
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


CLINTON LABOR MARKET AREA With MAJOR HIGHWAYS & RAILROAD SYSTEM



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.279 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

Utilities Gross Receipts Tax for Schools

A 3 percent tax is levied on utilities receipts for schools in Hickman County. Tax is paid by all consumers of utilities as an add-on to the utilities bills. Exempted are receipts from utilities services that are resold and the receipts from the sale of energy or energy producing fuels that exceed 3 percent of the cost of production in manufacturing, processing, mining or refining.

RECREATION

Local

Public recreational facilities located in Clinton include three playgrounds, two baseball diamonds, and two tennis courts. Private recreational facilities include a country club with a golf course, tennis courts and a swimming pool, and a privately owned swimming pool available for public use.

Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park is located 9 miles from Clinton at Columbus. This historic park, located on a bluff overlooking the Mississippi River, features a Civil War Museum which has a diorama of the famous battle fought there. Other facilities include miniature golf, hiking trails, shelter, snack bar, gift shop, playground, and fishing.

Area (Within 65 miles)

The Ballard County Wildlife Management Area, approximately 42 miles from Clinton, offers an 8,400-acre paradise for hunters and fishermen. There are controlled hunting seasons on dove, squirrel, and water fowl. Easy access roads provide designated areas for picnicking and camping during the summer season. Some of the wild animals and fowl that might be seen are whitetail deer, wild turkeys and eagles.

Clinton is located near two of the largest inland lakes in America, Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley, which include over 3,300 miles of shoreline.

Located on the shores of Kentucky Lake are two of the state's full-facility resort parks -- Kenlake State Resort Park and Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park. Both parks offer the following facilities: lakeside locations; lodge, cottage, and camping accommodations; dining rooms, gift shops, and picnic areas; golf, swimming, fishing, boat docks, boat rentals, horseback riding, hiking, tennis, playgrounds, and planned recreation.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park is located on the scenic Little River embayment of Lake Barkley's eastern shore. The park contains a lodge with a dining room and gift shop, cottages, and camping sites. Recreational facilities include a lodge pool, a beach and bathhouse, an 18-hole golf course, tennis courts, riding stable, trapshooting range, basketball court, hiking trails, playgrounds, and a picnic area. A marina located near the lodge has open and covered slips, a launching ramp, and rental boats of all types. An activities center with a capacity for 400 is also located near the lodge.

Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area is a beautiful 170,000-acre woodland that has been developed by TVA into a major area for outdoor recreation, conservation and environmental learning. It is a peninsula 5 to 10 miles wide and stretching for 40 miles north to south between Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley. The area offers an excellent combination of land and water recreational facilities such as picnic and swimming areas, boat launching ramps, primitive and developed campgrounds, and nature trails.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

The city of Clinton was selected to receive the "All Kentucky City" award for 1978. In addition, "All Kentucky City" awards were presented to the city for the years 1972 and 1974.

The Kentucky Water Service Company has completed a \$100,000 project to improve its water system. A 210,000-gallon standpipe was constructed and a 6-inch water main was extended 6,000 feet to connect into the existing water system.

Step I of a 201 Facilities Plan for the Clinton Sewer System is under way.

A \$215,000 medical facility, Doctor's Clinic of Family Medicine, is under construction. The clinic will feature outpatient family practice and will be staffed by 3 medical doctors.

The Clinton Bank now occupies its new main office building. The \$700,000 project provides drive-in facilities, enlarged safe and safe deposit boxes, and easy street access.

The First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Fulton has established a branch office in Clinton.

Planned relocation and rehabilitation of families and homes in the flood prone area of Clinton is now under way. The Department of Housing and Urban Development project will involve relocating approximately 20 families and rehabilitating 9 homes.

The Hickman County Memorial Library has reopened after a lengthy closing. Historical volumes and encyclopedias are available at the library.

A new athletic field is being developed at the Hickman County High School.

A new police cruiser is budgeted for 1980.
