



La Grange, Kentucky Industrial Sites - 1984




GENERAL HIGHWAY MAP

LaGRANGE AND BUCKNER, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

LaGrange, the county seat of Oldham County, is located in north-central Kentucky. LaGrange, with a population of 2,971 in 1980, is located 25 miles northeast of Louisville, Kentucky; 77 miles southwest of Cincinnati, Ohio; and 193 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee. Buckner, 4 miles southwest of LaGrange, is not an incorporated city.

Oldham County, located in the Outer Blue Grass Region in north-central Kentucky, covers a total land area of 190 square miles of gently rolling to hilly terrain. The Ohio River flows along the northwest boundary of the county. In 1980, Oldham County had a population of 27,795.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Oldham County residents employed in 1983 averaged 11,040, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 10,460 workers. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 555 workers; state and local government 1,630; wholesale and retail trade 970; and services 930. Manufacturing employment is greatest in primary metal industries, fabricated metal products, lumber and wood products, and rubber and plastics products.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1982 was \$8,244. Between 1978 and 1982 per capita income increased by 34 percent.

The LaGrange and Buckner labor market area includes Oldham and the four adjoining counties. The total number of residents of the labor market area employed in 1983 averaged 322,650, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 318,000 workers. Manufacturing employers in the area reported 72,090 workers; wholesale and retail trade 78,240; services 66,590; and state and local government 31,950.

Resources for Growth

- 1. Labor Supply There is a current labor supply of 35,680 men and 35,890 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1984 through 1988, 29,530 young men and 28,290 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for work.
- 2. Transportation The Seaboard System Railroad provides main line service to LaGrange and Buckner. LaGrange and Buckner are served directly by Interstate 71, a major north-south multi-lane highway, and Kentucky Highway 146. Nineteen common carriers have the authority to serve LaGrange and twenty common carriers have the authority to serve Buckner. The nearest commercial airport, Standiford Field in Louisville, is located 30 miles southwest of LaGrange.

- 3. Power and Fuel Electric power is provided to LaGrange and part of Oldham County by the Kentucky Utilities Company. Buckner and part of Oldham County are served electric power by the Louisville Gas and Electric Company. LaGrange and Buckner are provided natural gas service by the Louisville Gas and Electric Company, which is supplied by the Texas Gas Resources Corporation. One distributor of propane and three distributors of distillate fuel oil are located in the county.
- 4. Education Primary and secondary education is provided to LaGrange, Buckner and Oldham County by the Oldham County School System, which is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Four universities, two senior colleges, and one community college are located within 45 miles of LaGrange.

The Jefferson State Vocational-Technical School in Louisville, 25 miles southwest of LaGrange, offers training in 29 different courses. The Oldham County Area Vocational Education Center, located in Buckner, offers training in 7 different courses.

THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The LaGrange and Buckner Labor Market Area includes Oldham County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Henry, Jefferson, Shelby and Trimble.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

Major highways serving Oldham County are Interstate 71, U.S. Highway 42, and Kentucky Highways 146, 53, 393 and 22.

Interstate 71, with interchanges located at LaGrange and Buckner, is a major north-south route between Louisville, Kentucky, and Cincinnati, Ohio. Interstate 71 intersects with Interstates 64 and 65 in Louisville, 25 miles southwest of LaGrange, and with Interstate 75 in Boone County, 56 miles northeast of LaGrange. U.S. 42, a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway, lies 4 miles north of LaGrange via Kentucky 53 and 5 miles north of Buckner via Kentucky 393. Kentucky 146 is a "AAA"-rated trucking highway serving LaGrange and Buckner.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.221 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

RECREATION

Local

A year-round, supervised recreation program is open to all county residents. The program is operated through the Oldham County Board of Education and the various activities are conducted through the schools, using school recreational facilities.

The Oldham County Recreational Park is located I mile north of Buckner. The park contains a 56-acre fishing lake, volleyball courts, basketball courts, horseshoe pits, grills, picnic shelters, public restrooms, and parking facilities. There are plans for the construction of additional facilities at the Oldham County Recreational Park. They include a miniature golf course and additional soccer and football fields.

LaGrange sponsors Pony and Babe Ruth Baseball Leagues. In addition, there are a number of county-wide softball leagues, some operated by the Recreation Department and some private. Additional public recreational facilities in LaGrange and Buckner include two tennis courts, five baseball diamonds, and two football fields.

There is a small park located on the Ohio River near Westport, Kentucky. The park has facilities for launching small boats.

There are two private country clubs in the LaGrange and Buckner area. Each club matintains an 18-hole golf course and a swimming pool.

Area (Within 70 miles)

E. P. "Tom" Sawyer State Park, 18 miles southwest of LaGrange, is located near Louisville. Recreational facilities include an outdoor Olympic-size pool, a bathhouse, 12 lighted tennis courts, a picnic area, an archery range, and soccer fields. Planned recreation and a playground are offered year-round. Indoor facilities are available for basketball, volleyball, exercise classes, dance classes and various other events.

Louisville, 25 miles southwest of LaGrange, provides a wide variety of recreational opportunities. The most noted recreational event in Louisville is the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs. The "Run for the Roses" is the oldest continuously held horse race in the United States. Other attractions include: Kentucky Center for the Arts, Macauley Theatre, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Louisville Children's Theatre, the Louisville Bach Society, the Louisville Orchestra, the Louisville Ballet, the Kentucky Opera Association, several museums, the Louisville Zoological Gardens, University of Louisville sporting events, rock concerts, and the "Belle of Louisville" sternwheeler.

General Butler State Resort Park is located 26 miles northeast of LaGrange near Carrollton. The park includes a 30-acre lake, a boat dock, a 9-hole golf course, a miniature golf course, a swimming pool, playgrounds, shuffleboard, tennis courts, planned recreation, fishing, camping, horseback riding, 58 lodge rooms, cottages, and gift shops. General Butler's family home, the Butler Mansion, has been restored and contains a museum of Ohio River lore. Another unique feature is the Ski Butler ski area that has five ski runs, a ski shop, rental equipment, a ski school and chair lifts.

Taylorsville Lake, 36 miles south of LaGrange near Taylorsville, was developed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The 3,050-acre lake and 10,700-acre recreation area offer facilities for fishing, boating, swimming, and wildlife recreation.

Frankfort, the capital of Kentucky, is 41 miles southeast of LaGrange. Points of interest in Frankfort include the Capitol Building, a 34-foot floral clock, the Daniel Boone Monument, several museums, and old homes with their original furnishings. Frankfort is also the home of Kentucky State University which offers many cultural activities and sporting events.

Bernheim Forest Arboretum and Nature Center, located 48 miles southwest of LaGrange, is a privately endowed 10,000-acre forest and wildlife refuge. The area contains over 1,400 labeled varieties of plants, trees and shrubs; ornamental gardens; a museum; nature trails and waterfowl ponds.

Big Bone Lick State Park in Boone County, 61 miles northeast of LaGrange, provides a unique combination of educational and recreational pleasures. Visitors can walk through the natural outdoor museum with replicas and exhibits that tell the story of Big Bone Lick. Recreational activities and facilities include a modern campground with 62 sites, fishing in a nearby lake, an indoor museum and gift shop, picnic grounds, tennis, shuffleboard, volleyball, basketball, horseshoes, planned recreation, and a swimming pool in the camping area.

My Old Kentucky Home State Park, 63 miles southwest of LaGrange in Bardstown, portrays an image of the South's gentle and leisurely home life before the Civil War. The restored Georgian Colonial mansion is where composer Stephen Foster visited and where he was inspired to write "My Old Kentucky Home." One of the nation's most successful outdoor dramas, "The Stephen Foster Story", is presented in the park's amphitheatre during the summer months. The park also offers a 40-site campground, a gift shop, a 9-hole golf course and pro shop, a picnic area, and planned recreation.

The Kentucky Horse Park, a park dedicated to horses and to man's love for horses, is located 64 miles southeast of LaGrange near Lexington. The park, which contains more than 1,000 acres of Kentucky Bluegrass, features the International Museum of the Horse; the Man O'War Memorial; an antique carriage display; horseback and pony rides; walking farm tours; horse-drawn tours; a restaurant; a gift shop; and a campground area, which offers swimming, tennis, and planned activities. Numerous special events are held year-round and include various horse shows, steeplechasing, dressage, polo games, and rodeos.

Lincoln Homestead State Park, 67 miles south of LaGrange near Springfield, is a 153-acre park on land settled by Abraham Lincoln's family. The actual building in which Nancy Hanks, mother of President Lincoln, lived during her courtship with Thomas Lincoln is preserved here as well as a replica of the 1782 cabin where Thomas Lincoln lived as a boy. The park also has a museum, a gift shop, a picnic area, and an 18-hole golf course.

Old Fort Harrod State Park, 67 miles southeast of LaGrange, is a 28-acre park in Harrodsburg that features a full-scale reproduction of the original Fort Harrod. The park also contains the log cabin where Abraham Lincoln's parents were wed, the Mansion Museum which houses mementos associated with the great periods of Kentucky history, a pioneer cemetery, and a federal monument dedicated to pioneers. The "Legend of Daniel Boone" and "Lincoln" are two excellent outdoor dramas which are performed at the Old Fort Amphitheater during the summer months.

Lexington, 70 miles southeast of LaGrange, offers a variety of cultural, sporting, and recreational activities. Thoroughbred and harness racing is presented at Keeneland Race Course and the Red Mile Harness Track during several meets each year. The University of Kentucky and Transylvania University offer a number of sporting events. The University of Kentucky basketball games are held at Rupp Arena, the world's largest basketball arena. Other attractions include Lexington Philharmonic concerts, Lexington Children's Theatre, and plays performed by Broadway touring companies, all held in the recently renovated Opera House.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

The construction of a 300,000-gallon water tank at the L'Esprit Development and a 200,000-gallon water tank at the Oldham County Industrial Park was recently completed by the Oldham County Water District.

The construction of a new 770,000-gallon-per-day sewage treatment plant was completed in October of 1984 by the LaGrange Utilities Commission. The \$3.2 million sewage treatment plant replaced the existing plant.

The construction of a new \$350,000 fire house, at LaGrange, was recently completed.

The LaGrange City Hall recently moved into a \$160,000 office complex.

The South Central Bell Telephone Company, located in LaGrange, recently completed the construction of a new office building and the installation of a new telephone system.

The construction of a new post office in LaGrange was recently completed.

A \$1.4 million renovation at the Oldham County High School, Crestwood Elementary, LaGrange Elementary and Liberty Elementary was recently completed. The project included the installation of air conditioning at each of these schools.

The construction of a \$1.3 million addition to Oldham County High School was recently completed. The addition, which included 16 classrooms and a band and music facility, was completed in September of 1984.

Under Way

L'Esprit, located just north of LaGrange, is a 5,121-acre Arabian horse community being developed into a subdivision for individual farms dedicated to the breeding, training and selling of Arabian horses. The L'Esprit Development will include a veterinary/surgical center, receiving center, a 100-acre quarantine farm for horses with contagious diseases, and a sale center. The development is a 74-farm complex, with Lasma East, a 733-acre farm, being the anchor farm of the project. Lasma East will include breeding facilities, barns totaling 250 stalls, and a track to train Arabian horses to race. There are also plans for a residential and commercial district; an 8-mile, two-lane highway through the development; and possibly a hotel. Estimated time for completion of the development is seven to ten years.

The construction of a thoroughbred center, near LaGrange, is currently under way. The center includes a training track, six barns, and multifamily townhouses.

Planned

Plans for the construction of the \$13.1 million Tri-County Medical Center, in LaGrange, are currently under way. The 120-bed hospital will be completed in 1986.

There are plans for the construction of additional facilities at the Oldham County Recreational Park. They include a miniature golf course and additional soccer and football fields.

The Oldham County Board of Education has plans to relocate its central office to the Buckner area.
