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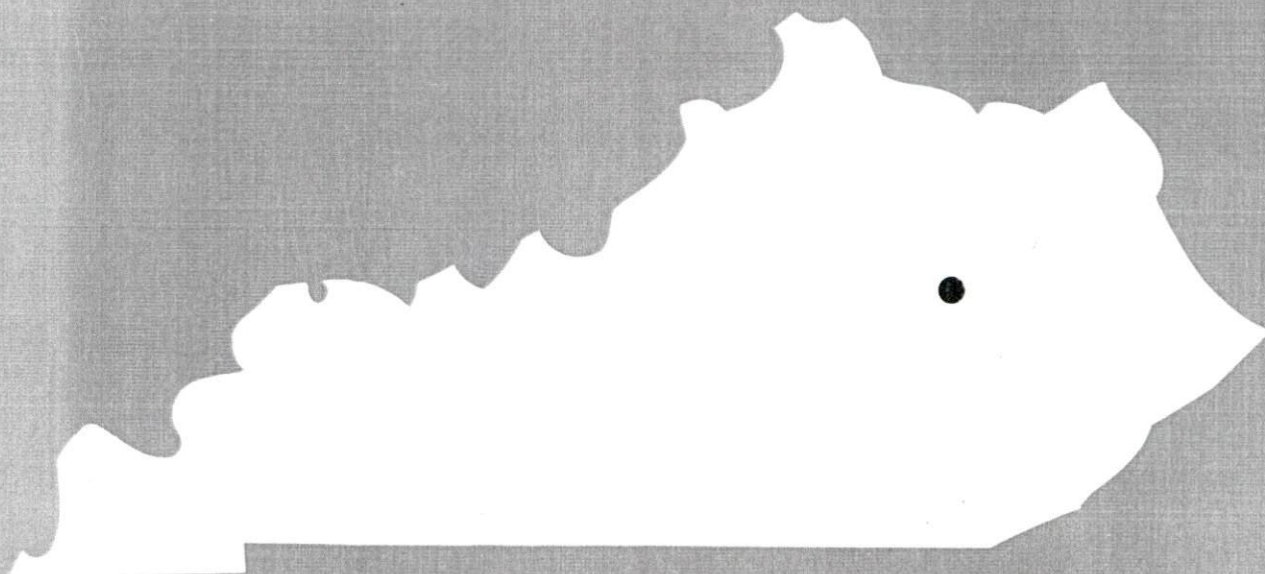
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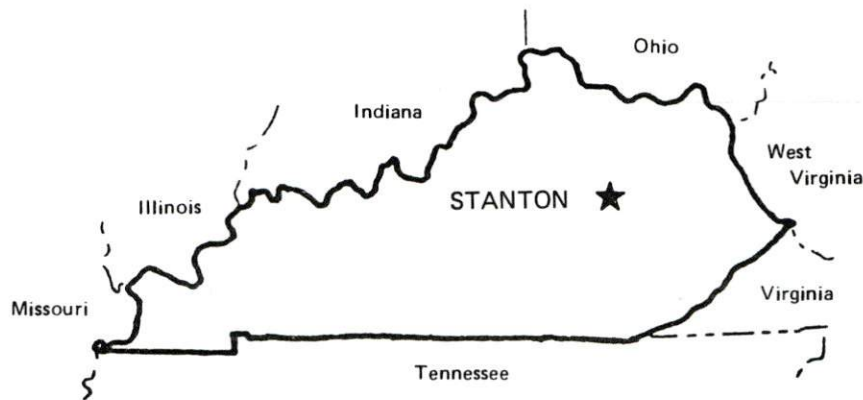

LABOR ORGANIZATIONS:

There are no labor organizations representing manufacturing workers in Stanton or Clay City at the present time.

TRANSPORTATION:

Rail: Stanton and Clay City are not served directly by rail. However, main line rail service is provided by the Seaboard System Railroad at Irvine, 14 miles south of Clay City, and by the Chessie System at Mt. Sterling, 15 miles north of Clay City. Services include daily freight stops, through freights, switching services, team track space and siding space. Piggyback facilities are located in Louisville, Kentucky, and Cincinnati, Ohio, both within 120 miles of Clay City.

Highways: The Mountain Parkway, a multilane toll road, passes through Powell County with interchanges located at both Stanton and Clay City. In addition, Stanton is served by Kentucky Highways 11, 15, and 213, while Clay City is served by Kentucky Highways 11, 15, and 82.

Truck: A.N.R. Freight System, Hazard Express, Inc., and Overnite Transportation Company provide interstate and intrastate motor carrier service to Stanton and Clay City.

Water: The nearest navigable waterway is a point on the Kentucky River at Frankfort, 69 miles northwest of Stanton, where a 6-foot navigation channel is maintained.

Air: Stanton Airport, a small aircraft airport located in Stanton, has one paved 3,000-foot runway. The nearest scheduled airline service is available at Blue Grass Field near Lexington, 51 miles northwest of Stanton. Services at Blue Grass Field include Delta, Frontier, Piedmont, USAir, Allegheny Commuter, Comair, and Tennessee Airways.

UTILITIES:

Electricity: The Clark RECC provides electricity to Stanton, Clay City, and most of Powell County. The source of power is the East Kentucky Power Cooperative.

Natural Gas: Delta Natural Gas Company serves Stanton and Clay City. The source of supply is Columbia Gulf Transmission Corporation.

Other Fuels: There are seven propane distributors and ten distributors of fuel oil located within a 25-mile radius of Stanton.

WATER AND SEWERAGE:

Water: The Stanton Water Works and Sewer System serves Stanton. The capacity of the water treatment plant is 720,000 gallons per day. Average daily consumption is 400,000 gallons and peak daily consumption is about 525,000 gallons. Total storage capacity has been increased to 1,000,000 gallons. Clay City Water Works serves Clay City and the capacity of the water treatment plant is 250,000 gallons per day. Average daily consumption is 200,000 gallons and peak daily consumption is 210,000 gallons. The storage capacity at Clay City has been increased to 300,000 gallons. The source of raw water for both cities is the Red River.

Sewerage: Stanton is served by the Stanton Water Works and Sewer System. The design capacity of the sewage treatment plant is 345,000 gallons per day and average daily flow is 275,000 gallons. Treatment is secondary. Clay City sewerage system has a design capacity of 200,000 gallons per day and average daily flow is 60,000 gallons. The treatment is primary.

GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE:

City: Stanton and Clay City are each served by a mayor elected to a four-year term and six council members elected to two-year terms.

County: Powell County is served by a county judge/executive and five magistrates elected to four-year terms.

EDUCATION: One public school system operates in Powell County. Total enrollment in the county school system is 2,368 including 633 high school, 623 middle school and 1,112 elementary school students. The nearest state vocational school is Central Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School in Lexington, 46 miles from Stanton. Area vocational education centers are located in Mt. Sterling and Winchester, both within 25 miles of Stanton and Clay City.

COMMUNICATIONS:

Telephone: South Central Bell Telephone Company serves Stanton and Clay City.

Telegraph: There is a Western Union toll-free number (800-325-5100) available for sending mailgrams, telegrams and international messages.

Newspaper: The Clay City Times is a weekly publication serving Powell County. The circulation is 3,200.

Radio Station: WBFC-AM and WSKV-FM radio stations broadcast from Stanton.

Television: Cable service is available in both Stanton and Clay City. Stations are received from Lexington and Louisville, Kentucky; Cincinnati, Ohio; Chicago, Illinois; and Atlanta, Georgia.

OTHER LOCAL FACILITIES:

Hospitals: The Mary Chiles Hospital at Mt. Sterling, 20 miles from Stanton, has 64 acute care beds and 30 skilled care beds. The Clark County Hospital at Winchester, 25 miles from Stanton, also serves the area and provides 81 acute care beds, with plans to add 19 additional beds in 1984.

Churches: Denominations represented in the Stanton and Clay City area include Assembly of God, Baptist, Christian, Church of Christ, Church of God, Presbyterian, and United Methodist.

Financial Institutions: The Powell County Bank at Stanton, the Clay City branch of the Powell County Bank, and the Pioneer Federal Savings and Loan Association provide financial services to the area.

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
