Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

Morehead is located 3 miles east of an interchange of Interstate 64. Interstate 64 provides access from Morehead to Lexington, approximately 65 miles west, where there are interchanges for Interstate 75 and the Blue Grass Parkway, making the central and western part of the state easily accessible. The Mountain Parkway, which runs east to west, has an interchange 43 miles west of Morehead via Interstate 64. Morehead is also served by U.S. 60 and Kentucky Highway 32, both class "AAA" trucking highways, and Kentucky Highway 519, a class "AA" trucking highway.

Kentucky Highway 32, from Morehead to Flemingsburg, is being widened and construction is expected to be completed in fall 1981.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.241 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

Morehead State University strives to develop programs to fulfill the goal of serving the economic, educational, social, and cultural needs of northern and eastern Kentucky. Consistent with this goal is the idea that it is essential to develop and explore new facets of knowledge. Hence, the university constructed an Energy Research Lab, which was dedicated in September 1980. Funds for the lab were donated by Ashland Oil, Inc., in the amount of \$50,000. The lab includes one large work area and five smaller work areas which will be used by students and faculty in the Mining Technology Program who are involved in energy research.

Physical education is as important as any form of education and to improve this area Morehead State University is constructing a \$7.5 million Academic-Athletic Center. It will have a seating capacity of 7,500 to 9,000, a swimming pool, other physical education facilities, and athletic department offices. An early 1981 completion date is expected.

Vocational Schools

RECREATION

Local

Morehead's wide variety of recreational facilities provide yearround activity for young and old. Outdoor facilities available include a municipal park, two playgrounds, five baseball diamonds, an Olympicsize swimming pool, outdoor multi-purpose court, four lit tennis courts, and one drive-in theater. Indoor recreational facilities include two indoor theaters; a Teen Center at the municipal park, which features a main room that accommodates 100 people and offices for the recreation director and staff; and the Carl D. Perkins Community Center, which has a large meeting room for 300 people, smaller meeting rooms for 50 people, a kitchen facility, and an arts and crafts area. Organized activities include the Morehead-Rowan County Police Department-Police-Youth Athletic League. It is planned that Morehead will be the location of the American Legion 7-State Regional Baseball Tournament in August 1981. Also the Jaycees have a 100-acre farm where the county fair is held each year.

Morehead State University provides the community with many recreational facilities and activities. The public is permitted to use such university facilities as the indoor swimming pool, the golf course, three racquetball courts, and 24 lit tennis courts. The university also provides an exhibition center on a university farm for horse shows, cattle shows, etc. In the summer the exhibition center is turned into an indoor track. All Morehead State University sporting events are also open to the public.

The university's plans for the future include the construction of a \$7.5 million Academic-Athletic Center which will have a seating capacity of 7,500 to 9,000, a swimming pool, other physical education facilities, and athletic department offices. An early 1981 completion date is expected.

A wealth of cultural activities can be found in Morehead. The Morehead-Rowan County Arts Commission schedules ballets, operas, etc., and utilizes Morehead State University facilities for these events.

The university supports cultural awareness with a university lecture series, and the Morehead State University Summer Theatre, which puts on an open-air theater on the banks of Cave Run Lake during the summer months. They hope to soon have their own amphitheatre for these performances.

The Appalachian Development Center sponsors the Mountain Heritage Festival in Morehead, which features music and crafts.

Area (Within 60 miles)

Morehead, Kentucky, is located in the northern section of the 640,000-acre Daniel Boone National Forest. There are many recreational sites within the forest's boundaries, and those located within 60 miles of Morehead include Cave Run Lake, Red River Gorge, Natural Bridge State Resort Park and the Pioneer Weapons Hunting area.

Cave Run Lake, constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is located just seven miles southwest of Morehead within the 640,000acre Daniel Boone National Forest. The lake area offers everything for the camper, the boatsman, the hunter, the fisherman, and "the lover of leisure". It is becoming a very popular spot for muskie fishing, as sited in <u>Outdoor Life</u>, <u>Sports Afield</u>, <u>The Courier Journal</u>, and other publications.

The Pioneer Weapons Hunting Area, 20 miles south of Morehead, is a 7,300-acre preserve, where hunters may take deer, turkey, and grouse, using primitive weapons only.

The Red River Gorge, approximately 45 miles south of Morehead, is a spectacular boulder-strewn, area of rugged woodlands, streams, cliffs, overlooks, arches, and rare plant and animal life.

Natural Bridge State Resort Park at Slade, 50 miles south of Morehead, is a 1,899-acre park located in the Daniel Boone National Forest where cliffs and stone arches fill the landscape. The rugged awesomeness of the great Natural Bridge, the largest of 12 natural sandstone arches in the park, is the main attraction. The park has a 35-room resort lodge with a dining room and gift shop, efficiency and one-bedroom cottages, and 95 camping sites. Other facilities include a 54-acre lake, a swimming pool, picnic shelters and playgrounds, hiking trails, and a riding stable. A skylift going up to Natural Bridge is operated from April 15 to October 31 each year.

Carter Caves State Resort Park, 20 miles northeast of Morehead, provides a restful atmosphere with its mountain wildflowers, a rippling stream, the underground wonders of three caves, a lodge, a restaurant, and a gift shop. Recreational facilities available include something for the whole family with playgrounds, a swimming pool, tennis courts, a shuffleboard court, a 9-hole golf course, boating, fishing, horseback riding, picnicking and cave tours.

Grayson Lake State Park is located 30 miles northeast of Morehead near Grayson. Facilities available include 71 campsites, a beach, and a picnic area. Good fishing and organized recreational programs can be found during the summer. The park is located in the 7,350-acre Grayson Lake Wildlife Area. Hunting information is available from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. The Rosedale Recreation Area, located near a dam on Grayson Lake, includes Kitchen House, a log house circa 1838 which was the scene of a Civil War skirmish. The nearby Camp Webb Conservation Center has a wildlife musuem. Greenbo Lake State Resort Park, which is located 40 miles northeast of Morehead near Ashland, has a magnificent fieldstone lodge and every article in each room of the lodge has been made in Kentucky. The lodge offers 36 lodge rooms, a dining room, a gift shop, a meeting room, a lodge pool, and a recreation room. Other facilities and activities at the park include a well-equipped campground, a marina, miniature golf, tennis courts, playgrounds, shuffleboard, planned recreation, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, and picnicking.

The spirit of Daniel Boone and his pioneers is reborn at Fort Boonesborough State Park in Boonesboro, 54 miles southwest of Morehead. In the re-created fort 16 pioneer crafts of the eighteenth century are demonstrated by Kentuckians using functioning antiques from the frontier Cabins are furnished as they would have been in the days of Boone era. and documentary films are presented which depict the struggle of the first Kentuckians to make the Kentucky wilderness a home. A gift shop within the fort offers for sale all the handcrafted items made at the fort, along with a wide variety of handcrafts from throughout Kentucky. Other recreational facilities and activities of the park include the finest sand beach on the Kentucky River with a modern bathhouse, sun deck, and snack shop; a modern camping area with 187 sites; a central service building housing showers, restrooms, and laundry facilities for campers; a pavilion with a gift shop and grocery inside and a playground and basketball, volleyball, and shuffleboard courts on the grounds; and planned daily activities and special events under the guidance of a trained recreation director. Near the park is the dock of the Dixie Belle sternwheel excursion boat which operates one-hour trips daily on the Kentucky River leaving from the Fort Boonesborough boat dock.

Blue Licks Battlefield State Park is located near Mt. Olivet, 60 miles northwest of Morehead. The 100-acre park is on the site of what is known as "The Last Battle of the Revolution" and the last major confrontation between the Indians and the pioneers. A musuem features Indian and pioneer artifacts, an audiovisual program, and prehistoric bones from animals trapped at Blue Licks. Facilities include ten primitive campsites, a gift shop, picnic shelters and grills, a play-ground, a snack bar, and an Olympic-size swimming pool. Fishing is available at the Licking River which runs through the park.

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
