

PRINCETON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Princeton, the county seat of Caldwell County, is located in the Pennyrile Region of Western Kentucky just east of Lake Barkley, the Land Between the Lakes and the vast Western Waterland area. Princeton, with an estimated 1994 population of 7,222, is located 100 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee; 174 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 219 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri.

Caldwell County, with an estimated 1994 population of 13,140, has a land area of 347 square miles.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Caldwell County residents employed in 1994 averaged 6,803. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,333 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 1,098 jobs; 599 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 727 employees; and contract construction firms provided 147 jobs.


Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 12,374 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1997 through 2001, 11,871 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Major highways serving Princeton include the Western Kentucky Parkway, U.S. Highway 62, and Kentucky Route 293. An interchange of Interstate 24 is located 13 miles west of the city. Twenty-one trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Princeton. The Paducah and Louisville Railway and the Western Kentucky Railway Company provide rail service to Princeton. The neareast commercial airline service is available at Barkley Regional Airport near Paducah, Kentucky, 55 miles west. The Princeton-Caldwell County Airport maintains a 3,000-foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Princeton by the Princeton Electric Plant Board. Caldwell County is served electric power by the Kentucky Utilities Company, the Henderson Union Electric Cooperative, and the Pennyrile Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Princeton is provided natural gas service by the Western Kentucky Gas Company.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided to Princeton and Caldwell County by the Caldwell County School System, which is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Eleven colleges and universities are located within 100 miles of Princeton. Vocational training is available at the Madisonville Regional Technology Center in Madisonville, 30 miles northeast, and at the Caldwell County Area Technology Center in Princeton.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1994







AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Major highways serving Princeton include the Western Kentucky Parkway, U.S. Highway 62, and Kentucky Route 293. Each is a "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highway. Other highways serving Princeton include Kentucky Highways 91 and 139.

An interchange of the Western Kentucky Parkway, a multi-lane east-west highway, is located one mile north of Princeton. Access to Interstate 24 is located 13 miles west via the Western Kentucky Parkway.

A westbound off-ramp and an eastbound on-ramp are available at the Kentucky 293 overpass of the Western Kentucky Parkway. A full interchange is planned to be constructed in the near future.



Structure

The City of Princeton is governed by a mayor and six council members. The mayor serves a four-year term, while the council members each serve two-year terms. Caldwell County is governed by a county judge/executive and eight magistrates. Each county official is elected to a four-year term.

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Princeton levies a 1.5 percent occupational license tax on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals and on net profits of businesses.

Caldwell County levies a 0.5 percent occupational license tax on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals and on net profits of businesses.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value.

RECREATION

Local

Princeton and Caldwell County provide numerous and varied recreational facilities. Supervised sports programs by Youth Incorporated include basketball, football and soccer (for boys and girls), and softball (for girls ages 9 through 15). The City-County Park Board and the Board of Education provide three public parks, four playgrounds, six lighted tennis courts, six baseball/softball diamonds, two football fields, and six basketball courts.

The 37-acre City-County Park is a well-maintained and supervised park featuring a swimming pool, two lighted tennis courts, two softball fields (supporting 25 adult leagues), a shelter house, 20 picnic tables, hiking trails, playground equipment, and a miniature golf course. Soccer fields were recently constructed at the park.

The Caldwell County School System maintains a community activity building which houses a gymnasium and physical education facilities.

Private recreational facilities available include the Princeton Country Club, with tennis courts, a swimming pool, an 18-hole golf course, and meeting rooms. A 21-lane bowling center is also located in Princeton.

Eddy Creek Resort and Marina is located 13 miles from Princeton in Lyon County. The resort provides camping, a full service marina and boat slips, pool, and lodging facilities.
