

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ALBANY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Albany, the county seat of Clinton County, is located in south-central Kentucky and had an estimated 1998 population of 2,168. Albany is located 119 miles south of Lexington, Kentucky; 131 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; 117 miles northwest of Knoxville, Tennessee; and 151 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky.

Clinton County is included in a three county area which has been designated a federal empowerment zone. The empowerment zone program provides funding and incentives to create jobs and opportunities for its citizens. Businesses are encouraged to invest in distressed areas encouraged to invest in distressed areas encouraging entrepreneurship, furthering local self-development, and assisting in the revitalization of the area.

Clinton County covers a land area of 198 square miles and had an estimated 1998 population of 9,346 persons. Clinton County is bordered to the south by the Kentucky-Tennessee state line.

The Economic Framework – Clinton County firms employed 2,418 people in 1997. Contract construction firms provided 78 jobs; mining and quarrying firms in the county employed 25; manufacturing firms in the county reported 668 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 535 jobs; 468 were employed in the service industry; and state and local government accounted for 477 jobs.


Labor Supply – There is a current estimated labor supply of 8,783 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1999 through 2003, approximately 3,895 young persons in the labor market area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation – Albany is served by U.S. Highway 127 and Kentucky Route 1590, both AAA-rated trucking highways. Clinton County is served by Kentucky Route 90, also a AAA-rated trucking highway. The Cumberland Parkway is accessible 35 miles north of Albany, while Interstate 40 is accessible 49 miles south of Albany. Interstate 65 and Interstate 75 are accessible 70 miles northwest and 79 miles east, respectively. Twelve trucking companies provides Albany with interstate and/or intrastate service. The Blue Grass Airport and the Nashville International Airport provide the nearest scheduled commercial airline service. Spring Creek Airport, four miles south of Albany, has a 3,025-foot paved runway. The Monticello-Wayne County Airport, 27 miles northeast of Albany, maintains a 4,000-foot paved runway. The nearest rail service is provided by the Norfolk Southern Corporation at Burnside, Kentucky, 46 miles northeast of Albany.

Power and Fuel – Electric power is provided to Albany and Clinton County by South Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is provided by Gasco.

Education – The Clinton County School System provides primary and secondary education to Albany and Clinton County. Six institutions of higher learning are located within 60 miles of Albany. The nearest state technical colleges providing post-secondary education are Somerset Technical College in Somerset; Bowling Green Technical College Glasgow Campus in Glasgow; and Central Kentucky Technical College Danville Campus in Danville. The Clinton County ATC (area technology center) providing secondary education is located in Albany.









LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Albany is governed by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term, while the council members each serve two-year terms. Clinton County is governed by a county judge/executive and six magistrates. Each county official is elected to a four-year term.

Planning and Zoning

Albany and Clinton County are not served by a planning and zoning commission at the present time.

Mandatory state codes - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Albany levies business license fees ranging from \$50 to \$300 annually, depending on the type of business.

Sales and Use Tax

A state sales and use tax is levied at the rate of 6.0% on the purchase or lease price of taxable goods and on utility services. Local sales taxes are not levied in Kentucky.

State and Local Property Taxes

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside the city limits may also be subject to city property taxes. Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value. Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its training and development coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator at the Somerset Technical College.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration and developing training programs within the organization. The Career Connections Assessment Center serving the Albany area is located at the Somerset Technical College.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In the Albany area, adult basic education and adult literacy classes are administered through the In Albany, adult literacy and adult basic education are provided by Clinton County Adult Learning Center..

Articulation agreements developed between various colleges and universities and the Kentucky Tech system allow students to earn credits to be used when matriculating to degree programs at a college or university. The Somerset Technical College has articulation agreements with Somerset Community College and Eastern Kentucky University.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation (BSSC) was established in 1984 by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as an independent, de jure corporation to stimulate economic development through customized business and industry specific skills training programs. The BSSC works with business and industry and Kentucky's educational institutions to establish programs of skills training. The BSSC is attached to the Cabinet for Economic Development for administrative purposes, in recognition of the relationship between economic development and skills training efforts.

The BSSC is comprised of two economic development tools, matching grants and the newly authorized Skills Training Investment Credit Act. The BSSC grant program is available to new, expanding and existing business and industry. Eligible training activities include pre-employment skills training and assessment; entry level, skills upgrade and occupational upgrade training; train-the-trainer travel; and capacity-building. The Skills Training Investment Credit Act provides tax credits to existing businesses for skills upgrade training.

RECREATION

Local recreational facilities in Clinton County include a VFW ball park, Seventy-Six Falls Country Club which offers a nine-hole golf course, a swimming pool, and a community center.

Development of Mountain View Recreational Park is under way in Clinton County. Portions completed include: a picnic area with shelter, four basketball courts, three ballfields, a playground, and a walking trail. In addition, other facilities are in the development stages including: three tennis courts, a small amphitheater, and a lighting system for the entire park.

The Foothills Festival is an annual event held the third weekend in October. Activities include: dances, a beauty pageant, Old Fashioned Days, a parade, music, a 5K run, a street rod show, a clown show, crafts sales, displays, and many more exciting events.

Dale Hollow Lake State Park is located alongside 48 square miles of surface water in southeastern Cumberland and Clinton Counties. Park facilities include a marina, a swimming pool, a picnic area, and 144 sites for tent and trailer camping. Dale Hollow Lake straddles the Kentucky-Tennessee state line. Several private recreation facilities are located near the lake, including Wolf River Resort and Wisdom Dock in Clinton County.

Lake Cumberland State Resort Park near Jamestown, 26 miles north of Albany, is a 3,000-acre park located on the 63,000-acre Lake Cumberland, which sports excellent bass, bluegill, and crappie fishing. The park features a modern 76-room resort lodge which is perched on a high bluff above the lake. The lodge offers an indoor and an outdoor swimming pool, a dining room, gift shop, and a multi-purpose activities center. Other park facilities include 30 cottages, an additional swimming pool, riding stables, tennis courts, hiking trails, a nine-hole golf course, miniature golf, a nature center, a picnic area, and a playground. A marina offers houseboats and fishing boats and motors for rent plus year-round launching ramps. Grider Hill Marina, a privately-owned dock on Lake Cumberland, is located in Clinton County.

APPENDIX A - DEFINITIONS

Geographic definition of the labor market area

A county's labor market area is defined as the base county, adjacent counties, and any other major commuting counties. Adjacency is used to define the labor market area primarily because of the small size of Kentucky's counties. The major commuting counties are defined from the point of view of the base county. Major commuting counties are those counties that comprise 90% of the base county's total commuters. The source of the commuting patterns is the 1990 journey-to-work data available from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Example - Logan County

To determine the labor market area for Logan County the following steps are taken. First, the counties with workers commuting into Logan county are listed in ascending order (see the table below). The cumulative percent is calculated. Next, all counties that comprise up to 90% of the commuters are included in the labor market area (actually the cut-off will be the county that breaks the 90% threshold – Montgomery County, TN at 92.6% in this case). Although Robertson is not a major commuter county, it is included since it is adjacent. The Logan County labor market is then comprised of the seven bold-faced counties in the table below.

Potential Labor Supply

The potential labor supply is an estimate of those persons not classified as in the labor force (not employed and not unemployed), but who want a job. The assumption is that people not in the labor force at the local level would like a job at the same rate as the nation. The U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics provides national, yearly estimates of the percent of the people not in the labor force who want a job. This percent is applied to the county-level number of people not in the labor force.

Underemployed

Wholesale/retail trade and non-professional services have historically paid low wages. The assumption is that workers in these industries would take higher paying jobs if they were available. Non-professional services excludes Miscellaneous Repair Services (SIC 7600), Health Services (SIC 8000), Legal Services (SIC 8100), and Engineering and Management Services (SIC 8700).

Total Available Labor

Total available labor is the sum of the number of unemployed, potential labor supply, and underemployed. Please note that the number of unemployed is the only generally accepted measure of labor availability. The other concepts are weaker measures and should be used with caution.





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
