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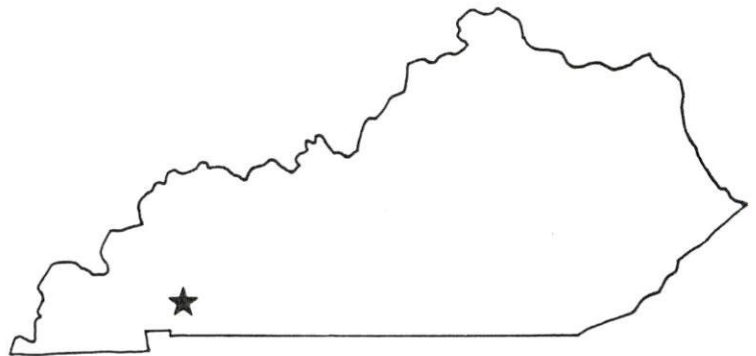

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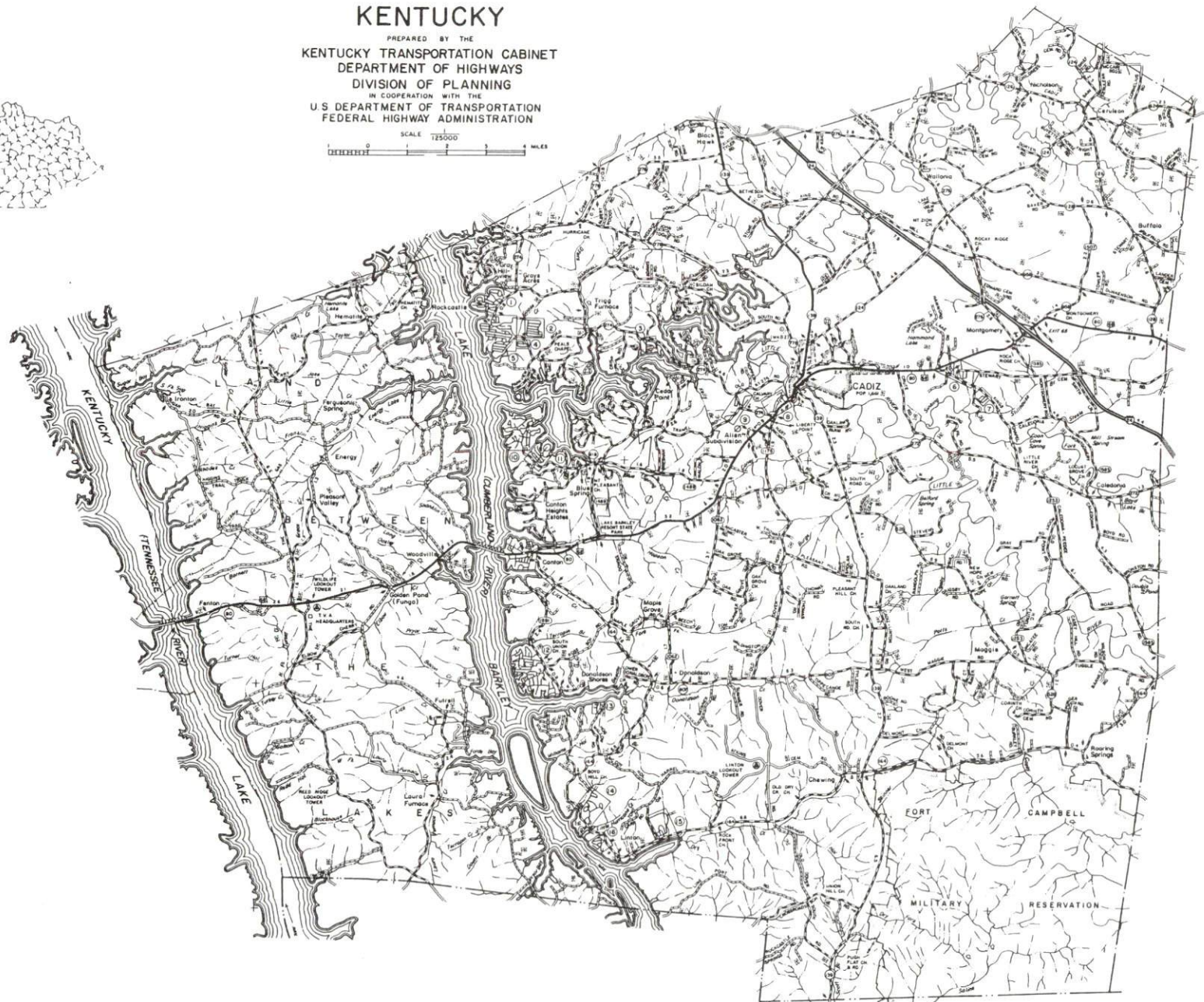

CADIZ, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Cadiz, the county seat of Trigg County, is located in southwestern Kentucky near Lake Barkley, one of the state's largest and most popular waterways. The city is situated 87 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee, and 184 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky. Cadiz had a 1990 population of 2,148 persons.

Trigg County comprises a land area of 421 square miles. The Kentucky-Tennessee state line forms the county's southern border, and Lake Barkley and Kentucky Lake - the latter of which forms the county's western boundary - run through the western portion of the county. The peninsula between these two waterways, the Land Between the Lakes, is a popular recreation area. Fort Campbell Military Reservation reaches into southeastern Trigg County and is an important economic influence on the area. Trigg County had a 1990 population of 10,361 persons.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Trigg County residents employed in 1990 averaged 3,893. In 1989, manufacturing firms in the county reported 914 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 404 jobs; 306 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 526 employees; and contract construction firms provided 82 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 21,019 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1990 through 1994, 10,511 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

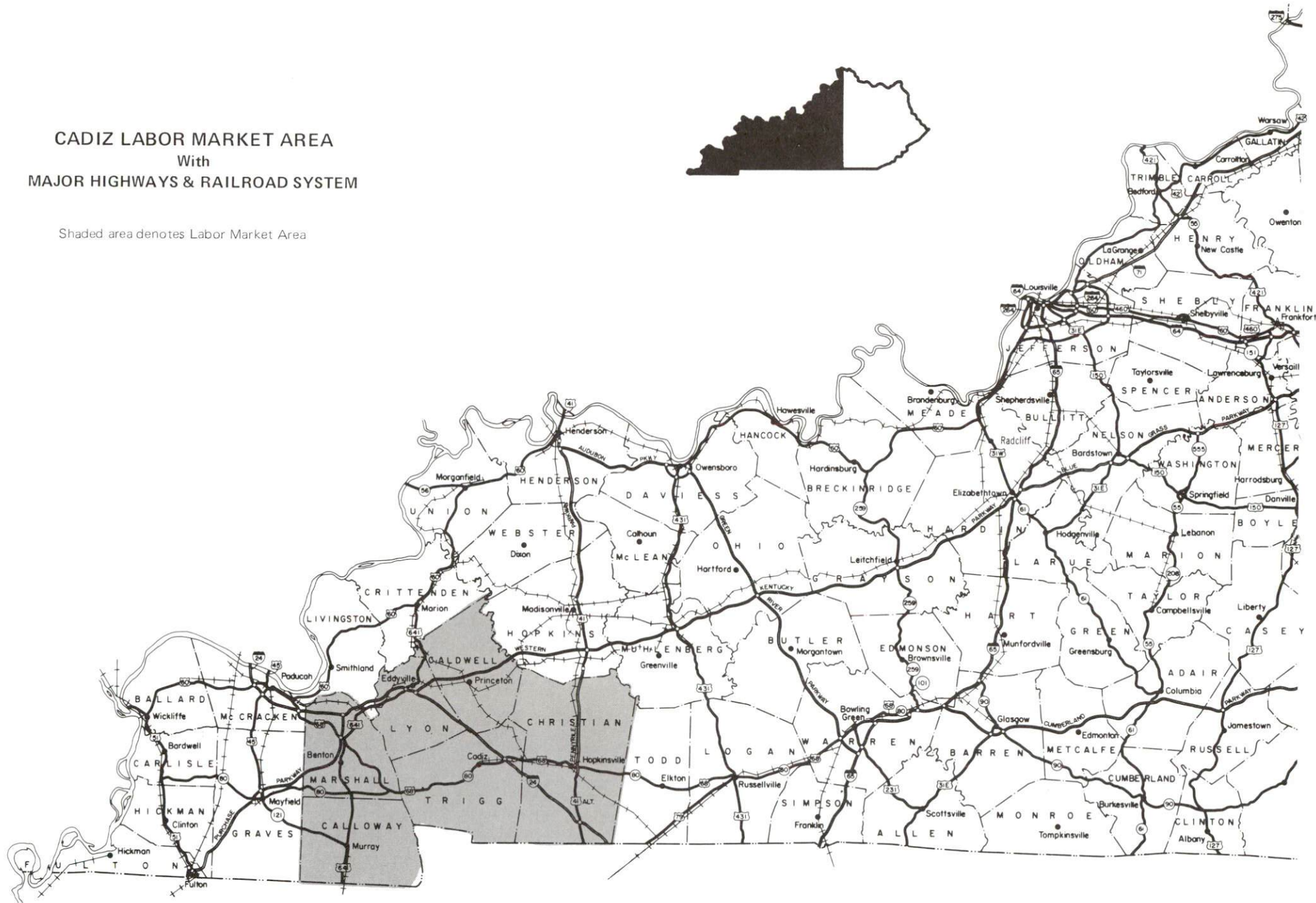
Transportation - U.S. Highway 68/Kentucky Highway 80 is a "AAA"-rated highway serving Cadiz, and provides access to Interstate 24, six miles east of the city. Eighteen trucking companies provide motor freight service to Cadiz. CSX Transportation provides the nearest rail service at Hopkinsville, Kentucky, 22 miles east. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Paducah, Kentucky's Barkley Regional Airport, 68 miles northwest of Cadiz, and at Nashville Metropolitan Airport in Nashville, Tennessee, 93 miles southeast of Cadiz. A private airstrip is located less than two miles from Cadiz, and an airport with a 4,800-foot runway is located at Lake Barkley State Resort Park, six miles from Cadiz. The nearest navigable waterway is Lake Barkley, eight miles west of Cadiz. A public riverport is located on Lake Barkley near Eddyville, 30 miles northwest of Cadiz.

Power and Fuel - The Pennyriple Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation provides electric power to Cadiz and Trigg County. Western Kentucky Gas Company provides natural gas service to Cadiz.

Education - The Trigg County School System, accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, provides primary and secondary public education to Trigg County. Seventeen institutions of higher learning are located within 90 miles of Cadiz. Vocational training is available at the Caldwell County Area Vocational Education Center at Princeton, Kentucky, 20 miles north of Cadiz, and at Madisonville State Vocational-Technical School at Madisonville, Kentucky, 55 miles northeast of Cadiz.

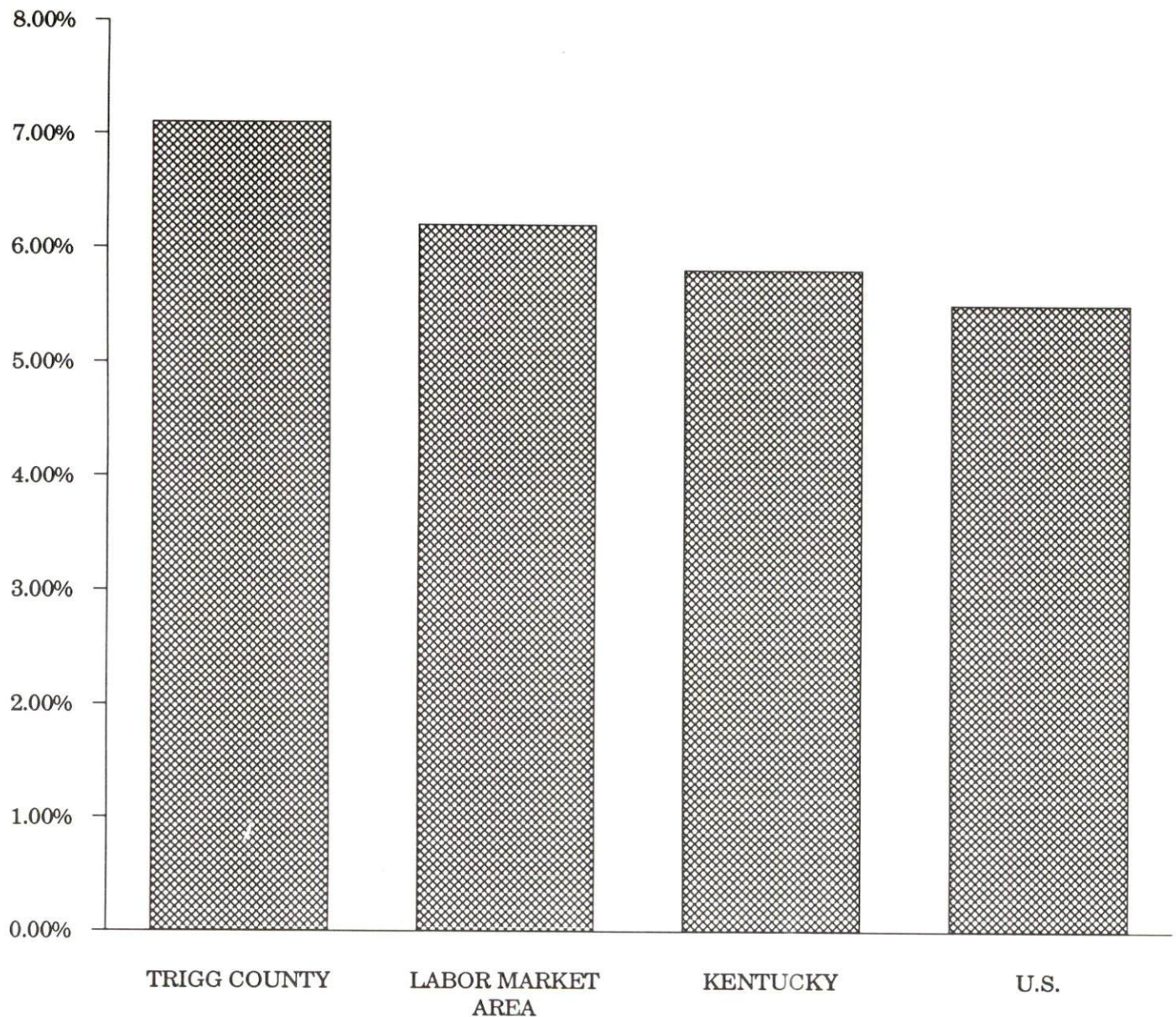

UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1990

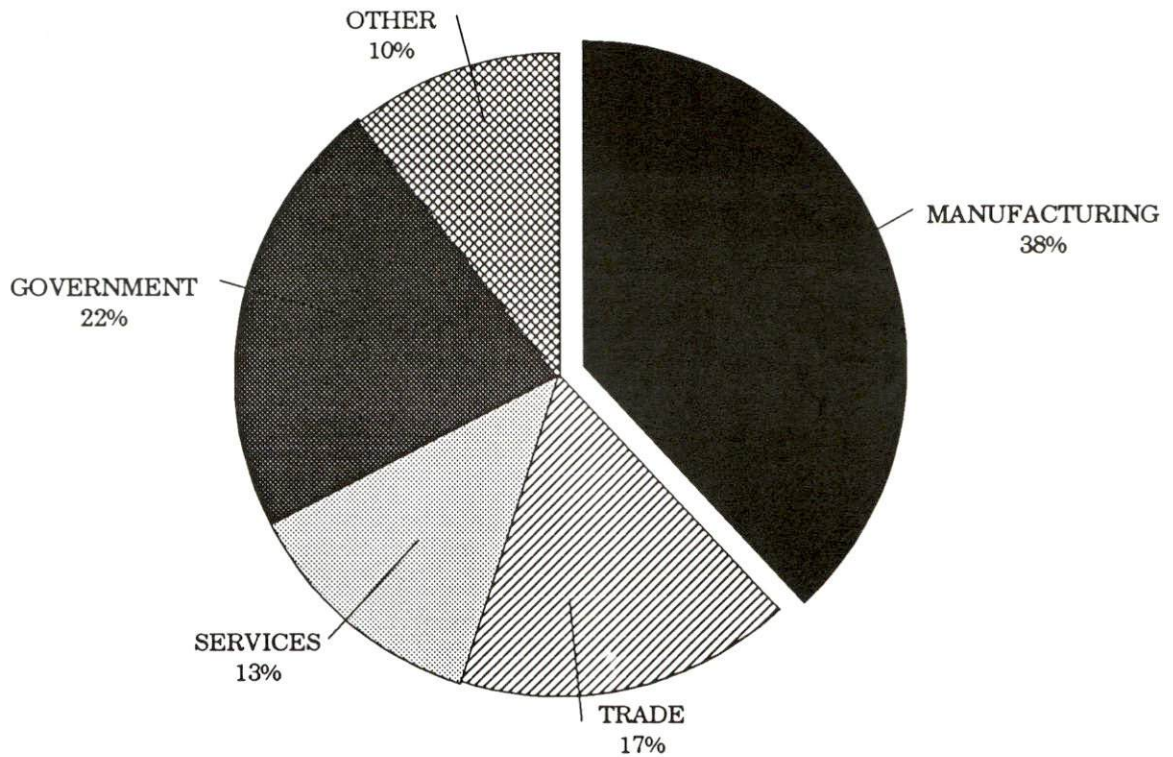

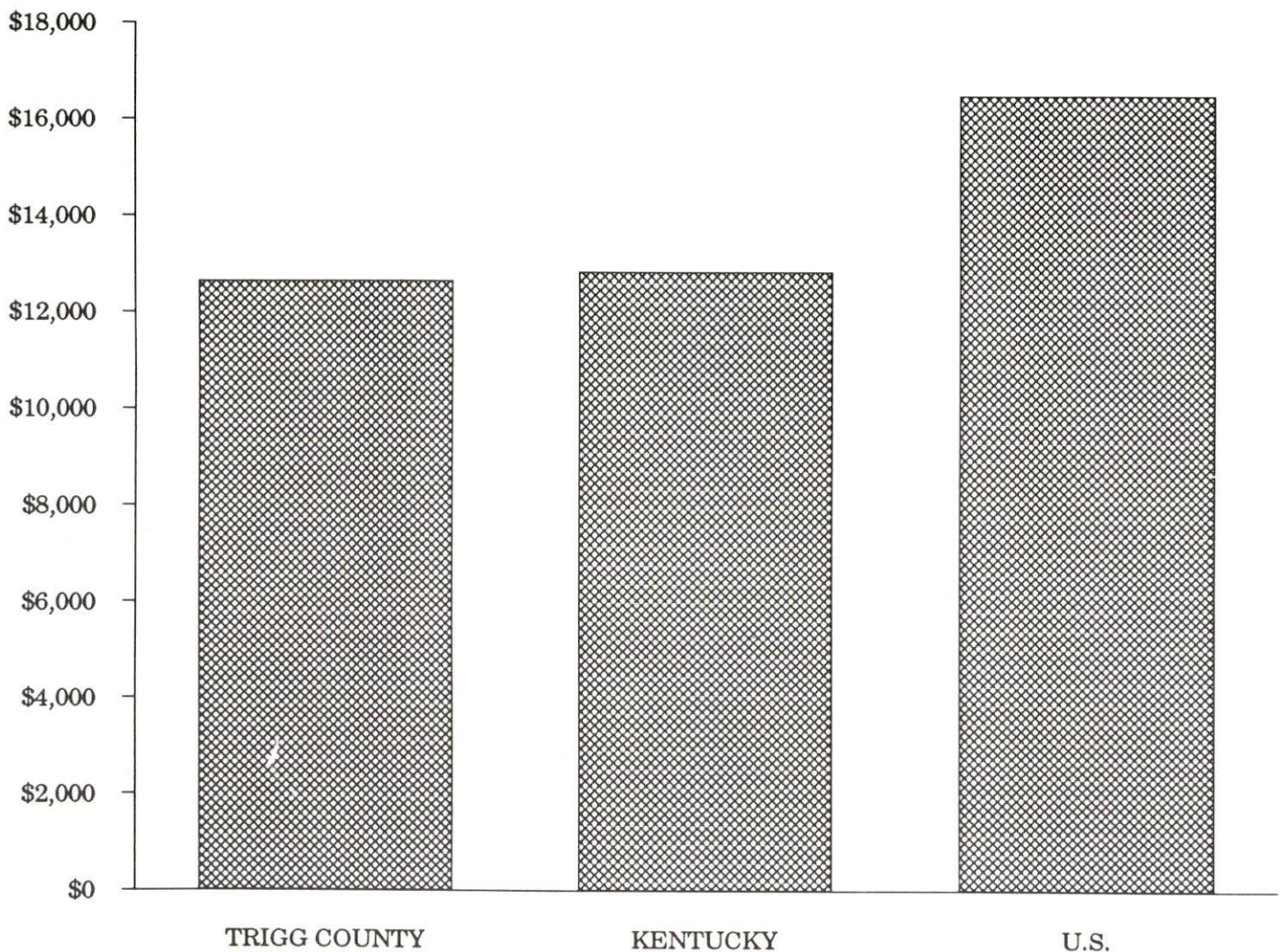

AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES

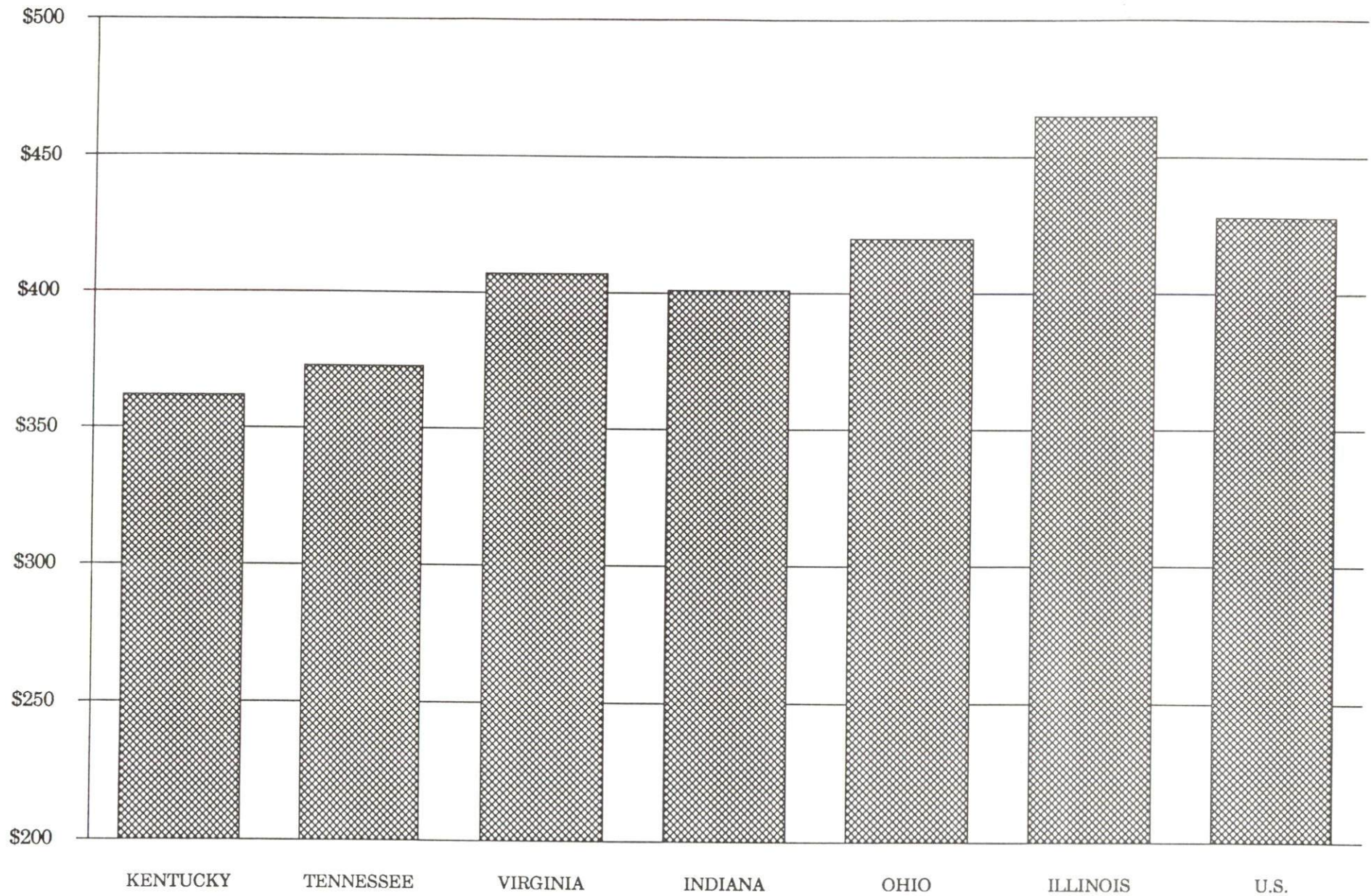
Trigg County is served by the Hopkinsville local office of the Kentucky Department for Employment Services. The focus of the following data is on job placements made by the Hopkinsville local office and may therefore be used as an indicator of the wages which employers in the area pay new employees. During the twelve months which ended on June 30, 1990, the local employment office filled 1,598 job openings in various occupational categories. TRANSPORTATION

Highways

U.S. Highway 68/Kentucky Highway 80 is a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway serving Cadiz. Interstate Highway 24 is accessible six miles east of Cadiz via U.S. 68/Kentucky 80. Interstate 24 and U.S. 68 provide access to the Western Kentucky Parkway, a multi-lane highway 29 miles northwest of Cadiz. The Pennyryle Parkway, a multi-lane toll road, is accessible 23 miles east of Cadiz via U.S. 68. Cadiz is also served by Kentucky Route 139, a "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway.

A construction project to widen U.S. Highway 68 from Cadiz to Bowling Green is planned. Details include widening the existing highway to four lanes and re-routing portions of the segment to straighten the highway. In addition, a 6.3-mile bypass will be constructed to the south side of Cadiz.

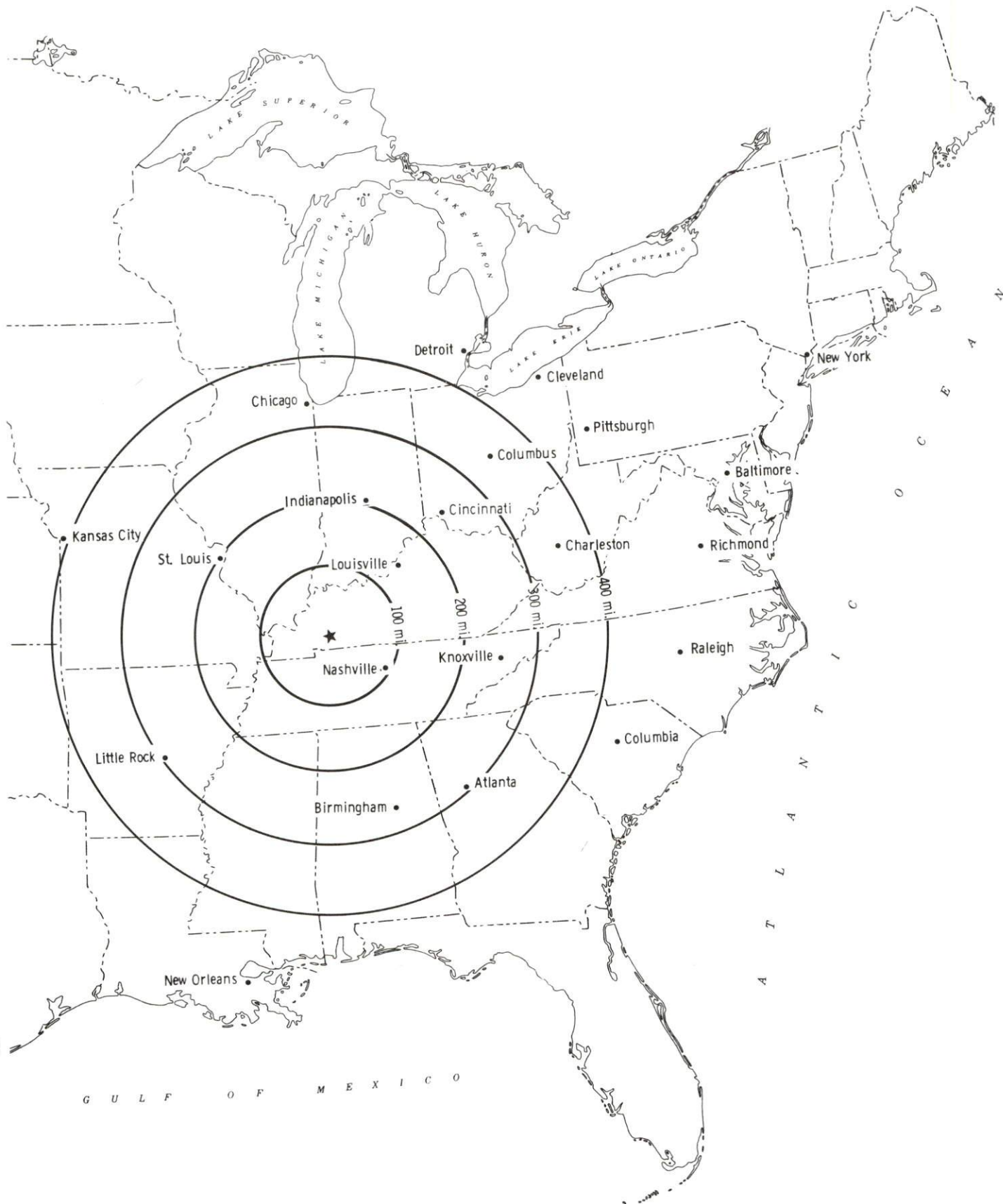

Water

The nearest navigable waterway, Lake Barkley, is an impoundment of the Cumberland River, which runs through western Trigg County approximately eight miles west of Cadiz. Kentucky Lake, an impoundment of the Tennessee River, forms Trigg County's western boundary. Both waterways are important commercial routes connecting the south-central U.S. with the Ohio River. A public riverport with cargo transfer and storage facilities is located on Lake Barkley near Eddyville, 30 miles northwest of Cadiz. A public riverport also is located 41 miles southeast of Cadiz at Clarksville, Tennessee.

The Cadiz Water Department recently completed construction of a 200,000-gallon elevated water storage tank. In addition, the Water Department plans to expand its existing water treatment plant from 500,000 gallons per day to 1,000,000 gallons per day at an estimated cost of \$1.2 million. As a part of the project, the distribution mains and the overall system will be upgraded. The scheduled completion date is October 1992.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Cadiz is governed by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term, while the council members each serve two-year terms. Trigg County is governed by a county judge/executive and seven magistrates. Each county official serves a four-year term.

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Cadiz levies a business privilege license tax based upon gross receipts; the tax is calculated using one of three schedules. The schedule applicable to manufacturers results in a tax levy of approximately one-tenth of one percent of gross receipts. The City of Cadiz also levies an earnings tax of one percent of gross wages and salaries earned by persons for work done in the city and a five percent tax on insurance premiums. The charge for an unloading license is \$35.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. A 15% reduction is automatically granted for accounts receivable.

The Trigg County School System completed construction of a five-room addition to Trigg County's vocational complex. This improvement assists the school system in further integrating vocational and general education classes. In addition, the School System is in the process of acquiring a vacated industrial building to renovate and convert to central offices for the Board of Education. The \$100,000 project will also create space for preschool classes.

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

Cadiz is a recreation paradise boasting western Kentucky's finest facilities for boating, fishing, hunting, golfing, water sports, and year-round scenic beauty. More than 360 miles of shore line surround Barkley and Kentucky Lakes within the boundaries of Cadiz and Trigg County. For easy lake access there are 16 boat ramps throughout the county. Several privately-owned marinas, campgrounds and resorts encompass Lake Barkley in Trigg County, providing tourists and local residents with all the facilities necessary to enjoy the scenic lake areas.

The 100-acre Trigg County Recreation Complex serves local residents with lighted softball fields, horse show rings, a motorcycle track, hiking trails and picnic facilities.

Located in west Cadiz is a park developed by the Army Corps of Engineers. Built on the shores of Little River (a canal to Lake Barkley), the park offers a boat ramp and fishing accessibility. The park also has a childrens' playground, picnic tables and restroom facilities.

Annual events in Cadiz include: Lake Barkley Crappiethon, a nationally renowned tournament held March through May; July 4th Weekend, held at the Trigg County Recreation Complex, with activities including square dancing, tractor pulls, softball tournaments, arts and crafts, and moto-cross racing; Boots Randolph Golf Tournament, held during the third weekend of September at Lake Barkley State Resort Park; Trigg County Country Ham Festival, held the second weekend in October; Trail of Trees, participated in by Main Street merchants beginning December 1; and The Holiday House, held at the original log cabin on Main Street, featuring more than a dozen different Christmas trees decorated by the members of the local Homemakers Club. All December events are kicked off with a Main Street Christmas Parade, the first Saturday in December.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, seven miles from Cadiz, is located on an embayment of Lake Barkley. The magnificent lodge includes 130 rooms, five suites, 13 cottages, a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, two meeting rooms, and a recreation room. An activities center with a capacity for 1,000, a complete fitness center, and an 80-site campground are located near the lodge. A lodge pool, a beach and a bathhouse, an 18-hole golf course, a pro shop, tennis courts, a riding stable, a trapshooting range, a basketball court, hiking trails, playgrounds, and a picnic area round out the recreational facilities. The marina near the lodge has everything for the "boat lover": covered and open slips, a launching ramp, and rentals for fishing boats, skiing boats, and pleasure ride pontoons. An airport, including a 4,800-foot lighted airstrip, is available.

The Land Between the Lakes, located on a 170,000-acre wooded peninsula, is an outdoor recreational and conservational education center. The Golden Pond Visitors Center offers a multi-media theatre/planetarium and observatory. Camping, swimming, fishing, boating, hiking, a buffalo herd on a 250-acre range, an Environmental Education Center for school study groups, an educational farm and a central station with films and displays are among the attractions. Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley are among the top fishing and water sport recreation areas in the southeastern United States.

Cadiz's nostalgic downtown Main Street, on Highway 68, features two- and three-story historical buildings occupied by retail merchants and business offices. The city of Cadiz became one of 23 Kentucky-sponsored Main Street cities in January 1987. This is a nation-wide program which works toward the promotion and preservation of a city's downtown district.

The Trigg County Museum recently opened near Cadiz. The museum, which displays memorabilia and artifacts from the area, is housed in a reconstructed 1812 log cabin once the home of native son Boots Randolph. A 1942 train engine is also featured.

Area (Within 45 miles)

Charm and serenity exemplify Kenlake State Resort Park which is located on Kentucky Lake, 25 miles southwest of Cadiz. The park offers hotel and cottage accommodations and an efficient camping site. Other facilities include a nine-hole golf course, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, boating, picnicking, planned recreation, an activities room, and one of the finest tennis complexes in the area.

Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine is located 33 miles east of Cadiz at Fairview. The shrine is at the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, a former U.S. Senator, Secretary of War, and the only president of the Confederate States of America. The park contains a 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top for viewing, a museum, a gift shop, and a playground with picnic tables.

Pennyrile Forest State Resort Park near Dawson Springs is located 39 miles northeast of Cadiz. The 24-room lodge, 13 cottages, and 68 campsites nestled within the trees provide excellent accommodations. Other facilities and activities include a dining room, a gift shop, rental rowboats and pedal boats, a nine-hole golf course, miniature golf, hiking trails, horseback riding, picnicking, playgrounds, shuffleboard, swimming at the lodge pool and off a sand beach, and two tennis courts. Lake Beshear, only four miles from the lodge, sports good fishing.

Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park, located 45 miles northwest of Cadiz near Gilbertsville, is one of the largest and most popular vacation resorts in Kentucky. A modern lodge with 72 rooms, a small lodge with 14 rooms, 67 cottages, and a 221-site campground make up the accommodations. The park includes a 4,000-foot lighted airstrip. There is also a dining room overlooking Kentucky Lake, a coffee shop, a snack bar, two gift shops, a meeting room, an activities center, and a recreation room. Recreational activities to choose from include boating and fishing at the largest docking facility in the Kentucky parks system, golf at the 18-hole Village Green Course, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, picnicking, swimming at the lodge pool, a sand beach, and tennis.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Cadiz re-certified as a "Kentucky Certified City" in 1990 for its' second consecutive year. Re-certification is based on achievement in the following areas: existing industry assistance, small business assistance, educational resources, and community development factors of health care, public safety, arts and culture; recreation, governmental awareness and resources. The Certified Cities Program is sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

Recent

Four new manufacturing firms including B&E Manufacturing; Bronco Spring, Inc.; Kentucky Lakes Hosiery; and Silhouettes, recently initiated operations in Cadiz and created approximately 50 new jobs.

A \$3 million commercial development project was recently completed at the intersection of U.S. Highway 68 east and Interstate 24. The development included construction of a 50-unit motel, restaurants, convenience stores, specialty shops, and an information center. The new businesses created approximately 100 new jobs.

The Cadiz Wastewater Department recently completed a renovation and expansion of its existing wastewater treatment plant and system. The plant was expanded from 300,000 gallons per day to 600,000 gallons per day at a cost of \$1.2 million.

The Cadiz Water Department recently completed construction of a 200,000-gallon elevated water storage tank.

The Trigg County School System completed construction of a five-room addition to Trigg County's vocational complex. This improvement assists the school system in further integrating vocational and general education classes.

The City of Cadiz completed construction of a new fire station at a cost of \$153,000.

The Trigg County Museum recently opened near Cadiz. The museum, which displays memorabilia and artifacts from the area, is housed in a reconstructed 1812 log cabin once the home of native son Boots Randolph. A 1942 train engine is also featured.

Under Way

Stone Plastics, Inc. is in the process of expanding its existing facility by 30,000 square feet. Total investment will approximate \$100,000.

An expansion is currently under way at Kentucky Machine and Engineering. The 23,000-square-foot project will create at least 25 new jobs.

The Trigg County School System is in the process of acquiring a vacated industrial building to renovate and convert to central offices for the Board of Education. The \$100,000 project will also create space for preschool classes.

Planned

A construction project to widen U.S. Highway 68 from Cadiz to Bowling Green is planned. Details include widening the existing highway to four lanes and rerouting portions of the segment to straighten the highway. In addition, a 6.3-mile bypass will be constructed to the south side of Cadiz.

The Cadiz Water Department plans to expand its existing water treatment plant from 500,000 gallons per day to 1,000,000 gallons per day at an estimated cost of \$1.2 million. As a part of the project, the distribution mains and the overall system will be upgraded. The scheduled completion date is October 1992.

A \$500,000 improvement project is planned for the 18-hole golf course at Lake Barkley State Resort Park.
