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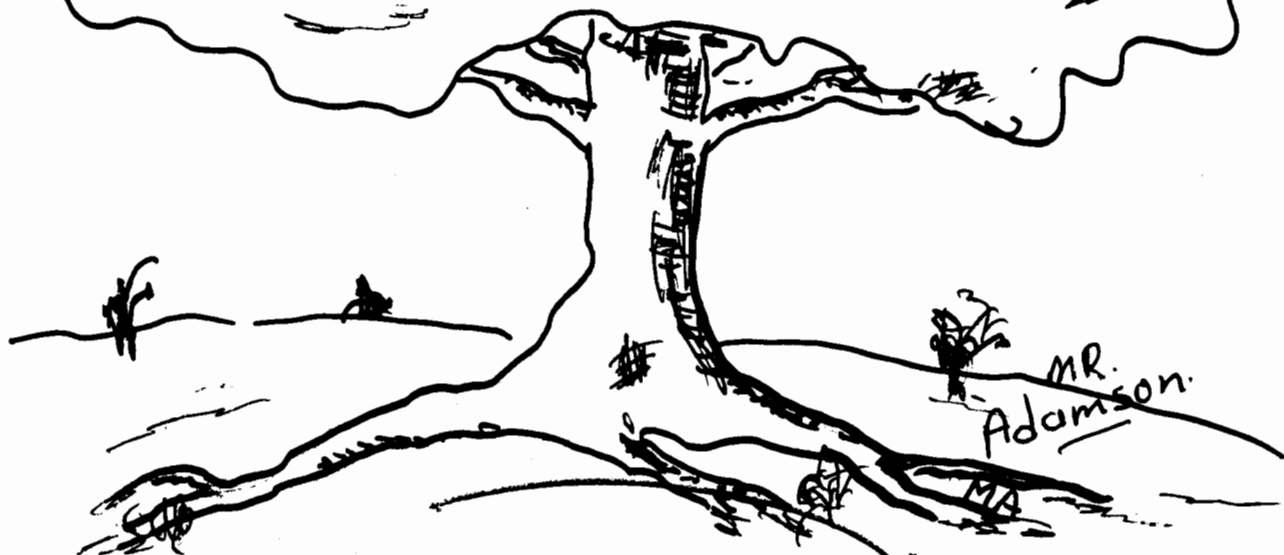

A RESUME OF
THE HISTORY OF THE OLD RED RIVER MEETING HOUSE

The OLD RED RIVER MEETING HOUSE, of south Logan County, is one of the great historical landmarks of Kentucky, and should be recognized as such, as a shrine of national importance.

Organized as a "Society of Presbyterians on the headwaters of Red River," between the years 1785 and 1789, (1) it became the first church of any denomination in approximately the western half of the state, and by 1800 its name had been heralded both at home and abroad as the SEAT of The Great Revival of 1800 (2) and the site of the FIRST Camp Meeting. (3)

The original old log church tumbled down from age in about 1856, more than a hundred years ago, leaving only its foundation stones, but men and writers at that time still remembered the great role it had played in the history of our country, recalling that here in 1800 the forces of Christianity had come together in mysterious fusion to kindle so great a conflagration in the religious life of America that it spread to the ends of our land and was heralded abroad. (2)

This church, as the seat of The Great Revival of 1800, was the preserver of Christianity on our broadening frontier at a time when greed for land and wealth threatened to supplant God and country in men's lives, and when the increase of unbelievers in the great spread of population westward threatened to make of us an unchristian nation. (4)

The log church was built on a rise northeast of Morton Maulding's fort, (5) the earliest settlement (6) in the original area of Logan County. The county was formed when Kentucky became a state, in 1792, and extended in length from approximately present Metcalfe County westward to the Tennessee River. Neither the state nor county had been formed when the old church was built. The area was then known as "the western frontier of Virginia, in the county of Lincoln, District of Kentucky."

In the very earliest record books of Lincoln County there are many references to "the Red River Settlement." As an example, "John Montgomery, late Colonel of the Illinois Regiment, now living in the Red River Settlement in the reserved lands for the Continental line of this state," (from Order Book of August, 1789, Lincoln County, Va.) and "Young Ewing in the Red River District," "Morton Maulding, Captain in the Red River Settlements." Others also mentioned are William Harrison and Andrew Miller.

These men first located downstream in the immediate vicinity of Morton Maulding's Fort, some later pushing on to other areas. As late as 1793, however, Young Ewing was still living nearby, as attested to by the order of the July Court of Logan County (7) that the road to Nashville be "cut out of point of timber opposite Ambrose Maulding's (on Little Whippoorwill Creek) then to Young Ewing's, then to Dromgoole's ford" (present Adairville), which road approximates the present Russellville-Adairville Road #431 approaching Red River from the north.

Among other early settlers were: William Harrison who came from Danville in 1786 and settled on this prong of Red River; Andrew Miller settled close by the same year, at the mouth of Little Whippoorwill Creek; Thomas Townsend's land cornered at William Harrison's Mill and abutted the old churchyard. (8) Thomas Townsend was born near Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1732 (the year of George Washington's birth), came to America at the age of eighteen and fought in the French and Indian Wars and the Revolution. He was a friend of Richard Henderson, head of the Transylvania Company, and co-owner of land with him in North Carolina. He was in Lincoln County by 1786, at which time he won a land suit in the Lincoln County courts. (9) The grave of his wife is in the oldest section of the burying ground, west of the site of the old log church. Their son, Thomas Townsend, gave the adjacent plot of land on which the later church building was placed.

That the earliest settlers of Logan County, and therefore of this section of the state, were Scotch-Irish Presbyterians, from the hordes of Covenanters flooding the eastern shores of America after 1730 seeking religious freedom, is plainly evidenced by the old graves of McPhersons, Ewings, Campbells, McLeans, Paisleys, Townsends, Boyds, Gordons, McMurtrys, Fitzhughs and many others to be found in the churchyard. They or their forebears had come principally by way of two ports, Philadelphia and Charleston, S.C., and on to Kentucky through Virginia and North Carolina. One old tombstone (10) bears an inscription of the 23rd Psalm written in Gaelic. Generals, Colonels, Majors and other brave soldiers who fought in our country's wars from its beginning are buried here, including one who fought in the battle of Waterloo. (11)

A monument with its brass plaque marking the site of the old log church has been erected on the northwest cornerstone of the old building. It was built on the foundation stones of the old log church and out of those of the second church which formerly stood in the northeast corner of the present grounds. The latter building, known as the Red River Cumberland Presbyterian Church, was erected in 1847 (12) and was razed over thirty years ago.

The Cumberland Presbyterians, the Disciples of Christ or Christian Church, and three other denominations (13) arose out of The Great Revival of 1800, which began at this Church on the third Sunday of June of that year, (14) hence the great movement's name. It began under the world-acknowledged leadership of this church's minister, Rev. James McGready. Thousands milled in the groves around the old log building in the greatest expression of religious fervor our country has ever known. It has often been called "the reformation of the western country," and "the most remarkable religious revival in American history." (15) Presbyterians, Methodists and Baptists (16) worked here in unison against the frontier's increasing wickedness, worked for men's souls and for the retention of our Christian heritage. Families came from great distances, in covered wagons from other states, and camped for five days to listen to McGready, McGee, Hodge (17) and other ministers assisting and preaching day and night.

Much has been written about The Great Revival of 1800, both for and against, and a great deal of misinformation has been used as source material by writers, even in the present day. Some of this misinformation came from scattered "posthumous" notes, admittedly gathered together with difficulty by a writer (18)

thirty years after the revival. McDonnold, an accurate historian of the 1880's, says of this writer, "he....liked to lead and expected others to follow.....(he) carried far more sail than ballast." (19)

The most accurate information comes from Rev. James McGready himself in articles he wrote in the fall of 1800, which were printed in 1803 in the New York Missionary Magazine and Repository. Having heard of the great revivals in his churches in the year 1800, this publication, one of the leading missionary magazines in the country at that time, asked him to write of the events leading up to and including these great meetings. He write:

"The first extraordinary manifestation of Divine power was at Red River, where the sacrament of the Supper was administered on the third Sabbath of June (viz 1800)." (Vol. IV, page 154)

He stated earlier (page 74):

"In January 1797 I took charge of three congregations, viz Red River, Muddy River and Casper River."

And on page 152, in referring to events in 1799, he states:

"Here I would just remark that some time before this I resigned the charge at Casper River on account of the distance and difficulties of the road, and in place of it I took Clay Lick in union with Red River and Muddy River."

The minutes in the Red River Church Book of 1833 (page 3) state:

"Red River Church was the seat of the memorable Revival of 1800, out of which the Cumberland Presbyterians arose."

And of its early history:

"It has alternately experienced its prosperous and languishing states. She has struggled through her difficulties most of the time without the labors of a stated minister, her supplies consisting in the labors bestowed by young men as missionaries and occasionally from local ordained ministers."

Three of the ministers known to have served the old church prior to McGready's coming in 1796 were Revs. Thomas Craighead (who in 1785 located between present Nashville and Callatin 30 miles away, and married the daughter of Hon. John Brown, the first U. S. Senator of Kentucky), Hezekiah Balch, and Samuel Finley. (20) Finley was sent to the church by the Transylvania Presbytery in 1795. He later had a church and school at Lancaster, Kentucky, and was made the first Acting President of Centre College (21) immediately upon the death of Rev. James McChord who died suddenly after his election to that post. Balch itinerated in the Cumberland country on both sides of the state line. His daughter married Gen. Samuel Caldwell who came to Kentucky in 1781 and who by 1792 had become the first county court clerk of Logan County.

There were other men who served the church as Presbyterian Missionaries in this early location, as related in the 1833 Minutes of the Church and on the pages of John McPherson's account book under dates as far back as 1785 and 1786. Among them were: John Montgomery, Andrew Miller and Samuel Houston. John McPherson's apothecary shop in his log home stood about 100 yards south of the old log church and was razed within the memory of aged people still living.

Among ministers following McGready were: William Mahon; Finis Ewing, leading founder of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church; William Harris, Caleb Weedon; Silas Davis; James F. Johnston; Joel Penick; F. M. Gilliam; Benjamin Taylor; William (Billie) Jordan Haydon; and others.

The very earliest minutes of the log church have long since been lost if they ever existed for any length of time under the stress of Indian warfare and life on the frontier, but its history has not been difficult to trace from deeds and church records left to us. Early deeds of Logan County would locate the old building for us even if former nonagenarian members, born in the 1840's, had not already done so. Three deeds read:

1. "Beginning at a post oak, corner to John McPherson's 50-acre military survey and at a corner to said Clark's 71-3/4 acre survey near Red River Meeting House.....(surveyors calls)..... to the beginning to include the meeting house and the auld school house where they now stands." (Logan County Deed Book E, page 136, 1816)
2. ".....the said Church Turstees to receive a Right for the lot of ground on which the Meeting House stands, also the lot known as the School House lot adjoining the said Meeting House lot. And also the graveyard lot adjoining the above Meeting House lot." (Logan County Deed Book U, page 8, 1834.)
3. ".....a certain trace or parcel of land including said old meeting house and a small portion of the graveyard." (Logan County Deed Book X, page 131, 1840)

Many writers have badly confused both the date and location of the FIRST CAMP MEETING. Muddy River and Gasper River churches, and even Cane Ridge in Bourbon County have at various times been given claim to this honor belonging to Red River Meeting House.

In July 1799 and June 1800 thousands came to the great sacramental meetings at Red River, which McGready himself describes in his series of articles written for the New York Missionary Magazine in the Fall of 1800. These meetings lasted from three to five days. People came from other states, in covered wagons, prepared for camping on the grounds.

Rev. John McGee and Captain Wallace Estill, eye-witnesses, disagreed in statements regarding the year and the place. Davidson in his History of the Presbyterian Church in Kentucky writing about the revival and camp meeting states: "The first manifestation occurred at Red River in July 1799, and from this time such crowds flocked to the sacraments that they therefore came in wagons loaded with provisions and filled up for temporary lodging. Such was the origin of camp meetings." Yet he quotes Smith in placing the first camp meeting at another location.

Captain Estill and James Smith placed the date in 1800, but Smith in his History of the Christian Church (too often quoted) wrote of families who went in their wagons with provisions and encamped near the church "we think at Muddy River Church" he states, "and most of the converts were from this company." Mr. McGready observed the circumstance, Smith further states, and urged the people from a distance "to come to the meetings prepared to remain on the ground. Previous to the meeting at Gasper River in July he had it proclaimed far and wide that on that occasion he expected the people to camp on the ground." The meeting "previous to the meeting at Gasper River in July" was the Great Revival at Red River Meeting House on the third Sunday of June 1800 which McGready himself describes and states "was the first extraordinary manifestation of Divine Power" and "was at Red River" where "vast multitudes attended." And in a letter dated Logan County, Ky., Oct. 23, 1801, further states "This was the greatest time we had ever seen before. All that I have related (re other revivals) is as it were an introduction. On Monday multitudes were struck down."

McDonnold in his History of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, pg. 12, who "had all the facts before him," related that "several families" from North Carolina journeyed in their wagons and camped at the sacramental meeting in July 1799, "and most of the converts were camped at that meeting. THIS MEETING WAS AT RED RIVER IN KENTUCKY (the emphasis is the author's). It is rather strange that mere conjectural accounts of the origin of camp meetings should be published." Continuing he states: "the good results which McGready saw follow this spontaneous camp-meeting caused him to publish far and near that his sacramental meeting at Gasper, in July 1800, would be a camp meeting."

Rev. Reuben Ross describes a meeting in Tennessee in 1799 and writes "Here a vast crowd similar to those at Red River Meeting House transpired," relating still further about a meeting at Muddy River Church, "The people came in from two states. Some came in tented wagons, some in carts, some on horse back, and many on foot."

The matter resolves itself into what is a "first" if not this first "spontaneous" or natural one to which McDonnold refers. Because McGready urged a later and perhaps larger one "at the next sacramental meeting" does not devalue the fact that the FIRST Camp Meeting was at Red River Meeting House.

Just as some later enthusiastic writer published that the Great Revival of 1800 was at Cane Ridge in Bourbon County, Kentucky, even though Barton Stone, founder of his denomination which had its origin there, wrote in his autobiography: "Having heard of a remarkable religious excitement in the south of Kentucky and Tennessee under the labors of James McGready and other Presbyterian ministers, early in the spring of 1801 I went there to attend camp meeting. There on the edge of the prairie in Logan County, Kentucky, the multitudes came together and continued a number of days and nights encamped on the grounds, . . . (description). . . . The scene was new and passing strange. My conviction was complete that it was good work, the work of God. Nor has my mind wavered since on the subject. I returned to my congregation. Multitudes had collected to hear the news of the meeting I had attended in Logan."

In Draper MS 3XXII8, Col. William Martin of Dixon, Tennessee, wrote regarding "The Great Revival of Religion which took place in the country in 1800, the most extraordinary in many respects that has been witnessed in modern times. It commenced with the Presbyterians in Logan County, fifty miles from here, and spread in every direction and gave rise to Camp Meetings. Its first movement was under James McGready."

ADDENDA

An accurate replica of the Original pioneer meeting house has been erected through the efforts of Logan County citizens and other interested parties determined to preserve this historical church as a Kentucky shrine.

Built of old hewn logs chinked with mud-colored mortar, and with huge cross beams, a roof of hand-cut shingles, a floor of wide planks and a great stone fireplace of native weathered stone, the log church stands in a grove of trees. The replica was drawn to scale from both the description of former aged members, and from a sketch of it drawn by an early artist traveling at the time with Wm. H. Milburn, roving Methodist minister, Chaplain of the U.S. Congress and author of note.

The three and seven-eighths acre plot, with its log building, monument and old burying ground, occupies a vantage spot north of the old site of Morton Maulding's fort, and on a horseshoe bend of Spring Creek, originally called Maulding's Fork of Red River. It is accessible over its driveway from State Highway 664, off U.S. 431.

Its property has from time to time been clearly surveyed and recorded. An interesting survey map may be found in Logan County Deed Book 42, pg. 579, (1869) made by Edwin R. Moore, a direct descendent of both James Harrod, first settler of Harrodsburg, and Baker Ewing, first Land Registrar of Kentucky. The last survey, ordered by a lifelong member of the church is dated July 20, 1948, and is recorded in Deed Book 147, page 459.

The deeds since 1840 read to The Red River Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The members also voted in 1909 to remain with the Cumberland Presbyterian denomination.

OUR RAYMER FAMILY HISTORY 1782-1982

The history of all Kentucky Raymers (and all Raymers that left Kentucky at a later time) begins with Abraham Raymer Sr.

Abraham Raymer Sr. may have been born around 1730 or 1740- perhaps in Pennsylvania or even England or Germany. The early Pa. Raymers spelled the name-Romer, Raimer, Raner and Ramer. The wife of "old" Abraham may have been-Senalah.

The first record of Abraham Raymer in Kentucky is in the early 1780's (in Jefferson County by 1781-1782). He received 400 acres of land there and was appointed by the court to be the administrator for someones estate by 1783. He was an early pioneer of Ky (and no doubt an indian fighter). He was one of the very first pioneers and settlers of the Severns Valley Fort (now Elizabethtown, Ky). That date would be 1780-1785. Since he was among the first pioneers of Kentucky, he was a contemporary of James Harrod (who founded the first settlement in Ky- Harrodsburg in 1774), as well as the famous Daniel Boone (started Booneboro in 1775). In fact, Daniel Boone was born in the same county of Pennsylvania that many of the Raymers were born in. So, did Abraham come to Ky with Boone? Maybe not- it is not known. He may have come down on flatboats- on the Ohio River, as so many did. While Abraham Sr. was in Jefferson County, another famous family was also there. Abraham Linclon (the grandfather of President Linclon) was killed by indians while there. In fact, his oldest son- Mordecai Linclon, not only killed the indian, but rescued his younger brother- Thomas (who later was to marry and be the father of the 16th President). The Linclon Family had also came to Virginia and Kentucky from Eastern Pennsylvania.

By the late 1780's, many pioneers begin leaving the protected forts of the time. Abraham Raymer was one of those who left for his own land- in which to build a house. He received a 250 acre Virginia Land Grant on the South Fork of Nolin River (I have a copy of that grant). At this same time, Thomas Linclon received land on the same river (which is now near Hodgenville, Ky). In 1809 the future President Linclon was born in the same land. By 1787 Abraham Raymer Jr. married Mrs. Margaret Cruse (Crews) in Nelson Co, Ky. Soon, Abraham Sr's daughter- Catherine would marry in Nelson & Hardin Co.

The first record we have of Abraham Raymer and family being in what is now Warren County, Ky was in 1792. Then, he was recorded as a taxpayer - as well as Abraham Jr. "Old" Abraham was listed with two males over 16, plus 2 horses and 14 cattle. He was permitted to run a ferry across Barren River in 1792 (Oct 23). By doing so, he became one of the very first to run a ferry in the State of Kentucky (admitted to the Union as a state in 1792).

Abraham Raymer Sr. is recorded in history. From- History of Kentucky by Collins (Vol.2, p.739), we find this amusing story;

" Four miles above Bowling Green, on the river is McFadens old station. Some stories are connected with it, one of which we relate; A dashing young Virginian came to the station and braged that he could outrun any man "in all Kaintuck". McFaden, who was a quizzical old genius, asked if he would run barefoot or shod(shoes), and was answered- barefoot. McFaden said I will set the time and place and will risk a gallon of wiskey that I find a man to beat you. The bet was made and the day fixed. The old hunter Raymer was sent for. The two parties went to the tract selected by McFadden. It was probably the most flinty bed in all the country. Both men started. They had gone but a few yards when the Virginian was compelled to hold up. But as Raymers feet were as hard as a buffalo's he kept ahead like a quarter hourse, to the great amusement of old McFaden and friends. That ground has since been called" Raymers Race Track".

The date above would be 1798. McFadden's Station was the first permanent settlement in Warren and surrounding area and was located near the present Porter Pike.

By 1800 or so, Abraham Sr had died. He may have lived his last days with Michael, his son. At that time they lived in the Ohio or Grayson County area. Abe Jr. was in Edmonson Co by this time. He was there when Edmonson was formed and did serve on its first grand jury. By the mid 1840's both Michael and Abraham Jr. were dead. Most of their descendants have remained in this area of Ky - even *NOW*. So our Raymers have been in Kentucky for 200 years, 1782-1982. All of us here today are descended from that first Abraham Raymer. That is then, our Raymer Family History 1782-1982.

JOHN S. WILSON (1843-1912) OF TENNESSEE, KENTUCKY, AND INDIANA

My maternal great-grandfather, John W. Wilson, was born 15 December 1843 in Knox County, Tennessee. He is the youngest son of Solomon Wilson and his second wife Judy (Julia) Qualls Morgan Wilson. Other children of Solomon and Judy include: Sarah, born 1827; Ada, born 1834; Madison, born 1836; Judy Ann, born 1837; Caswell Green, born 1839. Solomon had at least six children by his first wife, Polly Key, whom he married in 1811 in Knox County. He married his second wife, in Knox County on 11 March 1826. Bondsman for the marriage was James Skaggs; marriage service performed by Joseph Wood. The last record located on Solomon Wilson is the 1840 census; it is believed he died between 1843 and 1850, as on 1850 census for Knox County, Tennessee, his widow Judy is listed with her family. (Judy married first to John Morgan in 1823 in Knox County.

Also listed in 1850 census is David and Nancy Qualls. David age 75, born Virginia, and his wife Nancy age 67, born Virginia. They are believed to be Judy Qualls' parents; she was born 1799 in Virginia. At time of 1830 census, David and Nancy Qualls lived nine houses away from Solomon and Judy Wilson. Solomon Wilson's parents are unknown at this time.

John S. Wilson was a pupil enrolled in the Little Flat Creek Baptist Church School in 1850 or 1851, teacher was Martin Wymatt - also enrolled are John's sister Julia Wilson, and his brothers Green and Madison Wilson. This info from book "Harbison, Graveston, Knox County, Tennessee and the Graves Genealogy" by Thomas Neal, 1973, published by Mannis Printing Company, Knoxville, Tennessee. The Little Flat Creek Baptist Church was located near Corryton, Tennessee. It was the first Baptist church established in the community, in 1797 and it is still functioning.

On 20 February 1862 John S. Wilson enrolled in the Union Army in Company F of the 3rd Tennessee Infantry during the War of the Rebellion. He enlisted in Flat Lick (Knox County), Kentucky and served as a private until discharged at Nashville, Tennessee on 23 February 1865. His pension records state his personal description at the time of enlistment: Height, 5 feet 10 inches; Complexion: dark; Color of eyes: Dark. The records also state he was a farmer and that he was born 15 December 1843 at or in Knox County, Tennessee (declaration made at age 63, while a resident of Rockland, Warren County, Ky.)

John S. Wilson married Mary Ellen Sherman in Grainger County, Tennessee on 9 January 1869. Mary's parents' names are yet unknown to me, after much diligent searching in East Tennessee records. They may be William Sherman and his wife Anna Spradling who married 4 February 1840 in McMinn County, Tennessee and who appear in 1850 federal census in Washington County Tennessee with a daughter Mary. Mary Ellen Sherman was born 7 June 1843.

The family Bible of John S. Wilson and his wife Mary Ellen Sherman Wilson is now in the possession of a great-grandson who lives in Michigan. The Bible apparently was owned by Mary prior to her marriage as she wrote on flyleaf "Mary E. Sherman's book". In the Family Record section of the Bible, which was published in 1867 by the American Bible Society, New York, is noted the following:

Mary E. Sherman was borned in the years of our Lord 1843. June the 7 ... day.

John S. Wilson was borned December the 15 1843.

Wesley Alison Wilson was borned June the 19 1871.

Jennie Bell Wilson was borned August the 21 1874.

Sciotia Josevane Wilson was borned January the 4 1876.

Judy Ann Wilson was borned August the 4 1877.

James Francis Wilson was borned February the 6 1879.

Sarrah Flornee Wilson was borned November the 4 1880.

John Leonidust Wilson was borned February the 28 1882.

George William Wilson was borned January the 1 1884.

Junthe Argustia Wilson was borned May the 14 1886.

John and Mary Wilson are listed in the 1870 federal census for Grainger County, Tennessee. Nearby lived John's mother, Judy Wilson and two of her daughters. John's pension records state the families moved to Edmonson County, Kentucky in 1872 where they lived until 1885 when they moved to Barren County, Kentucky where they lived until 1896 when they moved to Warren County, Kentucky. The 1890 Edmonson County federal census shows John and Mary Wilson and their family, with Judy (Julia) Wilson living nearby with her two daughters, Sarah and Ada (called Bada). At the time of the 1900 census John and Mary Wilson lived in Warren County, Kentucky with their family. This is the last record located on Mary Wilson. (According to my mother, her Grandma Wilson died before the marriage of my mother's parents, Sarah and William Simpson, in June 1901. This she was told by her mother.)

The children of John and Mary Wilson:

1. Wesley Alison Wilson, born 1871, married Minnie ca 1894, died 11 January 1935 in Evansville, Indiana; five children.
2. Jennie Bell Wilson, born 1874, married Edgar Vance, died 1901 Barren County, Kentucky; no children.
3. Sciotia Josephine Wilson, born 1876, two daughters: Grace Marie and Beatrice; died 1960 Pontiac, Michigan.
4. Judy Ann Wilson, born 1877, married 1) Leonard Shirley in 1900 in Barren County, married 2) his brother, Barney Shirley; died 20 June 1947 in Barren County, Kentucky; no children.
5. James Francis Wilson, born 1879, had two daughters by first wife - Mae and Gladys, died July, 1951 in Tarryson, Ind.
6. Sarah Florence Wilson, born 1880, (my maternal grandmother), married 28 June 1901 in Celina, Clay Co., Tenn. to William Jason Simpson, born 23 October 1860, son of William S. Simpson and Louizanna (Lowe) Simpson of Barren County, Kentucky; their children: Zelma; Lura Mable; Lola Bell; Mamie Ruth; Augusta Ellen; William Herman; Anna Delphia; Opal Pauline; Lula Frances. Sarah (called Sally) died 28 June 1957 in Evansville, Indiana.

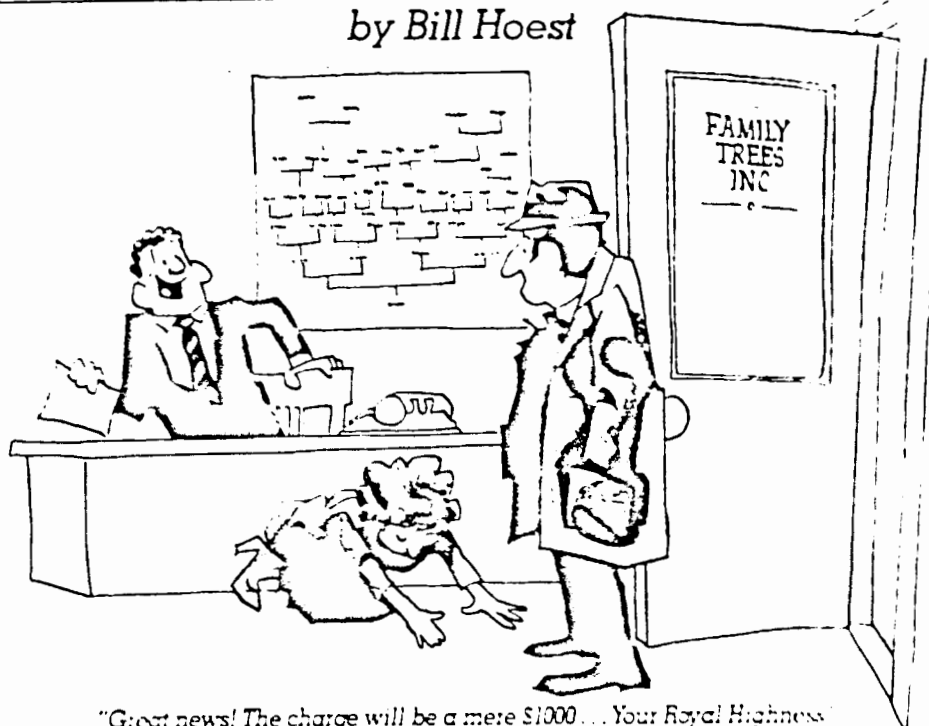
7. John Leonidas Wilson, born 1882, married Cora Baughn, died in 1941 in Evansville, Indiana.
8. George William Wilson, born 1884, married Bess, had four children - Ola, Jane, Marian and Jean; died 1934 in Evansville, Indiana.
9. Junthe Augusta Wilson, born 1885, married Edgar Vance, died young; no children; died in Barren County, Kentucky.

John S. Wilson's older sons had moved north to Evansville, Vanderburgh County, Indiana before 1910. John suffered from disabilities being treated by the family physician who came to the farm by horse and buggy. As his condition worsened his sons suggested he move to Evansville to consult a new doctor, which he did in 1911. He lived with his son and family at 1516 John Street at the time of his death on 19 January 1912. He was buried 22 January 1912 in Oak Hill Cemetery, in Evansville. His tombstone reads "John Willson, Co. P., 3 In. Inf." (He mostly used the spelling Willson, but many records show his last name spelled Wilson; his children used the spelling of Wilson.)

JOHN J. RECTOR OF VIRGINIA, TENNESSEE AND KENTUCKY

John J. Rector was born in 1805 or 1806 in Campbell County, Virginia, the son of Lewis Rector (1764-1830) and his second wife Elizabeth Martin, daughter of David Martin, who married 14 January 1799 in Campbell County, Virginia. Lewis Rector's first wife was Sarah Butler whom he married in 1792 in Campbell County. (Sarah daughter of William Butler (1733-1804) and Ann Duckett (1740-1804).)

The children of Lewis and Sarah Butler Rector include:

The will of David Martin is recorded in Campbell County, Virginia, Will Book 2, dated May, 1807 and names his children: Josiah; John (m. Sarah Pugh 1796); David (m. Jane Dickey 1801); James (m. Ann Dickey 1802); Mary (m. David Pugh 1794); Sally (m. Martin Rector 1804); Rachel (m. Rufe Watkins 1802) and Elizabeth (m. Lewis Rector 1799). His wife was not named.

Lewis and Elizabeth Martin Rector moved from Virginia to the area near what is now Oliver Springs, Tennessee (Anderson County) before 1814 when he appears on tax lists for Roane County. Oliver Springs is located near county lines of Roane and Morgan. Lewis Rector served in War of 1812 from Tennessee. He had land in both Roane and Morgan Counties, in addition to Anderson County. He and his family lived on the Indian Fork of Poplar Creek. Lewis Rector died about 1830 or 1831.

Lewis Rector's estate settlement is recorded in Anderson County, Tennessee in 1831 - Jacob Rector is the executor of the document. In it are named: Benjamin Rector; Elizabeth Rector; Jacob Rector; W. M. Rector; John Rector Jr. (John J. Rector, so listed as John Jr. to differentiate between Lewis' brother John and his son John); Powhatan Rector; Thomas Rector; D. M. C. Rector.

The last record located on Elizabeth Martin Rector is the 1850 Anderson County, Tennessee Federal census which shows her as age 67, born in Virginia, and living with two of her sons: Lewis age 34, born Tennessee and D. M. age 18, born Tennessee.

John J. Rector married about 1825-27 to Mary (maiden name unknown) who was born 1809 in North Carolina, according to 1850 federal census records for Warren County, Kentucky. They probably married in Roane County, Tennessee, although no record of their marriage is recorded there. John Rector was a witness at the marriage of his sister, Sarah Rector, in 1827 in Roane County to John Kington, according to a deposition dated 26 April 1870 (when John Rector was 73 years old and lived in Warren County, Kentucky) for his sister's pension which she applied for in 1870.

John Rector and his wife Mary Rector are the parents of the following children:

The three oldest children of John and Mary Rector were born in Tennessee before the family moved to Warren County, Kentucky in 1835 it is believed. John appears for the first time in tax lists of Warren County in 1836. His uncle, John Rector, had moved to Warren County and appears for the first time on 1833 list. Other relatives listed in early tax lists subsequent to 1832 are: Jacob Rector; Thomas Rector; Powhatan Rector; William M. Rector; William A. Rector; Frederick Rector; David Rector; Martin Rector; Wilson Rector; D. M. C. Rector. (Lists of 1833 through 1844.)

At the time of the 1850 federal census for Warren County, Kentucky, John and Mary Rector are listed as John age 44, Mary age 41, and their family included: Ann, 22; Lewis 20; Luverny 16; Elizabeth 14; Mack 13; William M. 10; Jane 5; The 1850 federal census shows John Rector age 54, Mary age 51, their children: Anna 35; Mack 23; Morgan 19; James T. 11; Mary 14; and also a daughter Mary age 5. Living next door is the Josiah Greathouse family, which included Elijah Greathouse who married Mary Jane Rector in 1861, and Louisa Greathouse who married John J. Rector in 1868.

John J. Rector, born 4 May 1840, married Louisa Greathouse 19 Jan. 1866 in Warren County, Kentucky. John died 30 November 1910 in Forrest, New Mexico where his wife died 14 June 1934.

The last record found on John J. Rector, born 1805/1806 in Campbell Co., Virginia is the federal census record of Warren County, Kentucky for 1880, which shows John age 75 and his second wife, Nelly Miller, whom he married 24 July 1870 in Warren County, she age 70 in 1880 - they lived in household of John's son, John J. Rector and his wife Louisa Greathouse Rector, John age 28, Louisa 26, and their children: Sarah 9, Eugene 5, Clyde 1. Apparently John J. Rector, Sr.'s first wife, Mary, b. 1809 in North Carolina, had died between 1860 and 1870. John Sr.'s death date is unknown at this time.

John J. Rector is a descendant of German emigrants to Virginia in 1714. Families from Germany included these: Brumback; Kesper; Cuntz (Coons); Fishback; Hitt (Hilde); Hoffman; Holtzelaw; Martin; Rector; Spillman; Weaver; Hager (Hager). They settled on the banks of the Rapidan River in what is now Orange County, Virginia. It was the frontier of Virginia in 1714. Governor Alexander Spotswood settled German emigrants (42 German protestants or thereabouts) in Germanna, in the County of Essex in 1714 for the security of the frontiers in those parts from the instructions of the Indians - they were free from the payments of all public and county levies for seven years. Later this was Spotsylvania County and became Orange County 1731. The German families had moved to Fauquier County, Virginia around 1717. These families were from Ulm and Siegen, Germany and were the first German Reformed congregations in America. Descendants of the original settlers have formed The Memorial

Foundation of the Germanna Colonies in Virginia, P. O. Box 393, Culpeper, VA 22701 and a number of books are available from them on these families. There is also a yearly reunion held in Virginia.

The ancestry of John J. Rector born 1805/1806 in Campbell County, Virginia is:

3. John Rector (1711-1773) b. Germany, m. cousin Anna Catherine Fishback, emigrant to Virginia 1714, d. Virginia.
4. John Jacob Rector (1674-), b. Trupbach, Nassau-Siegen, Germany, m. Elizabeth Fishback b. ca 1685, emigrated to Virginia 1714, settler of Germanna, d. ca 1728/9 Fauquier County, Virginia.
5. Christopher Richter (ca 1641 Siegen, Germany -) m. Anna Becker; Christopher was a clockmaker, d. after 1713.
6. Johannes Richter (ca 1615 Siegen, Germany -), wife's name Anna; Johannes was admitted to the Guild of Hammer-smiths and Smelterers as a Reichtmeister (middleman) in 1638 or 1639 in Siegen.
7. Jacob Richter of Siegen, probably born about 1575, wife's name unknown.
8. Hans Richter probably born about 1550 from the Country near Meissen, city of Freiburg, paid a fee in 1585 to become a citizen of Siegen.

SOME SHORTCUTS TO GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

Few of us have time to travel considerable distances to do genealogical research where the chances of finding information are remote. There are, however, some inexpensive methods that can be used to rule out certain locations entirely and to assure at least limited success in researching at other locations.

The grantor-grantee indexes are good starting points. These indexes, or indices, depending on how you choose to spell the word, are kept in some states by the County Clerk, and in others by the Circuit Clerk, and in still others by a Registrar of Deeds or one with a similar title. When in doubt, a letter addressed to the Registrar of Deeds will usually find its way to the proper officer.

Often a phone call in advance of any correspondence is advisable. In a rural county seat, where the officer employs few people, you can make a phone call inquiring about this system and, in the course of the short conversation, sometimes establish a rapport with the clerk or the deputy you will be later dealing with.

Remember that, whatever his title, the officer is an elected public official and he usually employs only persons who are pleasant and helpful in dealing with the public.

You may inquire as to the price per page of the copies from the grantor-grantee index. Some clerks may charge .25 per page, which he considers covers the actual cost. Others may charge \$1.00 per page and consider not only the cost of the photo copy but that the deputy is also rendering a service. He is usually free to establish his own fees in this area.

Your first inquiry should be for photo copies of the grantor-grantee index for the period your ancestor is thought to have lived and the county in question.

You may later be surprised when it appears that your ancestor or his heirs granted (sold) property which does not appear from the grantee index to have been conveyed to him in the first place, however further research will provide the answer.

He may have acquired title by having been the original "patentee" or an assignee of the patentee, in which case there would be no entry in the grantee index when he acquired title but an entry in the grantor index when he conveyed title.

If title was acquired by patent the deed should so indicate and should furnish the source of the patent, also the patent number from which further research can be conducted.

The pages from the grantee index and the grantor index, which you will receive from the clerk, may not be copies of the original index. Through the years the index books have been worn. Many have been recopied. Many were recopied as a WPA project in the thirties. In some instances special groupings were made at that time under particular letters of the alphabet and the entry may give a brief location of the property in question, whereas in the original index all persons whose name began with a "B" may be simply listed in chronological order, as the deeds were lodged for recording.

Be alerted to entries in the grantor index such as "Doe, John, heirs" or some similar designation. This should eventually lead you to the names of all ancestor's children and their spouses when you later secure copies of deeds.

If the ancestor left a will his executor alone will be the grantor of real property still owned by the ancestor at the time of his death in two instances (1) where it was necessary for the personal representative to sell real property in order to pay estate debts, or (2) where the will left specific directions to the executor, or personal representative, to convey real property. Otherwise, real property passes directly to the devisees, subject only to inheritance taxes which doesn't usually concern us.

If real property of the ancestor decedent was sold by his personal representative for any reason the authority for the sale should follow the source of title in the deed, i.e., a paragraph should follow the source and should read similar to the following:

This property is conveyed by James Doe, exec. of the estate of John Doe, pursuant to a provision directing such sale contained in the will of John Doe which is recorded in Wills Book 2, page 123 Warren County Clerk's office.

You can then request a copy of the will, referring to wills book and page number, and you will find that all the children of your ancestor will be "mentioned" in the will. This was because even though your ancestor may have intended to disinherit a particular child and the old-time lawyers will still "mention" that child and leave him \$1.00. This was to avoid a will contest on the grounds that the testator did not, at the time the will was executed, recognize the natural objects of his affections and bounty.

The records of the chancery court action will certainly mention all parties in interest, which will be the widow and all his children and their spouses.

Deeds, contracts of sale, affidavits of descent, and other documents may be found in the same index. If you have a notation "Doe, John, estate" and in a column to the right of that entry a notation "affidavit of descent" you are in luck because the

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affidavit of descent will furnish the same information as you will find in the file in the chancery court action for partition or sale.

When a party dies without a will the affidavit of descent should be filed before the deed, but this is not always the case.

After you have examined your photo copies furnished to you from the grantee index and the grantor index, and you have matched up conveyances to the ancestor with conveyances by the ancestor and made particular note as to the various types of documents with which you are dealing you will want to order copies from the clerk on a "selective" basis. If you are not somewhat selective you may be simply duplicating your material at a cost which can be avoided.

Now that you have received copies of deeds of real property to your ancestor when he moved to the county in question and copies of the deeds executed by him or by his executor or widow and heirs at law following his death there are certain things you should look for in these deeds.

In the course of any conveyance the deed should be executed by both husband and wife but this was not always the case, and the deed should also set out the source of title, following a legal description but, again, this practice was not usually observed in the older deeds and it was not observed in Kentucky in some counties as late as 20 years ago, although the law actually prohibits the clerk from accepting a deed for recording which does not contain a source of title.

With a proper source of title the researcher can start at any point from one deed to the one before it even back to the original patenting of the land if he is sufficiently interested in the land itself, and he can do this in the clerk's office in a matter of minutes provided the legal requirements are met and good draftsmanship has been observed. If the matter is being handled by mail this could create some problems.

Although old county records usually consisted of birth and death records, any records involving law suits, mortgages, marriage records, and such, it may be that nothing transpired which required an entry in these records, but an ancestor would seldom have lived in a particular county without having bought and sold some real property. Real property, particularly in rural areas, was too easy to acquire for him to have done otherwise.

Be particularly alert to notary certificates. Until recent times there was no such thing as notary-at-large. His commission was restricted to a particular state and a particular county. If you locate the deed where your ancestor bought land in a particular county you may find that he bought the land before he moved to that location. In that case you are able to learn, from the notary certificate, the State and County from which he moved.

It often was the case that the ancestor died without a will and the real property owned by him, at the time of his death, was sold by agreement of the widow and his heirs-at-law rather than following an action for partition and/or sale. At the time the ancestor died his children were usually adults, had married, and were often scattered. Be sure to make particular note of notary certificates in these cases, because the deed will usually have been mailed to the children for execution and the notary certificates will reveal the state and county of residence of each of his children at the time of death of the ancestor.

If the researcher wants to follow up on the new generation, he can then go to the grantee index or the grantor index in the state and county as indicated in the notary certificate as being the resident of a particular child, and then start the procedure all over again.

In summary, a few phone calls, some correspondence, and then spending of a relatively insignificant amount of money for photo copies from the grantee index and grantor index, and the securing of copies of deeds on a selective basis can save a lot of time and gasoline. If, however, the initial information points towards fruitful research, you may want to visit the courthouse and research all the other records, however, if the grantor-grantee index contains no information as to your ancestor at least you have avoided an unnecessary trip.
