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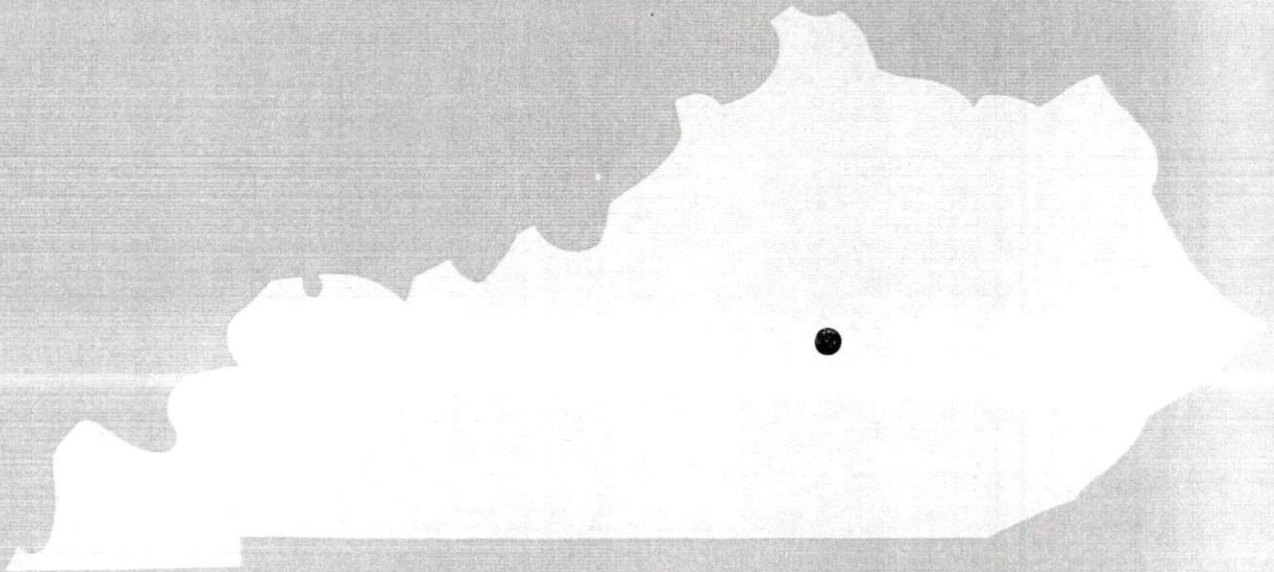

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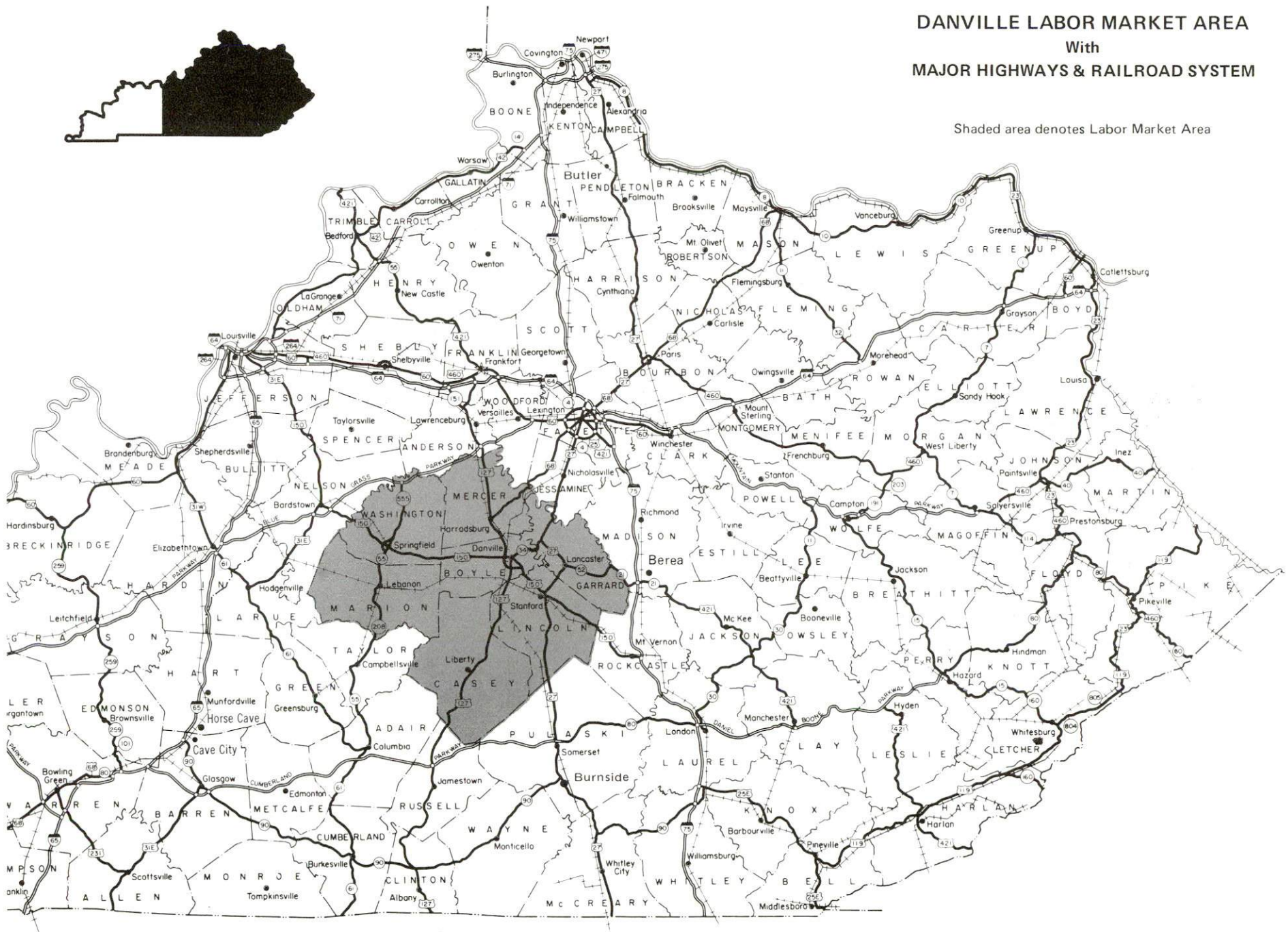

DANVILLE, KENTUCKY - A COMPREHENSIVE REPORT

Profile

Danville, county seat of Boyle County and home of Centre College, has a population of 12,942. Boyle County has a population of 25,066.

Danville is geographically situated near the southwest edge of Central Kentucky's Inner Bluegrass area. Gently rolling topography and large farms and good agricultural land are characteristic of the area. Danville is 81 miles southeast of Louisville, Kentucky, and 35 miles southwest of Lexington, Kentucky.

The Danville labor market area includes Boyle and the six surrounding counties. Employment in Boyle County totals 11,810, of which 11,130 are nonagricultural jobs. Employment in the labor market area totals 47,100, of which 40,600 are nonagricultural jobs. The current estimated labor supply available for employment totals 8,240, of which 4,500 are men and 3,740 are women.

Industrial employment in Danville and Boyle County is greatest in the manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, and services industries. Twenty-five manufacturing plants are located in Danville and provide over 3,600 jobs. Some of the products manufactured include trash compactors, ice makers for refrigerators, friction brake linings, disc pads, conveyors overhead roller, men's suits, shoes, upholstered chairs and sofas, steel wire and cable, glass bulbs, and tubing. Distribution centers located in Danville are also major sources of employment.

The growth and development of the city of Danville has been orderly and well planned. Excellent educational facilities, medical facilities, public and private recreational facilities, housing, and commercial and industrial development have made Danville one of Kentucky's most attractive and progressive cities.

THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Labor Market Area includes Boyle County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Casey, Garrard, Lincoln, Marion, Mercer and Washington.

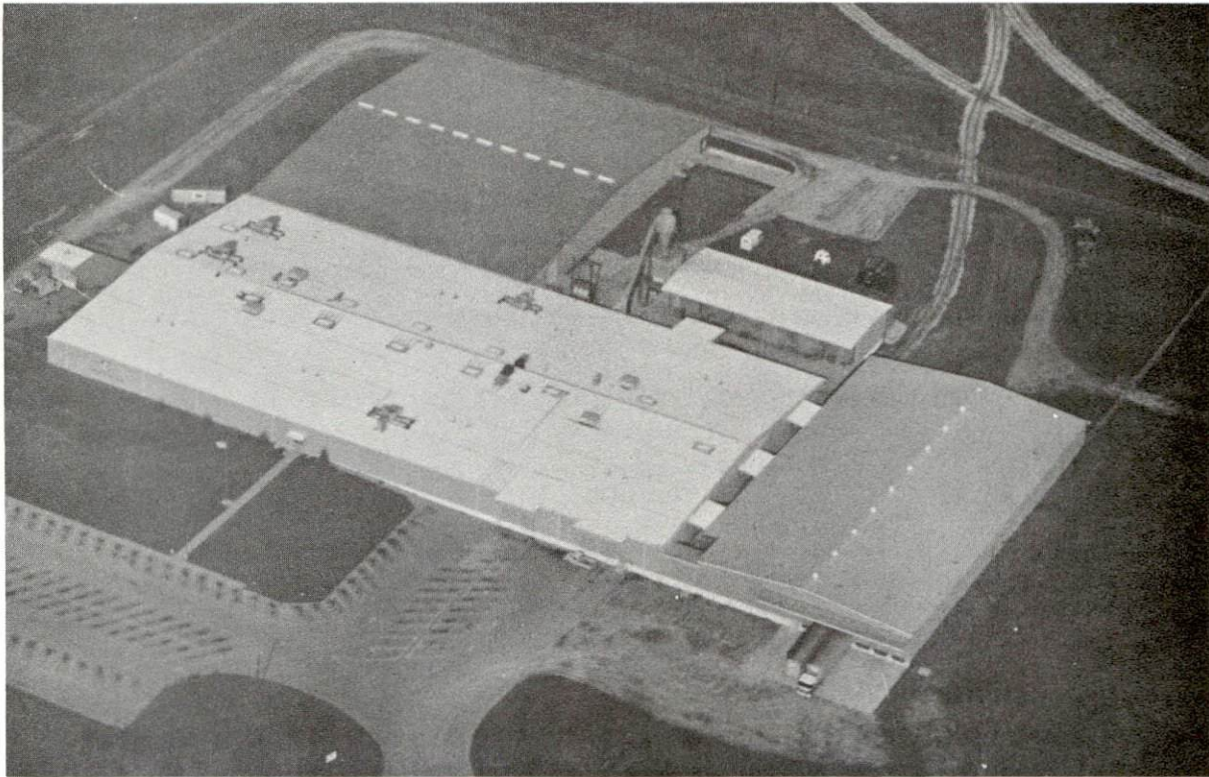
New Developments

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

U.S. Highways 127 and 150, and Kentucky Routes 33, 34 and 52 converge at Danville. The U.S. 127 Bypass, a two-lane extension of U.S. 127, borders the city to the south and west, interconnecting both U.S. Routes and Kentucky Route 34 west of Danville.

The Bluegrass Parkway, a controlled-access multilane toll road, is located 25 miles north of Danville via U.S. Highway 127, and provides direct access to Lexington, 22 miles eastward, and Interstate 65 at Elizabethtown, 59 miles to the west. The Cumberland Parkway, also a controlled-access, multilane toll road, is located 51 miles south via U.S. Highway 127 and provides access to Interstate 65, 63 miles to the east near Bowling Green. Interstate 75 is accessible at Lexington to the north and at Mt. Vernon, 38 miles to the south, via U.S. Highway 150.

Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.241 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

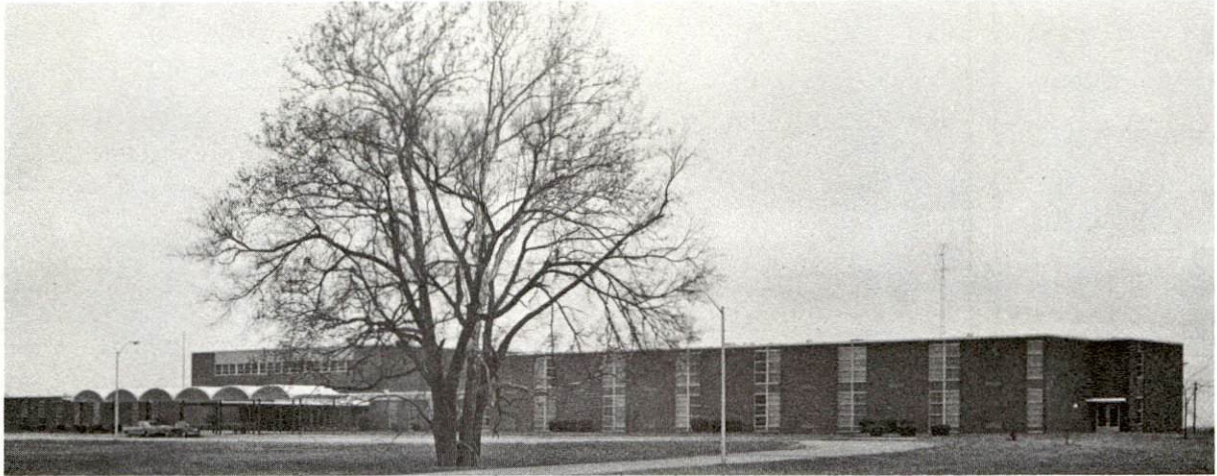

Centre College of Kentucky, located in Danville, was founded in 1819. The college is independently governed, but has maintained its Christian affirmation throughout its history. The college is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Association of American Colleges, the Southern University Conference, the Southern College University Union, the College Entrance Examination Board and the College Scholarship Service. A chapter of the National Council of Phi Beta Kappa was established here in 1970. Both Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees are offered at Centre.

Kentucky Junior College of Business is accredited as a junior college of business by the Accrediting Commission of the Association of Independent Colleges and Schools, Washington, D. C. The college confers the degree of Associate in Science, and also awards diploma courses and special courses. The college's spring 1981 student enrollment was 592.

*Centre College also offers a special 3-2 (three years at Centre, two years in engineering school) engineering program in cooperation with the University of Kentucky in Lexington, Kentucky; Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee; Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri; Columbia University in New York, New York; and Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Georgia.

**Courses in the masters degree program are taught on the Transylvania campus by faculty members of Xavier University of Cincinnati. The degree is issued by Xavier University.

***Joint doctoral degree programs are offered in cooperation with the University of Kentucky, Lexington, and cooperative doctoral degree programs are offered with Michigan State University and the University of Maryland.

Vocational Schools

Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers are operated by the Kentucky Department of Education. The state vocational-technical schools enroll persons full time who are at least 16 years of age and not in school. These students attend classes for six hours each day. The area vocational education centers are designed to accommodate high school students who are at least 15 years of age. These students attend vocational school for three hours each day. The state vocational-technical schools and the area education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

RECREATION

Local

Danville and Boyle County offer a wide variety of recreational opportunities. Public recreation facilities include two large parks, five mini-parks, nine playgrounds, two tennis courts, three baseball diamonds, four softball fields, four football fields and four soccer fields. The Danville-Boyle County Recreational Department offers year-round programs for all ages. A supervised playground program is available during the summer months, and sports enthusiasts may participate in leagues for basketball, football, baseball, softball, fast-pitch softball, and soccer. The state YMCA also offers a variety of year-round activities.

Private recreational facilities include one country club, one golf course, two swimming pools, two movie theatres, one bowling facility, one skating rink, and a racquetball court.

Constitution Square State Shrine in Danville is an authentic reproduction of Kentucky's first courthouse square. The first post office west of the Alleghenies still stands in the square alongside replicas of the jail, courthouse, and meetinghouse. Recent improvements to the park include landscaping and the addition of lights, and the Governor's Circle Monument on the park grounds, which is nearing completion. New buildings house historical displays and a Centre College exhibit.

The McDowell House, a registered national historic landmark adjacent to Constitution Square, is the home in which pioneer surgeon Doctor Ephraim McDowell lived and worked. The Apothecary Shop next door displays authentic 18th and 19th century pharmaceuticals.

The Centre College campus is the site for a variety of inter-collegiate sports activities through the fall, winter and spring months, and the campus track is available for public use. The Regional Arts Center, also located on the Centre campus, offers various entertainment and cultural activities to the community, including art exhibits and theatrical performances by national touring companies. Centre College was established in 1819, and is rated among the top 100 colleges in the nation.

Dining and outdoor theatre is available at Pioneer Playhouse. An 18th century village has been constructed on the theatre grounds, depicting a typical street scene at the time Kentucky's constitution was adopted.

Perryville Battlefield State Shrine, near Perryville, in Boyle County, is the site of the largest Civil War battle in Kentucky. A museum, a picnic area, and a playground are located on the grounds.

Crawford Springs Park, a small county park two miles from Perryville, offers a nature area, picnic and barbecue equipment, and wildflower and tree identification. A hiking trail connecting Crawford Springs Park and Perryville Battlefield State Shrine has been proposed.

Central Kentucky Wildlife Refuge, a 500-acre non-profit refuge, is located in western Boyle County. Open seven days per week, it offers hiking trails, and a wildflower walk is scheduled each April.

Area (Within 25 miles)

Many other recreational attractions are available within a 25-mile radius of Danville.

Isaac Shelby State Shrine, six miles south of Danville, is the burial site of Kentucky's first governor and one of the Commonwealth's foremost statesmen.

Herrington Lake, eight miles northeast of Danville, was developed by the Kentucky Utilities Company in 1925. Dix River Dam near Pleasant Hill is located on the 1,860-acre lake. Fishing, boating, and swimming can all be enjoyed on the lake. Camping and fishing facilities are available near Danville and Harrodsburg.

Old Fort Harrod State Park, nine miles north of Danville, is a 28-acre park in Harrodsburg that features a full-scale reproduction of the original Fort Harrod. The park also contains the log cabin where Abraham Lincoln's parents were wed, the Mansion Museum which houses mementos associated with the great periods of Kentucky history, a pioneer cemetery, and a federal monument dedicated to pioneers. The "Legend of Daniel Boone", an outdoor drama which brings to life on stage the men and women who made Kentucky, is performed in the park amphitheatre during the summer months.

There are many other points of historical interest in Harrodsburg, Kentucky's oldest city.

Pleasant Hill (better known as Shakertown) is located approximately 12 miles north of Danville, and features a restored Shaker village of 27 buildings and numerous displays of Shaker skills, crafts, and hand-made articles. Dining, lodging and conference facilities are available by reservation in the village buildings.

Camp Nelson Recreation Center is located 15 miles north of Danville on the Kentucky River. Facilities include areas for tent camping, a campground with hook-up for 55 units, picnicking and cooking equipment, a general store, a pool (summer only), a music hall and a boat launching ramp. Plans have been made to construct a boat dock and a museum at Camp Nelson, and horseback riding stables are available nearby.

William Whitley House State Shrine, 25 miles southeast of Danville near Stanford, is the first brick house west of the Allegheny Mountains, built 1787-94. Whitley laid out Kentucky's first race track here and started U.S. counterclockwise racing. The facility provides picnic and playground areas in a ten-acre park.
