Nurse practitioners are advanced practice registered nurses, meaning more schooling is necessary than that of just registered nurses. A master's degree must be obtained in addition to taking and passing a national certification exam and earning a state license. Nurse practitioners are able to work in a variety of places, such as hospitals, schools, clinics, and physician's offices. Depending on the state, however, most nurse practitioners work independently, but all consult with physicians and other health care professionals. The average salary for nurse practitioners is about \$95,000, with the expected job outlook to be 31%, which is much faster than normal.

The duties of nurse practitioners include, but are not limited to, diagnosing health problems and prescribing medication. In order to limit the number of children in hospitals and the amount of time spent there, nurse practitioners undertake health promotion and disease and illness prevention. With the care of pediatric nurse practitioners, children and families have had better hospital experiences. Families are now more knowledgeable and more confident in providing care for less serious illnesses in the home. Now, more than ever, the usual hierarchy of leadership in the medical field is stepping back to a more community inspired way of working, where equal teams are more effective than just a physician leading. Nurse practitioners are just as needed as physicians and administrative staff.
