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

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
GENERAL HIGHWAY MAP

BURKESVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Burkesville, the county seat of Cumberland County, is situated in south central Kentucky's Cumberland Valley, 127 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee, and 136 miles south of Lexington, Kentucky. In 1990, Burkesville had a population of 1,815 persons.

Cumberland County, located adjacent to the Kentucky-Tennessee state line, is a well-dissected plateau in which the most conspicuous topographic feature is the Cumberland River's broad meandering loops. The county has a land area of 304 square miles, and had a 1990 population of 6,784 persons.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Cumberland County residents employed in 1990 averaged 3,257. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 743 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 329 jobs; 331 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 265 employees; contract construction firms provided 9 jobs; and 18 people were employed by mining and quarrying operations.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 7,744 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1990 through 1994, 4,855 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Burkesville is served by Kentucky Highways 61 and 90, both "AAA"-rated highways. Seven common carrier trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Burkesville. Burkesville is located 39 miles east of Glasgow, where CSX Transportation operates the privately owned Glasgow Railroad. The Albany-Spring Creek Airport in Albany, 18 miles southeast of Burkesville, maintains a 2,600-foot paved runway. Scheduled commercial airline service is available at Standiford Field in Louisville, Kentucky; Bluegrass Airport, near Lexington, Kentucky; and Nashville Metropolitan Airport near Nashville, Tennessee. All are within 150 miles of Burkesville.

Power and Fuel - The Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation, whose source of electricity is Tennessee Valley Authority, provides electric power to Burkesville and most of Cumberland County. Burkesville Gas Company supplies natural gas service to Burkesville and parts of Cumberland County.

Education - The Cumberland County Public School System provides the residents of Cumberland County with primary and secondary education. There are three colleges and one state university located within 75 miles of Burkesville. Vocational training is provided by the Clinton County Area Vocational Education Center, 18 miles southeast of Burkesville, and by the Somerset State Vocational-Technical School, 62 miles southeast of Burkesville.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1990





AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



During the twelve months which ended on June 30, 1990, the local employment office filled 4,295 job openings in various occupational categories. TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Burkesville is served by Kentucky Highway 90, a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway, and by Kentucky Highway 61, which is also "AAA"-rated. Burkesville is 14 miles west of U.S. Highway 127 and 31 miles southeast of an interchange of the Cumberland Parkway, a multi-lane toll road. Kentucky 90 and the Cumberland Parkway provide access to Interstate 65 approximately 50 miles west of Burkesville. Kentucky 90 is part of the Appalachian Highway System network which provides Burkesville with access to Interstate 75, 74 miles northeast of the city.


Rail

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Burkesville is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term and the council members serve two-year terms. Cumberland County is served by a county judge/executive and eight magistrates. The county judge and magistrates serve four-year terms.

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Burkesville levies an occupational license tax of one percent on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals and on net profits of businesses with a maximum fee of \$200. A 10% insurance premium tax on policies written within city limits is levied by the City of Burkesville.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. A 15% reduction is automatically granted for accounts receivable.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

Local

A supervised recreation program is held each summer at the Veterans Memorial Park in Burkesville. The park features a swimming pool, lighted baseball and softball fields, a basketball court, a miniature golf course, three lighted tennis courts, a 3/8-mile running track, 1,000 feet of river frontage, and a picnic area. The fairground is also located at the park.

Other public recreational facilities include school playgrounds, basketball courts, tennis courts, and a baseball field. A bowling facility is also located at Burkesville.

A country club is located at 76 Falls, 15 miles from Burkesville, and features a golf course and swimming pool. Membership is open to residents of Cumberland and Clinton Counties.

The Cumberland County Sportsmen's Club owns a 60-acre farm 10 miles south of Burkesville, and sponsors regular trap shoots.

Dale Hollow Lake, nine miles south of Burkesville, is one of the most beautiful lakes in the state of Kentucky. The lake is 63 miles long, with a surface area of some 48 square miles. Its clear, clean water is attractive to fishermen, boaters, swimmers, scubadivers, and all-around sportsmen. Its shoreline is dotted with well established boat docks, fishing camps, launching ramps, motels, and other vacation facilities. These 620 miles of shoreline abound in small game, and Dale Hollow itself serves as a resting place for migratory waterfowl. But fish are the thing Dale Hollow is nationally famous for -- a wide variety of fishing including some of the best sustained bass population in the state. The world record smallmouth grew to its monstrous size--11 pounds, 15 ounces -- in Dale Hollow and was taken out of the Kentucky section of the lake. Dale Hollow winds through the mountains and valleys of the Cumberland foothills, creating inlets and islands that beckon the explorer and convince the vacationer that he's found a world apart.

In addition to the Dale Hollow State Park, other marinas and resorts near Burkesville include: Hendrick's Creek Resort; Sulphur Creek Resort; Wisdom Dock and Wolf River Resort and Marina.

The Cumberland River at Burkesville is a popular trout fishing area. The state of Kentucky stocks tens of thousands of rainbow trout, brown trout, and strippers there annually. One of the most spectacular fishing trips in the county is to float down the Cumberland River from the Wolfe Creek Dam to the Burkesville boat launching ramp a distance of 17 scenic river miles of excellent trout fishing.

Annual events held at Burkesville include the men's and women's Southern Kentucky Softball Tournament, hosted by Burkesville; the Cumberland County Fair, held each August; and the Cumberland River Festival, a three-day arts and crafts show held Labor Day weekend.

A privately owned excursion boat, in Burkesville, is available for touring along the Cumberland River.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Burkesville was chosen as a "Kentucky Certified City" in 1990. The award is based on achievement in the following categories: Economic development (includes tourism or industrial development) community organizations, utilities, infrastructure, community appearance, downtown revitalization, education, and recreation. The Certified Cities Program is sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.


A 40-unit motel opened in Burkesville in the spring of 1990. The \$1.2 million facility is located along the banks of the Cumberland River and provides picnic areas for their guest. Adjacent to the motel on the Cumberland River, is a privately owned excursion boat, used to take small tours on the river.

The Burkesville Municipal Water Works and Sewerage plans to construct a new 500,000-gallon-per-day wastewater treatment plant, utilizing existing facilities for sludge holding. Approximate cost is \$2.5 million and construction will begin in 1993.

Burkesville Municipal Water Works completed a 504,000-gallon-per-day water filtration plant at a cost of \$850,000. The plant has three submersible pumps for raw water intake.

The Cumberland County School System plans to renovate and construct 15 additional classrooms at the elementary school. The \$2.5 million project will begin in June of 1991. The school system also plans to renovate the high school at a cost of \$205,000. This project is scheduled to begin in 1993.

Cumberland Valley Manor, a nursing home in Burkesville, has expanded its facility to include 20 more beds.
