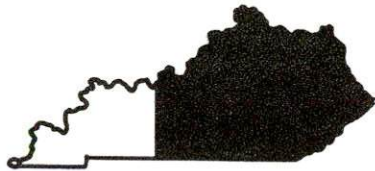

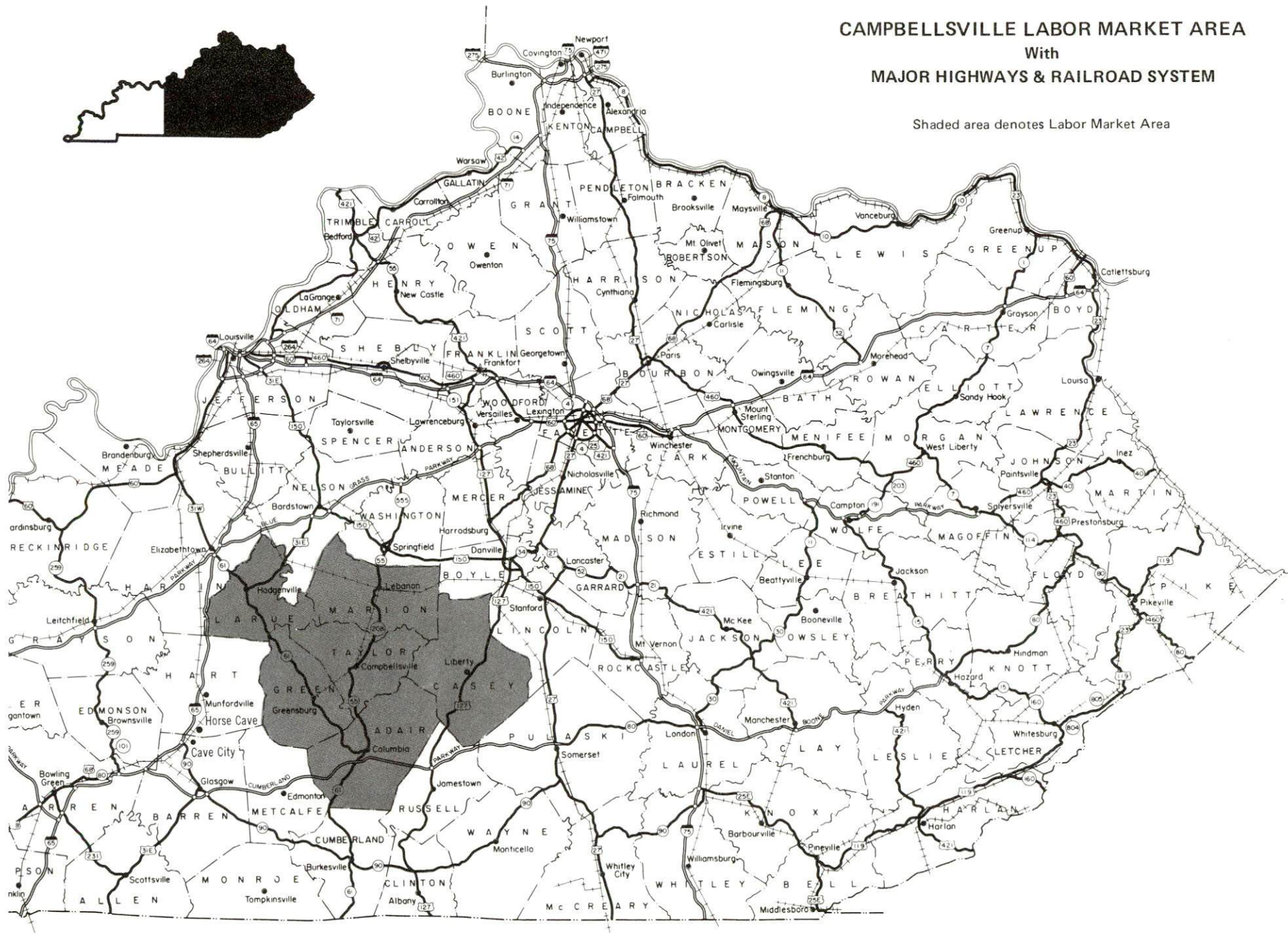




# CAMPBELLSVILLE LABOR MARKET AREA

## CAMPBELLSVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Campbellsville is the county seat of Taylor County and home of Campbellsville College. Located in southcentral Kentucky, Campbellsville is within 200 miles of Louisville, Kentucky; Nashville, Tennessee; Cincinnati, Ohio; and Knoxville, Tennessee. The 1980 population of Taylor County was 21,178 with 8,715 people residing in Campbellsville.

### The Economic Framework

Total employment in Taylor County during 1980 averaged 9,118 with 8,241 employed in nonagricultural jobs. Manufacturing provided 4,498 jobs, wholesale and retail trade provided 1,296 jobs and government provided 801 jobs. Manufacturing employment is greatest in the textile mill products, apparel and related products, fabricated metal products and nonelectrical machinery industries.

Per capita income in Taylor County in 1979 was \$6,526 or \$526 below the state average. Between 1975 and 1979, per capita income increased by 48 percent.

Campbellsville is the hub of a labor market area which includes Taylor and its five surrounding counties. Area employment in 1980 averaged 37,340 with 31,625 employed in nonagricultural jobs. Manufacturing provided 8,378 jobs, wholesale and retail trade provided 3,658 jobs, and government provided 3,045 jobs.

### Resources for Growth

1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 5,093 men and 3,030 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 3,855 young men and 3,642 young women will become 18 years of age before 1986 and potentially available for work.
2. The Louisville and Nashville Railroad serves Campbellsville with freight service. Local highways serving Campbellsville include U.S. 68 and Kentucky Highways 70, 208 and 210. In addition, within 45 miles of Campbellsville are two of Kentucky's multilane parkways. Two of the four common carriers which serve Taylor County maintain terminals in Campbellsville.
3. Electric power is provided by the Kentucky Utilities Company and the Taylor County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is provided by the Western Kentucky Gas Company. There is one distributor of propane and six distributors of distillate fuel oil located in Campbellsville.
4. Education is an important growth asset for Taylor County. Both the Campbellsville Independent and Taylor County school systems are accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Campbellsville College confers baccalaureate degrees and had a 1980 enrollment of 698.



## THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Campbellsville Labor Market Area includes Taylor County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Adair, Casey, Green, Larue and Marion.

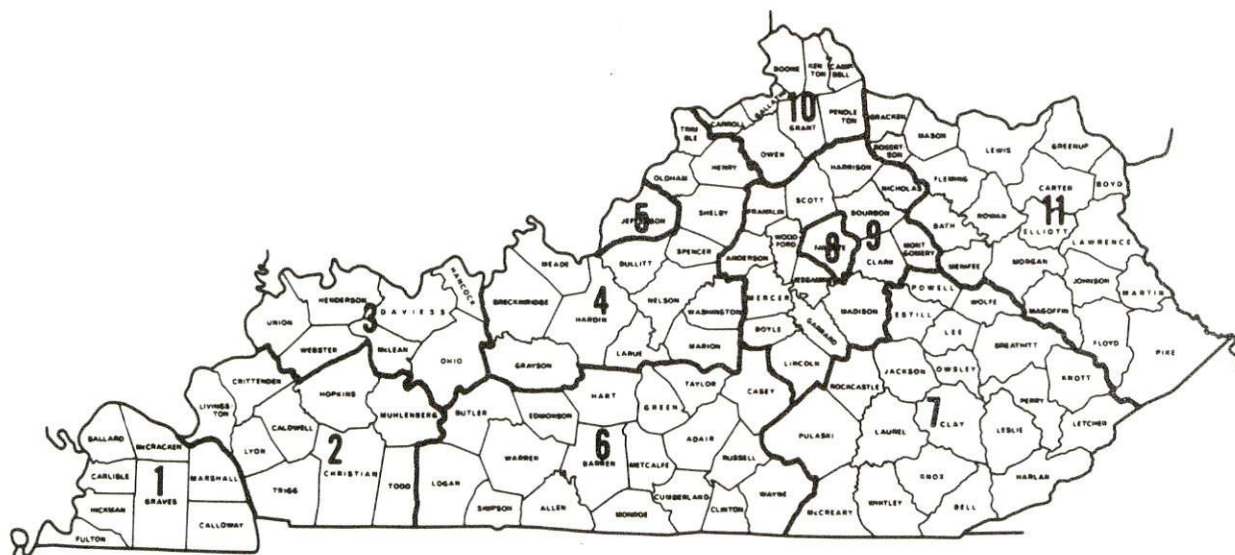

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

### Highways

U.S. Highway 68 and Kentucky Highways 55, 70, 208, and 210 serve Campbellsville. Campbellsville is located only 20 miles north of the Cumberland Parkway, 39 miles east of I-65, and 43 miles south of the Blue Grass Parkway.

A highway project is under way which, when completed, will greatly improve access to the Blue Grass Parkway and the Cumberland Parkway from Campbellsville. Sections of this project that have been completed include a 5-mile section of Kentucky 208 north of Campbellsville; a 5-mile section of Kentucky 55, extending south of Campbellsville to the Green River Lake; and 5 miles of a 20-mile section of Kentucky 55 between Campbellsville and Lebanon. The remainder of this 20-mile section still remains to be improved.

\*Rebuilding of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad trackage between Lebanon and Campbellsville is under way. The \$3.1 million project will provide a class-two track from Campbellsville to join with Louisville and Nashville's mainline tracks at Lebanon, 20 miles north of Campbellsville.

### Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.241 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

Campbellsville has excellent recreational facilities, which include several parks. Miller Park is a 55-acre scenic park, which features a Little League and softball field, tennis courts, a basketball court, children's playground, horse-shoe pits, croquet area, and a par 3 golf course. A stream meanders through the park, and various picnic facilities are near the stream.

The City-County Park, just on the outskirts of the city limits, features baseball and softball fields, which are used for many high school games, independent league games, and church games. The baseball field is the home field for all of Campbellsville College's home games. Plans are currently under way for expanding the City-County Park.

The Taylor County Park, located at the Green River Reservoir, contains 486 acres, and is used daily for recreation. A sand beach, covered picnic area, campsites, and boat launching ramps all make this park one of Central Kentucky's most outstanding attractions.

Cardinal Park is frequented by both local and touring guests, and is a lovely picnic area. This park is maintained by the Future Farmers of America at Taylor County High School and is located approximately 4 miles north from the city on Highway 55.

The 31,000-acre Green River Reservoir State Park features two boat docks and eight ramps. There are four large camping areas all with electrical hookups. The lake is a great tourist attraction for thousands annually, and provides one of the finest facilities for boating and skiing.

Other recreational facilities include a 20 lane bowling alley, a 9-hole golf course and swimming pool at the Campbellsville Country Club, and the City Lake, where fishing is excellent. Campbellsville College has a tennis court, indoor pool and organized physical fitness programs for the entire family.

Construction has begun on a \$500,000 swimming pool complex. The facilities will provide a 50-x 100-meter pool, with a 25-meter off-set diving area, and a bathhouse. The complex is scheduled for completion by summer 1982.



### Area (Within 70 miles)

Lincoln Homestead State Park, 28 miles north of Campbellsville near Springfield, is a 153-acre park on the original land settled by Abraham Lincoln's family. The actual building in which Nancy Hanks, mother of President Lincoln, lived during her courtship with Thomas Lincoln is preserved here as well as a replica of the 1782 cabin where Lincoln lived as a boy. The park also has a museum, a gift shop, a picnic area, and an 18-hole golf course.

Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historic Site, located 30 miles northwest of Campbellsville near Hodgenville, features the log cabin, which was the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln, enclosed within a granite memorial shrine. The grounds include 116 acres of the original Thomas Lincoln farm and a visitors' center with audio-visual programs and exhibits on the Lincoln family.

Perryville Battlefield State Shrine, 44 miles northeast of Campbellsville near Perryville, is the site of the largest Civil War battle in Kentucky. A museum, a picnic area, and a playground are located on the grounds.

My Old Kentucky Home State Park, 45 miles northwest of Campbellsville in Bardstown, portrays an image of the South's gentle and leisurely home life before the Civil War. The restored Georgian Colonial mansion is where composer Stephen Foster visited and where he was inspired to write "My Old Kentucky Home." One of the nation's most successful outdoor dramas, "The Stephen Foster Story," is presented in the park's amphitheatre mid-June until Labor Day. The park also offers a 40-site campground, a gift shop, a 9-hole golf course and pro shop, a picnic area, and planned recreation.

Lake Cumberland State Resort Park at Jamestown, 46 miles southeast of Campbellsville, is a 3,000-acre park located on the 50,000-acre Lake Cumberland, which sports excellent bass, bluegill, and crappie fishing. The park features a modern resort lodge which is perched on a high bluff above the lake. The lodge has a swimming pool, a dining room, a gift shop, and a multi-purpose convention center. Other park facilities include an additional swimming pool, riding stables, tennis courts, hiking trails, a 9-hole golf course, miniature golf, a picnic area, a playground, a 350-seat amphitheater, and a nature center. A marina offers houseboats, and fishing boats and motors for rent plus year-round launching ramps.

Constitution Square State Shrine, 51 miles northeast of Campbellsville in Danville, is a reproduction of Kentucky's first courthouse square, including the original 1792 post office which was the first in the west.

Old Fort Harrod State Park, 51 miles northeast of Campbellsville, is a 28-acre park in Harrodsburg that features a full-scale reproduction of the original Fort Harrod. The park also contains the log cabin where Abraham Lincoln's parents were wed, the Mansion Museum which houses mementos associated with the great periods of Kentucky history, a pioneer cemetery, and a federal monument dedicated to pioneers. The "Legend of Daniel Boone," an outdoor drama which brings to life on stage the men and women who made Kentucky, is performed in the park amphitheatre during the summer months.



Isaac Shelby State Shrine, 53 miles northeast of Campbellsville near Danville, is the burial site of Kentucky's first governor and one of the Commonwealth's foremost statesmen.

Mammoth Cave National Park is located 53 miles west of Campbellsville near Cave City. Beneath 51,000 park acres, Mammoth Cave is among the major tourist attractions of all times. It is one of the largest cave networks ever discovered, with at least 150 miles charted on five levels and vast areas not yet mapped. Some famous sights are Snowball Dining Room (267 feet below surface), Frozen Niagara, Crystal Lake, and Bottomless Pit. The park also features scenic boat trips on the Green River and nature and hiking trails. Park accommodations include a hotel with distinctive gift shops featuring native Kentucky and Southern Highland handicrafts, a motor lodge, hotel cottages, woodland cottages, and a hotel annex with budget accommodations and craft shop featuring live exhibits of broom making and weaving. Other park facilities include the hotel dining room and coffee shop, a service center, group meeting facilities, a campground, a picnic area, and tennis and shuffleboard courts.

William Whitley House State Shrine, 60 miles northeast of Campbellsville near Stanford, is the first brick house west of the Allegheny Mountains, built 1787-94. Whitley laid out Kentucky's first race track here and started U.S. counterclockwise racing. The facility provides picnic and playground areas in a 10-acre park.

Bernheim Forest is a 10,000-acre wildlife sanctuary located 63 miles north of Campbellsville, near Bardstown. Features include lakes, hiking trails, picnic areas, an arboretum and a nature center.

Dale Hollow Lake State Park, 65 miles south of Campbellsville, is located on 3,497 lakeside acres in southeastern Cumberland County. Park facilities include a marina, a picnic area, and 144 sites for tent and trailer camping. A private resort located on the lake provides facilities for swimming, fishing, boating, and playground activities, and offers cabin and houseboat rentals. Another private campground has tent and trailer camping, houseboat rentals, and a picnic area.

Barren River Lake State Resort Park, 69 miles southwest of Campbellsville near Glasgow, is a full-facility resort park offering a resort lodge, a coffee shop, cottages, a lodge pool, a beach, riding stables, nature trails, open and covered boat slips, a 9-hole par-3 golf course, lighted handball and tennis courts, shuffleboard, park camping with a service building, a restaurant, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, picnic areas, and a playground. Barren River Lake, which covers 10,000 acres, is a popular area for skiing, sailing, fishing, and swimming.
