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

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
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
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OLIVE HILL AND GRAYSON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Olive Hill is located in the western portion of Carter County. Grayson, the county seat of Carter County and the home of Kentucky Christian College, is situated in the eastern portion of the county. Olive Hill is located 156 miles east of Louisville, Kentucky; 162 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio; and 247 miles northeast of Knoxville, Tennessee. The 1984 estimated population of Carter County was 25,669, with 2,653 people in Olive Hill and 3,277 people in Grayson.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Carter County residents employed in 1984 averaged 8,450, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 8,090 workers. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 680 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 1,110 jobs; 320 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 810 employees; contract construction firms provided 150 jobs; and 345 people were employed by mining and quarrying operations.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 16,980 men and 13,730 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1986 through 1990, 7,550 young men and 7,420 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Carter County is directly served by Interstate 64 and U.S. 60, both "AAA"-rated highways. Four trucking companies provide Carter County with interstate and/or intrastate service. Sellers Field, 4 miles southeast of Olive Hill, has a 2,500-foot paved runway. The nearest commercial airline service is Tri-State Airport, 9 miles southwest of Huntington, West Virginia, 37 miles east of Olive Hill.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Olive Hill by the Olive Hill Municipal Electric Company, which is supplied by the Kentucky Power Company. Grayson and Carter County are provided electric power by the Kentucky Power Company. Also serving Carter County is the Grayson RECC. Olive Hill is provided natural gas by the City of Olive Hill Municipal Gas Company. Grayson is provided natural gas by the City of Grayson Utilities. Three distributors of propane and three distributors of distillate fuel oil are located in Carter County.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided to Olive Hill and Grayson by the Carter County School System. Kentucky Christian College, located in Grayson, is a four-year institution designed especially for the preparation of men and women who plan to enter specialized church-related vocations. Vocational training is provided by the Carter County Area Vocational Education Center at Olive Hill and Ashland State Vocational-Technical School at Ashland, 36 miles east of Olive Hill.

LABOR MARKET STATISTICS

The Olive Hill and Grayson Labor Market Area includes Carter County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Boyd, Elliott, Greenup, Lawrence, Lewis and Rowan.

AVERAGE WEEKLY WAGES BY INDUSTRY, BY PLACE OF WORK 1984



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

TRANSPORTATION

Rail

There is no rail line directly serving Olive Hill and Grayson at the present time. The nearest rail service is provided by the Chessie System at Ashland, 36 miles northeast.

Highways

Interstate 64 runs through the middle of Carter County. Two interchanges are located at Olive Hill and one interchange at Grayson. Carter County is also served by U.S. 60 and Kentucky 7, both "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. Interstate 75, a major north-south route, is located 78 miles west of Olive Hill via Interstate 64.

Construction of the 136.4-mile A-A highway is to start in Summer 1986. The A-A highway will stretch from southern Campbell County to Quincy in Lewis County and divide into two spurs from Quincy to U.S. 23 in Greenup County and to I-64 at Grayson. The \$450 million highway is scheduled for completion in 1991.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Olive Hill is served by a mayor and 6 council members. Grayson is served by a mayor and 4 commissioners. Carter County is served by a county judge/executive and 5 magistrates.

Planning and Zoning

At the present time there is no active planning and zoning commission in Olive Hill or Grayson.

Local Fees and Licenses

All property in Kentucky, except items exempted by the state constitution, is taxed by the state. Property which also may be taxed by local jurisdictions includes land and buildings, finished goods inventories, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and office equipment. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, and school districts.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Kentucky Christian College

Kentucky Christian College is a Bible college which was established in Grayson in 1919. The college is a non-profit education institution designed especially for the preparation of men and women who plan to enter specialized church-related vocations. Master of Ministry, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Theology degrees are conferred by the college. The college plans to offer a Bachelor of Business Administration starting in Fall 1986. The Fall 1985 enrollment was 536.

Kentucky Christian College completed construction of a \$1.5 million men's dormitory in Fall 1985. In Spring 1986 a \$225,000 expansion of the library facilities was completed.

* Joint doctoral degree programs are offered in cooperation with the University of Kentucky, Lexington. The degrees are issued by the University of Kentucky.

** Courses in a masters degree program are taught on the Transylvania campus by faculty members of Xavier University of Cincinnati. The degree is issued by Xavier University.

Vocational Schools

The Kentucky Department of Education operates both the state vocationaltechnical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

RECREATION

Local

Recreational facilities in Olive Hill's city park include a swimming pool, a playground, and a picnic area with a shelter house. The Carter County Shrine Club Park, also at Olive Hill, contains a ball field and a horse park with stables. A second ball field is located at the Olive Hill High School.

The Eastern Kentucky Homecoming, an event held annually in Olive Hill, features the famed Olive Hill entertainer and songwriter Tom T. Hall and the Tom T. Hall Golf Tournament. Other attractions of the event are a parade, a horse show, a beauty pageant, music, and local arts and crafts.

Recreational facilities in Grayson include a new swimming pool and bathhouse, tennis courts, ball fields, playgrounds and picnic areas.

The annual Grayson Memory Days Festival features a parade, street dancing, Jaycee horse show, and art show.

Carter Caves State Resort Park, 8 miles north of Olive Hill, provides a restful atmosphere with its mountain wildflowers, a rippling stream, the underground wonders of three caves, a 28-room lodge, a restaurant, and a gift shop. Recreational facilties available include something for the whole family with playgrounds, two swimming pools (one Olympic-size), tennis courts, shuffleboard, a 9-hole golf course, miniature golf, boating, fishing, horseback riding, picnicking, and cave tours.

A trip down Tygarts Creek near Olive Hill offers an opportunity for canoeing, spelunking, hiking, and picnicking. Scheduled canoe trips are available.

Grayson Lake State Park is located 8 miles south of Grayson. Facilities available include 71 campsites, a beach, and a picnic area. Good fishing and organized recreational programs can be found during the summer. The park is located in the 7,350-acre Grayson Lake Wildlife Area.

Area (Within 40 miles)

The Daniel Boone National Forest, approximately 14 miles west of Olive Hill, covers 640,000 acres of timberland in eastern Kentucky. It encompasses much of Kentucky's great beauty and provides a vacation paradise. There are scenic hiking trails, rivers and streams stocked with a variety of fish, hunting preserves, camping sites, and numerous other natural and historical attractions.

Greenbo Lake State Resort Park is located 16 miles north of Grayson near Ashland, has a magnificent fieldstone lodge. The lodge offers 36 rooms, a dining room, a gift shop, a meeting room, a lodge pool, and a recreation room. Other facilities and activities at or near the park include a well-equipped campground, a marina, miniature golf, tennis courts, playgrounds, shuffleboard, planned recreation, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, and picnicking. **Morehead State University** at Morehead, Kentucky, 19 miles southwest of Olive Hill, offers a variety of cultural and athletic activities which may be enjoyed by the public year-round.

Cave Run Lake, constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is located 29 miles southwest of Olive Hill within the 640,000-acre Daniel Boone National Forest. The lake area offers everything for the camper, the boatsman, the hunter, the fisherman, and "the lover of leisure."

Numerous recreational opportunities are also available at Ashland, 36 miles northeast of Olive Hill, including athletics, cultural events, private and public entertainment facilities, fairs and festivals.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

The City of Olive Hill Utilities recently completed a \$30,000 renovation of its electric system.

The Carter County Board of Education recently completed construction of new central offices. Total cost of the facilities was \$350,000.

Kentucky Christian College completed construction of a \$1.5 million men's dormitory in Fall 1985. In Spring 1986 a \$225,000 expansion of the library facilities was completed.

Under Way

The City of Olive Hill Municipal Water Company is currently renovating its water treatment plant. The \$1.2 million project will be completed in October 1986.

Construction of a new 120-bed nursing home, in Grayson, is under way. The new facility will be completed in August 1986.

The City of Grayson has an ongoing downtown revitalization under way.


Construction of a 48-unit apartment complex in Grayson is under way.

Planned

Construction of the 136.4-mile A-A highway is to start in Summer 1986. The A-A highway will travel from southern Campbell County to Quincy in Lewis County and then divide into two spurs from Quincy to U.S. 23 in Greenup County and to I-64 at Grayson. The \$450 million highway is scheduled for completion in 1991.

The City of Olive Hill Municipal Gas Company plans to renovate all of its distribution mains and service lines in Summer 1986. The \$1.3 million project will be completed in November 1986.
