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
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
GENERAL HIGHWAY MAP

MAYFIELD, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Mayfield, the county seat of Graves County, is the geographic center of the eight-county Jackson Purchase Region in the western tip of Kentucky. Mayfield is located 27 miles south of Paducah, Kentucky; 135 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee; 194 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri; and 229 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky. The 1980 population of Mayfield was 10,705.

Graves County is a 557-square-mile, rectangular-shaped territory bordered on the south by Tennessee. The 1980 population of Graves County was 34,049.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Graves County residents employed in 1981 averaged 13,020 with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 12,250 workers. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 2,810 workers; wholesale and retail trade 2,120; state and local government 1,130; and employees in the service industries 1,150. Manufacturing employment is greatest in the rubber and plastic products, apparel and related products, and nonelectrical machinery industries.

Per capita personal income in Graves County in 1980 was \$7,246, an increase of 36 percent since 1976.

Mayfield is the hub of a labor market area which include Graves County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Calloway, Carlisle, Hickman, McCracken and Marshall plus Henry and Weakley counties in Tennessee. The total number of residents in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area employed in 1981 averaged 66,570 with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 64,070 workers. Manufacturing employers in this area reported 12,500 workers; wholesale and retail trade 12,900; state and local government 8,100; and employees in the service industries 7,945.

Resources for Growth

1. Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 13,470 men and 10,950 women available for industiral jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1983 through 1987, 8,350 young men and 7,870 young women will become 18 years of age and potentially available for work.

- 2. Transportation Local transportation capability is excellent. The Illinois Central Gulf Railroad provides Mayfield with main line service. Mayfield is directly served by the Purchase Parkway, a multi-lane toll road, which connects with Interstate 24 just 28 miles northeast of the city. Fourteen common carriers have the authority to serve Mayfield. Scheduled commercial airline service is available in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, approximately 75 miles northwest, or Nashville, Tennessee, 141 miles southeast. Commuter air service is available in Paducah, 29 miles north. The Mayfield Graves County Airport has one, paved runway 3,300 feet in length. Two riverports are within 40 miles of Mayfield.
- 3. Power and Fuel Electricity, generated by the Tennessee Valley Authority, is provided by the Mayfield Electric and Water System. Natural gas service is provided by the Western Kentucky Gas Company which is supplied by the Texas Gas Transmission Corporation. Two distributors of propane and three distributors of distillate fuel oil are located in Mayfield.
- 4. Education Graves County is served by two public school systems. The Mayfield Independent School System serves over 1,800 students and is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Graves County School System serves over 3,800 students. Two nonpublic schools are located in Mayfield.

The Mid-Continent Bible College which offers a Bachelor of Arts degree in Theology is located in Mayfield. In addition, there are two universities and one community college within 35 miles of Mayfield.

The Mayfield Area Vocational Education Center offers training in seven courses. The West Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School at Paducah, 27 miles distant, offers 33 different courses.

THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Mayfield Labor Market Area includes Graves County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Calloway, Carlisle, Hickman, McCracken and Marshall. The southern boundary of Graves County is formed by the Tennessee state line. The Mayfield Labor Market Area also encompasses two of the adjoining Tennessee counties.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

Mayfield is served by the Purchase Parkway, a four-lane toll road which is the major route through the Purchase Area. The parkway connects with Interstate 24 just 28 miles northeast of Mayfield. The parkway terminates 24 miles southwest of Mayfield at South Fulton, Tennessee.

In addition, Mayfield is also served by U.S. Highway 45* and Kentucky Highways 80 and 121. All three of these routes are "AAA" rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways, with the exception of Kentucky 80 west of Mayfield which is a "AA" rated (62,000-pound gross load limit).

Paducah's location at the confluence of the Ohio and Tennessee Rivers and just 45 miles north of where the Ohio flows into the Mississippi River provides an excellent site for the port facility.

The Hickman-Fulton County Riverport, located 40 miles southwest of Mayfield, is a general cargo facility located within the Hickman Harbor on the Mississippi River.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.224 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

RECREATION

Local

Public recreation facilities include four parks, one mini-park, nature trails, five playgrounds, ten tennis courts, seven baseball diamonds, an adult softball field, football stadium, fairgrounds, and a public swimming complex. The Mayfield-Graves County Park Board provides a year-round supervised recreation program.

Private recreation facilities include two country clubs with 18-hole golf courses and swimming pools, a movie theater, a drive-in theater, a bowling facility, a skating rink, and a swim and racquet club.

Area (Within 50 miles)

Mayfield is located in the center of a region of lakes, rivers, and streams. Several of Kentucky's outstanding state parks are located within a short driving distance and offer a wide variety of recreational activities.

Mayfield is located near two of the largest inland lakes in America, Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley, which include over 3,300 miles of shoreline.

Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area is a 170,000-acre woodland formed into a peninsula by Lake Barkley and Kentucky Lake and developed into a major area for outdoor recreation, conservation and environmental learning. There are more than a thousand sites for family and organized group camping. A 5,000-acre Conservation Education Center has quarters for school study groups plus an educational farm and a Center Station with films and displays. Among the many other activities provided by Land Between the Lakes are fishing, boating, swimming, hunting, and hiking.

Charm and serenity exemplify Kenlake State Resort Park which is located on the 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake, 30 miles east of Mayfield. The park offers hotel and cottage accommodations and an efficient camping site. Other facilities include a 9-hole golf course, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, boating, picnicking, playgrounds, shuffleboard, planned recreation, and one of the finest tennis complexes in the area.

Kentucky Dam Village State Resort, located approximately 32 miles northeast of Mayfield at Gilbertsville, is one of the largest and most popular vacation resorts in Kentucky. A modern lodge with 72 rooms, six different cottage types, and a 225-site campground make up the accommodations. There is also a dining room overlooking the 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake, a coffee shop, a snack bar, two gift shops, a meeting room, an activities center, and a recreation room. Recreational activities to choose from include boating and fishing at the largest docking facility in the Kentucky parks system, golf at the 18-hole Village Green Course, hiking, horseback riding, picnicking, swimming at the lodge pool or off the sand beach, and tennis.

A Confederate cannon, a network of earthen trenches, and a massive chain and anchor give the feeling of being transported back to the Civil War. All of this and more can be discovered at Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park at Columbus, 31 miles west of Mayfield. Other attractions at the 156-acre park include a 38-site campground, a gift shop, a historical hiking trail, miniature golf, a picnic area, and a playground. A visit to the museum at the park, which is in a building that served as a Civil War infirmary, offers a display of Civil War relics and early Indian artifacts and an audiovisual slide program on the Battle of Belmont.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, 43 miles east of Mayfield near Cadiz, is located on the scenic Little River embayment of the 58,000-acre Lake Barkley. The magnificent lodge includes 120 rooms, four suites, nine cottages, a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, two meeting rooms, and a recreation room. An activities center with a capacity for 400 and a 80-site campground are located near the lodge. A lodge pool, a beach and a bathhouse, an 18-hole golf course, tennis courts, a riding stable, a trapshooting range, a basketball court, hiking trails, playgrounds, and a picnic area comprise the recreational facilities. The marina near the lodge has everything for the "boat lover": covered and open slips, launching ramp, and rentals for fishing boats, skiing boats, and pleasure ride pontoons.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent:

The Graves County School System opened a new elementary school at Farmington for the 1982-83 school year. The facility is designed for 300 students and was constructed at a cost of \$1.03 million.

The county school system also added a \$600,000, 14-room annex to the Wingo Elementary School in 1981.

The study phase of a 201 Facilities Plan of the city's waste water system has been completed.

Under Way:

Construction is currently under way on U.S. 45 north of Mayfield. An approximately 16-mile section of the highway is being expanded to four lanes. The \$22 million project is scheduled for completion in July 1983.


The county school system is constructing a new elementary school at Cuba which is designed to accommodate 300 students. The school is scheduled to open in 1983 at a cost of \$1.46 million.

Planned:

Tentative plans have been made to extend the runway at the Mayfield-Graves County Airport to 4,600 feet.

The city school system has tentative plans to renovate the Mayfield Middle School and East College Elementary.

A new central high school which will serve approximately 1,200 students is planned for a 39-acre site owned by the county school system.
