WATER: Kingston-Terrill Water District. The water district, supplied by the Richmond Water, Gas and Sewerage Company, has an 8-inch main on Site # 1. Capacity of the water district is presently 500 gpm - present usage is 100,000 gpd - capacity can be increased. Pressure is maintained at 67 psi.

GAS: Delta Natural Gas Company, Inc. There are two 4-inch mains in the immediate vicinity of Sites # 1 and # 2. The company is supplied by the Columbia Gulf Transmission Company. BTU content is approximately 1,040; specific gravity is .6.



<u>Water:</u> Daily treatment capacity - 3,500,000 gallons; average daily use - 2,225,000 gallons; maximum daily use - 2,500,000 gallons; storage capacity - 1,900,000 gallons; size distribution lines - 20 and 6 inches.

Sewerage: Type treatment - grit chamber, comminutor, primary settling, filter, secondary settling, final tank, digester, sludge bed; design capacity - 4,500,000 gallons per day or a population of 22,000; size of sewer mains - 16 and 6 inches.
