HOPKINSVILLE, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Hopkinsville, the county seat of Christian County, is situated in southwestern Kentucky. Hopkinsville, with a 1980 population of 27,318, is located only 73 miles northwest of Nashville, Tennessee; 170 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 245 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri.

Christian County, covering 722 square miles, is Kentucky's second largest county. Situated in Kentucky's Pennyroyal Region, Christian County is bordered on the south by the Kentucky-Tennessee state line and to the north is the Western Coal Fields Region. In 1980, Christian County had a population of 66,878.

The Clarksville-Hopkinsville, Tennessee-Kentucky Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area includes Montgomery County in Tennessee and Christian County in Kentucky. In 1980, the population of the SMSA was 150,220.

The Economic Framework

The total number of Christian County residents employed in 1982 averaged 21,550, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 20,170 workers. Manufacturing employers in the county reported 3,220 workers; wholesale and retail trade 4,000; state and local government 2,480; and 2,845 persons in service occupations. Manufacturing employment is greatest in the apparel and related products; primary metals; electrical machinery; fabricated metal products; and rubber and plastic products industries.

Per capita personal income in Christian County in 1981 was \$7,648. Between 1977 and 1981 per capita income increased by 40 percent.

The Hopkinsville labor market area includes Christian County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Caldwell, Hopkins, Muhlenberg, Todd and Trigg plus Montgomery and Stewart Counties in Tennessee. The total number of residents in the Kentucky portion of the labor market area employed in 1982 averaged 68,380 with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 64,430 workers. Manufacturing employers in this area reported 8,820 workers; wholesale and retail trade 10,220; state and local government 6,630; and 8,165 persons employed in service occupations.

Resources for Growth

1. Labor Supply - There is a current labor supply of 11,380 men and 9,960 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1983 through 1987, 10,970 young men and 10,305 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

2. Transportation - Rail service is provided to Hopkinsville by Seaboard System Railroad and Illinois Central Gulf Railroad. Major highways serving Hopkinsville are the Pennyriple Parkway, a multilane toll road, and U.S. Highways 41, 41A, and 68. Interstate 24 is accessible 13 miles south of Hopkinsville or 16 miles west of the city. Twenty common carriers have authority to serve Hopkinsville. The Hopkinsville-Christian County Airport has one paved runway, 5,000 feet in length. Commuter air service is available 20 miles to the south at Outlaw Field. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Nashville Metropolitan Airport, 79 miles to the southeast.

3. Power and Fuel - The Hopkinsville Electric Plant Board, supplied by Tennessee Valley Authority, provides electric service to Hopkinsville. Electric power is provided to Christian County by Pennyriple RECC, supplied by Tennessee Valley Authority, and by Kentucky Utilities Company, an electric generation and transmission company. Natural gas service is provided by Western Kentucky Gas Company whose source of supply is Texas Gas Transmission Corporation. There are two distributors of propane and eight distributors of distillate fuel oil in Hopkinsville.

4. Education - The Christian County School System is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and serves 9,500 primary and secondary students. In addition, there are four nonpublic schools in Hopkinsville and the Fort Campbell School System in southern Christian County.

Hopkinsville Community College, a part of the University of Kentucky Community College System, offers associate degrees in Management Technology/Business Management, Law Enforcement Technology, Nursing, Secretarial Administration, and Human Services/Mental Health. The Fall 1982 headcount enrollment was 1,164.

There are three universities and two other community colleges within 72 miles of Hopkinsville. In addition, nine institutions of higher education are located in Nashville, Tennessee, 73 miles from Hopkinsville.

The Madisonville State Vocational-Technical School in Madisonville, 34 miles north, offers instruction in 19 courses. The Christian County Area Vocational Education Center in Hopkinsville offers training in 10 courses.

THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Hopkinsville Labor Market Area includes Christian County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Caldwell, Hopkins, Muhlenberg, Todd and Trigg. The southern boundary of Christian County is formed by the Tennessee state line. The Hopkinsville Labor Market Area also encompasses the two adjoining Tennessee counties.

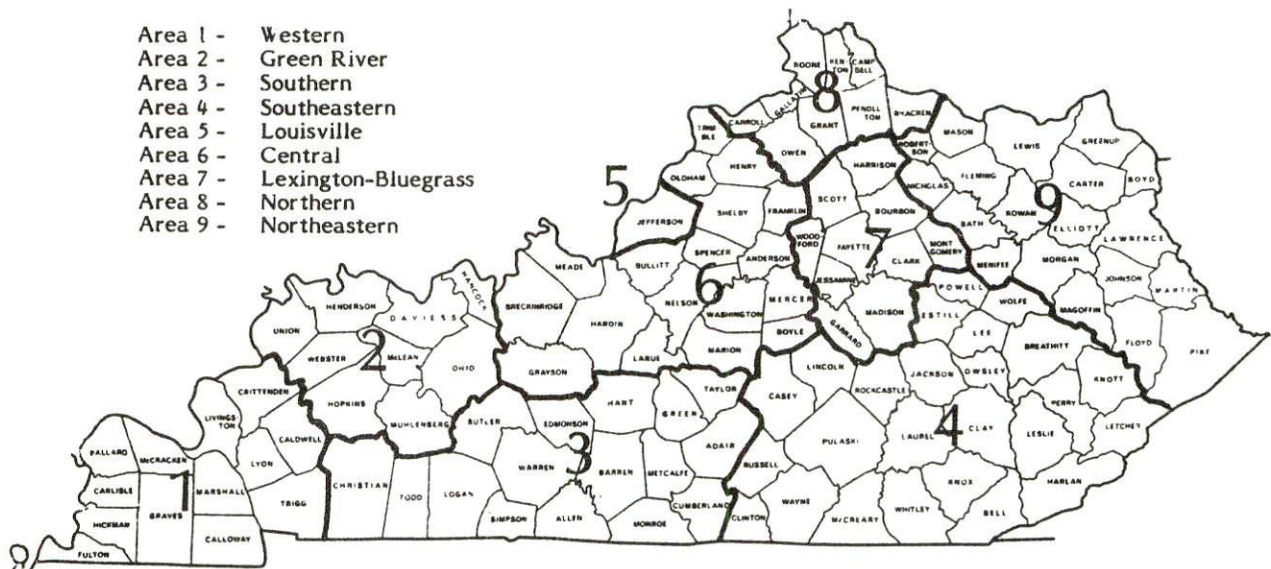

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Highways

Major highways serving Hopkinsville are U. S. Highways 41, 41A and 68, all "AAA" rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. Hopkinsville is the terminus of the Pennyriple Parkway, a multi-lane toll road. The Pennyriple Parkway serves Hopkinsville with four interchanges and extends north to connect with the Western Kentucky Parkway, 25 miles from Hopkinsville.

Interstate 24, a major east-west route, serves Christian County. Interstate 24 is accessible 13 miles south of Hopkinsville via U. S. 41A or 16 miles west of Hopkinsville via U. S. 68.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.224 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

The University of Kentucky's Hopkinsville Community College offers two years of transfer or college parallel courses; associate degrees in Management Technology/Business Management (with further options in Data Processing, Agricultural Business and Banking), Law Enforcement Technology, Nursing, Secretarial Administration, and Human Services/Mental Health; and a variety of credit and noncredit courses. In addition, the college works with business and industry to provide job-related courses for their employees. The community college also conducts examinations for the certification of professional secretaries, General Education Development Tests (G.E.D.'s), and State Merit Examinations (for employment with state government) twice monthly. The Fall 1982 headcount enrollment was 1,164.

Vocational Schools

Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers are operated by the Kentucky Department of Education. The state vocational-technical schools enroll persons full time who are at least 16 years of age and not in school. These students attend classes for six hours each day. RECREATION

Local

Hopkinsville offers a variety of public recreation facilities. Public facilities include ten parks, eight playgrounds, three swimming pools, eighteen tennis courts, eleven baseball diamonds, one football field, two soccer fields, a nine-hole golf course (par-3), two gymnasiums, and a fishing lake. New public facilities including a senior citizen's walking course, a BMX track, an 18-hole miniature golf course, and batting cages are expected to be completed during 1983.

The **Hopkinsville-Christian County Recreation Department** employs a full-time director and staff. Supervised recreational programs include classes in golf, tennis, swimming, arts and crafts, soccer, aerobics and special programs for the handicapped. Sports leagues include men's and women's softball, basketball and volleyball; co-ed softball and flag football; boys' and girls' softball; little league and Babe Ruth league baseball; junior league basketball; pee wee football; and soccer.

Private recreational facilities include a golf and country club, swimming pools, bowling lanes, riding stables, three movie theatres, a roller skating rink, trap shooting facilities, and a racquetball and health club.

The **Western Kentucky State Fair** is held at the Christian County Fairgrounds each summer. A horse show, horse races, tractor pulls, and performances by famous entertainers are featured. The fair is the largest in western Kentucky.

The **Pennyroyal Area Museum** is in Hopkinsville. The museum houses exhibits of Civil War and Jefferson Davis items, Indian relics, and early pioneer displays.

Several organizations in Hopkinsville hold periodic performances, programs or exhibits throughout the year. These organizations include the **Pennyrile Players**, a community theatre group; the **Hopkinsville Art Guild**; the **Pennyrile Rose Society**; and the **Pennyroyal Arts Council, Inc.**

Area (Within 60 miles)

Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine is located 10 miles east of Hopkinsville at Fairview. The shrine is at the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, a former U. S. Senator, Secretary of War, and the only president of the Confederate States of America. The 16-acre park contains a 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top for viewing, a museum, a gift shop, and a playground with picnic tables.

Embraced by probably the most beautiful wooded area in Western Kentucky, **Pennyrile Forest State Resort Park** near Dawson Springs is located approximately 21 miles northwest of Hopkinsville. The lodge and cottages nestled within the trees provide excellent accommodations. Other facilities and activities include a dining room, a gift shop, rental rowboats and pedal boats, a 9-hole golf course, hiking trails, horseback riding, picnicking, playgrounds, shuffleboard, swimming at the lodge pool and off a sand beach, and two tennis courts. Lake Beshear, only four miles from the lodge, sports good fishing.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, 29 miles west of Hopkinsville near Cadiz, is located on the scenic Little River embayment of the 58,000-acre Lake Barkley. The magnificent lodge includes 120 rooms, four suites, nine cottages, a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, two meeting rooms, and a recreation room. An activities center with a capacity for 400 and a 80-site campground are located near the lodge. A lodge pool, a beach and a bathhouse, an 18-hole golf course, tennis courts, a riding stable, a trapshooting range, a basketball court, hiking trails, playgrounds, and a picnic area comprise the recreational facilities. The marina near the lodge has everything for the "boat lover": covered and open slips, launching ramp, and rentals for fishing boats, skiing boats, and pleasure ride pontoons.

The Land Between the Lakes, located on a 170,000-acre wooded peninsula approximately 35 miles from Hopkinsville, is an outdoor recreation and conservational education center. Camping, swimming, fishing, boating, hiking, a buffalo herd on a 250-acre range, an Environmental Education Center for school study groups, an educational farm and a central station with films and displays are among the attractions.

Charm and serenity exemplify **Kenlake State Resort Park** which is located on the 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake, approximately 43 miles west of Hopkinsville. The park offers hotel and cottage accommodations and an efficient camping site. Other facilities include a 9-hole golf course, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, boating, picnicking, playgrounds, shuffleboard, planned recreation, and one of the finest tennis complexes in the area.

Kentucky Dam Village State Resort, located 53 miles northwest of Hopkinsville at Gilbertsville, is one of the largest and most popular vacation resorts in Kentucky. A modern lodge with 72 rooms, six different cottage types, and a 225-site campground make up the accommodations. There is also a dining room overlooking the 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake, a coffee shop, a snack bar, two gift shops, a meeting room, an activities center, and a recreation room. Recreational activities to choose from include boating and fishing at the largest docking facility in the Kentucky parks system, golf at the 18-hole Village Green Course, hiking, horseback riding, picnicking, swimming at the lodge pool or off the sand beach, and tennis.

Lake Malone State Park, located in southern Muhlenberg County, approximately 60 miles northeast of Hopkinsville, offers camping facilities, swimming, fishing and boating on a 788-acre lake. Playground facilities and picnic shelters are located in a beautiful scenic cliff area. Located across from the entrance to the park is an inn featuring luxury rooms, a restaurant, a swimming lake, a beach, boating, fishing, tennis, and nature trails.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

An expansion and renovation of the city's sewerage treatment system was recently completed. A new treatment plant, with a design capacity of 3,000,000 gallons per day, was constructed to supplement the existing treatment plant. Other aspects of the project include renovation of the old treatment plant, construction of five new pump stations and installation of 16 miles of collector mains. Total cost of the project was approximately \$35,000,000.

In 1982 an eight-story building which houses the Jennie Stuart Medical Center's administrative offices, ancillary services and patient care rooms was completed. The new building represents the third and final phase of the hospital's master plan to renovate and expand the hospital facilities.

Three new manufacturing firms began operations in Hopkinsville during 1982. C & F Stamping currently employs 50 workers and manufactures plastic injection moldings. White Hydraulics currently employs 35 workers and manufactures hydraulic motors. International Paper Company employs 70 people and manufactures folding cartons.

Under Way

Hopkinsville is a participant in the Governor's Economic Achievement Recognition (GEAR) Program. GEAR, utilizing a team of economic and community development professionals, helps communities identify and solve specific economic development problems or needs. Four projects have been implemented in connection with GEAR in Hopkinsville:

- 1) Preparation of a market analysis of the city's central business district.
- 2) Identification of historical sites with potential for tourism development.
- 3) Establishment of a revolving loan fund for revitalization of downtown Hopkinsville.
- 4) The "Sixth Street Redevelopment Project" which calls for revitalization of historical structures, sidewalks and street improvements along Sixth Street.

Major projects under way within the Christian County School System include the construction of a new \$250,000 stadium and football field and a new \$115,000 maintenance building.

Planned

Several new retail businesses plan to locate in Hopkinsville during 1983. Construction is under way for facilities to house two major grocery stores, a fast food restaurant and two movie theaters.



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
