

GREENSBURG, KENTUCKY – A RESOURCE PROFILE

Greensburg, the county seat of Green County, is located in south central Kentucky. The city had an estimated 1996 population of 2,035. Greensburg is located 82 miles south of Louisville, Kentucky; 124 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; and 349 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri.

Green County, in the Mississippian Plateaus Region of south central Kentucky, covers a land area of 289 square miles and had an estimated 1997 population of 10,570 persons.


The Economic Framework – Green County firms employed 1,776 people in 1997. Contract construction firms provided 22 jobs; manufacturing firms in the county reported 352 employees; transportation and public utilities provided 24 jobs; wholesale and retail trade provided 360 jobs; 78 were employed in finance, insurance, and real estate; 351 were employed in the service industry; and state and local government accounted for 570 jobs.

Labor Supply – There is a current estimated labor supply of 12,750 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1999 to 2003, approximately 6,088 young persons in the labor market area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation – Highways serving Greensburg are U.S. Highway 68, a AAA-rated trucking highway; Kentucky Route 61 a AA-rated trucking highway; and Kentucky Route 70. Twelve trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Greensburg. The nearest rail service is provided by CSX Transportation at Munfordville, 27 miles west of Greensburg. The Taylor County Airport, twelve miles northeast, has a 5,000-foot paved runway. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at the Louisville International Airport in Louisville, 76 miles north; and at the Blue Grass Airport, 87 miles northeast, near Lexington. Commercial airline service is also available at the Nashville International Airport in Nashville, Tennessee, 130 miles south of Greensburg.

Power and Fuel – Electric power is provided to Greensburg and a portion of Green County by the Kentucky Utilities Company. A portion of Greensburg is also served by the Taylor County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is provided to Greensburg by the Western Kentucky Gas Company.

Education – The Green County School System provides primary and secondary education to the residents of Greensburg and Green County. There are eleven colleges and universities within 60 miles of Greensburg. The nearest area technology center (ATC) providing technical training is the Green County ATC in Greensburg. The Taylor, Adair, and Green Counties Industrial Training Consortium is located at the Area Technology Center. The nearest technical college providing postsecondary technical training is the Bowling Green Technical College Glasgow Campus in Glasgow, 29 miles southwest of Greensburg.







TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Direct access to Greensburg is provided by U.S. Highway 68, a AAA-rated trucking highway (80,000pound gross load limit), and by Kentucky Route 61, a AA-rated trucking highway (62,000-pound gross load limit). Kentucky Route 70, a AAA-rated trucking highway also serves Greensburg. Interchanges of Interstate 65, a major north-south route, are located near Munfordville, 28 miles west, via Kentucky Highways 61 and 88; and at Elizabethtown, 40 miles northwest, via Kentucky 61. Interchanges of Interstate 65 are also accessible via Kentucky 88 and Kentucky 218 at Horse Cave, 32 miles west of Greensburg; and at Cave City, 34 miles west of Greensburg via U.S. 68 and Kentucky 70.

The Western Kentucky Parkway and the Bluegrass Parkway are multi-lane, east-west highways which are accessible at Elizabethtown. The Bluegrass Parkway is also accessible via Kentucky 55 and U.S. 150, 53 miles north of Greensburg. The Cumberland Parkway, a multi-lane, east-west toll road, is accessible 31 miles south of Greensburg via U.S. Highway 61.

Kentucky Route 61 North has been reconstructed from U.S. 68 to just south of Summerville.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The City of Greensburg is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor serves a four-year term and the council members serve two-year terms. Green County is served by a county judge/executive and five magistrates. The judge/executive and magistrates are elected to serve four-year terms.

Planning and Zoning

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Greensburg levies a vehicle permit fee of \$20 per year.

Sales and Use Tax

A state sales and use tax is levied at the rate of 6.0% on the purchase or lease price of taxable goods and on utility services. Local sales taxes are not levied in Kentucky.

State and Local Property Taxes

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside the city limits may also be subject to city property taxes. Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value. Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its training and development coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator at the Somerset Technical College (606) 677-4049.

Customized training is also offered at the Green County ATC (502) 932-4263. An Industrial Training Consortium comprised of industries in Taylor, Adair, and Green Counties (T.A.G.) was formed in 1998.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration and developing training programs within the organization. The Career Connections Assessment Center serving the Greensburg area is located at the Somerset Technical College (606) 679-4303. Assessment services are also available at the Green County Adult Learning Center at the Green County ATC (502) 932-5936.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In the Greensburg area, adult literacy classes and adult basic education are available through the Green County Adult Learning Center.

In Greensburg, the Green County Board of Education and the Green County Area Technology Center offer programs in automotive, electric, machine tool, welding, wood manufacturing, and business technologies, and health science.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation (BSSC) was established in 1984 by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as an independent, de jure corporation to stimulate economic development through customized business and industry specific skills training programs. The BSSC works with business and industry and Kentucky's educational institutions to establish programs of skills training. The BSSC is attached to the Cabinet for Economic Development for administrative purposes, in recognition of the relationship between economic development and skills training efforts.

The BSSC is comprised of two economic development tools, matching grants and the newly authorized Skills Training Investment Credit Act. The BSSC grant program is available to new, expanding and existing business and industry. Eligible training activities include pre-employment skills training and assessment; entry level, skills upgrade and occupational upgrade training; train-the-trainer travel; and capacity-building. The Skills Training Investment Credit Act provides tax credits to existing businesses for skills upgrade training.

RECREATION

The American Legion Park is a 65-acre community park located in Green County. The park was developed and financed by local residents. Recreational facilities available are: ballfields, a pavilion, a horse show ring, fishing area, equipped playground, horseshoe pits, and tennis courts. Four additional public tennis courts are located at the elementary school. The Green County Country Club is a nine-hole course. The Green River flows through Green County and Greensburg and is on the Canoe Kentucky route from Taylor County to Munfordville in Hart County.

Green County is one of the oldest Kentucky counties and has a rich historical heritage. Greensburg is home to the oldest existing courthouse west of the Allegheny Mountains. The "Old Courthouse," completed in 1803 was restored to its original state, and is part of a self-guided walking tour of Greensburg's historical sites.

Other points of interest include the home of Jeremiah Abell, Presbyterian minister who served as missionary and pastor in Green and surrounding counties during the early 1800's; the site of the home of Jane Todd Crawford on whom Dr. Ephraim McDowell performed the world's first successful ovariotomy in 1809; General E.H. Hobson's Home; a Clerk's office built in 1818; Mt. Gilead Church, which is built on the site of the camp of the "Long Hunters" who came to Kentucky in 1769; the Old Bank Building, which originally housed the Bank of Kentucky; Allen's Inn; Pendleton House; Ben Will Penick House; Greensburg Academy; Simpson House, the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln's law partner; and a scenic footbridge.

The Greensburg Academy, built in 1813, was a private academy taught by Mentor Graham. In 1825-26 Mr. Graham moved to Illinois where he met Abraham Lincoln and is credited with Mr. Lincoln's formal education. The Academy opened as a bed and breakfast in 1998.

The Green County Historical Society hosts the Green County Heritage Festival in October.

APPENDIX - DEFINITIONS

Geographic definition of the labor market area

A county's labor market area is defined as the base county, adjacent counties, and any other major commuting counties. Adjacency is used to define the labor market area primarily because of the small size of Kentucky's counties. The major commuting counties are defined from the point of view of the base county. Major commuting counties are those counties that comprise 90% of the base county's total commuters. The source of the commuting patterns is the 1990 journey-to-work data available from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Example - Logan County

-

To determine the labor market area for Logan County the following steps are taken. First, the counties with workers commuting into Logan county are listed in ascending order (see the table below). The cumulative percent is calculated. Next, all counties that comprise up to 90% of the commuters are included in the labor market area (actually the cut-off will be the county that breaks the 90% threshold – Montgomery County, TN at 92.6% in this case). Although Robertson is not a major commuter county, it is included since it is adjacent. The Logan County labor market is then comprised of the seven bold-faced counties in the table below.

Potential Labor Supply

The potential labor supply is an estimate of those persons not classified as in the labor force (not employed and not unemployed), but who want a job. The assumption is that people not in the labor force at the local level would like a job at the same rate as the nation. The U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics provides national, yearly estimates of the percent of the people not in the labor force who want a job. This percent is applied to the county-level number of people not in the labor force.

Underemployed

Wholesale/retail trade and non-professional services have historically paid low wages. The assumption is that workers in these industries would take higher paying jobs if they were available. Non-professional services excludes Miscellaneous Repair Services (SIC 7600), Health Services (SIC 8000), Legal Services (SIC 8100), and Engineering and Management Services (SIC 8700).

Total Available Labor

Total available labor is the sum of the number of unemployed, potential labor supply, and underemployed. Please note that the number of unemployed is the only generally accepted measure of labor availability. The other concepts are weaker measures and should be used with caution.
