



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LEITCHFIELD-GRAYSON COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Leitchfield, the county seat of Grayson County, is situated near the eastern edge of the Western Kentucky Coal Field Region. Leitchfield is located 77 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; 129 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee; and 268 miles east of St. Louis, Missouri. Leitchfield had an estimated 1992 population of 5,438.

Caneyville, located 13 miles west of Leitchfield, had an estimated 1992 population of 589. Clarkson, located four miles east of Leitchfield, had an estimated 1992 population of 587.

Grayson County, with a land area of 503 square miles, is characterized by flat-topped, sandstone-capped ridges. Grayson County had an estimated 1992 population of 21,678.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Grayson County residents employed in 1994 averaged 9,530. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 2,177 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 1,565 jobs; 536 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 1,240 employees; and contract construction firms provided 281 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 13,017 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1996 through 2000, 14,368 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Leitchfield is served by the Western Kentucky Parkway and U.S. 62, both "AAA"-rated trucking highways; and Kentucky 259, a "AA"-rated trucking highway. Seventeen common carriers provide interstate and/or intrastate trucking service to Grayson County, while one trucking company maintains a terminal in the county. The Paducah and Louisville Railway provides rail freight service to Leitchfield. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at the Louisville International Airport in Louisville, 73 miles northeast of Leitchfield. The Leitchfield-Grayson County Airport, five miles southeast of Leitchfield, maintains a 4,000-foot paved runway. Rough River Dam State Resort Park also provides a 3,200-foot paved, lighted airstrip with tie-downs and aviation fuel. The airstrip is 18 miles northwest of Leitchfield.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Leitchfield and Grayson County by the Kentucky Utilities Company. Grayson County is also provided electric power by the Warren Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas is provided to Leitchfield by Leitchfield Utilities.

Education - The Grayson County School System, which is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, provides public education to Leitchfield and Grayson County. One nonpublic school also operates in Leitchfield. Eleven colleges and universities are located within 80 miles of Leitchfield. Vocational training is available at the Grayson County Area Technology Center in Leitchfield and at the Elizabethtown Regional Technology Center, 32 miles northeast of Leitchfield.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1994





AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



RECENT INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENTS

The Leitchfield/Grayson County Industrial Development Foundation has acquired a 90-acre site on U.S. Highway 62 West, with access to rail and utilities. The Industrial Foundation also owns 40 acres at Clarkson with rail and utilities access and six acres on Commerce Drive with utilities access. The City of Leitchfield has purchased 68 acres for future industrial development on Kentucky Highway 259 North and infrastructure extension is planned.

The recently remodeled 63,450 square foot Aton Building is situated on 3.72 acres in the Leitchfield Industrial Park and provides 9,713 square feet of office space, inside rail, six dock doors, and all utilities.

TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Major highways serving Leitchfield include the Western Kentucky Parkway and U.S. Highway 62, both "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways; and Kentucky Highway 259, a "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway. Downtown Leitchfield is located approximately one mile north of an interchange to the Western Kentucky Parkway which connects with Interstate 65 and the Bluegrass Parkway at Elizabethtown, 32 miles northeast. The Western Kentucky Parkway also provides direct access to the Green River Parkway, 32 miles west of Leitchfield.

As a part of its six-year road plan, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet plans to construct a bypass around the east side of Leitchfield. The first phase will facilitate traffic flow to the Twin Lakes Regional Hospital. Eventually, the bypass will also facilitate traffic to the industrial park.



There is no zoning agency in Leitchfield or Grayson County at the present time. However, there is a City of Leitchfield Planning Commission.

Mandatory state codes enforced - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Leitchfield levies an occupational license tax of one and two-tenths percent (1.2%) on employee wages. The City also levies an occupational license tax of 1.2 percent on net profits of businesses, or \$50, whichever is greater. Unloading licenses range from \$10 to \$35 per year.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new skills, improve basic skills or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In Grayson County adult literacy is provided by the Grayson County Literacy Program and adult basic education is available through the Grayson County Board of Education.

Tech Prep

Tech Prep is a combined secondary and postsecondary program of studies that leads to an associate degree or diploma in a technical field. The Elizabethtown Regional Technology Center offers programs in the areas of automotive technology, carpentry, computer-aided drafting, electrical technology, electronics technology, food service technology, and welding.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is a major source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

Leitchfield provides many recreation programs which include baseball and softball leagues. The Grayson County Middle School gymnasium is open to adults in the community for organized sports such as volleyball, swimming, badminton, floor tennis and table tennis. Three parks, two playgrounds, five baseball fields, two tennis courts, an archery range, and a municipal swimming pool are also available to residents for recreational activities. A city-county sports complex includes a football field, a baseball field, a soccer field, a swimming pool, basketball courts, tennis courts, a running track, and a playground. The reconstruction of a four-acre lake is planned for one of the parks. In addition, two softball fields will be added.

Private recreational facilities include a 14-lane bowling facility; a lake and pay-fishing area; and a golf club, which is available to residents on a membership basis. Facilities at the Lakeview Club include a nine-hole golf course; a clubhouse with a proshop, snack bar, locker room and party room; a driving range; a putting green; a swimming pool; and tennis court.

Pine Knob, a 500-seat outdoor theater in Caneyville, 13 miles west of Leitchfield, provides unique entertainment in a quaint historic setting. The theater features two shows including the "Dock Brown Outlaw Show," which is based on the book "Dock Brown, The Grayson County Outlaw," and "Down in Hoodoo Holler" during summer weekends; and in the fall, "Daddy Took the T-bird Away."

Rough River Dam State Resort Park at Falls of Rough is located 18 miles northwest of Leitchfield. The 637-acre park on Rough River Lake features a 40-room lodge with a dining room, coffee shop, gift shop, meeting room, and a 3,200-foot lighted airstrip with tie-downs and aviation fuel. Cottages and camping sites are also available. Falls of Rough Conference Center accommodates 300 for dining or 500 for auditorium style seating. Recreational facilities include a launching ramp, a dock with open and covered slips, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, a nine-hole 3-par golf course, a swimming pool, a sand beach with a bathhouse complex, tennis courts, an archery range, hiking and fitness trails, picnic and playground areas, and planned recreation. Cruise boat excursions on Rough River Lake are available on the "Lady of the Lake" in season.

Nolin River Lake is just north of Mammoth Cave National Park. The 5,800-acre lake offers facilities for camping, boating, and fishing. The lake is the fifth most visited in Kentucky and is approximately 15 miles southeast of Leitchfield.

Mammoth Cave National Park is located 42 miles southeast of Leitchfield near Cave City. Beneath 52,000 park acres, Mammoth Cave is among the major tourist attractions of all times. It is the largest cave network ever discovered, with over 300 miles of caverns. Some famous sights are Snowball Dining Room (where lunch is served 267 feet below surface), Frozen Niagara, Crystal Lake, and Bottomless Pit. The park also features scenic boat trips on the Green River and nature and hiking trails. Park facilities include a hotel with dining room and coffee shop, gift shops, cottages, a service center, group meeting facilities, a campground, boat rides, a picnic area, and tennis and shuffleboard courts. The park is open for tours every day of the year (except Christmas Day).

The Court Square Theater recently opened. Located in the old court room at the Grayson County Courthouse on the Public Square, the 300-seat facility is newly renovated and available for arts and other programs in the community.

St. Joseph's Parish recently opened a 200-seat community center. Facilities include a kitchen and large rental space for group gatherings.

A new city park is presently being developed in Leitchfield. When completed it will contain a four-acre lake, picnic facilities, and lighted parking. Two of three softball fields, concessions, and restrooms are already complete. Facilities will be available for softball tournaments, ranging from minor leagues to adult leagues.

A 40-unit Hatfield Inn has just been completed immediately off of the Western Kentucky Parkway on U.S. Highway 62. The Inn is 18 miles from Rough River Dam State Resort Park; 32 miles from Interstate 65; and 32 miles from the Green River Parkway.
