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

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FRENCHBURG, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Frenchburg, the county seat of Menifee County, is located at the western edge of the Eastern Kentucky Coal Field. Frenchburg is located 57 miles east of Lexington, Kentucky; 128 miles east of Louisville, Kentucky; 133 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio; and 205 miles northeast of Knoxville, Tennessee. Frenchburg had an estimated 1998 population of 699.

Menifee County, with a land area of 204 square miles, is located in the northern portion of the Daniel Boone National Forest. The picturesque valley of the Red River forms part of the southern boundary of Menifee County. Menifee County had an estimated 1998 population of 5,736.

The Economic Framework – Menifee County firms employed 880 people in 1997. Contract construction firms provided 31 jobs; manufacturing firms in the county reported 178 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 106 jobs; 144 were employed in the service industry; and state and local government accounted for 304 jobs.


Labor Supply – There is a current estimated labor supply of 11,837 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1999 through 2003, approximately 6,694 young persons in the labor market area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation – Frenchburg is served directly by U.S. Highway 460 and Kentucky Route 36, both AAA-rated trucking highways. Access to Interstate 64 is 17 miles northwest of Frenchburg via Kentucky 36, and the Mountain Parkway is accessible 21 miles south of the city. Eight common carrier trucking companies serve Frenchburg. CSX Transportation provides main line rail service 38 miles west of Frenchburg at Winchester, Kentucky. The nearest commercial airport, Blue Grass Airport near Lexington, is located 62 miles west of Frenchburg. The Mt. Sterling-Montgomery County Airport and the Stanton Airport are located within 24 miles of the city.

Power and Fuel – Frenchburg and a major portion of Menifee County receive electric power from the Clark Energy Cooperative. The Licking Valley Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation serves the southern portion of Menifee County. Natural gas is provided to Frenchburg by the Delta Natural Gas Company.

Education – Primary and secondary education is provided to Frenchburg and Menifee County by the Menifee County School System. Fourteen colleges and universities are located within 60 miles of Frenchburg. The nearest area technology centers (ATC) providing secondary education are Montgomery Co. ATC in Mt. Sterling; Morgan Co. ATC in West Liberty; Lee Co. ATC in Beattyville; Breathitt Co. ATC in Jackson; and Clark Co. ATC in Winchester; all within 31 miles of Frenchburg. The nearest technical college providing post-secondary education is Rowan Co. Technical College in Morehead.







TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Principal highways serving Frenchburg are U.S. 460 and Kentucky 36. Both are AAA-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. Interstate 64, a major east-west corridor, is accessible 17 miles northwest of the city via Kentucky 36 and 24 miles northwest via U.S. 460. Interstate 64 intersects with Interstate 75, a principal north-south highway, 59 miles northwest of Frenchburg near Lexington. The Mountain Parkway, a multi-lane east-west highway which traverses eastern Kentucky, is accessible 21 miles south of Frenchburg.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Frenchburg is served by a mayor and four commissioners. The mayor serves a four-year term and the commissioners serve two-year terms. Menifee County is served by a county judge/executive and five magistrates, each serving four-year terms.

Planning and Zoning

There are no planning and zoning commissions currently in Frenchburg or Menifee County.

Mandatory state codes enforced - Kentucky Plumbing Code, National Electric Code, Kentucky Boiler Regulations and Standards, Kentucky Building Code (modeled after BOCA code)

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Frenchburg levies a business license fee of \$20 and \$10 for a transient business license. A \$20 loading and unloading fee is required annually.

Sales and Use Tax

A state sales and use tax is levied at the rate of 6.0% on the purchase or lease price of taxable goods and on utility services. Local sales taxes are not levied in Kentucky.

State and Local Property Taxes

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside the city limits may also be subject to city property taxes. Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value. Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its training and development coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator at the Rowan County Technical College.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration and developing training programs within the organization. The Career Connections Assessment Center serving the Frenchburg area is located at the Rowan County Technical College.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In Frenchburg, adult basic education and adult literacy classes are administered through the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation (BSSC) was established in 1984 by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as an independent, de jure corporation to stimulate economic development through customized business and industry specific skills training programs. The BSSC works with business and industry and Kentucky's educational institutions to establish programs of skills training. The BSSC is attached to the Cabinet for Economic Development for administrative purposes, in recognition of the relationship between economic development and skills training efforts.

The BSSC is comprised of two economic development tools, matching grants and the newly authorized Skills Training Investment Credit Act. The BSSC grant program is available to new, expanding and existing business and industry. Eligible training activities include pre-employment skills training and assessment; entry level, skills upgrade and occupational upgrade training; train-the-trainer travel; and capacity-building. The Skills Training Investment Credit Act provides tax credits to existing businesses for skills upgrade training.

RECREATION

The Menifee County Recreation Park was recently completed. The facility includes a softball-baseball field, basketball and volleyball courts, a swimming pool, a bathhouse, picnic tables, grills, and a playground area.

Carrington Greens Golf Course, an 18-hole privately-owned course open to the public, is located seven miles from Frenchburg.

Several tourist attractions are located near Frenchburg. Red River Gorge, part of the Daniel Boone National Forest and considered one of eastern Kentucky's most prominent features, is a boulder-strewn area of rugged forest, streams, cliffs, overlooks, arches, rare plants, and animal life. Picnic and campsites are available in the Koomer Ridge Recreation Area. Pioneer Weapons Area features a 7,480-acre preserve where hunters are limited to primitive weapons use only.

The Menifee Mountain Memories Festival is held the first weekend in June. Attractions include arts and crafts, exhibits, contests, food booths, a parade, and historical tours.

Cave Run Lake, constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is located in Menifee County within the 640,000-acre Daniel Boone National Forest. The lake area offers everything for the camper, the boatsman, the hunter, the fisherman, and "the lover of leisure."

Menifee County is located within the northern portion of the Daniel Boone National Forest, which covers 640,000 acres of timberland in eastern Kentucky. It encompasses much of Kentucky's great beauty and provides a vacation paradise. There are scenic hiking trails, rivers and streams stocked with a variety of fish, hunting preserves, camping sites, and numerous other natural and historical attractions.

APPENDIX A - DEFINITIONS

Geographic definition of the labor market area

A county's labor market area is defined as the base county, adjacent counties, and any other major commuting counties. Adjacency is used to define the labor market area primarily because of the small size of Kentucky's counties. The major commuting counties are defined from the point of view of the base county. Major commuting counties are those counties that comprise 90% of the base county's total commuters. The source of the commuting patterns is the 1990 journey-to-work data available from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Example - Logan County

To determine the labor market area for Logan County the following steps are taken. First, the counties with workers commuting into Logan county are listed in ascending order (see the table below). The cumulative percent is calculated. Next, all counties that comprise up to 90% of the commuters are included in the labor market area (actually the cut-off will be the county that breaks the 90% threshold – Montgomery County, TN at 92.6% in this case). Although Robertson is not a major commuter county, it is included since it is adjacent. The Logan County labor market is then comprised of the seven bold-faced counties in the table below.

Potential Labor Supply

The potential labor supply is an estimate of those persons not classified as in the labor force (not employed and not unemployed), but who want a job. The assumption is that people not in the labor force at the local level would like a job at the same rate as the nation. The U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics provides national, yearly estimates of the percent of the people not in the labor force who want a job. This percent is applied to the county-level number of people not in the labor force.

Underemployed

Wholesale/retail trade and non-professional services have historically paid low wages. The assumption is that workers in these industries would take higher paying jobs if they were available. Non-professional services excludes Miscellaneous Repair Services (SIC 7600), Health Services (SIC 8000), Legal Services (SIC 8100), and Engineering and Management Services (SIC 8700).

Total Available Labor

Total available labor is the sum of the number of unemployed, potential labor supply, and underemployed. Please note that the number of unemployed is the only generally accepted measure of labor availability. The other concepts are weaker measures and should be used with caution.
