


# HOPKINSVILLE LABOR MARKET AREA



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.


Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

A central dispatcher relays all emergency calls and the dispatching office contains equipment capable of tracing calls when false alarms are suspected or when an excited caller fails to give an address or other pertinent information about an emergency.

A 911 emergency number has been installed to be used in calling the police, fire or ambulance services. During emergencies, the services can tune to a common radio frequency to communicate with each other.

## RECREATION

### Local

Hopkinsville offers a variety of public recreational facilities. Public facilities include eight parks, eight playgrounds, three swimming pools, eighteen tennis courts, eight baseball diamonds, one football field, one 9-hole golf course, two gymnasiums, and Lake Bly, a fishing lake.

The Hopkinsville-Christian County Recreation Department employs a full-time director and staff. Supervised recreation programs include classes in golf, tennis, swimming, arts and crafts, and special programs for the handicapped. Flying lessons are offered through the recreation department at the Hopkinsville-Christian County Airport. Sports leagues include girl's softball, little league softball and baseball, Babe Ruth baseball, and junior league basketball. A meeting room is available for local clubs and groups at the recreation department's headquarters.

Private recreation facilities include a country club, golf course, swimming pools, bowling lanes, riding stables, indoor and outdoor movie theatres, a roller skating rink and trap shooting facilities.


The Western Kentucky State Fair is held at the Christian County Fairgrounds each summer. A horse show, horse races, tractor pulls, and performances by famous entertainers are featured. The fair is the largest in western Kentucky.

A community concert series and performances by the Pennyrile Players, an outstanding community theatre group with an active membership of 150, are held at Hopkinsville Community College. A photographic exhibit of 5,000 local historical pictures dating back to the Civil War is held during the first two weeks of March at the community college.


The Pennyrile Festival of Arts is celebrated during the second week of October. The festival offers juried art exhibits, programs in drama and music and a garden tour. Twice yearly, in April and October, a professor at Hopkinsville Community College presents a "Highlights in Local History" program at the Pennyroyal Area Historical Museum in Hopkinsville. Other points of interest in and near Hopkinsville include the 101st Airborne Museum at Fort Campbell, a pioneer cemetery, and the burial site of Edgar Cayce, the world famous clairvoyant.

### Area (Within 60 miles)

Pennyrile Forest State Resort Park is located in northern Christian County about 20 miles north of Hopkinsville. Facilities include a 24-room lodge, 180-seat dining room, one and two bedroom

cottages and efficiency cottages, a gift shop, a 55-acre lake, a beach and bathhouse, a lodge pool, a 9-hole golf course, a miniature golf course, a playground, hiking trail, shuffleboard court, 68 camping spaces, 4 picnic shelters, a boat dock, paddle boats, and boat launches. Horseback riding and a supervised recreation program are available.

Hopkinsville is located near two of the largest inland lakes in America, Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley, which include over 3,300 miles of shoreline. This lakeland area offers numerous recreational facilities for water sports, fishing, boating, camping and hunting.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, one of Kentucky's finest, is located less than 30 miles west of Hopkinsville on the shores of Lake Barkley. The park contains a 120-room lodge, 350-seat dining room, a coffee shop, gift shop, 9 cottages, a beach and bathhouse, a swimming pool, an 18-hole golf course, a 100-seat amphitheatre, a boat dock with open and covered slips, boat launches, a 300-seat meeting room and a nature study center. Activities available include camping, boating, skiing, fishing, horseback riding, trap shooting, hiking, swimming and tennis.

Located on the shores of Kentucky Lake are two of the state's full-facility resort parks -- Kenlake State Resort Park and Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park. Both parks offer the following facilities: Lakeside locations; lodge, cottage, and camping accommodations; dining rooms, picnic area, and gift shops; golf, swimming, fishing, boat rentals, horseback riding, tennis, playgrounds, and planned recreation.

Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area is a beautiful 170,000-acre woodland that has been developed by TVA into a major area for outdoor recreation, conservation, and environmental learning. It is a peninsula 5 to 10 miles wide and stretching for 40 miles north to south between Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley. There are facilities for fishing, boating, hiking, swimming, hunting, and camping.

Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine is located 10 miles east of Hopkinsville at Fairview. The shrine is located on the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, a former U. S. Senator, Secretary of War, and the only president of the Confederate States of America. The 16-acre park contains a 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top for viewing, a museum, a gift shop, and a playground with picnic tables.

Lake Malone State Park is northeast of Hopkinsville near Dunmor. The 338-acre park offers facilities for camping, boating, swimming, fishing, and hiking. The park has a 200-seat meeting room and boat rentals are available.

## COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

### Industrial and Commercial

Plymouth Tube Company has located a plant in the Hopkinsville Industrial Park which manufactures metal tubing. A second plant, which will manufacture steel extrusions, is under construction at the park and is expected to begin operations in 1979.

U. S. Tobacco Company is building a plant at Hopkinsville.

Pennyrile Citizens Bank began operations in September 1976.

First City Bank opened its northwest branch in July 1977. The bank now has 24-hour automatic teller service at two locations.

A new shopping center is being developed between Hopkinsville and Fort Campbell.

### Utilities

A 2,000,000-gallon water storage tank was put into operation at the industrial park in June 1978.

A 201 Facilities Plan to study infiltration, inflow and deterioration to the municipal sewerage system is underway. Plans call for building a 3,500,000 gpd sewage treatment plant in the southern portion of Hopkinsville and upgrading the existing plant. Plans also call for the construction of 92,000 feet of new collector and outfall interceptor lines. All improvements are expected to be completed by January of 1982.

### Transportation

Construction of Interstate 24 has been completed between Cadiz, Kentucky, and Chattanooga, Tennessee. An interchange of I-24 is located 12 miles south of Hopkinsville via a four-lane section of U. S. 41A. Construction of the remaining portion of the interstate which connects with Interstate 57 in Illinois is scheduled for completion in 1980.

Construction was recently completed on a full parallel taxiway and apron, taxiway lighting, and a new administration building at the Hopkinsville-Christian County Airport.

### Public Safety

The Hopkinsville Police Department plans to start an apprenticeship program for new officers which is funded by the Department of Labor.

The Hopkinsville Street Department has purchased a new snow plow.

The Christian County Sheriff's Office has hired seven new deputies and purchased seven patrol cars, new finger printing equipment, drug testing equipment, firearms testing equipment and new cameras.

### Health

A construction project is underway at Jennie Stuart Memorial Hospital. The new building will house 26 critical care beds, 10 emergency rooms, 10 operating rooms, a pharmacy, physical and respiratory therapy facilities and a central supply room. Construction is expected to be finished in December of 1978.

### Education

Kindergarten is now available to all five-year old children in the county. Curricula additions at the Christian County School System include career education and classes for gifted and talented children and handicapped children.

A new \$1 million library and learning resources center is under construction at Hopkinsville Community College. The center will also include facilities for continuing education.

### Communications

South Central Bell Telephone Company built a \$5.5 million electronic switching system in Hopkinsville in January 1978. Call forwarding, touch tone, call waiting and other special services can now be made available to all customers with private lines.

### Recreation

Four new tennis courts were built in public parks during 1977.

Construction is underway on a picnic shelter and grills at Ruff Park.

Recreational activities for the handicapped are now available through the Hopkinsville-Christian County Recreation Department.

Little River Park has been developed and offers 1.5 miles of open space with areas for active and passive recreation. Facilities at the park include picnic tables, a shelter house and restrooms. Landscaping at the park was recently completed. A dam has been built to raise the water level in the river and fishing piers have been added.

## Other

A warehouse was recently renovated at a cost of \$1.1 million to house the Hopkinsville-Christian County Library. The library, which opened at its new location in January 1977, is situated in a public park overlooking the Little River. Because of the unusually large number of foreign born people living in the Clarksville-Hopkinsville SMSA the Hopkinsville-Christian County Library has received a grant to purchase materials for the acculturation of foreign nationals into American society.

Community development funds were used for the redevelopment of the Durrent Avenue area. Improvements include paving three streets, extending sewer service and establishing a mini-park. Further redevelopment in the Durrent Avenue area and reconstruction of East First Street are planned.

Construction will begin in September on a 220-unit, 3-story apartment complex for the elderly. The complex will include a 150-unit intermediate care nursing home.

The City of Hopkinsville has contributed \$12,000 towards the operation of the Hopkinsville Human Relations Commission. The purpose of the commission is to promote understanding and respect among all economic, social, religious, ethnic, and racial groups. The commission is comprised of 25 members appointed by the mayor and 4 associate members from local high schools.
