



MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Morehead is the county seat of Rowan County and the home of Morehead State University. Morehead, with a 1990 population of 8,357, is located 65 miles east of Lexington, Kentucky; 65 miles west of Huntington, West Virginia; 139 miles east of Louisville, Kentucky; and 96 miles southeast of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Rowan County covers a land area of 280 square miles and is located along the western edge of the Eastern Coal Field in northeastern Kentucky. In 1990, Rowan County had a population of 20,353.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Rowan County residents employed in 1992 averaged 7,919. In 1991, manufacturing firms in the county reported 820 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 1,833 jobs; 1,416 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 2,266 employees; and contract construction firms provided 297 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 12,462 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1993 through 1997, 7,883 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Morehead is served by Interstate 64, U.S. 60 and Kentucky 32, which are each "AAA"-rated trucking highways. Fourteen trucking companies serve Morehead with interstate and/or intrastate service. The nearest rail service is provided by the CSX Transportation Company at Winchester, 46 miles southwest. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Bluegrass Airport, five miles west of Lexington, 69 miles west of Morehead; and Tri-State Airport (Walker-Long Field), three miles southwest of Huntington, West Virginia, 60 miles east of Morehead. The Morehead-Rowan County Airport, five and a half miles southwest of Morehead, has a 2,600-foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Morehead and parts of Rowan County by the Kentucky Utilities Company, an electric generation and transmission company. Rowan County is also served by the Grayson Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation, Clark Rural Electric Cooperative, Fleming-Mason Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation, and the Kentucky Power Company. Natural gas is provided to Morehead by the Morehead Utility Plant Board, which is supplied by Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company. Delta Natural Gas Company also provides natural gas to Rowan County.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided to Morehead by the Rowan County School System, which is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Higher Education is provided by Morehead State University in Morehead. Vocational training is available at the Rowan State Vocational-Technical School, also located in Morehead.

The Morehead Labor Market Area includes Rowan County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Bath, Carter, Elliott, Fleming, Lewis, Menifee, and Morgan.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1992





AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



RECENT INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Harold White Lumber, Inc. recently purchased an additional bank resaw machine which improves the yield and grade lumber recovery. Also a 50,000 square-foot facility was constructed that houses the moulding operation which produces hardwood moulding, flooring and trim.

Fannin Industries has installed sawdust fired kilns with 100,000 board-feet of capacity and an air drying yard and grading station to compliment an existing sawmill operation.

Richard White Wood Products, Inc. installed a lumber steamer in the summer of 1993 to increase the value of walnut lumber leaving the yard by providing an even color.

Kentucky Lumber & Dry Kiln installed a small sawmill in the spring of 1993 to produce lumber for the existing kiln drying operation.

Acorn Industries, Inc. has expanded facilities to include pallet remanufacturing to utilize old pallets by repairing and using parts to decrease the waste into local landfills.

TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Morehead is served by Interstate 64 and U.S. 60, which are both "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. Interstate 64 provides easy access to Interstate 75, a major north-south corridor, 59 miles west. In addition, Kentucky 32, Kentucky 377, Kentucky 519, and Kentucky 801 serve Rowan County.

There are several major highway projects under construction in Rowan County. Phase I of the Morehead bypass project is completed. Phase II will start the summer of 1993, followed by Phase III sometime afterward. The interchange from I-64 and Kentucky Highway 801 now under construction is scheduled for completion the summer of 1993. This interchange will now allow traffic to travel directly from I-64 to Cave Run Lake. There has been an upgrade of Kentucky Highway 801 from I-64 to U.S. 60 for realignment and improvement of roadway.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

Morehead is served by a mayor and six council members. The mayor serves a four-year term, while the council members each serve two-year terms. Rowan County is served by a county judge/executive and four magistrates. Each county official serves a four-year term.

Local Fees and Licenses

Morehead levies an occupational license fee of one percent of all salaries, wages, commissions, and other compensation earned within the city, and one percent of the net profits of businesses for activity conducted in the city during the preceding year.

Rowan County levies an occupational license fee of one percent of all salaries, wages, and net profits of businesses earned within the county. This fee does not apply to wages and net profits earned within the Morehead city limits.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Morehead State University

Morehead State University became a state institution of higher education in 1922 and received University status in 1966. The University offers nearly 120 separate academic programs on the associate, baccalaureate and graduate levels. The University's academic structure consists of four colleges encompassing 21 departments. In addition to its main campus offerings, the University offers classes at regional sites including its three extended campus centers located in West Liberty, Prestonsburg and Ashland. The campus consists of 500 acres within the city limits of Morehead and a 320-acre agricultural complex north of the city. Morehead State University was one of the first colleges in Kentucky to offer courses in robotics engineering technology.

Morehead State University's Continuing Education Office acts as an outreach liaison between the region's community needs, interests and concerns and the University's resources. Cultural preservation, training, and economic and community development issues are addressed by this office.

Economic development services also are provided through the East Kentucky Small Business Development Center, housed within the College of Business, with satellite centers in Morehead, Ashland and Pikeville. These Small Business Development Centers provide training and guidance to small businesses and enterpreneurs in 25 counties.

The Office of Wood Technology, located on the Morehead State University campus, works with expansion and problem solving within the wood industry of eastern Kentucky. Activities are directed at maintaining productivity within the primary wood industry and providing information to encourage additional secondary wood processing. Direct assistance and consultant expertise is available through the program. Assistance is also provided to individuals involved with economic development which have an interest in wood industry development. The program locates technical assistance, resource and marketing information and works with coordination and development of training programs designed to stabilize the productivity and to promote development of additional wood processing within eastern Kentucky.

VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL TRAINING

Kentucky Tech schools are operated by the Cabinet for Workforce Development and provide secondary (Sec) and postsecondary (P/S) vocational-technical training.

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its Training and Development Coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses wanting to establish a customized training program should simply contact a Training and Development Coordinator located at the Rowan State Vocational-Technical School.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers to business, education, and government agencies customized assessment in career inventories, interest inventories, psychomotor skills and academic potential, as well as pre-hire assessment. A Career Connections Assessment Center is located at the Rowan State Vocational-Technical School.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new skills, improve basic skills or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In Rowan County, adult literacy is provided through the Morehead State University/Rowan County Volunteer Literacy Project and adult basic education is provided by Morehead State University and the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is a major source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

Morehead's wide variety of recreational facilities provide year-round activity. Outdoor facilities include three ball fields (lighted), two playgrounds, an olympic-size swimming pool, an outdoor multi-purpose court, two lighted tennis courts, and a sheltered picnic area at the municipal park. The Carl D. Perkins Community Center provides meeting rooms, a kitchen, and an arts and crafts area. Organized activities are sponsored by the Morehead Recreation Department and various civic organizations.

The Morehead-Rowan County Community Park features a baseball field, two softball fields (all lighted), four tennis courts, a multi-purpose field, restroom facilities, three soccer fields and concessions.

Morehead State University provides the community with many recreational facilities and activities. The public is permitted to use such university facilities as the indoor swimming pool, the golf course, and 24 lighted tennis courts. The University also provides an exhibition center on a university owned farm for horse and cattle shows. All Morehead State University athletic events are also open to the public.

A wealth of cultural activities can be found in Morehead. For example, the Morehead-Rowan County Arts Council schedules many cultural programs utilizing Morehead State University facilities for these events.

Rowan County is located within the Daniel Boone National Forest, which covers 640,000 acres of timberland in Eastern Kentucky. It encompasses much of Kentucky's great beauty and provides a vacation paradise. There are scenic hiking trails, rivers and streams stocked with a variety of fish, hunting preserves, camping sites, and numerous other natural and historical attractions.

Cave Run Lake, spanning 8,300 acres, is located 10 miles southwest of Morehead within the Daniel Boone National Forest. The lake, drawing visitors from several states, promotes a large tourism industry. Cave Run, with two large federal campgrounds, offers everything for the camper, the boatsman, the hunter, the fisherman, and "the lover of leisure".

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Morehead re-certified as a "Kentucky Certified City" in 1992, and is distinguished as a gold award winner recognizing six consecutive years of certification. Re-certification is based on achievement in the following areas: existing industry assistance, small business assistance, educational resources, and community development factors of health care, public safety, arts and culture, recreation, governmental awareness and resources. The Certified Cities Program is sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

Recent

The Morehead/Rowan County Economic Development Council, Inc. recently purchased a 55.5-acre tract of land one and a half miles from Interstate 64. The industrial site has infrastructure in place. In addition, the council also has 75 acres of land currently under construction on Kentucky Highway 801 near the new interchange of Interstate 64.

The Clack Mountain project involving the realignment of Kentucky Route 519 which connects Morehead and West Liberty is completed.

Harold White Lumber, Inc. recently purchased an additional bank resaw machine which improves the yield and grade lumber recovery. Also a 50,000 square-foot facility was constructed that houses the moulding operation which produces hardwood moulding, flooring and trim.

Fannin Industries has installed sawdust fired kilns with 100,000 board-feet of capacity and an air drying yard and grading station to compliment an existing sawmill operation.

Richard White Wood Products, Inc. installed a lumber steamer in the summer of 1993 to increase the value of walnut lumber leaving the yard by providing an even color.

Kentucky Lumber & Dry Kiln installed a small sawmill in the spring of 1993 to produce lumber for the existing kiln drying operation.

Acorn Industries, Inc. has expanded facilities to include pallet remanufacturing to utilize old pallets by repairing and using parts to decrease the waste into local landfills.

Under Way

There are several major highway projects under construction in Rowan County. Phase I of the Morehead bypass project is completed. Phase II will start the summer of 1993, followed by Phase III sometime afterward. The interchange from I-64 and Kentucky Highway 801 now under construction is scheduled for completion the summer of 1993. This interchange will now allow traffic to travel directly from I-64 to Cave Run Lake. There has been an upgrade of Kentucky Highway 801 from I-64 to U.S. 60 for realignment and improvement of roadway. A county-wide Sewer Board has recently been formed. It plans to extend sewerage service to subdivisions in the county currently without service. Construction is scheduled to start the fall of 1993.

Planned

The City of Morehead plans to construct two new city streets. One street will extend from the City Park to University Boulevard. The other new street will connect Kentucky Highway 32 with St. Claire Medical Center. The city will also widen Second Street from Kentucky Highway 32 to University Boulevard.
