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
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DANVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Danville, the county seat of Boyle County, is located in the gently rolling landscape of central Kentucky's Blue Grass Region. The city's central location and excellent transportation facilities contribute to the city's growth as a manufacturing and distribution center. Danville had an estimated population of 13,480 in 1988. The City of Danville annexed 154 acres of Boyle County December 26, 1989. This has increased the population of Danville to approximately 17,000. Danville is located 35 miles southwest of Lexington, Kentucky; 85 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky; 154 miles north of Knoxville, Tennessee; and 113 miles south of Cincinnati Ohio.

Boyle County, with a land area of 182 square miles, had a 1988 estimated population of 26,100 persons.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Boyle County residents employed in 1989 averaged 11,161. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 3,236 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 3,567 jobs; 2,373 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 1,444 employees; and contract construction firms provided 287 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 16,341 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1990 through 1994, 8,822 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Main line rail service is provided to Danville by the Norfolk Southern Railway Company. Major "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) highways serving Danville are U.S. Highways 127 and 150. Thirty common carrier trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to the city. The Danville-Boyle County Airport, four miles south of Danville, maintains two paved runways of 4,800 and 2,400 feet. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at the Bluegrass Airport near Lexington, 35 miles northeast of Danville.

Power and Fuel - Kentucky Utilities Company provides electric power to Danville and portions of Boyle County. The major portion of Boyle County is served by Inter-County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Western Kentucky Gas Company provides natural gas service to Danville.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided to Danville and Boyle County by the Danville Independent School System and the Boyle County School System. The Danville Independent School System is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Kentucky School for the Deaf is also located in Danville. Centre College, located in Danville, is an independent, four-year college which confers Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees. The Kentucky College of Business, also located in Danville, confers the Associate in Science degree. In addition, eight institutions of higher learning are located within 36 miles of Danville. Vocational training is available at the Central Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School in Lexington, 35 miles northeast of Danville; the Harrodsburg Area Vocational Education Center, 9 miles north of Danville at Harrodsburg; and the Garrard County Area Vocational Education Center at Lancaster, 12 miles east of Danville.







PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME 1988





Highways

U.S. Highways 127 and 150 are "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) highways serving Danville. U.S. 127 provides Danville with four-lane access to the Blue Grass Parkway, 24 miles to the north. The Blue Grass Parkway is four-lane toll road which connects with Interstate 65, 84 miles west of Danville.

U.S. 150 provides direct access to Interstate 75, 38 miles southeast of Danville. Interstate 75 is also accessible 38 miles east of Danville via U.S. 150 and Kentucky Route 1295. U.S. 127 continues south to the multi-lane Cumberland Parkway, 51 miles south of Danville.

Kentucky Routes 33, 34 and 52, all "AA"-rated highways (62,000-pound gross load limits), also serve Danville.



Construction to upgrade the treatment plant to a 10,000,000 gallon capacity is currently underway. The project is expected to be completed April, 1991 and cost \$2,500,000.

Structure

The city of Danville is served by a mayor, four city commissioners, and a city manager. The mayor serves a four-year term and the commissioners serve two-year terms. Boyle County is served by a county judge/executive and six magistrates. The county judge/executive and magistrates are elected to four-year terms.

Local Fees and Licenses

The city of Danville levies a business license fee on businesses within the city. The fee is \$25 annually for all businesses. An occupational license fee of one percent is levied on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals and on net profits of businesses with a minimum of \$25.

Boyle County levies an occupational license fee of 0.45 of one percent on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals and on net profits of businesses.

State and Local Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky, except items exempted by the state constitution, is taxed by the state. Property which also may be taxed by local jurisdictions includes land and buildings, finished goods inventories, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and office equipment. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, and school districts.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Centre College

Centre College, founded in 1819, is a small, independently governed, four-year college with a heritage of academic excellence. The college offers majors in 21 programs and confers both Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts degrees. Centre also offers a 3-2 engineering program (3 years at Centre and 2 years at an engineering school) in cooperation with 6 major universities nationwide. Centre College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and is the country's smallest co-educational college with a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa.

Kentucky College of Business

Kentucky College of Business is accredited as a junior college of business, and the Danville location is one of the school's five campuses in the state. The college offers six degree programs and six diploma programs in secretarial business management, legal and medical secretary, data processing, and accounting fields. The college confers the Associate in Science degree.

Lindsey Wilson College

Lindsey Wilson College offers an evening degree program in Danville, where one can earn an associate degree in less than two years by attending classes two evenings per week. The program is designed for busy adults, and a counselor is available to provide pre-enrollment counseling, academic guidance, and advice about financial aid, and will arrange transfer credits for college level work completed at another institution.

Vocational Training

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

Local

Danville and Boyle County offer a wide variety of recreational opportunities. Public recreation facilities include three large parks, five mini-parks, nine playgrounds, two tennis courts, three baseball diamonds, four softball fields, four football fields and four soccer fields. The Danville-Boyle County Recreational Department offers year-round programs for all ages. The city sponsors exercise, karate, indoor soccer, and arts and crafts programs. A supervised playground program is available during the summer months, and sports enthusiasts may participate in leagues for basketball, football, baseball, softball, fast-pitch softball, and soccer. The state YMCA also offers a variety of year-round activities. A community theatre is also active in Danville, and presents several productions each year. Private recreational facilities include a country club, two golf courses, two swimming pools, four movie theatres, a bowling facility, a roller-skating rink and a racquetball court.

Crawford Springs Park, a small county park two miles from Perryville, offers a nature area, picnic and barbecue equipment, and wildflower and tree identification.

Construction of a new city park is being planned. The park will include the following: a public pool, four baseball fields, four softball field, five tennis courts, a jogging/walking trail, shelters, five basketball courts, five soccer fields, two football fields, playgrounds, restrooms, and concession stands.

Constitution Square State Shrine, in Danville, is a reproduction of Kentucky's first courthouse square, including the original 1792 post office which was the first in the west.

The McDowell House is the home in which pioneer surgeon Dr. Ephraim McDowell lived and worked. Now a registered national historic landmark, the house is located adjacent to Constitution Square and is open to the public year-round. The Apothecary Shop next door displays authentic 18th and 19th century pharmaceuticals.

The Centre College campus is the site of a variety of intercollegiate sports activities throughout the fall, winter and spring months. The college's track is available for public use. The Norton Center for the Arts, also located on the Centre campus, offers a variety of cultural and entertainment activities, including art exhibitions, concerts and theatrical performances by national touring companies to the college and the community-at-large.

Dining and outdoor theatre is available at Pioneer Playhouse. An 18th century village has been constructed on the theatre grounds, depicting a typical street scene at the time Kentucky's constitution was adopted.

Central Kentucky Wildlife Refuge, a 500-acre, non-profit refuge, is located in western Boyle County. Open seven days per week, it offers hiking trails, and a wildflower walk is scheduled each April.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

Danville recertified as a Kentucky Certified City in 1989, and is distinguished as a gold award winner recognizing seven consecutive years of certification. Re-certification is based on achievement in the following categories: existing industry assistance, small business assistance, educational resources, and community development factors of health care, public safety, arts and culture, recreation, governmental awareness and resources. The Certified Cities Program is sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

Three manufacturers have recently located plants in Danville. Sammi Sound Technology Corporation manufactures speakers and speaker systems and employs thirty. Clark Equipment Company manufactures forklifts and employs seventy. Hill Tool and Die, Inc. are die makers and provide die maintenance and employ eight.

The City of Danville Water Division recently upgraded the raw water pumping station and constructed a 24-inch raw transmission main, costing \$1,200,000. Construction to upgrade the treatment plant to a 10,000,000 gallon capacity is currently underway. The project is expected to be completed April, 1991 and cost \$2,500,000.

The City of Danville Sewer Division constructed a flow equalizations lagoon in July, 1990. A new combination aerated facultative/flow equalization lagoon is currently under construction and is planned to be completed November, 1990. The estimated cost of these two projects is \$800,000.

Goodall Field constructed a 4,000-foot taxiway parallel to the 4,800-foot runway in January, 1990 at a cost of \$500,000. Plans are being made for installation of an AWOS3 (All Weather Observation Station) and a localizer landing system by the winter of 1990, costing \$300,000.

The Boyle County School System completed a \$4,000,000 project in 1990. This project included construction of a new wing and renovations to the high school and building four new classrooms at Woodlawn Elementary.

Over \$1,300,000 was invested in property renovations and new business start-ups in downtown Danville, as part of the "Heart of Danville" project, from July, 1989 to June, 1990.

The Danville Independent School System has constructed a new gymnasium and renovated the cafeteria at the Hogsett Elementary School. This project was completed in the spring of 1989 and cost \$360,000.

Reconstruction of U.S. Highway 127 North from Danville to Harrodsburg, was completed in 1988.

Under Way

The U.S. Highway 127 bypass around Danville is currently being reconstructed to a four-lane highway. This project is expected to be completed in 1991.

Planned

A highway improvement project is planned for Kentucky Route 34 from Danville to U.S. Highway 27. Included in this project will be the construction of a new bridge and widening of the highway. Construction of this project is planned to start in 1991.

The Danville Independent School System has two projects planned. The first project is a \$3,000,000 renovation project at the three elementary schools and the high school. The second project is the implementation of a \$1,300,000 technology development program to place computers in all the schools.

The Child Care Center Committee was created in June, 1990 by the Danville Industrial Council to plan the development of an industrial park child care facility.



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
