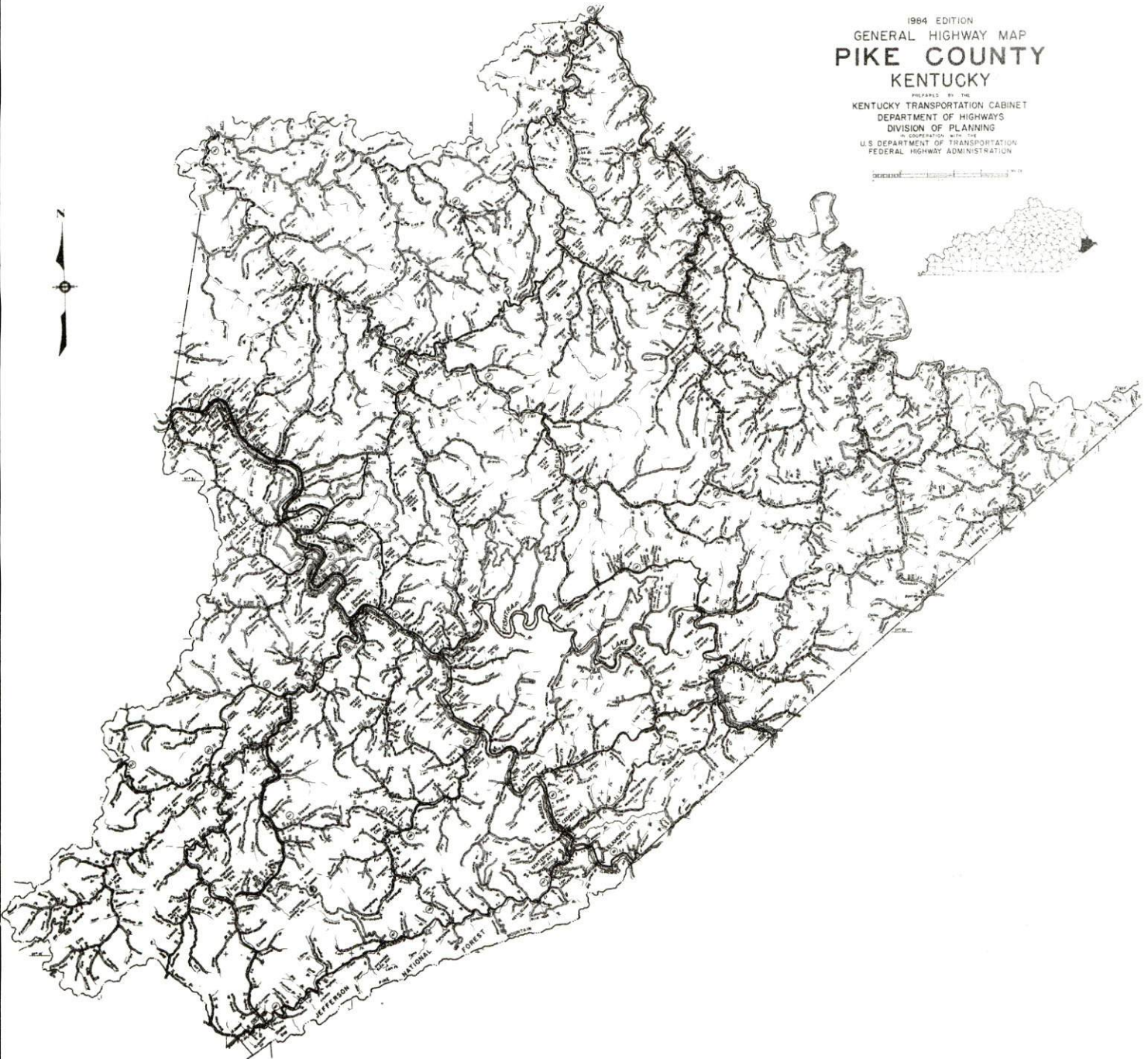

PIKE COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Pike County is located at the easternmost tip of Kentucky in the Eastern Coal Fields region. Pike County covers 785 square miles of land area, and in addition to being Kentucky's largest county, it is also one of the largest underground bituminous coal-producing counties in the United States. The county had a 1982 estimated population of 82,100.

Pikeville, the county seat, is located along the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River. The city had a 1982 estimated population of 4,679. Pikeville is located 143 miles southeast of Lexington, Kentucky; 225 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio; and 222 miles northeast of Knoxville, Tennessee.

Elkhorn City, 23 miles southeast of Pikeville on the Kentucky-Virginia border, had a 1982 estimated population of 1,429 persons.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Pike County residents employed in 1983 averaged 27,190, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 27,160 workers. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 260 workers; wholesale and retail trade 4,340 employees; state and local government 2,540 employees; mining and quarrying 6,910 employees; and 2,860 employees in service industries. Manufacturing employment is greatest in food and kindred products, and stone, clay, and glass products industries.

Per capita personal income in Pike County in 1982 was \$8,245. Between 1978 and 1982, per capita personal income increased by 48 percent.

The Pike County labor market area includes Pike County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Floyd, Knott, Letcher, and Martin, plus Buchanan and Dickenson Counties in Virginia, and Mingo County in West Virginia. The total number of residents in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area employed in 1983 averaged 56,760, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 56,585 workers. Manufacturing employers in this area reported 630 employees; wholesale and retail trade 7,890 employees; state and local government 5,860 employees; mining and quarrying 14,240 employees; and 5,660 employees in the service industries.

Resources for Growth

1. Labor Supply - There is a current labor supply of 22,020 men and 25,590 women available for industrial jobs in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area. In addition, from 1985 through 1989, 9,300 young men and 8,860 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

2. Transportation - The Chessie System provides freight service to Shelbiana, 7 miles south of Pikeville, and Seaboard System Railroad serves Elkhorn City. U.S. Highways 23 and 119 are "AAA"-rated, 80,000-pound gross load limit highways serving Pikeville. U.S. 460 and Kentucky 80 are "AAA"-rated west of the city, and "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) east of the city. The Mountain Parkway, a multilane toll road, is located 49 miles northwest of Pikeville. Elkhorn City is located 23 miles southeast of Pikeville via Kentucky 80. There are six common carrier trucking companies serving Pikeville. The nearest scheduled commercial airline services are available 100 miles north of Pikeville near Huntington, West Virginia. The Pikeville Airport has one paved 3,500-foot runway.

3. Power and Fuel - Kentucky Power Company provides electric power to all of Pike County. Natural gas service is provided to Pikeville by the City of Pikeville. The sources of supply are Columbia Gas Transmission Corporation and 20 local gas wells. There are two propane dealers and six fuel oil dealers within 25 miles of Pikeville.

4. Education - The Pikeville Independent School System - which is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools - and the Pike County School System provide primary and secondary education in Pike County. One nonpublic elementary school also operates in Pike County.

Pikeville College is a four-year, independent college affiliated with the United Presbyterian Church. There are 24 other institutions of higher learning within 150 miles of Pikeville.

The Mayo State Vocational-Technical School at Paintsville, 40 miles northwest of Pikeville offers training in 27 course areas. Area vocational education centers are located in the Pike County communities of Belfry, Millard, and Phelps, and offer training in 11 different course areas.

THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Pike County Labor Market Area includes Pike County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Floyd, Knott, Letcher, and Martin, plus Buchanan and Dickenson Counties in Virginia, and Mingo County in West Virginia.

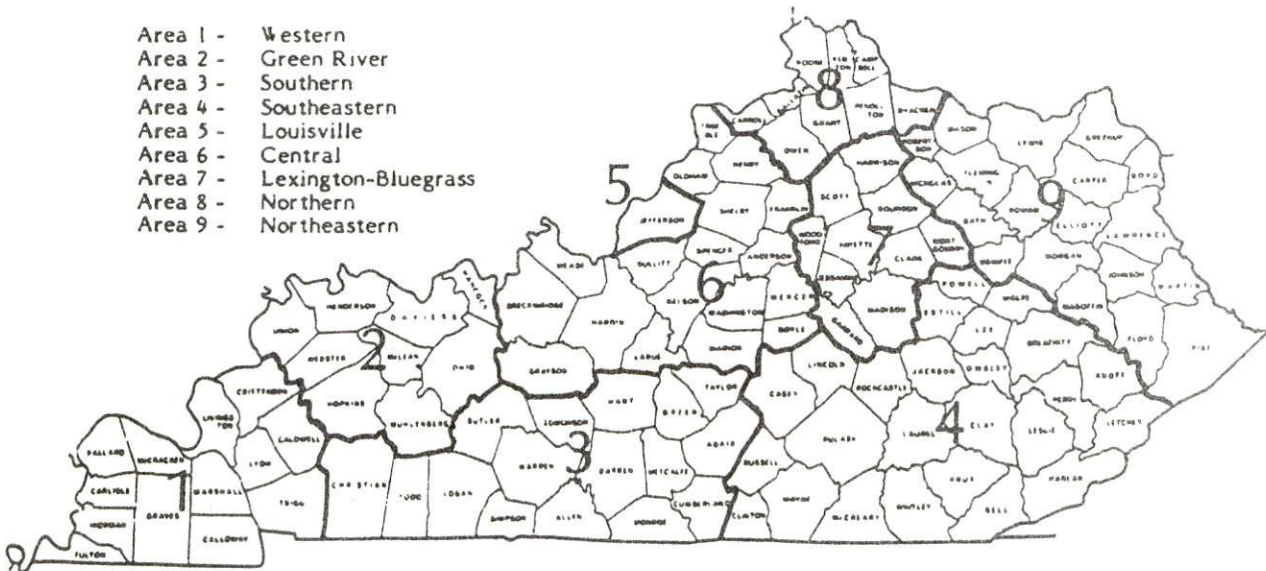

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The 1984 state rate is \$0.22 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

RECREATION

Local

Pike County is in the center of Kentucky's mountain vacationland and is surrounded by some of the most majestic scenery in the eastern United States.

Public recreational facilities in Pikeville include the 15-acre Bob Amos Park, offering ball fields, tennis courts, a track and a football field. The Hambley Recreational Facility - a youth center - features a tennis court, a covered swimming pool, Little League ball fields, a football field, and a mini park. The Pikeville City Park has basketball goals, a playground, and tennis courts. Also, several mini parks are located in Pikeville. The Fourth Street Community Recreation Center offers a gymnasium.

Elkhorn City recently completed construction of a city park offering a playground, a Little League ball field, and a swimming pool. Two tennis courts are located at the local school yard.

Breaks Interstate Park, also located at Elkhorn City, encompasses 3,910 acres and is the site of the largest canyon east of the Mississippi River. Park facilities include a lodge, restaurant, housekeeping cottages, tent and trailer campsites, picnic areas, playgrounds, hiking trails, horseback riding, fishing, fishing boat rentals, community pool, visitor's center, and a gift shop.

Swimming pools are also located in the communities of Virgie, Phelps, and Blackberry.

Fishtrap Lake, which lies 10 miles southeast of Pikeville in Pike County, offers boating, fishing and camping areas. The Fishtrap Lake Wildlife Area offers state-regulated hunting in season.

Private recreational facilities in Pike County include two country clubs with golf courses and swimming pools, a bowling alley, roller rinks, and seven indoor theatres.

Annual events in Pike County include Pikeville's Fourth of July Festival, featuring fireworks displays, and the Christmas parade. Hillbilly Days, also held in Pikeville, features costume contests, food booths, games, bluegrass and country music, and a parade. The event benefits the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children. The Apple Blossom festival is held each year in Elkhorn City.

Area (Within 90 miles)

Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, 27 miles northwest of Pikeville near Prestonsburg, takes full advantage of its picturesque highland setting. The 1,700-acre park offers facilities and activities such as a lodge, a dining room, a gift shop, cottages, a lodge pool, recreation rooms, campsites, picnic areas, planned recreation, playground, golf, hiking, horseback riding, shuffleboard, fishing, and fishing boat and pedal boat rentals. A summer music theatre presents Broadway musicals in a 90-seat amphitheater.

Kingdom Come State Park, located 75 miles southwest of Pikeville near Cumberland, Kentucky, contains 961 beautiful mountain acres. It is named for John Fox, Jr.'s, "The Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come", which was written in 1903 and was the first U.S. novel to sell one million copies. Features include a three-acre fishing lake, a picnic area, a hiking trail, a playground, and Raven Rock, a fascinating stone formation with a large cave opening at the base. The park is located on the midway point of the Little Shepherd Trail, a hiking and driving trail which follows Pine Mountain from Harlan to Whitesburg.

Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park, 87 miles southwest of Pikeville at Buckhorn, is a full-facility resort park with a 36-room lodge. The lodge itself offers a dining room with a lake view, a gift shop, a pool, meeting rooms, and a recreation room. Other park facilities and activities include a beach, a bathhouse, a picnic shelter, 72 campsites, a playground, mini-golf, tennis, a dock with open and covered slips, boat rentals, a 40-foot levee plus a fishing pier, bicycle rentals, and planned recreation.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

A new Pikeville Airport facility was opened recently, with a 3,500-foot runway. Plans are being made to further expand the new facility.

A new clarifier and a 200,000-gallon storage tank were added to Elkhorn City's water treatment and distribution system in 1984.

The new Shelby Valley Water District began operations in 1982; the system serves an area between Shelbiana and Virgie, Kentucky. Water is purchased from the Marrowbone Creek Water District.

The Pike County School System completed construction of a new \$5,800,000 high school at Elkhorn City in 1983. Construction of a \$6,000,000 high school at Phelps is scheduled for completion in 1985.

The Citizens Bank has opened two new branch facilities in Pike County since 1982. A renovation project at the main bank was begun in 1984.

The First National Bank of Pikeville installed new automated teller facilities in 1984. Two branches have also been expanded recently.

New branches of Pikeville National Bank and Trust Company were opened at Mouthcard and Elkhorn City since 1982.

Elkhorn City completed construction of a new city park and senior citizens center in 1982.

Under Way

New buildings are being constructed for volunteer fire departments in the Pike County communities of Blackberry, Dorton, Ferrells Creek, and Knox Creek.

The "Pikeville Cut Through", a \$60,000,000 project to relocate the Levisa Fork River, the railroad and the highways which formed a loop around Pikeville, is scheduled to enter its final phase during 1985. The original river bed is being filled to create additional land for community development, and the railroad has been relocated.

Planned

Construction of a new 7,000,000-gallon-per-day water treatment plant for the city of Pikeville is planned when funding becomes available.

Construction of an enclosed, 750,000-square-foot regional shopping mall at Pikeville is to begin in 1985. Completion is scheduled for Spring 1986.
