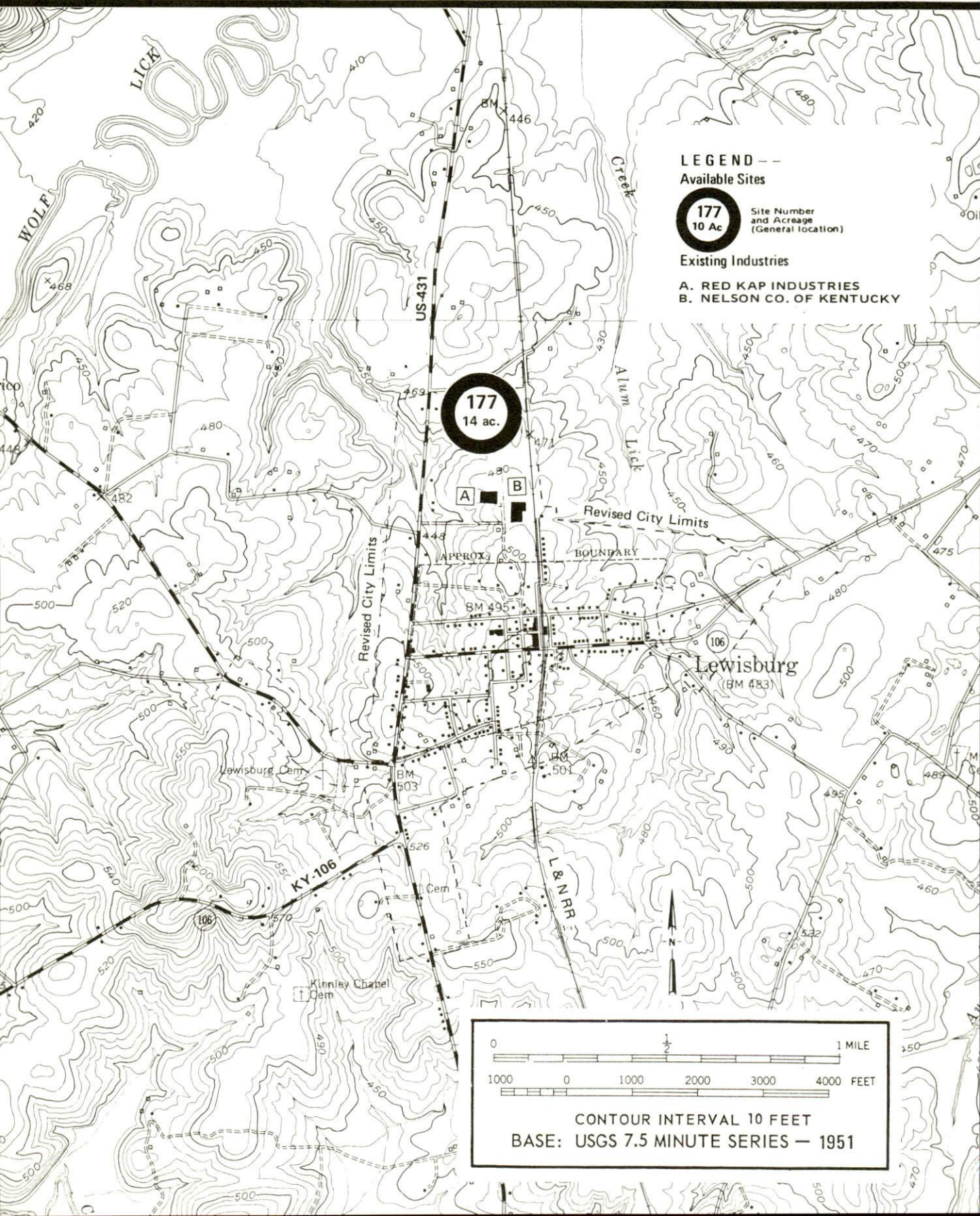


AUBURN, KENTUCKY -- Index to Industrial Sites -- 1977

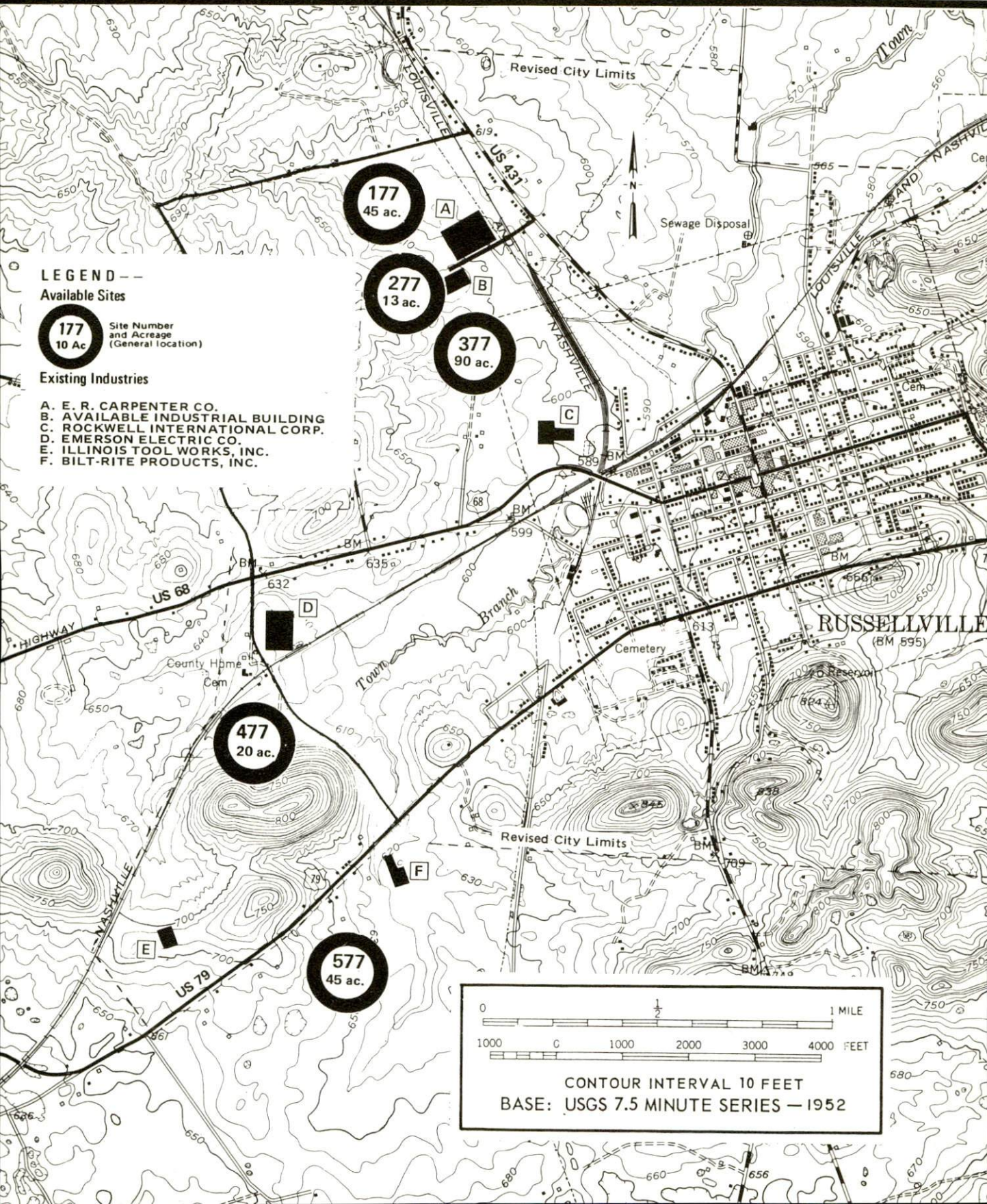

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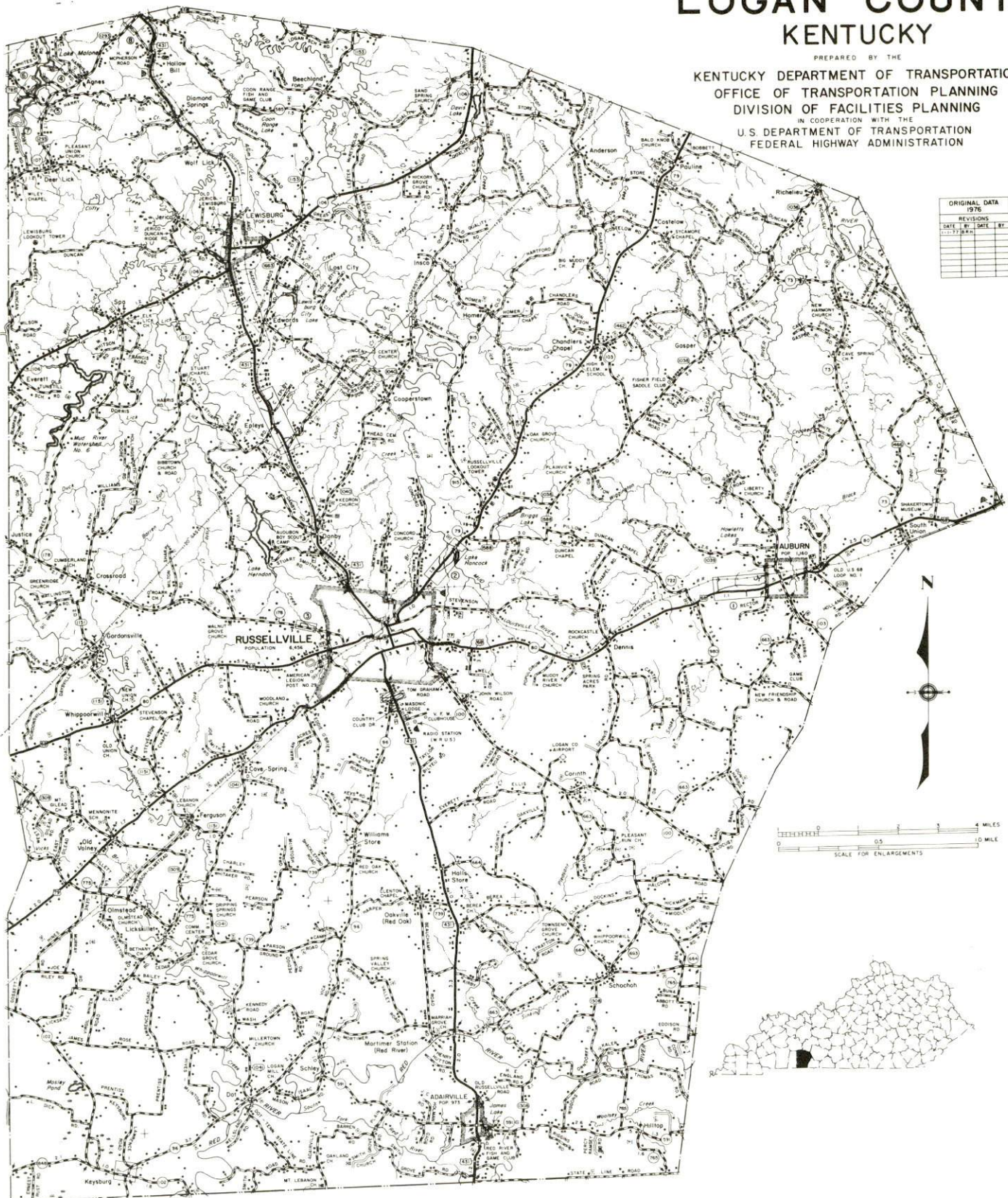

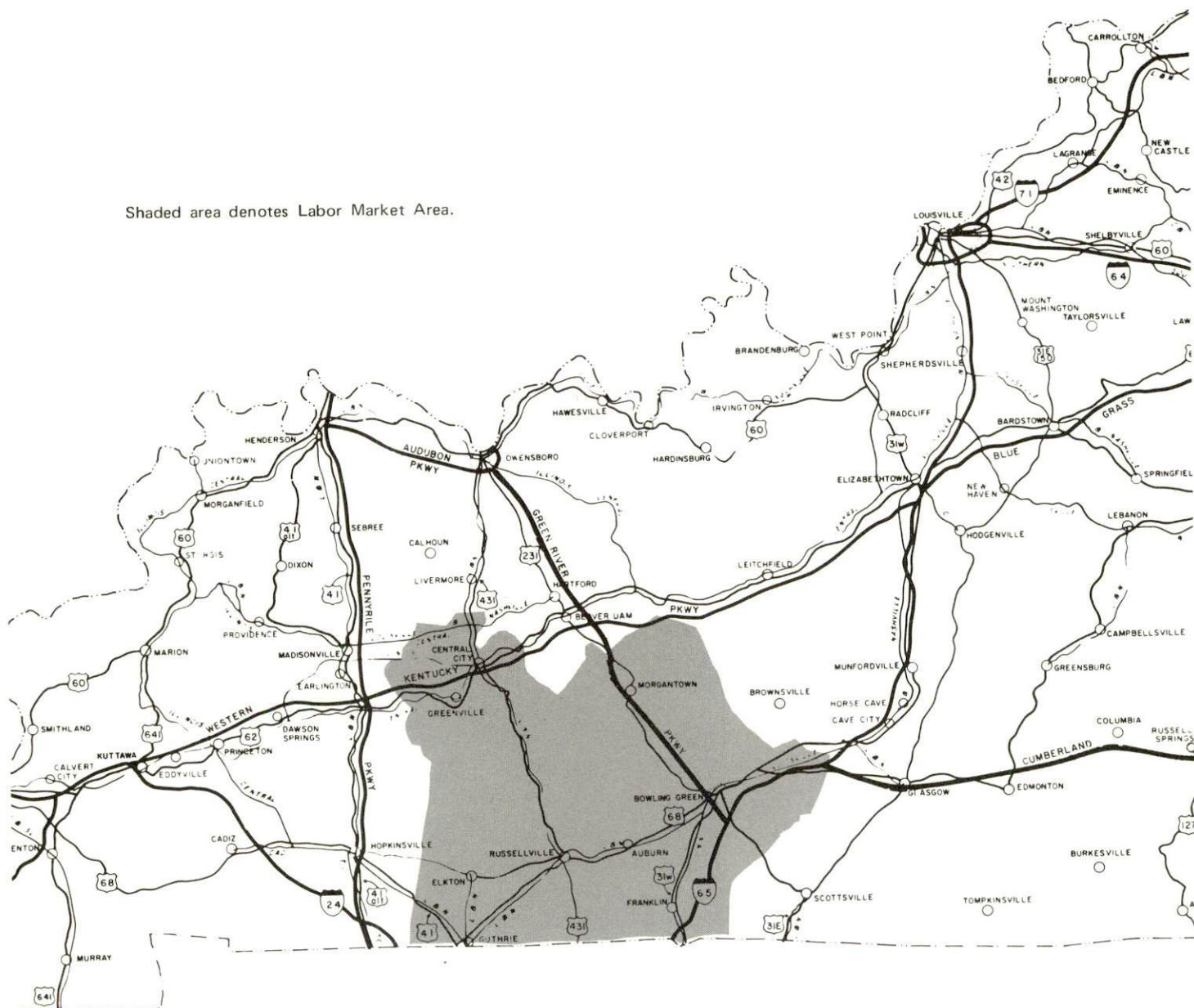

RUSSELLVILLE, ADAIRVILLE, AUBURN AND LEWISBURG, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Logan County, located in the gently rolling agricultural land of southwestern Kentucky, is in the Mississippian Plateau Region which offers many recreational advantages to the area. Russellville, centrally located within Logan County, is the county seat. Adairville, Auburn, and Lewisburg are only minutes away. Russellville is located 29 miles west of Bowling Green, Kentucky; 54 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee; 150 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 275 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri.

Logan County, consisting of 563 square miles of land area, had an estimated population of 22,100 in 1975. The 1973 estimated population of Russellville was 6,058; Adairville 983; Auburn 1,172; and Lewisburg 657.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Logan County residents employed in 1975 averaged 8,100, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 6,480 workers. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 2,600 workers; mining and quarrying 10; construction firms 160; transportation, communications, and public utilities 150; wholesale and retail trade 950; finance, insurance, and real estate 150; and employees in the service industries 320. Major industrial products are hermetic electric motors, aluminum die castings, urethane foam cushion, and men's work pants.

Total unemployment in Logan County averaged 9.7 percent of the labor force in 1975.

Per capita personal income in the county in 1974 was \$4,079, an increase of 50.8 percent since 1970.

The Russellville, Adairville, Auburn and Lewisburg labor market area includes Logan County, the five adjoining Kentucky counties, and Robertson County in Tennessee. The total number of residents in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area employed in 1975 averaged 59,700, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 53,700 workers. Manufacturing employers in the area reported 14,100 workers; mining and quarrying 3,260; construction firms 1,825; transportation, communications, and public utilities 1,565; wholesale and retail trade 9,950; finance, insurance, and real estate 1,440; and employees in the service industries 6,150.

Resources for Growth

1. Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 7,600 men and 9,050 women available for industrial jobs in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area. In addition, 6,835 young men and 6,490 young women in this area will become 18 years of age before 1983 and potentially available for work. The current labor supply would be supplemented by the number of men and women in the adjoining Tennessee county who are available for industrial jobs.

2. Transportation - The Louisville and Nashville Railroad serves Logan County with a variety of services. An interchange of Interstate 65 is located 30 miles east of Russellville. An entrance to the Western Kentucky Parkway is located 37 miles north, to the Penny-rile Parkway 35 miles west, and to the Green River Parkway 25 miles east of Russellville. An interchange of Interstate 24, which is scheduled to be completed in 1980, is located 27 miles southwest of Russellville. The Russellville-Logan County Airport has a 2,800-foot paved runway for light aircraft. A commercial airport, offering jet service and a local air freight terminal, is located in Nashville, Tennessee, 54 miles distant.

3. Utilities and Fuel - Electricity is supplied to Russellville by the Russellville Electric Plant Board and to the remainder of the county by the Penny-rile RECC and the Warren RECC. All of these utility companies receive power from the Tennessee Valley Authority. Natural gas is furnished to Russellville, Adairville and Auburn by the Western Kentucky Gas Company. Natural gas is not available in Lewis-burg. There are two propane distributors and three distillate fuel oil distributors in the Logan County area.

4. Education - Two public school systems operate within the county. There are five universities, five senior colleges and one community college located within 55 miles of Russellville. An area vocational education center, offering 13 courses, is located in Russellville; and a state vocational-technical school, offering 23 courses, is located in Bowling Green, 29 miles east of Russellville.

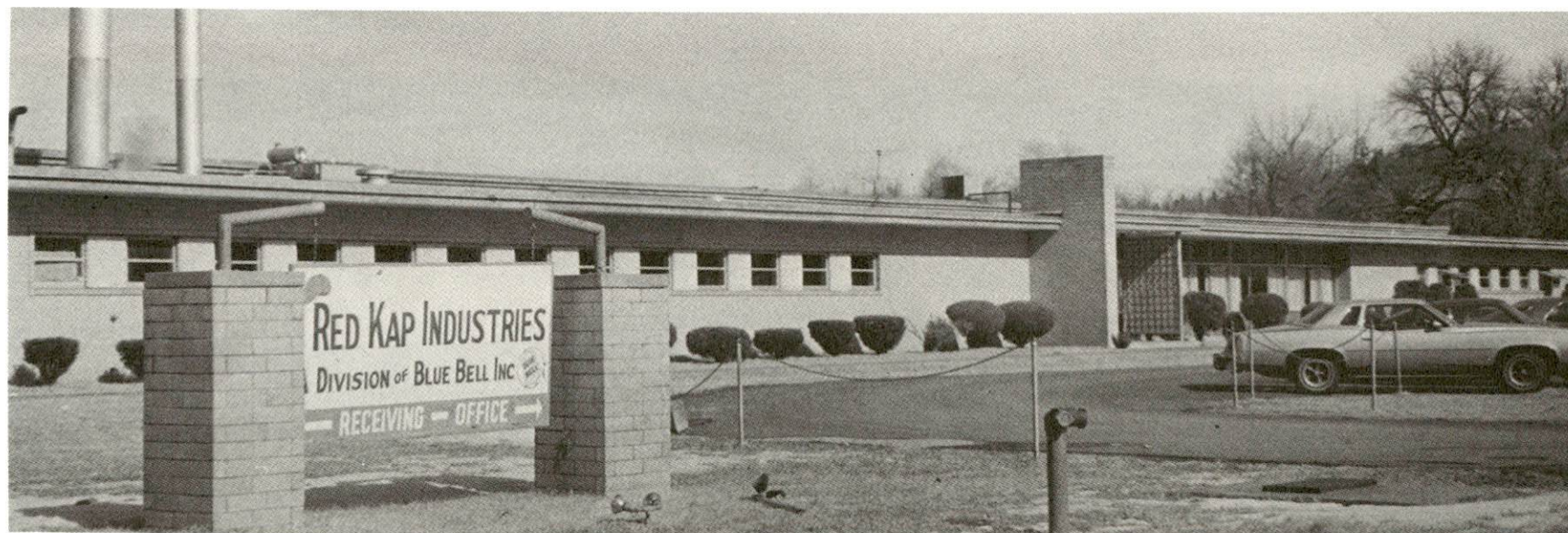

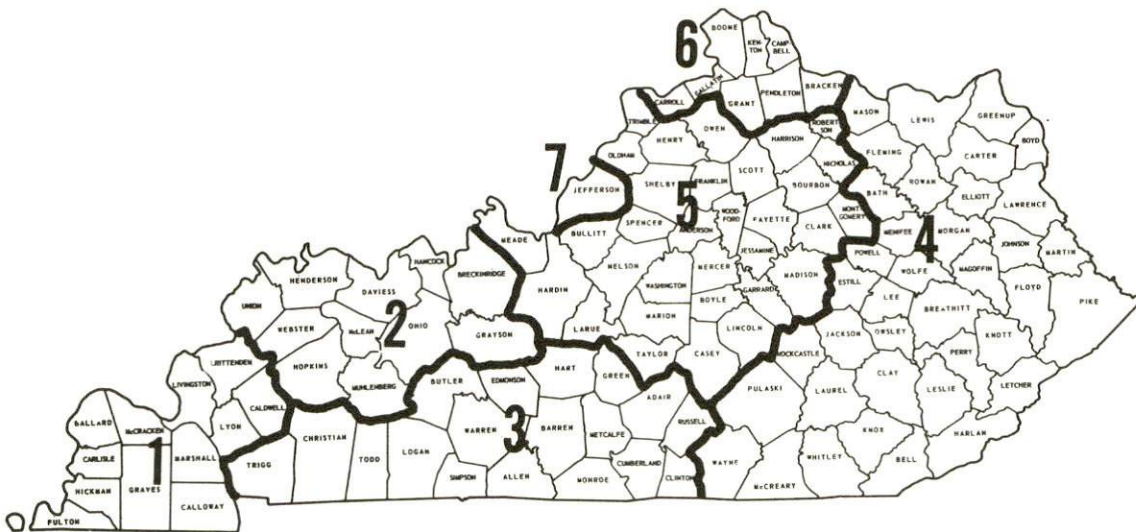

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for seven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

U. S. Highways 68, 79, and 431, all "AAA" rated highways with 80,000 pound gross load limits, serve Logan County. Interstate 65 is located 30 miles east of Russellville via U. S. 68 and the Green River Parkway. An entrance to the Western Kentucky Parkway is located 37 miles north, to the Pennyryle Parkway 35 miles west, and to the Green River Parkway 25 miles east of Russellville.

At the present time, Interstate 24, which will extend from Chattanooga to Interstate 57 in Illinois, is under construction. The section from Chattanooga to the Kentucky line, scheduled to be completed in 1977, will have an interchange 27 miles southwest of Russellville via U. S. 79. The entire project is scheduled for completion in 1980.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Beginning January 1, 1977, local school tax rates were reduced by \$0.30 per \$100 valuation and the state rate was increased by \$0.30 per \$100 (from \$0.015), resulting in no net change in the combined state and local rates.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. Beginning January 1, 1977, local school rates were reduced by \$0.30 per \$100 valuation and the state rate was raised by \$0.30 per \$100 (from \$0.15).

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Intangible personal property owned by corporations in Kentucky as a result of business transactions performed out-of-state, but having a tax situs in Kentucky (accounts receivable, notes, bonds, credits, non-domestic bank deposits, licensing or royalty agreements, shares of stock of any affiliated company, etc.) is taxed by the state at \$0.015, and is not subject to local taxation.

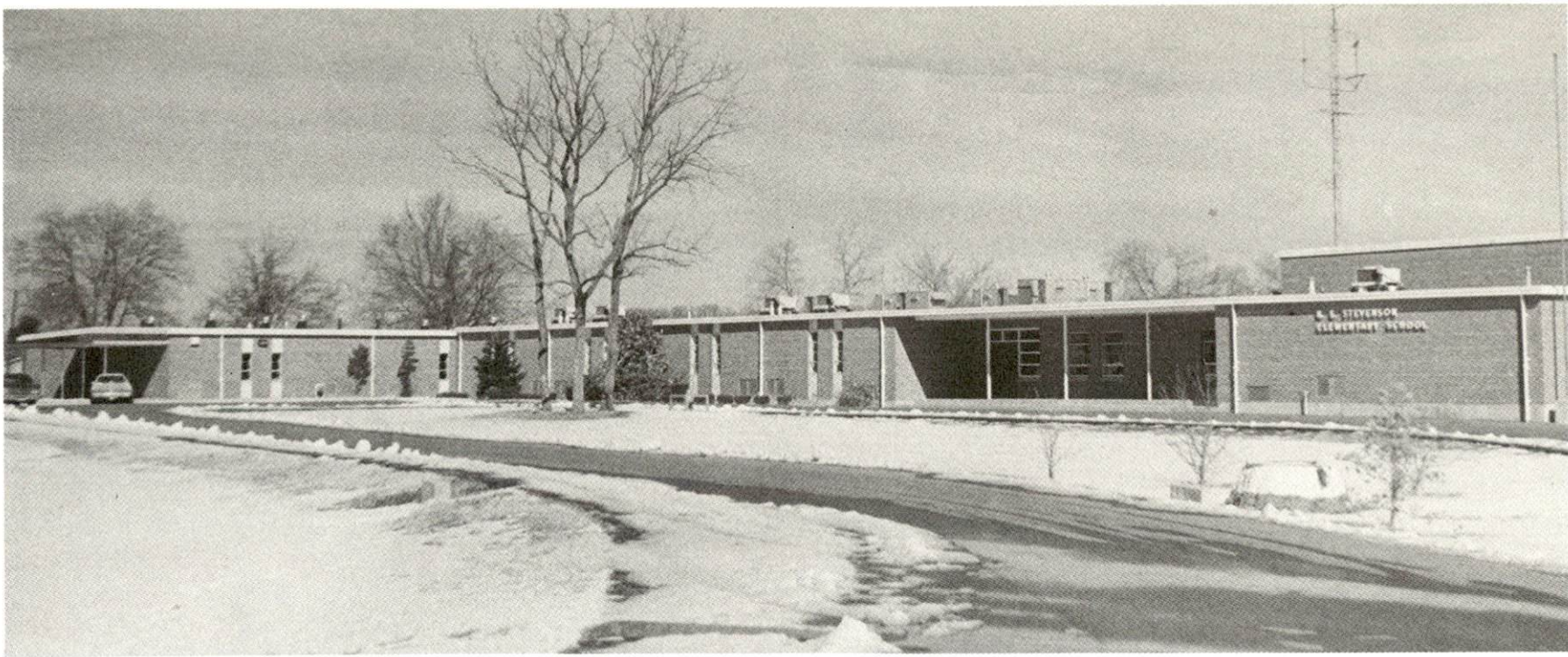

RECREATION

Local

A variety of recreational and entertainment facilities are offered in Logan County. The county features a community concert series, swimming pools, golf courses, tennis courts, country club, movie theatres and community centers. In addition, Logan County is the site of the Old Southern Bank Building, the first bank robbed by the Jesse James gang; the Shaker Museum; the first confederate capital of Kentucky; Red River Meeting House, site of the Great Revival of 1800; and Duel Site Farm, scene of the duel of Andrew Jackson and Charles Dickinson. Russellville offers year-round supervised recreation programs, while Adairville, Auburn, and Lewisburg provide supervised programs during the summer.

The 1,100-acre Audubon Council, Boy Scouts of America camp, serving 26 counties in west Kentucky, is one of the finest in mid-America. It is located about 2 miles northwest of Russellville and surrounds a 150-acre lake which it leases from the City of Russellville.

Located partly within Logan County is Lake Malone, which offers swimming, boating, fishing, picnicking, and camping. Two docks and one boat ramp are located on the lake only 7 miles north of Lewisburg. Lake Malone State Park, 10 miles away, provides horseback riding, tennis, hiking, and luxurious accommodations at the lodge.

Area (Within 55 miles)

The Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine located 25 miles west of Russellville is the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, only president of the Confederate States of America. The 351-foot obelisk shrine is the fourth highest in the U. S. An elevator to the top provides access to a view of the countryside. The 20-acre park also features a museum, playground, and picnic shelters.

At Mammoth Cave National Park is the world-famous Mammoth Cave. The cave covers 150 miles of charted caverns, situated beneath 51,000 acres of beautiful park grounds. Cave attractions include the Snowball Dining Room, Frozen Niagara, Crystal Lake and Bottomless Pit. Other park attractions include a scenic boat trip on the Green River, nature trails, amphitheater, and a visitor center exhibit room with audio-visual programs hourly.

Barren River Lake State Park, a 1,500-acre park with a 50-room lodge and 12 cottages, provides: fishing, swimming, camping, boating, horseback riding, and nature trails. Boat ramps, a marina, a 9-hole and a par-3 golf course, a gift shop and a coffee shop are also located on the park grounds.

Beech Bend Park, located in Bowling Green, 29 miles east of Russellville, features campgrounds, amusement park, zoo, car racing, and golf course.

Nashville is only 54 miles away, and the city offers a wide variety of entertainment.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Russellville

Recent:

1. Exceptional Industries of Russellville, an employer of the handicapped, opened in a renovated 4,000-square foot building.
2. Transamerica Safety Products, Inc., producers of safety ladders and mobile scaffolding, has begun operations and employs 12 people.
3. Shortenings, Inc., employing 3 people, has begun production.
4. The Logan County Courthouse has been renovated.
5. An addition to the Logan County Public Library has been completed.
6. The Logan County School System has purchased five mobile classroom units for special education classes.
7. The Russellville Independent School District has completed a 16-room addition to an elementary school, added a new roof and air-conditioning to the middle school, and remodeled the central office building.
8. Other construction projects completed include: a new National Guard Armory; a 60,000-square foot tobacco warehouse; and 8 tee hangars and 45,000 square feet of additional tie down space at the Russellville-Logan County Airport.

Underway:

1. The city has nearly completed a three-year project to improve the storm sewer system and rework the bridges.
2. A new jail, a 6-acre downtown shopping center, and a municipal building that will house the fire department are in various stages of construction.
3. A 201 Facilities Study of the municipal sewerage system is underway.

Planned:

1. The cities of Russellville and Lewisburg are studying the possibility of constructing a new water treatment facility on the new Spa Lake.

2. There are plans to extend the runway at the Russellville-Logan County Airport by 500 feet.
3. Construction of a 9-hole public golf course, a country club, and a \$200,000 health department is planned.

Adairville

Recent and Underway:

1. A \$150,000 expansion of the Odom Sausage Company will provide approximately 15 more jobs.
2. Work has begun on a new 430,000-gallon-per-day water treatment plant.
3. The city has annexed 35 acres of a residential area on the eastern limits of Adairville.
4. Thirty low-rent housing units have been completed, and twenty more units are under construction.
5. The city square is being reconstructed.
6. The first phase of a 201 Facilities Study of the municipal sewerage system is nearing completion.

Planned:

1. The South Logan Water Association is being organized to serve residents in south Logan County.
2. Sewer service is to be extended to the newly annexed area.

Auburn

Recent and Underway:

1. Expansions totaling \$140,000 at Auburn Roller Mills, Inc., and \$35,000 at Scott's Auburn Mills, Inc., have been completed.
2. The city is annexing 100 acres of a residential area.
3. The municipal building has been renovated.
4. Sewer service has been extended to 40 additional homes.
5. A pavilion has been constructed at the municipal park.

Planned:

1. The East Logan Water District will be established to serve residents of eastern Logan County. The water district will purchase treated water from the Russellville Water Works and serve as an additional water source for Auburn.
2. A 201 Facilities Study is underway.

Lewisburg

Recent and Underway:

1. Red Kap Industries has completed an expansion project that doubled the size of its facilities.
2. Sewer lines have been extended to a proposed subdivision.
3. A city park, that will have a baseball diamond, tennis court, picnic area, and shelter house, is under construction.
4. A downtown mini-park is nearing completion.
5. A new branch bank and drive-in facilities at another bank have been constructed.
6. Two new businesses have been established.

Planned:

1. Nelson Company of Kentucky plans a \$350,000 expansion that will create approximately 50 additional jobs.
2. A nursing home is planned.
3. The city plans to purchase a new police cruiser.
