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

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JACKSON COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

McKee, the county seat of Jackson County, is situated in the southwestern portion of the Eastern Kentucky Coal Field Region. McKee had a 1998 estimated population of 953. The city of Annville is located fifteen miles south of McKee and had an estimated population of 489 in 1998.

Jackson County covers a land area of 346 square miles and had an estimated 1999 population of 13,040 persons. A major portion of Jackson County lies within the Daniel Boone National Forest and contains some of the most beautiful woodlands and ruggedly scenic areas in the state.

Jackson County is part of a three-county area which has been designated a Federal Empowerment Zone. The designation means the federal government will make \$40 million available to the entire zone for economic and community development over a ten-year period. The program provides tax benefits, financial incentives, and relief from federal, state and local regulations. Businesses are encouraged to invest in distressed areas encouraging entrepreneurship, furthering local self-development, and assisting in the revitalization of the area. Part of the funds can be used for improving the current workforce, including job skills training, capital for new or expanding businesses, and consulting services.

The Economic Framework – Jackson County firms employed 2,799 people in 1997. Contract construction firms provided 70 jobs; manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,024 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 263 jobs; 393 were employed in the service industry; and state and local government accounted for 658 jobs.


Labor Supply – There is a current estimated labor supply of 32,205 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1999 through 2003, approximately 15,154 young persons in the labor market area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation – Jackson County is served directly by U.S. Highway 421, an AAA-rated trucking highway, and Kentucky Highways 30 and 89, both AA-rated trucking highways. Interstate 75 is accessible 27 miles south of Annville. Nine common carrier trucking companies serve Jackson County. CSX Transportation provides mail line rail service at Berea, 34 miles northwest of Annville. Blue Grass Airport near Lexington, provides the nearest scheduled commercial airline service, and is located 84 miles northwest of Annville. The Madison County Airport near Richmond, 43 miles north of Annville, maintains a 4,000 foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel – The Jackson Energy Cooperative provides electric power to Jackson County. Annville Gas Transmission Company provides natural gas service to the Jackson County-McKee Industrial Park.

Education – The Jackson County School system provides primary and secondary level education to McKee and Jackson County. Twelve colleges and universities are located within 60 miles of Annville. The nearest state technical college, providing post-secondary education, is the Laurel County Technical College in London. The nearest area technology centers (ATC) providing secondary education are Clay Co. ATC in Manchester; Rockcastle Co. ATC in Mount Vernon; Lee Co. ATC in Beattyville; Corbin ATC in Corbin; Knox Co. ATC in Barbourville; Leslie Co. ATC in Hyden; Madison Co. ATC in Richmond; Breathitt Co. ATC in Jackson; and Garrard Co. ATC in Lancaster; all within 40 miles of Annville.







TRANSPORTATION

Highways

U. S. Highway 421, an AAA-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway, serves Annville and Jackson County. U.S. 421 connects with Interstate 75 at Berea, 35 miles northwest and with the Daniel Boone Parkway, a limited access toll road, at Manchester. U.S. 421 has been widened and improved just south of Berea at Bighill. Kentucky Highway 30 and 89, both 11-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) truck highway, also serve Jackson County.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Jackson County is governed by a county judge/executive and three magistrates. Each official is elected to a four-year term. McKee and Annville are governed by a mayor and six council members. The mayor serves a four-year term, while the council members each serve two-year terms.

Planning and Zoning

Jackson County does not have a planning and zoning commission at the present time.

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of McKee levies an annual business license fee of \$50. Annual unloading license fees are \$50 for trucks under 3/4 ton capacity and \$75 for trucks 3/4 ton capacity and over. The City of Annville does not levy any business license fees.

Sales and Use Tax

A state sales and use tax is levied at the rate of 6.0% on the purchase or lease price of taxable goods and on utility services. Local sales taxes are not levied in Kentucky.

State and Local Property Taxes

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside the city limits may also be subject to city property taxes. Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value. Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its training and development coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established

and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator at the Laurel County Technical College.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration and developing training programs within the organization. The Career Connections Assessment Center serving the Jackson County area is located at the Laurel County Technical College.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In the Jackson County area, adult basic education is provided through the Jackson County Board of Education and adult literacy classes are administered through the Appalachian Communities for Children.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation (BSSC) was established in 1984 by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as an independent, de jure corporation to stimulate economic development through customized business and industry specific skills training programs. The BSSC works with business and industry and Kentucky's educational institutions to establish programs of skills training. The BSSC is attached to the Cabinet for Economic Development for administrative purposes, in recognition of the relationship between economic development and skills training efforts.

The BSSC is comprised of two economic development tools, matching grants and the newly authorized Skills Training Investment Credit Act. The BSSC grant program is available to new, expanding and existing business and industry. Eligible training activities include pre-employment skills training and assessment; entry level, skills upgrade and occupational upgrade training; train-the-trainer travel; and capacity-building. The Skills Training Investment Credit Act provides tax credits to existing businesses for skills upgrade training.

RECREATION

Five public recreational parks are located in Jackson County, including the communities of McKee, Annville, Sandgap and Gray Hawk. Each park provides facilities for softball, soccer, football, basketball, tennis, horseshoes, volleyball, jogging, playgrounds and picnics. Organized activities include softball leagues for both men and women; senior, little and t-ball leagues; basketball and volleyball leagues; rappelling clubs; Kentucky Long Rifle and American Sharps Competitive Shooting Clubs. Two private summer camps for children are also located in Jackson County.

Jackson County's senior population enjoys activities and meals in a newly constructed facility that is both functional and attractive. Pick-up bus service is available as well as home-delivered meals.

The Community Center in McKee, in the old McKee School, is available to rent for social gatherings, reunions, receptions, etc.

Annual events include the Bighill Bluegrass Music Festival in August; the Jackson County Fair and Homecoming held the week before Labor Day weekend; the July 4th picnic and fireworks; and the Stringbean Music Festivals in the summer and fall.

The Daniel Boone National Forest, which traverses Jackson County, covers 640,000 acres of timberland in eastern Kentucky with 56,000 acres in Jackson County. It encompasses much of Kentucky's great beauty and provides a vacation paradise. There are scenic hiking trails, rivers and streams stocked with a variety of fish, hunting preserves, camping sites and numerous other natural and historical attractions.

APPENDIX A - DEFINITIONS

Geographic definition of the labor market area

A county's labor market area is defined as the base county, adjacent counties, and any other major commuting counties. Adjacency is used to define the labor market area primarily because of the small size of Kentucky's counties. The major commuting counties are defined from the point of view of the base county. Major commuting counties are those counties that comprise 90% of the base county's total commuters. The source of the commuting patterns is the 1990 journey-to-work data available from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Example - Logan County

To determine the labor market area for Logan County the following steps are taken. First, the counties with workers commuting into Logan county are listed in ascending order (see the table below). The cumulative percent is calculated. Next, all counties that comprise up to 90% of the commuters are included in the labor market area (actually the cut-off will be the county that breaks the 90% threshold – Montgomery County, TN at 92.6% in this case). Although Robertson is not a major commuter county, it is included since it is adjacent. The Logan County labor market is then comprised of the seven bold-faced counties in the table below.

Potential Labor Supply

The potential labor supply is an estimate of those persons not classified as in the labor force (not employed and not unemployed), but who want a job. The assumption is that people not in the labor force at the local level would like a job at the same rate as the nation. The U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics provides national, yearly estimates of the percent of the people not in the labor force who want a job. This percent is applied to the county-level number of people not in the labor force.

Underemployed

Wholesale/retail trade and non-professional services have historically paid low wages. The assumption is that workers in these industries would take higher paying jobs if they were available. Non-professional services excludes Miscellaneous Repair Services (SIC 7600), Health Services (SIC 8000), Legal Services (SIC 8100), and Engineering and Management Services (SIC 8700).

Total Available Labor

Total available labor is the sum of the number of unemployed, potential labor supply, and underemployed. Please note that the number of unemployed is the only generally accepted measure of labor availability. The other concepts are weaker measures and should be used with caution.
