



TODD COUNTY



TODD COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Todd County is situated in southwestern Kentucky's Mississippian Plateaus Region. Todd County is bordered on the south by the Tennessee state line and has a land area of 376 square miles. The county had a 1994 estimated population of 11,278 persons.

Elkton, the county seat and a gold award winning Certified City, is located in central Todd County, 60 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee; 161 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 246 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri. Elkton had a 1994 estimated population of 1,803 persons.

Guthrie is located on the Tennessee state line in southern Todd County, 13 miles south of Elkton, and had a 1994 estimated population of 1,577 persons.

Trenton, located in southwestern Todd County, had a 1994 estimated population of 366 persons.


The Economic Framework - The total number of Todd County residents employed in 1995 averaged 5,265. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,453 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 600 jobs; 185 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 513 employees; and contract construction firms provided 64 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 10,770 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1997 through 2001, 9,905 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - "AAA"-rated trucking highways serving Todd County include U.S. Highway 41, which serves Trenton and Guthrie; U.S. Highway 68/Kentucky Highway 80, which serves Elkton; and U.S. Highway 79, which serves Guthrie. In addition, two interchanges of Interstate 24 are located within eight miles of Todd County. Twenty-four trucking companies provide interstate and/or intrastate service to Todd County. Todd County receives main line rail service from CSX Transportation and short line rail service from R.J. Corman Railroad Company-Memphis Line. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Nashville International Airport, 66 miles southeast of Elkton, near Nashville, Tennessee. Standard Field at Elkton maintains a 3,500-foot turf runway.

Power and Fuel - Electricity is supplied to Todd County by Pennyrile Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. Natural gas service is provided to Elkton by Western Kentucky Gas Company and to Bardcor Corporation in Guthrie by the City of Clarksville, Tennessee. Natural gas service is currently not available in Trenton and most of Guthrie.

Education - The Todd County School System provides primary and secondary public education to Todd County residents, and is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. One nonpublic school serves the county. Thirteen institutions of higher learning are located within 60 miles of Elkton. Vocational training is available at the Bowling Green Regional Technology Center and the Kentucky Advanced Technology Center in Bowling Green, 45 miles east of Elkton; at the Madisonville Regional Technology Center, 52 miles northwest of Elkton; at the Russellville Area Technology Center, 16 miles east of Elkton; and at the Christian County Area Technology Center in Hopkinsville, 20 miles west of Elkton.



LABOR MARKET STATISTICS

The Todd County Labor Market Area includes Todd County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Christian, Logan, and Muhlenberg. The southern boundary of Todd County is formed by the Tennessee state line. The Labor Market Area is supplemented by the Tennessee counties of Montgomery and Robertson.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1995







AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES



TRANSPORTATION

Highways

"AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways serving Todd County include U.S. Highways 41, 79, 68 (also designated as Kentucky Route 80), and Kentucky Route 181. U.S. Highway 41 extends through southwestern Todd County and serves the cities of Guthrie and Trenton. U.S. Highway 68 extends east to west through central Todd County and serves Elkton. A bypass which connects U.S. 68 with Pond River Road was recently constructed in Elkton. U.S. Highway 79 passes through southeastern Todd County and intersects with U.S. Highway 41, near Guthrie and the Kentucky-Tennessee state line. Kentucky Route 181 connects Elkton with Guthrie, 13 miles south of Elkton.

Two interchanges of Interstate 24 are located within eight miles of Todd County. Access is via U.S. Highway 79 at a point six miles southwest of Guthrie, and via Kentucky Route 104 at a point eight miles southwest of Trenton. Other nearby multilane highways include the Pennyrile Parkway, 19 miles west of Elkton; the William H. Natcher Parkway, 41 miles east of Elkton; and Interstate 65, also 41 miles east of Elkton.

The widening of U.S. 68/Kentucky 80 to four lanes from Bowling Green to Cadiz is to be completed by late 1997. This will effectively improve connections from Todd County to Interstates 65 and 24; the Pennyrile Parkway; the Western Kentucky Parkway; and the William H. Natcher Parkway. The new road/bypass will be located within one-half mile of the Industrial Park.



Local Fees and Licenses

Elkton - The City of Elkton levies a business license tax of one-tenth of one percent of gross receipts of businesses (\$50 minimum and \$2,500 maximum tax), and an occupational license tax of 1.5 percent of gross wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals.

Guthrie - The City of Guthrie levies an annual business privilege tax of one -fourth of 1.0 percent based on the number of employees and ranges from \$50 to \$2,500. An occupational license tax of 1.0 percent is levied on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals.

Trenton - The City of Trenton does not levy any business license fees.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. Accounts receivable are taxed at 85% of face value.

The Todd County School System provides two programs to encourage development in academic excellence: Citizens for Academic Excellence and the Honors and Advanced Placement Program. The Citizens for Academic Excellence Program provides funding for technology-oriented programs, while the Honors and Advanced Placement Program affords challenging opportunities for the emerging students.

All schools in the Todd County School System will be connected via the Internet to the World Wide Web by Fall 1996.

The renovated Todd County Middle School offers a very well-planned new area which locates a new cafeteria and a new gym on either side of the stage, making the area extremely flexible for school functions.

Todd County Central High School operates a student based video production business for media class students. In addition to learning to run a small business, the business provides a much needed service to the community, and income received goes back into the school media and drama programs.

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its Training and Development Coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low-cost customized training programs and services for both established and prospective businesses. Businesses needing customized training should contact a Training and Development Coordinator located at the Madisonville Regional Technology Center.

Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers to business, education, and government agencies customized assessment in career inventories, interest inventories, pre-hire assessment, psychomotor skills, and academic potential. A Career Connections mobile unit is available to potential Kentucky Tech students, business and industry and other agencies within and around Elkton.

Adult Education Services

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new skills, improve basic skills, or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In Todd County, adult literacy is provided through the Todd County Board of Education and adult basic education is available through the Todd County Literacy Council.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is a major source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

Public recreational facilities in Elkton include a 15-acre municipal park and playground with three lighted ball diamonds, four tennis courts (two are lighted), a picnic area, and pavilion. A playground is located at the elementary school; a baseball diamond, a football field, and a girl's softball field are located at the high school; and a basketball court is available at a local church.

Recreational facilities in Guthrie include Kent Greenfield Park with a lighted Little League baseball field and a concession stand, as well as a local playground. The Guthrie Senior Citizens Center hosts weekly social functions.

Recreational facilities and playgrounds are available in Trenton.

Private recreational facilities in Todd County include a country club with a nine-hole golf course, a swimming pool, and two tennis courts.

The Milliken House is available for many social events. Facilities include a theatre which seats 280 people, a ballroom, meeting rooms, and a kitchen.

Jefferson Davis Monument State Historic Site is located nine miles west of Elkton at Fairview. The park is at the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, a former U.S. Senator, Secretary of War, and the only president of the Confederate States of America. The park contains a 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top for viewing, a museum, a gift shop, and a playground with picnic tables.

The Robert Penn Warren Birthplace Museum is located in Guthrie, 13 miles south of Elkton. Robert Penn Warren was recognized as the nation's first poet laureate and was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for fiction and twice for poetry. A complete collection of his works are on display at the museum.

A railroad museum, housed in a restored caboose, is available in Guthrie. The museum contains displays which depict the early significance of rail in Guthrie and is open for touring upon request.
