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

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STANFORD-LINCOLN COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Lincoln County, with a land area of 337 square miles is in portions of both the Outer Blue Grass and Mississippian Plateaus Regions. Lincoln County had an estimated 1999 population of 22,540.

Stanford, the county seat of Lincoln County, is in south central Kentucky. Stanford is 48 miles south of Lexington, Kentucky; 95 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky; 135 miles south of Cincinnati, Ohio; and 143 miles north of Knoxville, Tennessee. Stanford had an estimated 1998 population of 2,989.

The Economic Framework – Lincoln County firms employed 3,773 people in 1997. Contract construction firms provided 164 jobs; manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,019 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 779 jobs; 606 were employed in the service industry; and state and local government accounted for 893 jobs.


Labor Supply – There is a current estimated labor supply of 24,179 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 2000 through 2004, approximately 11,120 young persons in the labor market area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation – U.S. Highways 27, 127, and 150 are AAA-rated trucking highways serving Lincoln County. Interstate 75, a major north-south corridor, is accessible 27 miles southeast of Stanford via U.S. 150. The Cumberland Parkway, an east-west multi-lane toll road, is accessible 34 miles south of Stanford via U.S. 27. The Blue Grass Parkway, an east-west multi-lane highway, is accessible 36 miles north of Stanford via U.S. 150 and 127. Twenty trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Stanford. The Norfolk Southern Corporation provides the nearest rail service to Stanford at Danville, 11 miles northeast. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Blue Grass Airport near Lexington, 42 miles north of Stanford.

Power and Fuel – Kentucky Utilities Company provides electric power to Stanford and parts of Lincoln County. Lincoln County is also provided electric power by the South Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation and the Inter-County Energy Cooperative Corporation, which are supplied by East Kentucky Power. Natural gas service is provided to Stanford by the Western Kentucky Gas Company, which is supplied by the Tennessee Gas Transmission Company.

Education – The Lincoln County School System provides primary and secondary education to the residents of Lincoln County. Fifteen colleges and universities are within 60 miles of Stanford. The Garrard County Area Technology Center (ATC) provides secondary technical education in Lancaster, 8 miles north of Stanford. The Central Kentucky Technical College Danville Campus provides post-secondary technical education in Danville, 10 miles southeast of Stanford.









LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The City of Stanford is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor is elected to a four-year term and the council members serve two-year terms. Lincoln County is served by a county judge/executive and four magistrates. The county judge/executive and magistrates serve four-year terms.

Planning and Zoning

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Stanford levies a business license fee which ranges from \$5 to \$500 annually. Manufacturing firms are not charged a fee during the first five years of operation. After the fifth year, manufacturing firms with less than 25 employees are levied \$100 per year and firms with more than 25 employees are levied a fee of \$300 per year.

Sales and Use Tax

A state sales and use tax is levied at the rate of 6.0% on the purchase or lease price of taxable goods and on utility services. Local sales taxes are not levied in Kentucky.

State and Local Property Taxes

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside the city limits may also be subject to city property taxes. Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value. Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its training and development coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should contact a Training and Development Coordinator at the Central Kentucky Technical College Danville Campus.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers business, education, and government agencies testing packages for evaluating job applicants, selecting employees for promotional consideration and developing training programs within the organization. The Career Connections Assessment Center serving the Stanford-Lincoln County area is located at the Central Kentucky Technical College Danville Campus.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new academic skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In Stanford and Lincoln County, adult basic education and adult literacy classes are available through the Lincoln County Board of Education.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation (BSSC) was established in 1984 by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as an independent, de jure corporation to stimulate economic development through customized business and industry specific skills training programs. The BSSC works with business and industry and Kentucky's educational institutions to establish programs of skills training. The BSSC is attached to the Cabinet for Economic Development for administrative purposes, in recognition of the relationship between economic development and skills training efforts.

The BSSC is comprised of two economic development tools, matching grants and the newly authorized Skills Training Investment Credit Act. The BSSC grant program is available to new, expanding and existing business and industry. Eligible training activities include pre-employment skills training and assessment; entry level, skills upgrade and occupational upgrade training; train-the-trainer travel; and capacity-building. The Skills Training Investment Credit Act provides tax credits to existing businesses for skills upgrade training.

RECREATION

The Stanford-Lincoln County Recreational Park, located adjacent to the Lincoln County High School, contains four tennis courts, lighted playground, water fountain, and a softball field. The Lions Club Recreational Park, a 10-acre facility, features three little league baseball fields. The Logan-Hubble Memorial Recreation Park features four shelters, restrooms, playgrounds, basketball courts, and a picnic area.

The Dix River Country Club provides an 18-hole golf course, two tennis courts, and a swimming pool for its members. Other recreational facilities include a drive-in theatre and flea market.

The Harvey Helm Museum provides historical records, genealogical records, and a collection of historical articles.

William Whitley House State Historic Site is southeast of Stanford. The Whitley House was the first brick house constructed west of the Alleghenies in 1788. The first circular racetrack was built there, using clay instead of turf in contrast with British tracks, and races were run counter clockwise instead of clockwise. The park is on a 10-acre site with a picnic area, playground equipment, and a gift shop.

Special events in Lincoln County include the Chamber of Commerce Christmas Parade, the Crab Orchard Homecoming held during the July 4th holiday, and Waynesburg Pioneer Days held the 3rd weekend in September.

APPENDIX - DEFINITIONS

Geographic definition of the labor market area

A county's labor market area is defined as the base county, adjacent counties, and any other major commuting counties. Adjacency is used to define the labor market area primarily because of the small size of Kentucky's counties. The major commuting counties are defined from the point of view of the base county. Major commuting counties are those counties that comprise 90% of the base county's total commuters. The source of the commuting patterns is the 1990 journey-to-work data available from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Example - Logan County

To determine the labor market area for Logan County the following steps are taken. First, the counties with workers commuting into Logan county are listed in ascending order (see the table below). The cumulative percent is calculated. Next, all counties that comprise up to 90% of the commuters are included in the labor market area (actually the cut-off will be the county that breaks the 90% threshold – Montgomery County, TN at 92.6% in this case). Although Robertson is not a major commuter county, it is included since it is adjacent. The Logan County labor market is then comprised of the seven bold-faced counties in the table below.

Potential Labor Supply

The potential labor supply is an estimate of those persons not classified as in the labor force (not employed and not unemployed), but who want a job. The assumption is that people not in the labor force at the local level would like a job at the same rate as the nation. The U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics provides national, yearly estimates of the percent of the people not in the labor force who want a job. This percent is applied to the county-level number of people not in the labor force.

Underemployed

Wholesale/retail trade and non-professional services have historically paid low wages. The assumption is that workers in these industries would take higher paying jobs if they were available. Non-professional services excludes Miscellaneous Repair Services (SIC 7600), Health Services (SIC 8000), Legal Services (SIC 8100), and Engineering and Management Services (SIC 8700).

Total Available Labor

Total available labor is the sum of the number of unemployed, potential labor supply, and underemployed. Please note that the number of unemployed is the only generally accepted measure of labor availability. The other concepts are weaker measures and should be used with caution.
