

MONTICELLO, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Monticello, the county seat of Wayne County is in south-central Kentucky. Monticello, with an estimated 1996 population of 5,630, is located 101 miles south of Lexington, Kentucky; 109 miles northwest of Knoxville, Tennessee; 168 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky; 155 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; and 186 miles south of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Wayne County, with a total land area of 459 square miles, is within portions of both the Mississippian Plateaus and the Eastern Kentucky Coal Fields Regions of the state. Lake Cumberland lies along or near the northern boundary of Wayne County and the Tennessee state line forms the southern boundary. Wayne County had an estimated population of 18,697 persons in 1997. The county holds the distinction of the largest manufacturer of houseboats in the country.

A portion of Wayne County is included in a three-county area which has been designated a federal empowerment zone. The empowerment zone program provides funding and incentives to create jobs and opportunities for its citizens. Businesses are encouraged to invest in distressed areas encouraging entrepreneurship, furthering local self-development, and assisting in the revitalization of the area.

The Economic Framework – Wayne County firms employed 5,321 people in 1997. Contract construction firms provided 70 jobs; manufacturing firms in the county reported 2,003 employees; transportation and public utilities provided 167 jobs; wholesale and retail trade provided 1,078 jobs; finance, insurance, and real estate provided 163 jobs; 736 were employed in the service industry; and state and local government accounted for 905 jobs.

Labor Supply – There is a current estimated labor supply of 19,414 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1999 to 2003, approximately 8,698 young persons in the labor market area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.


Transportation – Monticello is served directly by Kentucky Highway 90, a AAA-rated trucking highway, and by Kentucky Highway 92, a AA-rated trucking highway. In addition, the Cumberland Parkway, a multi-lane toll road, is accessible twenty-nine miles north of Monticello. Fourteen trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Monticello. The Norfolk Southern Railroad provides the nearest main line rail service at Burnside, Kentucky, twenty-one miles northeast. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Blue Grass Airport, 105 miles north of Monticello. The Monticello-Wayne County Airport, a local airport located just north of Monticello, maintains a 4,000-foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel – Electric power is provided to Monticello by the City of Monticello Electric Plant Board, which is supplied by the Tennessee Valley Authority. Wayne County is served by the South Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation, which is supplied by East Kentucky Power.

Education – The Monticello Independent School System and the Wayne County School System provide primary and secondary education to the residents of Monticello and Wayne County. Nine colleges and universities are within 60 miles of Monticello.

The Wayne County Area Technology Center (ATC) provides secondary technical training in Monticello. The nearest technical college providing postsecondary technical training is the Somerset Technical College, 22 miles northeast of Monticello.







Monticello is served by Kentucky Highway 90, a AAA-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway which connects with U.S. 27, 21 miles northeast of Monticello; and Kentucky Highway 92, a AA-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway which connects with U.S. Highway 27, 32 miles southeast. U.S. 127 is accessible 19 miles southwest of Monticello via Kentucky 90. The Cumberland Parkway, an east-west multi-lane toll road, is accessible 29 miles north of Monticello via Kentucky 90 and U.S. 27. Interstate 75, a major north-south corridor, is accessible 53 miles east of Monticello via Kentucky 92.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The City of Monticello is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term and the council members serve two-year terms. Wayne County is served by a county judge/executive and four magistrates, each of whom serves a four-year term.

Planning and Zoning

Presently, there is no planning and zoning commission in Monticello.

Mandatory state codes enforced - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Monticello levies a business license fee ranging from \$50 to \$500 per year, depending on the type of business. For manufacturers, the fee is \$500 per year.

Sales and Use Tax

A state sales and use tax is levied at the rate of 6.0% on the purchase or lease price of taxable goods and on utility services. Local sales taxes are not levied in Kentucky.

State and Local Property Taxes

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside the city limits may also be subject to city property taxes. Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value. Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its training and development coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator at the Somerset Technical College (606) 677-4049.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration and developing training programs within the organization. The Career Connections Assessment Center serving the Monticello area is located at the Somerset Technical College (606) 677-4049.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In the Monticello area, adult basic education and adult literacy classes are administered through the Schools on Wheels Literacy Program and adult basic education is provided by the Wayne County Adult Learning Center.

Articulation agreements developed between various colleges and universities and the Kentucky Tech system allow students to earn credits to be used when matriculating to degree programs at a college or university. The Somerset Technical College has articulation agreements with Somerset Community College and Eastern Kentucky University.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation (BSSC) was established in 1984 by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as an independent, de jure corporation to stimulate economic development through customized business and industry specific skills training programs. The BSSC works with business and industry and Kentucky's educational institutions to establish programs of skills training. The BSSC is attached to the Cabinet for Economic Development for administrative purposes, in recognition of the relationship between economic development and skills training efforts.

The BSSC is comprised of two economic development tools, matching grants and the newly authorized Skills Training Investment Credit Act. The BSSC grant program is available to new, expanding and existing business and industry. Eligible training activities include pre-employment skills training and assessment; entry level, skills upgrade and occupational upgrade training; train-the-trainer travel; and capacity-building. The Skills Training Investment Credit Act provides tax credits to existing businesses for skills upgrade training.

RECREATION

The Monticello-Wayne County Park and Recreation Board sponsors many supervised recreation programs and oversees the Monticello-Wayne County Memorial Park. The 86-acre facility offers five shelters, two playgrounds, three basketball courts, three lighted tennis courts, volleyball, badminton, horseshoe pitching, croquet, four softball fields, one baseball field, and horseback riding trails.

An indoor swimming pool is located at the Monticello High School and is available to the community for recreation and instruction.

Special events held during the year in Monticello include: The Wayne County Fair and Horse Show; Monticello Arts and Crafts Festival; and the Christmas Parade.

Private recreational facilities include a country club, a nine-hole golf course, two swimming pools, a movie theatre, and two tennis courts.

The Wayne County Sportsman's Club makes its clubhouse available for community activities. The clubhouse is located on 50 acres and provides kitchen and dining facilities.

APPENDIX - DEFINITIONS

Geographic definition of the labor market area

A county's labor market area is defined as the base county, adjacent counties, and any other major commuting counties. Adjacency is used to define the labor market area primarily because of the small size of Kentucky's counties. The major commuting counties are defined from the point of view of the base county. Major commuting counties are those counties that comprise 90% of the base county's total commuters. The source of the commuting patterns is the 1990 journey-to-work data available from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Example - Logan County

To determine the labor market area for Logan County the following steps are taken. First, the counties with workers commuting into Logan county are listed in ascending order (see the table below). The cumulative percent is calculated. Next, all counties that comprise up to 90% of the commuters are included in the labor market area (actually the cut-off will be the county that breaks the 90% threshold – Montgomery County, TN at 92.6% in this case). Although Robertson is not a major commuter county, it is included since it is adjacent. The Logan County labor market is then comprised of the seven bold-faced counties in the table below.

Potential Labor Supply

The potential labor supply is an estimate of those persons not classified as in the labor force (not employed and not unemployed), but who want a job. The assumption is that people not in the labor force at the local level would like a job at the same rate as the nation. The U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics provides national, yearly estimates of the percent of the people not in the labor force who want a job. This percent is applied to the county-level number of people not in the labor force.

Underemployed

Wholesale/retail trade and non-professional services have historically paid low wages. The assumption is that workers in these industries would take higher paying jobs if they were available. Non-professional services excludes Miscellaneous Repair Services (SIC 7600), Health Services (SIC 8000), Legal Services (SIC 8100), and Engineering and Management Services (SIC 8700).

Total Available Labor

Total available labor is the sum of the number of unemployed, potential labor supply, and underemployed. Please note that the number of unemployed is the only generally accepted measure of labor availability. The other concepts are weaker measures and should be used with caution.
