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
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
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
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
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
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KENTUCKY'S FOUR MISSISSIPPI RIVER COUNTIES A RESOURCE PROFILE

Kentucky's Four Mississippi River Counties, Ballard, Carlisle, Hickman and Fulton Counties, have a population of 29,321 and cover a total land area of 901 square miles. The four counties are located adjacent to the east bank of the Mississippi River in extreme southwestern Kentucky.

The four-county area is within 165 miles of Nashville, Tennessee; 186 miles of St. Louis, Missouri; and 240 miles of Louisville, Kentucky.

The Economic Framework

Total employment of residents in Kentucky's Four Mississippi River Counties in 1981 averaged 12,570, with 11,140 persons employed in nonagricultural jobs. Manufacturing employers in the four river counties provided 1,745 jobs, wholesale and retail trade provided 1,610 jobs, and 1,070 persons were employed by state and local government. Manufacturing employment is greatest in the electrical machinery, apparel and related products, and paper and allied products industries.

Per capita personal income in the four-county area in 1980 ranged from \$5,860 to \$7,070.

The labor market area of Kentucky's Four Mississippi River Counties encompasses a fourteen-county area that extends into Tennessee, Missouri, and Illinois. Total employment of residents in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area in 1981 averaged 74,675, with 71,330 persons employed in nonagricultural jobs. Manufacturing employment within the area provided 13,710 jobs, wholesale and retail trade 14,190 jobs, state and local government 8,770 jobs, and service occupations 8,425 jobs.

Resources for Growth

1. Labor Supply

<u>Current labor supply</u> - There is a current estimated labor supply of 13,260 men and 10,130 women in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area available for industrial jobs.

Future labor supply - From 1983 thru 1987, 6,780 young men and 6,520 young women in this eight-county area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for work.

Additional labor supply - The current labor supply would also be increased by a portion of the available labor supply in Lake, Obion, and Weakley Counties in Tennessee; Mississippi County in Missouri; and Alexander and Pulaski Counties in Illinois.

2. Transportation

Rail - Railroad service is provided to all four counties by the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad.

<u>Highways</u> - Major highways serving the Four Mississippi River Counties include the Purchase Parkway, a multilane toll road, and U.S. Highways 60, 62 and 51. In addition, Interstate 24 is easily accessible near Paducah, Kentucky, via the Purchase Parkway, U.S. 60 or U.S. 62. Fourteen common carriers have authority to serve within the four-county area.

<u>Air</u> - The Fulton Municipal Airport is located within the four-river-county area. The Mayfield-Graves County Airport, Barkley Field (in Paducah, Kentucky), Everett-Stewart Airport (in Union City, Tennessee), and Cape Girardeau Municipal Airport are within 35 miles of the four river counties.

<u>Water</u> - Water transportation is an important asset to the Four Mississippi River Counties. Two major riverports serve the area, the Hickman-Fulton County Riverport Authority, located within the area, and the Paducah-McCracken County Riverport at Paducah.

3. Power and Fuel

<u>Electric power</u> - Electric power is provided to the Four Mississippi River Counties through seven distributors. The generating sources of power are Kentucky Utilities Company, Tennessee Valley Authority and Big Rivers Electric Corporation.

<u>Natural gas</u> - Natural gas service is provided in the area by nine municipal gas companies. The sources of supply are Trunkline Gas Company and Texas Gas Transmission Corporation.

<u>Propane and fuel oil</u> - Four distributors of propane and six distributors of distillate fuel oil are located within the four river counties. Other distributors of propane and fuel oil are located in adjoining counties.

4. Education

Five public school systems serve over 5,500 students in the four river counties.


Six colleges and universities are located within 60 miles of the four river counties.

Two vocational education centers are located within the four river counties. The Ballard County Vocational Education Center, located in Barlow, offers training in seven courses. The Fulton County Vocational Education Center, located in the city of Hickman, offers five courses. In addition, the Mayfield Area Vocational Education Center, in nearby Mayfield, offers ten courses. The Purchase Training Center, also at Mayfield, offers training in diesel and hydraulics mechanics. The West Kentucky State Vocational Technical School, in nearby Paducah, offers twenty-eight courses.

5. Recreation

Bordering the Mississippi River provides residents of the Four Mississippi River Counties excellent opportunity for water sports and fishing. The Ballard County Wildlife Management Area offers an 8,400-acre paradise for hunters, and there are controlled hunting seasons on dove, squirrel and water fowl. Sections of several highways in the four-river-county area have been designated as part of the Great River Road, a scenic route which runs along the Mississippi River from Canada through ten states to the Gulf of Mexico.

The Four Mississippi River Counties are located within 60 miles of (1) three of Kentucky's state parks which offer full resort facilities, (2) Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley which offer top fishing, water sports, and recreational areas, and (3) The Land Between the Lakes, a 170,000-acre recreational and conservational wooded penninsula.



LABOR MARKET

The greater labor market area of Kentucky's Four Mississipi River Counties includes eight Kentucky counties, three Tennessee counties, one Missouri county, and two Illinois counties. Kentucky counties comprising the Kentucky portion of the labor market area are Ballard, Carlisle, Hickman, Fulton, Calloway, Graves, McCracken, and Marshall.

All counties within the greater labor market area are within easy commuting distance of Kentucky's Four Mississippi River Counties.



The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

EXISTING MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY

Thirty-three manufacturing plants are located in Kentucky's Four Mississippi River Counties. Six of the plants employ more than 100 workers. Ten plants are located in Fulton County, five in Hickman County, six in Carlisle County, and thirteen in Ballard County with a variety of products manufactured, including business and printing papers, bleached chemical wood pulp, lamps and lamp bases, sports shirts and jackets, graphite electrodes, telephone reconditioning service, and food products.

In addition to the area manufacturing firms, a major employer within the area is Ferry-Morse Seed Company located in the city of Fulton. This company, which packages seeds, has a total employment of approximately 280.

Recent Manufacturing Developments:

Uarco, Inc., is currently constructing a manufacturing plant in the city of Fulton. Uarco, Inc., manufactures business forms and proposes to employ approximately 150 workers. Operations at the new facility are scheduled to begin in fall of 1983.

Sigri Carbon Corporation, located in the city of Hickman, recently completed Phase 1 of a three-part major expansion. The three-part plan, which includes both upgrading and additions to existing facilities, will represent approximately \$200 million in added investment by 1990.

Westvaco Corporation, located in the city of Wickliffe, is currently expanding its papermaking capacity by approximately 25 percent. The \$38 million project is scheduled for completion in spring 1984.


Highways

Major highways which serve the four river counties include U.S. Highways 60, 62, and 51, all "AAA" rated (80,000 lb. gross load limit) trucking highways. Other "AAA" rated routes in the four river counties are Kentucky Highways 1420, 996, 286, 121, 58, 125, and 166. In addition, several "AA" rated (62,000 lb. gross load limit) trucking highways serve the area. These include Kentucky Highways 80, 307, 123, 239, and 94.

The Purchase Parkway, a multilane toll road, directly serves Fulton County and is easily accessible from several points in the other river counties. The parkway is the major route through the Jackson Purchase Region. Interstate 24, a major east-west highway, is easily accessible near Paducah, Kentucky, via the Purchase Parkway, U.S. 60 or U.S. 62. Interstate 57, a major north-south highway, is accessible in southern Illinois just across the Ohio River from Ballard County. In addition, Interstate 55 is accessible approximately 25 miles west of Ballard County via I-57.

Sections of several highways in the four river counties have been designated as part of the Great River Road, a scenic route which runs along the Mississippi River from Canada through ten states to the Gulf of Mexico.

Planned highway improvements in the Four Mississippi River Counties include several bridge replacement projects. Plans for 1983 to 1988 include ten projects, which will total approximately \$11 million. Also, construction on portions of the Great River Road is planned pending availability of Great River Road funding.

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

Water

Water transportation is an important asset to the four river counties. The area is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River and on the north by the Ohio River. Two major riverports provide service to the four-county area - the Hickman-Fulton County Riverport and the Paducah-McCracken County Riverport. Several barge companies operate in the area. Channel fueling service is also available in the area.

Private businesses located within the Hickman harbor area include River Grain Corporation which consists of a grain elevator, 558,000 bushels of storage and a grain terminal. Bunge Corporation operates a grain elevator and terminal and has an approximate 1,000,000-bushel storage capacity. Lattus Ready-Mix Company operates a sand and gravel company.



Riverports

Hickman-Fulton County Riverport Authority*

The Mississippi River bounds Hickman on the west, and port facilities are available for barges. Hickman Harbor has private unloading facilities, 24-hour service, 24-hour food and provision service, fresh water, and refueling service for the large freight boats and barges that serve the area. Hickman Harbor Service, Inc., C & D Transport, and Flowers Transportation, Inc., provide fleet service for the harbor. Hickman is a headquarters for the U.S. Coast Guard, serving an area of 190 miles up and down the river, and the home base for the Coast Guard Cutter Chippewa.

The Hickman-Fulton County Riverport Authority, a still, warm-water harbor on the Mississippi River, has completed a \$2.4 million general cargo facility. The heart of the port is the docking facility, consisting of two 16-foot diameter mooring cells, one 20-foot diameter mooring and conveyor cell, one mooring "dolphin" structure, and a 30-foot diameter crane cell which has a pedestal-mounted crane rated at 125-ton lifting capacity. This crane, which has a 120-foot-long boom, is able to lift 50 tons out of a barge and place a 20-ton load on a truck.

Linking the docking facility with the flood-protected material handling and processing segment of the port on the other side of the levee is an 86-foot-long bridge with paved roadway over the levee. At the land end of the bridge is an 18,400-square-foot heated warehouse, a 6,000-square-foot warehouse and a paved staging area with truck height loading dock which has a rail spur at one end for rail transshipment. There is also 10,000 square feet of outside storage space.

The second main element of the port is a 125-foot-long radial stacker which has the capability of stockpiling ten or more bargeloads of material. In the barge unloading operation it is fed by a hopper on the 20-foot diameter river cell which will be loaded by a clamshell attached to the crane. The stacker is connected to the docking facility by a 1,205-foot-long conveyor system which has a 30-inch-wide belt with the capacity to transport material at a rate of 350 tons per hour outbound and 400 tons per hour inbound.

^{*} The city of Hickman, including the Hickman-Fulton County Riverport, has been designated as one of Kentucky's first enterprise zones. An entrprise zone is an area of a city or county in which special incentives are offered by state and local agencies to encourage new and expanded business. The life of the zone designation is 20 years.

The entire facility is constructed on approximately 25 acres of land adjoining the harbor. A two-tract industrial site is being developed with one tract located adjacent to the port and the other tract located ¼ mile from the port. The port was built primarily to handle and transport bulk commodities, mainly corn, grain and coal. As demand for other commodities has grown, the port has added the capability to adapt to handle virtually any cargo moved on the inland waterways system.

Paducah-McCracken County Riverport Authority

The Paducah-McCracken County Riverport Authority is located at the confluence of the Ohio and Tennessee Rivers, just 48 miles east of where the Ohio River flows into the Mississippi River and at the head of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway (under construction). In addition to its excellent water transportation location, the Paducah-McCracken County Riverport is located just six miles from I-24.

Currently, the riverport contains an 8-acre general cargo area; 20,000 square feet of warehouse space; about 40,000 square feet of open storage; and a bulk handling facility which includes a storage bin and loading and unloading equipment.







NATURAL RESOURCES

Mineral Resources

The mineral resources of the four-county region have to be considered in conjunction with the entire Purchase Area in order to evaluate their potential.

The resources of the Purchase Area are clay, sand and gravel. Clay is produced from the Claiborne and Wilcox Age deposits. Throughout the Purchase Area deposits of Eocene and Cretaceous Ages contain sand with a high silica content. The pliocene sand and gravel is mined for road metal.

Clay

Clay is probably the most important mineral resource of this region. Several varieties of clay are widely distributed throughout the area. The most commercially important are those suitable for the manufacture of ceramic products. These sell under the trade name of ball, sagger and wad, depending upon their uses. They are mined at several locations by two companies in Graves County; however, deposits occur in Ballard, Calloway, Carlisle, Graves and Marshall Counties. The U.S. Bureau of Mines estimates the ball clay reserves in Kentucky to be 630,000,000 tons. The total reserve base is located in the Purchase Region.

<u>Fuller's Earth</u>: This is a term used to describe bleaching clays with high natural absorptive capacities for oil. Deposits of this type clay extend in an arc-shaped belt from Ballard County running roughly parallel with Kentucky Lake to the Tennessee border. The U.S. Bureau of Mines estimates Kentucky's reserves to be 750,000,000 tons. Currently, these deposits are not being mined; however, the quality of the reserves have the absorptive properties approximating the chemical oil standard.

Sand and Gravel

The sand and gravel resources of the Purchase Area are very large and widespread. The greater part of the sand and gravel produced in the area has been for general construction and building purposes such as highways, bridges, railroad ballast, etc.

- Industrial Sand: Deposits of industrial sand have been mined in Calloway, Fulton, Graves and McCracken Counties. This type of sand is used for manufacturing glass and foundry molds. Generally, the sand contains over 97% silica, 0.05% to 0.231% iron oxide, and 0 to 0.03% magnesium oxide.
- The Carlisle County Silica Sand Deposit: An unmined silica sand deposit lies in Carlisle County. It is located about 5.5 miles west of Bardwell and has been named The Laketon Deposit. The sand is exposed intermittently along the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad for a distance of about one mile. The analyses of raw sand from two locations show the sand to be composed of 95.80 to 97.75 percent silica and that 76 to 86 percent is retained on 30 to 70 mesh screens.

Water Resources

The four-county area has an abundance of surface water and groundwater. The area is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River and on the north by the Ohio River. The low-flow discharges are large and are capable of supplying water needs of a highly industrialized area. The chemical quality of these rivers is good, having generally less than 300ppm dissolved solids.

Ground Water

Numerous aquifers capable of large yields exist in these counties. The following are the most widespread aquifers:

- Claiborne Group: Sands of this group can yield more than 1,000 gallons per minute in about three-fourths of this area. Generally, the best aquifer is the lower 300 to 400 feet of this group; however, sands in the top part of the group may also have yields of more than 1,000 gallons per minute. Generally dissolved solids in the water are less than 70 parts per million and the water is soft. The water from this aquifer is low in iron content and usually does not have to be treated.
- Mississippi & Ohio River Alluvium: Sand and gravel of these alluvial deposits can usually yield more than 1,000 gallons per minute at most places. The water is hard to very hard. The water quality is good and contains less than 500 mg/l of dissolved solids. It is usually high in iron content and has to be treated.

AGRICULTURE

Agriculture plays an important role in the economy of the four river counties. In 1978, over 1,800 farms, with an average size of 226 acres, operated in the four counties. Also in 1978, farm land made up nearly 73 percent of the total land area in the four counties. Major crops in the area include soybeans, winter wheat and corn.



Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Kentucky statutes allow the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and allow local jurisdictions to levy taxes on selected classes. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, school districts, and special districts. Counties levy taxes throughout the county, including property located inside of incorporated cities. Cities may levy taxes only within their corporate boundaries. School districts do not overlap.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas, usually a small portion of a community or county. In Ballard County a watershed district levies a tax of \$0.165 per \$100 valuation. In Carlisle County a watershed district levies a tax of \$0.100 per \$100 valuation. In Hickman County a fire protection district levies a tax of \$0.07 per \$100 valuation. In addition, in Fulton County a fire protection fee of \$0.02 per acre is charged on timberland.

State and local taxes are levied on the following classes of property:

Utilities Gross Receipts Tax for Schools

School districts in Kentucky may levy a utilities tax at a rate not exceeding 3 percent of taxable utilities (telephone, telegraph, electric, water, and natural and artificial gas services). Exempted from the tax are energy costs that exceed 3 percent of the cost of production in manufacturing.

The tax is included as an add-on to the utility bills at the time of payment.

During the 1982-83 school year, all school districts except the Fulton Independent School District levied a 3 percent utilities tax for schools.

The Ballard County Wildlife Management Area offers an 8,400-acre paradise for hunters and fishermen. There are controlled hunting seasons on dove, squirrel, and water fowl. Easy access roads provide designated areas for picnicking and camping during the summer season. Some of the wild animals and fowl that might be seen are whitetail deer, wild turkeys and eagles. In addition, hunting and fishing are welcomed in many privately owned areas throughout the four counties.

A Confederate cannon, a network of earthen trenches, and a massive chain and anchor give the feeling of being transported back to the Civil War. All of this and more can be discovered at **Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park** at Columbus in west Hickman County. Other attractions at the 156-acre park include a 38-site campground, a gift shop, a historical hiking trail, miniature golf, a picnic area, and a playground. A visit to the museum at the park, which is in a building that served as a Civil War infirmary, offers a display of Civil War relics and early Indian artifacts and an audiovisual slide program on the Battle of Belmont.

Reelfoot Lake and the **Kentucky Bend** are located in southwest Fulton County. Reelfoot Lake is a 70-square-mile lake in Kentucky and Tennessee known for its fishing. Kentucky maintains a 2,000-acre wildlife area near the lake for hunting. The Kentucky Bend is land totally separated from the state by the Mississippi River.

Sections of several highways in the four river counties have been designated as part of the **Great River Road**, a scenic route which runs along the Mississippi River from Canada through ten states to the Gulf of Mexico.

Other local recreation facilities include four country clubs which offer golf, tennis and swimming. Also, the Mississippi River is a source of recreational activities including fishing and boating.

Area (Within 60 miles)

Charm and serenity exemplify Kenlake State Resort Park which is located on the 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake. The park offers hotel and cottage accommodations and an efficient camping site. Other facilities include a 9-hole golf course, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, boating, picnicking, playgrounds, shuffleboard, planned recreation, and one of the finest tennis complexes in the area. Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park, located at Gilbertsville, is one of the largest and most popular vacation resorts in Kentucky. A modern lodge with 72 rooms, six different cottage types, and 225-site campground make up the accommodations. There is also a dining room overlooking the 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake, a coffee shop, a snack bar, two gift shops, a meeting room, an activities center, and a recreation room. Recreational activities to choose from include boating and fishing at the largest docking facility in the Kentucky parks system, golf at the 18-hole Village Green Course, hiking, horseback riding, picnicking, swimming at the lodge pool or off the sand beach, and tennis.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, near Cadiz, is located on the scenic Little River embayment of the 58,000-acre Lake Barkley. The magnificent lodge includes 120 rooms, four suites, nine cottages, a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, two meeting rooms, and a recreation room. An activities center with a capacity for 400 and an 80-site campground are located near the lodge. A lodge pool, a beach and a bathhouse, an 18-hole golf course, tennis courts, a riding stable, a trapshooting range, a basketball court, hiking trails, playgrounds, and a picnic area comprise the recreational facilities. The marina near the lodge has everything for the "boat lover," including covered and open slips, launching ramp, and rentals for fishing boats, skiing boats, and pleasure ride pontoons.

Kentucky Lake is one of the top fishing, water sport and recreational areas in the southeastern United States. The 184-mile-long lake, covering more than 160,300 total surface acres of water, was impounded from the Tennessee River in 1944 by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Lake Barkley, "twin" to Kentucky Lake, is a 118-mile-long impoundment of the Cumberland River. The two lakes are connected by a 1 3/4-mile-long freeflowing canal at their northern ends. Lake Barkley is a major fishing and recreational area covering approximately 58,000 acres.

The Land Between the Lakes, located on a 170,000-acre wooded penninsula, is an outdoor recreational and conservational education center. Camping, swimming, fishing, boating, hiking, a buffalo herd on a 250-acre range, an Environmental Education Center for school study groups, an educational farm and a central station with films and displays are among the attractions.

HISTORY

Ballard County dates back to 1842 when it became Kentucky's 93rd county. Ballard County was named for Captain Bland W. Ballard, a native of Fredericksburg, Virginia, who migrated to Kentucky at the age of 18. He saw extensive military service under Generals George Rogers Clark, "Mad" Anthony Wayne, and William Henry Harrison.

Fort Jefferson was built by George Rogers Clark and 200 soldiers nearly four decades before settlers began arriving in Ballard County. The fort was located approximately five miles south of the confluence of the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers. During the Civil War, the fort was used by General U. S. Grant in some southern campaigns.

Carlisle County was formed from the southern part of Ballard County in 1886. The first settlers came into Carlisle County soon after the Chickasaw Indians moved west of the Mississippi River in compliance with the terms of the Treaty of Purchase in 1818. One of the oldest settlements was at Cunningham, in the northern part of the county, in 1820. Bardwell, the county seat, is near the center of Carlisle County and was chosen over the community of Arlington in the southern part of the county.

Hickman County, the 71st Kentucky county, dates back to 1821. The county was named for Captain Paschal Hickman, a native of Virginia who migrated to Kentucky as a small boy. He gained a reputation as an Indian fighter and was killed in the River Raisin Massacre in the War of 1812.

In 1861, Confederate forces moved into the area and established fortifications on a high bluff overlooking the Mississippi River near the city of Columbus. This is now the site of the Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park. Some of the old fortifications have been restored and a portion of the giant chain and anchor General Leonidas Polk stretched across the river to prevent passage of Union gunboats has been preserved.

Fulton County, formed from Hickman County, became Kentucky's 99th county in 1845. The county was named in honor of Robert Fulton, whose famous steamboat, the "Clermont," was the first commercially successful one in America. The city of Hickman was mentioned by Mark Twain in his Life on the Mississippi as one of the most beautiful towns along the river.

The town of Fulton lies on the Kentucky-Tennessee border. Until the mid-1960's it was the distribution center for 70 percent of all bananas brought into the United States. To celebrate this heritage, Fulton hosts the annual International Banana Festival.
