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
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

ON THE COVER

Our cover picture is by young artist Davie Reneau, and is of the old mill that stands on Beaver Creek near her home, three miles west of Glasgow. The mill site was approved by the Warren County Court on May 1, 1798 and the mill was built shortly thereafter by stone mason Killian Kreek. When Killian Kreek and his wife Margaret Kreek sold the mill to Simon Buford in October of 1799, the county of Barren had been formed. Killian and Margaret signed the deed with their German names "Gullian Grieg and Margaret Grieg."

Over the years the mill has been known as Kreek's Mill, Buford's Mill, Crenshaw's Mill, Short's Mill, Denton's Mill, Staples' Mill, and possibly several other names. It was most likely last operated in the 1940's. When the mill was purchased in 1957 by Davie's great-grandfather, John E. Powell, the wooden top floors were falling down. After making the picture from which this sketch is made, Mr. Powell had the top floors removed and the stone first floor reinforced and roofed over with a loft room.

Barren County's second mill stands silently through the seasons and watches Beaver Creek flow swiftly by as it has done every day for more than 180 years. If it could only talk....

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FARM RECORDS OF ROBERT MOSELEY SANDERSON

Abstracted by Margaret L. Hill, 248 Berrywood Drive, Severna Park, MD, 21146. Peggy is a great-granddaughter of Robert Sanderson.

Robert Moseley Sanderson, a native of the Big Island community of Bedford County, Virginia, came to Barren County, Kentucky, around 1849, when he was a young man of twenty-two. In Virginia, he had worked from the age of fourteen in a Lynchburg tobacco warehouse, and he continued in this line of work in Kentucky, managing William M. Wilson's tobacco warehouse in Horse Cave for several years. Eventually, Robert was able to purchase a farm on Walton's Mill Road, in the Salem community of Barren County. (Since 1954, when the Sanderson farm passed from family ownership, the owners have been G. D. Whitaker, T. A. Bradly, and, most recently, Steven L. Savage.)

In 1854, Robert Sanderson married Elizabeth Carrington King, daughter of John and Betsy Priest King of Barren County. The Sandersons had eight children: Billy (m. Lizette Gardner, Laura Wright, Laura Watkins), Blen (m. John W. Ellis), Ned (m. Fannie Parrish), Cattie Lee (m. P. L. Terry), Alex and Bob (both of whom died in childhood), Nat (m. Fannie Farris) and John (m. Daisy Shaw).

In 1964, my aunt, Mrs. Belinda Richardson of Smiths Grove, Kentucky, youngest child of John and Daisy Shaw Sanderson, gave me three books of Sanderson farm records. The bound notebooks had been used not only by Robert Sanderson but also by John Sanderson, who purchased the family farm from his widowed mother. Robert numbered the pages of the notebooks, but neither he nor John used the pages in consecutive order! All three notebooks, in addition to surviving the normal ravages of time, were submerged, wrapped in plastic, in flood water for nine days in August 1967, in Fairbanks, Alaska.

I have arranged the abstracts in chronological order and have referred to Robert M. Sanderson by his initials. In some places, I have retained his original spelling.

1857 - Farm prices included three bushels clover seed, \$26.10; 1½ bushels corn, \$1.00; rye straw, \$4.00; 4,000 bundles oats, \$50.00; 72 shocks stock fodder, \$5.76; one barrel salt, \$5.20; three bushels timothy seeds, \$9.16; one sorrel mare, \$100.00; one iron gray mare, \$150.00; one roan mare, \$200.00; one black horse coalt, \$50.00; sows, \$8.00 each; shoats, \$1.50 each; one specle cow, \$20.00; one white heaffer, \$10.00; sheep, \$1.00 each; four blind bridles, \$6.00; one gallon whiskey, 80¢; window sash, \$4.00; two fine sheep, \$5.00.

Pd. Jno. B. Farris for 2½ days plowing, \$2.00. Pd. H. Parker \$7.50 for twelve days work; pd. A. Parker \$12.50 for 17 days work. Pd. E. R. Smith for harvesting, \$5.00. Paid I. Hatcher \$5.00 for work on barn.

RMS received threshing money from Jim Pace, \$39.50; Thos H. King, \$15.00; James Nuckols, \$6.00. (RMS apparently had a farming partnership with Thomas H. King, his brother-in-law.)

In <u>1859</u>, two hammers and two augers were \$2.40; knife and one sifter, \$1.56; licensed Eli B. Crane, \$2.00; grin(d)stone and crank, \$5.85; one axe, \$1.50; pd. Ben Nevel for making grindstone, \$1.00; three boxes rat exterminator, \$.65; pd. Joseph T. Berry for ½ bushel sweet potatoes, \$.50; pd. Robt. Shaw for doctoring gray mare for bighead, \$5.00.

Also in 1859, RMS bought 70,186 lbs. of tobacco for Smith & Bristow for \$4,848.39, from George Lyons, Ed Berry, Mrs. Susan Ellis, Robt. Parker, Isaac West, George Morrow, Garland Ford, H. Berry, Isaac Smith, Jno. H. Lewis, J. S. Barlow, Samuel T. Davis, William West, Samuel T. Davis' Black Boy, Jack Parker, Thos. Bethell, O. D. Watters, Wm. Pace, E. R. Smith, W. P. Redford, Mrs. Ellis' Black Boy Chas., Mrs. Jane Gerles (Geralds?), C. Robards, Presly Owens, Wm. Rhea, M. E. Parker, P. Knuckles' Black Boy, Robt. Lyons, W. S. Farris, Robt. Shaw, P. Curd's Black Boy, James Knoble, J. T. Berry's Black Boy, Thos. Watters, N. G. Terry. \$95.00 was paid for delivering tobacco to the depot.

(I feel certain that the slaves named actually did receive the proceeds from the sale of tobacco. Perhaps, as exceptional workers, they were allowed to sell for their own profit tobacco raised in excess of a quota. Or possibly, they were actually working completely on shares.)

In 1860, oats were still 50¢ per bushel, flour was $3\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per lb., wheat was \$1.25 per bushel, coffee was 18¢ per lb., and lard was 11¢ per lb.

1861 - Shelton Martin commenced pasturing horse 24 May. Robert Jolley commenced pasturing horse 4 January.

1864 - W. P. Davidson put six hogs in clover field 25th May. Other neighbors who pastured livestock in the Sanderson fields that year were Henry Parker, Marsh Tobscott, Jack Parker, M. W. Fishback, W. L. Wilson, and Samuel Preston. RMS did not list the charge for renting his fields.

1865 - Jno. Durham commenced work for RMS on April 26, 1865. George Sanders commenced work on May 3rd, 1865.

From November 18, 1865 to December 1866, Mrs. Henry Deweese worked for the Sandersons and was furnished supplies at the following rates: meal, 50¢ per bushel; "2nd rate" flour, 2½¢ per 1b.; 1 bushel Irish potatoes, \$1.00; 14 lbs. salt, 25¢; four pairs of shoes (in December!), \$9.60; 49 lbs. hogs heads and ribs, \$1.96; flour, 6¢ per 1b.; one hat and 6 yds. shirting, \$3.75; bacon, 20¢ per 1b.; 230 sweet potato slips, 60¢; coffee had more than doubled since 1860, at 3 lbs. for \$1.00; soap, 6¢ per 1b.; one pair of shoes in October 1866, \$2.25; and pork, 10¢ per 1b.

Benjamin, "Black Boy," commenced work September 10 at 50¢ per day. To December 2nd, he worked 58 days for \$33.00. Due RMS, \$34.25. Ben paid over \$1.25. Among supplies advanced were one pot rack, 50¢; 10 lbs. coffee, \$5.00; 20 lbs. sugar, \$6.00.

(I believe this Benjamin to be a former slave willed to Cattie B. King, sister-in-law of RMS, by her father John King in 1841. A black man named Benjamin Sanderson appears in the 1880 Census of Barren County, Kentucky, as head of household. I believe this to be the same man.) RMS paid R. M. Claton (Clayton) for laying one bull tong plow, \$1.25; sharping two plows, 30¢.

<u>1866</u> - William Deweese commenced work 7th May; Bowling (Bolling) Fourqueson (Ferguson) Commenced work 18th April. Daniel, Black Boy, worked 28 days for \$14.70; settled. Mathew France worked March-Dec. 22 and was advanced one pair boots, \$8.00; one hat, \$2.00. Harrison Lee, Black Boy, commenced work February 5. George Hamilton commenced work November 13 and worked 35 days for \$20.15.

Cattie B. King owed RMS \$135.25, including \$1.00 as a subscription for missionary; settled January 1, 1868.

E. Williams bought a hind quarter of mutton, 15 lbs., for \$1.05.

Henry Deweese put his cow in clover April 18th at \$2.00 per month.

In this post-war year of 1866, RMS bought 26,216 lbs. of tobacco for \$5,003.96, from 24 fellow Barren countians. One, Albert Vance, sold his "entire crop of tobacco raised in 1865 to R. M. Sanderson to be delivered to him at his barn in good prizing by 1st May. When delivered as above, said Sanderson is to pay me ten dollars per 100 lbs. round. This January 19th, 1866." /S/ Albert Vance. "January 22, let A. Vance have seventy dollars on his crop tobacco." This transaction is accompanied by the original 3¢ revenue stamp.

In an undated transaction, probably in 1866, RMS purchased two bedsteads from his brother-in-law, Thomas H. King, for \$22.00.

<u>1867</u> - Lee Peck worked January 5, 1867-August 28, 1868. Other workers on the Sanderson farm that year were Henry Deweese, A. F. Williams, James Brooks, Henry Redford, William Green, John W. King, Willis Sanderson, and Jacob (no surname given).

I believe Willis Sanderson to be the former slave named Willis willed to Mrs. Sanderson in 1841 by her father, John King. On the following page of the book is found "Willis, Black Boy, commenced work March 26th, 1867 at \$10.00 per month." Willis had apparently been living in another location for some time, as he was advanced \$1.00 to pay freight. Supplies advanced to Willis were charged at the following prices: one cherry bedstead, \$4.00; one oven and lid, \$1.50; one bushel of meal, 75¢; flour at 8¢ per lb.; one pair of shoes, \$2.50; 10 lbs. of salt, 15¢; bacon, 14¢ per lb.; one pair of boots, \$5.00; one coat, \$2.50; taxes, \$2.00; hat, \$4.00; pair pants, \$4.00.

1868 - Silas Francis, man of color, commenced work llth day of February 1868 at \$12.00 per month. Waller Francis commenced work 15th April at \$12.00 per month. He worked one month and quit. Settled in full by cash.

"Cattie B. King due 1868 to RMS. The proper account cannot be found. This is from recollection." To Globe Company, \$14.00; for gate and hinges, \$3.50; for bridle, \$1.50; summer bonnett, \$9.00; money spent in Glasgow, \$15.00; winter bonnett, \$8.00; hoops, \$3.00; cossett, \$2.50; doll, \$1.50; Thurman & association, \$6.00; subscription N. G. Terry, \$2.50; taxes, \$4.20; going to Glasgow in December, \$10.00; Munfordsville Fair, \$2.00. 1869 - Eggs were 12½¢ per dozen; salt, 14 lbs. for 20¢; bacon, 18¢ per lb.; four bushels turnips, \$1.50. Wages were up to \$15.00 per month.

Thos. Brooks lost time while working on the Sanderson farm: fixing hen house, $\frac{1}{2}$ day; to go for garden seed, 1 day; to work garden, 3/4 day; sick, $5\frac{1}{2}$ days; to work garden, 1/3 day; wife sick, $\frac{1}{2}$ day; to go to church, 1 day; to go to election, 1 day; to work road, 1 day; to go to sale, 1 day; to look for home, 1 day; to kill hog, $\frac{1}{2}$ day.

1870 - Workers on the Sanderson farm included Joseph Thompson, Jasper Higdon, Gene Hawkins, Buck Pace, Andy Martin, Chas. Morrow, James Crump, Robt. Davidson, and Eldridge (no first name given). Wages were up to \$16.00 per month, \$20.00 for Jasper Higdon.

Wheat was down to \$1.00 per bushel; one bushel of Irish potatoes remained at \$1.00; coffee was up considerably to 25¢ per lb.; ham meat, 20¢ per lb.; apples, 50¢ per bushel; one bottle Smith's tonic, \$1.00; one pair shoes, \$2.40; one bridle, \$1.75; one pair boots, \$3.25; one hat, \$1.65; 6 yds. of domestic, 90¢; one spool of thread, 10¢; one pair socks, 50¢.

1871 - Workers included James Webb, Thos. Webb, James Fitzjearlds, George Ralston. Day work was 50¢ to \$1.00 per day, depending on the type of work done: gathering corn and chopping, 50¢ per day; planting corn, 60¢ per day; stacking oats, \$1.00 per day.

1872 - Workers included William Lee, William Owens, Jo. Eubanks, James FitzJearlds, Peter Parrish. William Lee earned \$10.00 per month.

Meal was up to 65¢ per bushel; flour was down again to 4¢ per lb.; butter, 25¢ per lb.; apples, up to \$1.00 per bushel; Irish potatoes, down to 80¢ per bushel; sweet potatoes, \$1.00 per bushel; ham meat, down to 13¢ per lb.; side meat, 10¢ per lb.

Peter Parrish was advanced supplies such as 8 yds. cotton goods, \$2.40; coat and pants, 75¢; one pair shoes, \$2.00; one under dress, 75¢ (presumably for Mrs. Parrish or Jennie). Both Jonnie and Jennie Parrish helped in the fields.

<u>1873</u> - Two of the farm workers were Levi Tolley and Isaac Young. Flour is up to $4\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per lb.; meal is down to 60¢ per bushel; lard, 10¢ per lb.; hind quarter of beef, 5¢ per lb.; salt is a little over 1¢ per lb.; an 8 gallon keg of syrup varies from \$5.74 to \$6.30; wheat is still \$1.00 per bushel; coffee is up again to $25\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per lb.

1874 - James Savage, P. Brown and Wm. Smith each earned \$13.00 per month.

1875 - John Barden, John Crofford (Crawford), Henry Ray, Levi Tolley and Tom Loy (or Lay) earned wages ranging from \$12.00 to \$15.00 per month. Levi Tolley's Grange dues were \$1.20.

Coffee is up to 27¢ per lb.; meal is up to 75¢ per bushel; apples are down to 75¢ per bushel; shoulder meat, 10¢ per lb.; side bacon, 14¢ per lb. 1876 - Levi Tolley was still working for RMS; other workers were Albert Stokes, Henry Goff, Clay Brown and Henry Redford. Wages varied from \$10.00 to \$14.00 per month.

An agreement between R.M. Sanderson and Henry Redford is dated 1 Jan. 1876, and provided for Redford to cultivate 8 acres tobacco, cut, house and strip; 10 or 12 acres wheat, cut and stack; 20-30 acres corn, gather; to furnish hands sufficient to cultivate above mentioned crops; Redford to have Cattie B. King house "to live in, garden and orchard and fire wood;" one half of the tobacco, half of wheat; first and second parties "each paying the threshermen for threshing the wheat; first to furnish one horse or mule and fead for same." ..."The second part binds himself to the good care of all the houses, especially of the dwelling house and fruit and shad(e) trees of the yard." The "1st part is to pay the smith acct. for the farm tools." Contract to December 25, 1876. /s/ Robt. M. Sanderson

1877 - Levi Tolley's name appears again. Coffee is down to 24¢ per lb.; a 10 gallon keg of molasses, \$7.50; Irish potatoes are back up to \$1.00 per bushel; sugar is 10¢ per lb.

1880 - Jackson Hill, Robt. Cox, George M. Ray, Thos. Church, Henry Evrett, Emma Turner, Benjamin Loller (Lawler), Jim McGuier, Lewis Rasdale, and John Bibb were among the farm workers on the Sanderson place. Wages ranged from \$8.00 to \$12.00 per month.

Price samplings included meal, 37½¢ per lb.; "flower," down again to 3½¢ per lb.; 16 lbs. salt, 25¢; molasses, 40¢ per gallon; oven and lid, \$1.00: skillet and lid, 75¢; sifter and tray, 75¢; pair scissors, 75¢; Irish potatoes, up to \$1.20 per bushel; coffee, down to 20¢ per lb.

"Notice - Executors Sale: On Saturday, January 31st, 1880, I will as Executor of Johnson Owen, Dec'd, offer for sale on the premises one and half mile East of Cave City, Barren County, KY, two undivided interests of onethird each in and to the tract of land allotted to Mrs. Amy Owen as the widow, said, of Johnson Owen, Dec'd."

1882 -"This agreement made and entered into this day between Robt. M. Sanderson and Thos. Church, both of the County of Barren and State of KY. Witnesseth: Robt. M. Sanderson of the first part is to let the second part have eight acres of land for tobacco and eighteen acres of land for corn and as much land for oats as the 1st part may see proper for the 2nd part to have now. The 2nd part binds himself and boys to cultivate the above mentioned land according to the 1st part's direction and the second part further binds himself and boys to make two thousand rails and put them where the 1st part may direct into a fence."

1894 - Paid for Ned's house: For plank to Prichard, \$25.00; for doors, windows, plank, etc., \$33.00; for shingles, \$20.00. (Ned was the Sandersons' second son. When he married, he was given a piece of the original farm.)

Bull served red cow with star in forehead August 23rd, 1894. Due to calve April 23rd, 1895.

"This contract made and entered into this day between Robt. M. Sanderson of the 1st part and L. H. Costler (or Coaster) of the 2nd part, both of the County of Barren and State of KY. The 1st agrees to furnish to the 2nd part, twelve acres for corn and three acres for tobacco, tools and team to cultivate said land in corn and tobacco, and the house and garden at the west side of the Farm to live in, and teame to cultivate said garden and haul his fire wood. First part agrees to give the 2nd part one-third of the corn and one half of the tobacco above mentioned to cultivate said land in corn and tobacco good. The 2nd part agrees to house two-thirds of the corn and strip the tobacco, and to take good care of teame and tools, and feed teame and cleane out fence corners where he cultivates. And it is expressly understood that whatever the first part may furnish the second part, it is (to) come out of second part's 1/3 of the corn and ½ of his tobacco. The first agrees to furnish the second part as much as Eight dollars per month in provisions or money to enable the second part to cultivate the above mentioned crop.

Witness our hand and seals this March 6th, 1894."

Robert made no more entries in these three books after 1894. In 1895, his youngest son, John, married, and the young couple also lived on the family farm. Robert Sanderson turned over more and more of the farm management to John. For a time, Robert and his wife, "Lizzie," lived in Cave City in a small white frame house across the street from the Baptist Church. (This is the house owned for many years by the late Mr. and Mrs. Will Reynolds.)

Robert Moseley Sanderson died February 5, 1906. He and Lizzie are buried in the small family burying ground on the original Sanderson farm about a mile and a half southeast of Cave City, Kentucky, on Waltons Mill Road. The cemetery, recently restored, can be seen in a field on the north side of the road.

PENSION RECORDS OF ANDERSONS IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

WILLIAM ANDERSON, Virginia, S36403

Application filed 20 Feb 1820 by William Anderson, "aged 65 years on the 13th next", of Barren Co., Kentucky. Enlisted in Feb 1776 for two years in Capt. Matthew Jouitt's company, Maj. William Nelson's battalion, 7th Va. Regt. under Col. Alexander McClanahan. Served one year, 10 months. About 1814 William's son Robert bought his father's property at a sheriff's sale. In Feb 1821 William described his family as consisting of his wife, age 60, & granddaughter aged between 13 and 15 years. William died 14 Feb 1837.

ROBERT ANDERSON, Virginia, W28

Application filed 13 Nov 1832 by Robert Anderson, resident of Jackson Co., Tennessee, aged 72 years "next January". Born 29 Jan 1761 in Hanover Co., Virginia. Lived in Hanover Co. when called into service, from there moved to Mercer Co., KY then to Barren Co., KY, and in 1817 to Jackson Co., Tenn. Robert died 18 Apr 1836 in Jackson Co. His widow Molly (or Mary) applied 12 Mar 1839 at Jackson Co., stating she married Robert at the beginning of 1789 in Hanover Co., VA., by Reuben Ford, a Baptist preacher, and their oldest child, Matthew, was born 20 Feb 1790. Hanover Co., VA., court record shows Robert Anderson Married Mary Martin, spinster of Hanover, on 24 Nov Family record shows: Robert (the middle initial G. seems to 1789. have been added later) Anderson Jr. b. 28? Mar 1801; John (middle initial B seems to have been added later) Anderson b 17 Feb 1804; Sarah Glen? Anderson b Mar 1792; Matthew b 20 Feb 1790; William Tomson? Anderson b 18 Feb 1795; Elizabeth 18 Jul 1796? 1798?. Molly filed again 30 Oct 1848 from Jackson Co., aged 84.

ROBERT ANDERSON, North Carolina, Virginia, W2579, Bounty Land Warrant #34,821,160-55

Robert was born 25 Mar 1763 in York Co., PA.; resided in Rockbridge Co., VA., when entering the service. Served as a private under Capts. Millikan, Gilmore, Paxton, and Col. McDowell. Moved to Washington Co., N.C. (later Tennessee), and served under Capt. Sevier and Col. Robertson. Was at Kings Mountain, Cowpens and Guilford Court House. Married in 1814 or 1815 Mrs. Nancy (Ping) Brown per a bond executed 8 Dec 1814 in Pulaski Co., KY. She was the widow of John Brown, whom she had married in Lincoln Co., KY in 1789, and who died in 1811 in Pulaski Co. Robert Anderson applied for pension 15 Apr 1833 while a resident of Pulaski Co., where he died 29 Aug 1841 or 24 or 27 Aug 1844. Nancy lived in Pulaski Co. in 1853, aged 93, with a daughter. Supposed to have had several children by Brown. No Anderson children are mentioned. Robert Ping, a neighbor, relationship to Nancy not stated, was living in Pulaski Co., in 1853, aged 47. Lewis Ping mentioned in 1844 testifying to the death of Robert Anderson. Joseph McAlister of Pulaski Co. made affidavit in 1833 regarding Robert's service.

WOLFE--DEVASHER

Among the various papers that survived the fire that destroyed the Allen Co. Court House at the turn of the century is a deed which was filed in 1880, and is as follows:

State of KentuckyAllen CountyG. W. Harris clerk of the Allen County Court

Certify that the foregoing Allotment of Dower and Division of the land of William Devasher deed to his Wife or Widow, Elizabeth Devasher and his heirs .. as filed at the <u>Feburary</u> Term of this Court, July the 9th, 1880 Which is received by the court as and for the division of Land & allotment of dower of the Widow and heirs of William Devasher decd. as aforesaid which is ordered to be recorded which is with this certificate recorded in my office given under my hand this the 19th day of February 1880.

The DeVasher family came to Barren County as an early day. John C. DeVasher born 1778 came to Barren County prior to the War of 1812. He was the son of Doctor Joseph (John) DeVasher who, according to living legend, was a surgeon for the Hessians during the Revolutionary War, but defected to the American side and served during the war under General Francis Marion. The DeVasher family was known as "Walser" or "Walzer" in German and later "DaWalser".

Prior to John C. DeVasher's removal to KY, he married Elizabeth L. McDaniel born 1782. Their oldest son was William L. Devasher b. 1803. Other sons that were well known in Barren Co. were Alexander DeVasher born 1811 and buried near Lucas and John DeVasher who is buried near the Walnut Creek Boat Dock.

William L. DeVasher (1803-1876) mar. Elizabeth Calvert (1813-1895). Elizabeth Calvert was the dau. of John Calvert (1792-1856) and Jane Russel (1789-1832). John Calvert also came to Barren Co. at an early day and was a soldier in the War of 1812. His family is buried in the Calvert Cenetery on the Bill and Ada Hagan Tracy farm near Fountain Run.

The children of William and Elizabeth DeVasher were: 1. John C. DeVasher b. ca. 1831, mar. Margaret Aphlin. (John C. DeVasher lived near the present Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church in Warren Co. KY. He gave the land on which the church was built.) 2. Betsy J. DeVasher born ca. 1834.

3. William Tol. DeVasher (Feb. 23, 1837-Oct. 2, 1915) buried at Fountain Run, KY. "Tol" DeVasher was a Baptist minister. He mar. Mimervie Glover and when she died he mar. _?_ Mitchell.

4. Polly (Mary A.) DeVasher b. 1842, d. March 28, 1876, mar. John J. Wolfe in Allen Co., KY.

5. Delila C. DeVasher b. ca. 1849, mar. Green Biby.

6. Joseph W. DeVasher b. ca. 1846, mar. Con Spears.

7. Thomas DeVasher b. ??, never married.

8. Nancy (Elizabeth) DeVasher mar. Samuel Hatler. They had one

After William L. DeVasher's death, his widow, Elizabeth DeVasher, lived with their son, Joseph DeVasher. She raised Jimmy Hatler.

Mary A. "Polly" DeVasher mar. John J. Wolfe in Allen Co. KY, November 17, 1860. John J. Wolfe (1836-1679) was the oldest son of James Raymond Wolfe (May 1, 1815-Sept. 30, 1895). James R. Wolfe appears in the 1850 census of Sumner Co., Tenn. His first wife died and he remarried. He had several sons by his second marriage: J. D. "Dave" Wolfe who lived in the Boyce Community of Warren County; Henry Wolfe; Fletcher Wolfe (a half brother to Dave and Henry) and others, whose names I don't recollect. These Wolfe's lived near the Warren-Allen County line. James R. Wolfe appears to have moved to this area ca. 1857. He is buried in the Rather Graveyard in Allen Co., KY.

I. Margaret was the daughter of Thomas and Peachy Walker of VA, and was the sister of Dr. Thomas Walker. Anne McCoun, daughter of James and Margaret Walker McCoun, was the wife of Robert McAfee and they were the parents of Robert Breckinridge McAfee, the historian.

II. Elizabeth Tilford was the daughter of James and Elizabeth Tilford. Her sister, Nancy Ann Tilford, married James McCoun, Jr., brother of her husband John. The Tilfords were related to the Mathenys, David and Jeremiah.

III. Patsey (Martha?) Cardwell was the daug. of John and Nancy Tilford was the daughter of _____? We are inclined to believe that this Nancy Tilford (wife #2 of Samuel) was his first cousin.

IV. Jane Isabella Eccles was the daughter of John Eccles who mar. Nancy Shepherd on Dec. 11, 1800 in Mercer Co., KY. (Believe John sold his property in Mercer Co. in the 1830's...but we're not sure which county he moved to from there.)

V. Helen Mary Conway was the daug. of Daniel and Elizabeth Ann Woods Conway. Her grandmothers were nee Worley and Wilson.

The Gaunts were also inter-related. Mary "Polly" Gaunt, a cousin of Robt. B. McAfee, mar. Henry Eccles 8-13-1805. Bondsman: John Gaunt. Polly's mother was Mary McAfee, who m. #1. John Poulson and #2. Thos. Gaunt.

Henry Eccles was the Bondsman for Esther Eccles when she married Joseph McCoun 6-18-1816. Samuel Eccles was the Bondsman for Jane Eccles when she married Robert McCoun.

In consideration of the love she has for Christianity, she deeds to the Christian Church (trustees) and their successors, so long as the church is kept up - to wit - a certain tract of land on which the Mt Gilead Meeting house now stands, on the waters of East Fork Creek, in Monroe County, Ky., 1/2 acre, except the standing timber reserved to Hagan - so long as church is kept up at that place.

Parties of the second part (Christian Church) agree to repair the house and make it good and comfortable by 8 December 1872, otherwise deed is void.

BOOK REVIEW - KENTUCKY "SKAGGS" RECORDS - By Juanita Skaggs Luttrell. Copyright 1982 - 818 pages, softbound - copies priced at \$30.00 order from Juanita Skaggs Luttrell, Box 296, Leland, ILL, 60531-0296

This book has been donated to our society by Mrs Luttrell for review, and we are very pleased to recommend it to any person who is interested in Skaggs research.

The book is composed of the results of fifteen years of intense research about the Skaggs family who settled in the south central Kentucky area, and eventually spread over the entire state. The front portion of the book includes general information about the family from the grandsons of an Irishman who came to Maryland during the seventeenth century to the descendants of those same grandsons, Henry Skaggs and his cousin William Skaggs who were famous Long Hunters and brave early pioneers.

There are many maps, a 13 page section containing a Mormon index of Kentucky Skaggs, Kentucky Land Grants, as well as a listing of the formation dates of all the Kentucky counties.

The balance of the book consists of very valuable information from 36 Kentucky counties, which are listed alphabetically, and gives source material such as census records - many of them including the 1900 census, court records such as deeds, marriages, wills, court orders, etc, cemetery records, vital statistics, tax records - all records from every source available to the compiler.

Mrs Luttrell does not attempt to build the family tree of each branch of the family; she gives you the material from which you may construct your own family tree. This book will save the Skaggs researcher many hours of valuable time and is well worth your consideration.
