





## OWENSBORO, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Owensboro, county seat of Daviess County, is Kentucky's third largest city with a 1980 population of 54,450. Situated on the south bank of the Ohio River in northwestern Kentucky, Owensboro is 37 miles southeast of Evansville, Indiana; 106 miles west of Louisville, Kentucky; 130 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee; and within 230 miles of Cincinnati, Ohio, and St. Louis, Missouri.

#### The Economic Framework

Total employment in Daviess County averaged 39,045 in 1980 with 37,744 employed in nonagricultural jobs. There were 6,895 jobs in manufacturing, 7,062 in wholesale and retail trade, 4,328 in government and 4,424 in service occupations. Manufacturing in Daviess County is highly diversified and provides approximately 18 percent of the total employment. Manufacturing employment is greatest in the electrical machinery, food and kindred products, and primary metals industries.

Per capita income in the county in 1979 was \$8,412, or \$1,360 above the Kentucky average. Between 1975 and 1979, per capita income increased by 55 percent.

Owensboro is the hub of a labor market area which includes the Kentucky counties of Daviess, Hancock, Henderson, McLean, and Ohio, plus Spencer and Warrick counties in Indiana. Total employment in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area averaged 76,431 in 1980 with 73,325 employed in nonagricultural jobs. There were 15,645 jobs in manufacturing, 11,563 in wholesale and retail trade, 7,434 in government and 7,409 in service occupations.

#### Resources for Growth

- 1. There is a current estimated labor supply of 5,274 men and 5,428 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, 7,421 young men and 7,142 young women will become 18 years of age before 1986 and potentially available for work.
- 2. Local transportation capability is excellent. The Ohio River, a major artery in the Eastern United States Inland Waterways System, established Owensboro as an excellent location for riverport facilities. The Louisville and Nashville Railroad provides freight service and a variety of other services including piggyback facilities. Owensboro is directly served by the Auduben and Green River Parkways. The Western Kentucky Parkway, the Pennyrile Parkway, and interstate highways 64 and 65 all are within 70 miles. Seven of the 20 common carriers which serve Owensboro maintain terminals in the city. Commuter and air freight services are available at the Owensboro-Daviess County Airport.

- 3. Electric power is provided to the city by Owensboro Municipal Utilities. The Green River Electric Corporation and Kentucky Utilities Company supply electric power to Daviess County. Natural gas service is provided by the Western Kentucky Gas Company. There are six distributors of propane and five distributors of distillate fuel oil in Owensboro.
- 4. Education is an important growth asset for Owensboro. The Owensboro Independent School District and the Daviess County School System are both accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Over 15 nonpublic schools also provide educational opportunities for over 4,300 kindergarten through high school students.

Two vocational training facilities are located in Owensboro. The Daviess County State Vocational-Technical School offers 14 courses and the Owensboro Vocational-Technical School offers 16 courses.

There are two fully accredited, coeducational, senior colleges located in the city: Brescia College and Kentucky Wesleyan College. Both colleges confer baccalaureate degrees and have graduate level course offerings in cooperation with Western Kentucky University and Murray State University. The Owensboro Junior College of Business confers a two-year "Associate Degree in Specialized Business" diploma.

#### THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Owensboro Labor Market Area includes Daviess County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Hancock, Henderson, McLean and Ohio.



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

### Highways

Direct highway access to Owensboro is provided by two parkways. The Audubon Parkway, a multilane toll road, extends westward from Owensboro and connects with the Pennyrile Parkway, 23 miles away, at a point 3 miles south of Henderson. The Green River Parkway, also a multilane toll road, extends southward from Owensboro, connecting with the Western Kentucky Parkway 30 miles away, and with Interstate 65 in Bowling Green, 70 miles away.

U.S. highways 60, 231 and 431 and Kentucky routes 54, 56, and 81 converge at Owensboro. The city is encircled by a multilane, controlled-access bypass, the Wendell H. Ford Expressway.

An interchange of Interstate 64, providing direct access to Louisville and St. Louis, is located 36 miles north of Owensboro.

#### Water

Located on the Ohio River, a major river in the Eastern United States Inland Waterways System, Owensboro is an excellent location for riverport facilities. Navigation on the Ohio River is being improved by the construction of new and larger locks and dams under the supervision of the U.S. Corps of Engineers. This project, in part, provides for the number of lockages to be reduced from 46 to 18 and the present method of double locking large tows to be eliminated by the new 1,200-foot lock chambers. In addition, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, scheduled to be completed in the early 1980's will reduce the distance to the Gulf by nearly 400 miles. These improvements will substantially decrease transportation time and cost.

The Owensboro Riverport Authority\* was established in 1967 by the city of Owensboro for the purpose of developing riverport facilities and developing land to attract river-oriented industries. The authority officially opened a \$5.6 million public river terminal in June 1976. This facility, located on a 50-acre site at Ohio River Mile 759, has a 30,000-square-foot transfer warehouse, 9,300 square yards of paved outside storage, two 1.2 million gallon liquid storage tanks, two 600,000 gallon liquid storage tanks, 4,200 tons of inside bulk storage, 750 ton/hour coal loading facility, and two 110-ton cranes (one located on a spud barge) for the transfer of commodities. The facility has eight mooring dolphins and space for approximately 30 to 40 barges. Tug and fleeting service is available 24 hours a day. The riverport is located on a main line of the L & N Railroad and is served by a short "AAA" highway connection to the parkway and interstate systems. A 230-acre. fully-developed industrial park which includes natural gas service is located adjacent to the riverport facility.

Commercial barge lines providing regular service to Owensboro include American Commercial Barge Line Company. Federal Barge Lines, Inc., Riverway, Dravo Corporation, Walker Towing Corporation, Ohio River Company, and many others.

<sup>\*</sup>Plans are currently under way at the Owensboro Riverport Authority to expand coal loading facilities to 1,500 tons per hour. In addition, bulk storage warehousing capacity will increase by 20,000 tons and grain loading facilities also are being planned. Construction began in the late 1981 and is targeted for completion during spring 1982 at a total cost of approximately \$2.4 million.

### Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.229 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxatiion.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

### Vocational Schools

Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers are operated by the Kentucky Department of Education. The state vocational-technical schools enroll persons full time who are at least 16 years of age and not in school. These students attend classes for six hours each day. The area vocational education centers are designed to accommodate high school students who are at least 15 years of age. These students attend vocational school for three hours each day. The state vocational-technical schools and the area education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

# Clubs and Organizations

There are approximately 175 clubs and organizations in Owensboro which include most major civic, business, professional, fraternal, charitable, sports, agricultural and youth organizations.

#### RECREATION

#### Local

Owensboro has excellent public recreation facilities that are sponsored and maintained by the Owensboro Parks and Recreation Department. Public recreation facilities include 14 parks, 15 playgrounds, 3 swimming pools, a 9-hole golf course, 29 tennis courts, 13 baseball diamonds, 9 basketball courts, and 3 croquet courts. Shifley Park is a 10-acre park with a baseball diamond, football field, playground equipment, and shelter house. Similar facilities are available at the recently completed Thompson-Berry Park. Owensboro's Sportscenter has an air-conditioned, 7,000-seat auditorium-arena, and a covered ice rink. The Sportscenter is the home court of the nationally known Kentucky Wesleyan College Panthers, winner of the NCAA small college championship four times since 1966.

Private recreation facilities at Owensboro include three country clubs with golf courses, four swimming pools, seven indoor and two outdoor movie theaters, two bowling facilities, YWCA, Family-Y, and indoor and outdoor tennis courts.

The Summer Festival, an annual race for hydroplanes, is held in June and offers a number of events and activities over a two-week period. Major events include a parade, a beauty pageant, a hot-air balloon race, flatboat races, the statewide tug of war championship, sports tournaments, and stunt flying. Other entertainment includes rock concerts, square dancing, and folk festivals.

The International Barbecue Festival is held each year in Owensboro in April. This annual event will feature cooking competition, cooking exhibitions, mime and puppet shows, square dancing, clogging exhibition, fiddling, battle of the bands, a petting zoo, and a number of other festivities.

The Owensboro Symphony Orchestra, the Owensboro Youth Orchestra, the Theatre Workshop, the Owensboro Museum of Fine Arts, and the Owensboro Area Museum of Natural Science provide a wide variety of cultural events and attractions. Owensboro's Festival of Arts features art exhibits, dramatics, music events, and writing seminars. Kentucky Wesleyan College and Brescia College also offer cultural events.

Other interesting attractions of the Owensboro area are Glenmore's Little Museum which features the second largest miniature bottle collection in the United States and artifacts of the distilling industry; the world's largest sassafras tree; tours of strip mining areas and coal mines; and tours of Pinkerton Tobacco Company.

Ben Hawes State Park, 4 miles west of Owensboro, is a 300-acre park open year round. It contains a softball field, tennis courts, an archery range, hiking trails, a picnic area and shelters, and an 18-hole and a 9-hole golf course.

Three recreation areas in the Owensboro vicinity are Windy Hollow Campground and Recreation Area, Diamond Lake Recreation Area, and Miller Lakes, Inc. These areas offer facilities for camping, swimming, fishing, boating, and hiking.

## Area (Within 65 miles)

Just north of Henderson, 30 miles east of Owensboro, is the John James Audubon State Park, a 692-acre park where the famed naturalist gathered material for his paintings, "The Birds of America." Many paintings by Audubon and his sons, and 126 first-edition prints of his paintings are on display at the Audubon Memorial and Nature Museum which is the focal point of the park. Other park features include the Audubon woods, a bird sanctuary, and a 12-acre nature preserve lake. The park has cottages and camping sites. Recreational facilities include a 28-acre recreational lake, a beach, and a bathhouse, rental rowboats and pedal boats, a dock, a 9-hole golf course, hiking trails, picnic shelters, and playgrounds. Organized recreation programs are offered during the summer.

Horse racing is another attraction available in Henderson. James C. Ellis Park and Thoroughbred Race Track provide two months of racing during the summer, and Midwest Harness Raceway features harness racing in the spring and fall.

The Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial, 30 miles north of Owensboro at Lincoln City, Indiana, preserves the Lincoln farm and the burial site of Nancy Hanks Lincoln. The memorial contains reconstructed log buildings, an exhibit shelter, and a visitor center with an auditorium and museum.

Noteworthy for its spaciousness and perfect grooming, Rough River Dam State Resort Park at Falls of Rough, is 35 miles southeast of Owensboro. The 377-acre park on Rough River Lake has a 40-room lodge with a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, and a meeting room. Cottages and camping sites are also available. Recreational facilities include a launching ramp, a dock with open and covered slips, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, a 9-hole golf course, a swimming pool, a sand beach with a bathhouse complex, three tennis courts, an archery range, hiking trails, picnic and playground areas, and planned recreation. Cruise boat excursions on Rough River Lake are available on the "Lady of the Lake".

Santa Claus Land, located 35 miles northeast of Owensboro at Santa Clause, Indiana, is a 45-acre amusement park with a Christmas theme.

## Area (Within 65 miles) (Contd.)

Lake Malone State Park, located in southern Muhlenberg County, approximately 65 miles south of Owensboro, offers camping facilities, swimming, fishing and boating on a 788-acre lake. Playground facilities and picnic shelters are located in a beautiful scenic cliff area. Located across from the entrance of the park is an inn, featuring luxury rooms, a restaurant, a swimming lake, a beach, boating, fishing, tennis, and nature trails.

Embraced by probably the most beautiful wooded area in Western Kentucky, Pennyrile Forest State Resort Park at Dawson Springs is located 65 miles southwest of Owensboro. The lodge and cottages nestled within the trees provide excellent accommodations. Other facilities and activities include a dining room, a gift shop, rental rowboats and pedal boats, a 9-hole golf course, hiking trails, horseback riding, picnicking, playgrounds, shuffleboard, swimming at the lodge pool and off a sand beach, and two tennis courts. Lake Beshear, only four miles from the lodge, sports good fishing.
