



TOMPKINSVILLE/GAMALIEL, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Tompkinsville, the county seat of Monroe County, is located in the central portion of the county. Tompkinsville, with a 1994 estimated population of 3,135, is located 99 miles northeast of Nashville, Tennessee; 127 miles south of Louisville, Kentucky; and 183 miles northwest of Knoxville, Tennessee.

Gamaliel, located in the southwestern portion of Monroe County near the Kentucky-Tennessee state line, is eight miles southwest of Tompkinsville. Gamaliel had an estimated 1994 population of 440.

Monroe County, with a 1994 estimated population of 11,676, is located in south-central Kentucky in the Mississippian Plateaus physiographic region. Monroe County's southern boundary is formed by the Kentucky-Tennessee state line.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Monroe County residents employed in 1995 averaged 5,325. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 2,105 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 706 jobs; 272 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 833 employees; and contract construction firms provided 31 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 3,583 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1997 through 2001, 5,575 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Tompkinsville is served by Kentucky Highway 163, a AAA-rated trucking highway. Gamaliel is served by Kentucky Highways 63, 87, and 100. The Cumberland Parkway is accessible twenty-four miles north of Tompkinsville. Interstate 65 is accessible forty-three miles northwest of Tompkinsville. Twenty common carrier trucking companies provide Tompkinsville with interstate and/or intrastate service. The Tompkinsville-Monroe County Airport, located two miles northeast of Tompkinsville, maintains a 4,000-foot paved runway with a 500-foot overrun. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at the Nashville International Airport, 105 miles southwest of Tompkinsville. Rail service is provided by CSX Transportation at Glasgow, 27 miles northwest of Tompkinsville.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Tompkinsville and Gamaliel by the Tri-County Electric Membership Corporation. Tompkinsville is provided natural gas service by the Tompkinsville Natural Gas Company.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided to Tompkinsville and Gamaliel by the Monroe County School System. Fifteen institutions of higher education are located within 100 miles of Tompkinsville. Vocational training is provided by the Monroe County Area Technology Center at Tompkinsville; and at the Kentucky Advanced Technology Center in Bowling Green and the Bowling Green Regional Technology Center, both 66 miles northwest of Tompkinsville.



LABOR MARKET STATISTICS

The Tompkinsville and Gamaliel Labor Market Area includes Monroe County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Allen, Barren, Cumberland, and Metcalfe. In addition, the Labor Market Area is supplemented by Clay and Macon Counties in Tennessee, which form the southern boundary of Monroe County.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1995







AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



Anderson Brothers Hardwoods expanded in 1995, creating additional jobs. Also, L.P.H. Manufacturing Company, Inc. expanded by another 4,000 square feet in 1996 and added new equipment.

The City of Tompkinsville owns a 40-acre undeveloped industrial site.

TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Tompkinsville is served by Kentucky Highway 163, a AAA-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway. Kentucky Highways 63 and 100 also serve Tompkinsville. Gamaliel is served by Kentucky Highways 63 and 100, both AAA-rated from Gamaliel to Tompkinsville. Kentucky Highway 87 also serves Gamaliel. Kentucky Highway 90, a AAA-rated highway, is located fourteen miles north of Tompkinsville. The Cumberland Parkway is accessible twenty-four miles north of Tompkinsville, while Interstate 65 is accessible forty-three miles northwest of Tompkinsville.

Kentucky 3144, which provides access to the industrial park, was recently reconstructed and widened. Plans are under way to widen and straighten segments of Kentucky 163 from Tompkinsville northward to Kentucky Highways 1049 and 90. Four projects totaling \$12.75 million will be completed in phases through the year 2001, and will cover 12 miles along Kentucky 163.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Tompkinsville is governed by a mayor and six council members. Gamaliel is governed by a mayor and four commissioners. Both mayors are elected to four-year terms, while the council members and commissioners serve two-year terms respectively. Monroe County is governed by a county judge/executive and five magistrates. Each county official is elected to a four-year term.

Planning and Zoning

Monroe County is not served by a planning and zoning commission at the present time.

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Tompkinsville levies business license fees ranging from \$25 to \$100 annually. Manufacturing (exempt first three years), retail, or wholesale merchandise stores having gross annual sales:

The City of Gamaliel levies an occupational license tax of one percent on wages and one percent on net profits of businesses. Business licenses are \$25 annually.

Monroe County levies an occupational license tax of one-half of one percent on wages of persons engaged in any trade, occupation, or profession and one-half of one percent on net profits of businesses.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value.

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its Training and Development Coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator located at the Bowling Green Regional Technology Center

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers to business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration, and developing training programs within the organization. A Career Connections Assessment Center is located on the campus of the Bowling Green Regional Technology Center.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. For Tompkinsville and Gamaliel, adult basic education and adult literacy programs are administered through the Monroe County Resource Center and Monroe County Literacy Council.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is a major source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

In addition to hospital service, Monroe County Medical Center operates an active Home Health Agency, manages the County Ambulance Service, sponsors specialty clinics, and operates a Rural Health Clinic in Fountain Run. The hospital recently replaced the Home Health and Ambulance buildings. Construction within the hospital includes replacing the kitchen, expanding the laboratory, and doubling the size of the nurses' station

Immediate plans include construction of a specialty clinic suite, reconfiguring the emergency room to improve patient care, and the addition of nuclear medicine to the radiology department. Furthermore, the hospital has entered into an agreement with the Fiscal Court to oversee the implementation and operations of a "911" enhanced system.

RECREATION

Local

Tompkinsville's city park offers three ball fields and facilities for picnicking, camping, hiking, tennis, basketball, volleyball, archery, and fishing and boating on a 100-acre lake. Other public recreation facilities in the city include two tennis courts near the high school football stadium; and baseball diamonds, softball diamonds, and football fields at the schools. Planned developments at the park include two additional ball fields and a beach at the lake.

Gamaliel's city park contains a lighted softball field, picnic shelters, grills, basketball courts, a pulling track, and shuffleboard courts. Additional public recreation facilities in the city include a baseball diamond, tennis courts, and a football field on the school grounds.

A private country club in the county offers an 18-hole golf course, a swimming pool, and two tennis courts. A drive-in movie theater is located near Tompkinsville.

The annual Monroe County Fair, held in late July, features agricultural exhibits, fiddling contests, a country music show, rodeo horse show, tractor pulls, and various displays and exhibits. In addition, the Monroe Arts Council hosts the Watermelon Festival, held annually on Labor Day.

Old Mulkey Meeting House State Historic Site, near Tompkinsville, offers picnic areas and playgrounds. The house, built in 1804, is the oldest log meeting house in the state. Daniel Boone's sister is buried in the graveyard and authentic records written in pokeberry ink are on display.
