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




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FULTON, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Fulton, the larger of two incorporated cities in Fulton County, is located in the Jackson Purchase Region of extreme western Kentucky. The city is situated on the Kentucky-Tennessee state line, adjacent to South Fulton in Obion County, Tennessee. The two cities utilize many common facilities and unite in efforts to ensure economic and cultural growth. Fulton is a three-time recipient of the "Kentucky Certified City" award, based upon progress in community and economic development. Fulton is 49 miles south of Paducah, Kentucky; 125 miles northeast of Memphis, Tennessee; and 200 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri. Fulton had a 1986 estimated population of 2,910 persons.

Fulton County, covering 211 square miles, is bordered to the south by Tennessee; to the north by Hickman County, Kentucky; and to the west by the Mississippi River, which separates Fulton County from Missouri. The county had a 1986 estimated population of 8,007 persons.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Fulton County residents employed in 1987 averaged 3,179. In 1986, manufacturing firms in the county reported 982 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 789 jobs; 197 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 534 employees; and contract construction firms provided 56 jobs.


Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 3,063 men and 4,367 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1988 through 1992, 2,023 young men and 1,861 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - The Illinois Central Gulf Railroad provides main line rail service to Fulton. Fulton is served by the Jackson Purchase Parkway, a multi-lane toll road which connects with Interstate 24, 50 miles to the northeast. The city is also served by U.S. Highways 51 and 45, plus Kentucky Highways 94, 129, 166 and 307. The Hickman-Fulton County Riverport, a major riverport on the Mississippi River, is 20 miles distant. There are 19 common carriers with authority to serve the city. The nearest scheduled commercial airline services are available at Paducah, Kentucky, 49 miles north of Fulton. The Fulton Municipal Airport has a 2,700-foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided by the Fulton Electric System and the Hickman-Fulton Counties RECC. The Tennessee Valley Authority is the source of power to both systems. The City of Fulton, Public Works Department, supplied by Texas Gas Resources Corporation, provides natural gas service. There are 4 distributors of distillate fuel oil within 20 miles.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided by the Fulton Independent School System and the Fulton County School System. There are four institutions of higher learning within 50 miles of Fulton. Vocational education is available at the West Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School in Paducah, 49 miles north, and at the Fulton County Area Vocational Education Center in Hickman, 24 miles east of Fulton.



AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES

Fulton County is served by the Mayfield local office of the Kentucky Department for Employment Services. The focus of the following data is on job placements made by the Mayfield local office and may therefore be used as an indicator of the wages which employers in the area pay new employees. During the twelve months which ended on June 30, 1987, the local employment office filled 3,150 job openings in various occupational categories. 

Highways

Fulton is the southern terminus of the Purchase Parkway, a multi-lane toll road through extreme Western Kentucky. The Purchase Parkway connects with Interstate 24, 50 miles northeast of Fulton, and locally with U.S. 45, U.S. 51, and Kentucky 166, all "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways serving Fulton include Kentucky 94, Kentucky 129, and Kentucky 307.

U.S. Highway 51 connects Fulton with Interstate Highways 40 and 55 near Memphis, Tennessee, 125 miles southwest; and with Interstate 57, 48 miles northwest. U.S. 45 provides access to Interstate 24, 45 miles north of Fulton, and to Interstate 40, approximately 65 miles south of the city.

Water

The nearest navigable waterway is the Mississippi River at Hickman, 20 miles west of Fulton, where riverport facilities are available. Hickman-Fulton County Riverport Authority has completed a \$2.4 million general cargo facility within the Hickman Harbor, a still, warm-water harbor on the Mississippi River.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The city of Fulton is served by a mayor, four commissioners, and a city manager. The mayor is elected to a four-year term and the commissioners serve two-year terms. Fulton County is served by a county judge/executive and four magistrates. The judge/executive and magistrates serve four-year terms.

Local Fees and Licenses

The City of Fulton levies a one and one-half percent occupational license tax on wages of individuals. Occupational license tax on businesses is based on the type of business. Manufacturers pay an annual fee based upon number of employees: less than 50 - \$100, 50 to 100 - \$150, and over 100 - \$200. The city also levies an unloading license fee of \$75 annually and a city vehicle license fee of \$10 annually.

A 3 percent tax is levied on utilities receipts for schools in the Fulton County School District. Tax is paid by all consumers of utilities as an add-on to the utilities bills. Exempted are receipts from utilities services that are resold and the receipts from the sale of energy or energy producing fuels that exceed 3 percent of the cost of production in manufacturing, processing, mining or refining.

State and Local Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky, except items exempted by the state constitution, is taxed by the state. Property which also may be taxed by local jurisdictions includes land and buildings, finished goods inventories, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and office equipment. Local taxing jurisdictions in Kentucky include counties, cities, and school districts.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Vocational Training

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

Vocational training is available at both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers. The state vocational-technical schools are post-secondary institutions. The area vocational education centers are designed to supplement the curriculum of high school students. Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers offer evening courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

Arrangements can be made to provide training in the specific production skills required by an industrial plant. Instruction may be conducted either in the vocational school or in the industrial plant, depending upon the desired arrangement and the availability of special equipment.

RECREATION

Local

The City of Fulton's 35-acre public park contains four baseball diamonds, four double tennis courts, picnic shelters and playgrounds. Supervised baseball activities are offered here in the summer.

A public park in South Fulton, Tennessee, contains two tennis courts and a baseball diamond.

The Willow Plunge Corporation, a nonprofit organization in Fulton, charges admission to its swimming pool and tennis courts.

A country club near Fulton features an 18-hole golf course, swimming pool, and three tennis courts. Other private recreational facilities in the area include one drive-in movie theater, a bowling alley, supper clubs, and a youth recreation center.

The International Banana Festival is held annually in Fulton and draws thousands of visitors. This festival, celebrating the area's historic role as a center for the redistribution of bananas, is a tribute to the community's warm relationship with Latin America as well as with its sister community, South Fulton, Tennessee, which also takes part in the festival.

Other annual events in the area include the Summer Salute to Agriculture, sponsored jointly by the Hickman-Fulton County Chamber of Commerce and the Fulton-South Fulton Chamber of Commerce, and the Mississippi River water festivities which are the highlight of the Fourth of July "Spirit of America" celebration at Hickman, 20 miles to the west.

Area (Within 65 miles)

Reelfoot Lake and the Kentucky Bend are approximately 25 miles from Fulton. Reelfoot Lake is a 70-square mile lake in Kentucky and Tennessee known for its fishing. Kentucky maintains a 2,000-acre wildlife area near the lake for hunting. The Kentucky Bend is land totally separated from the state by the Mississippi River. Both lake and bend were created in 1811 and 1812 by the largest earthquakes ever recorded in North America.

A Confederate cannon, a network of earthen trenches, and a massive chain and anchor give the feeling of being transported back to the Civil War. All of this and more can be discovered at Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park at Columbus, 23 miles northwest of Fulton. Other attractions at the 156-acre park include a 38-site campground, a gift shop, a historical hiking trail, miniature golf, a picnic area, and a playground. A visit to the museum at the park, which is in a building that served as a Civil War infirmary, offers a display of Civil War relics and early Indian artifacts and an audiovisual slide program on the Battle of Belmont.

Charm and serenity exemplify Kenlake State Resort Park which is located on Kentucky Lake, 45 miles northeast of Fulton. The park offers hotel and cottage accommodations and an efficient camping site. Other facilities include a 9-hole golf course, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, boating, picnicking, planned recreation, an activities room, and one of the finest tennis complexes in the area.

Paducah is located 49 miles north of Fulton. As Kentucky's seventh largest city, Paducah provides many recreational opportunities. Points of interest include the Alben W. Barkley Monument; the Barkley Museum; the Market House Square-Museum; quarter horse racing at the Bluegrass Downs; Whitehaven, an 1860 antebellum home; riverboat rides aboard the Zachary Taylor; and many other attractions.

Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park, located 55 miles northeast of Fulton near Gilbertsville, is one of the largest and most popular vacation resorts in Kentucky. A modern lodge with 72 rooms, a small lodge with 14 rooms, 67 cottages, and a 221-site campground make up the accommodations. The park includes a 4,000-foot lighted airstrip. There is also a dining room overlooking Kentucky Lake, a coffee shop, a snack bar, two gift shops, a meeting room, an activities center, and a recreation room. Recreational activities to choose from include boating and fishing at the largest docking facility in the Kentucky parks system, golf at the 18-hole Village Green Course, fishing, hising, horseback riding, picnicking, swimming at the lodge pool or off the sand beach, and tennis.

The Land Between the Lakes, located on a 170,000-acre wooded peninsula, is an outdoor recreational and conservational education center. The Golden Pond Visitors Center offers a multimedia theatre/planetarium and observatory. Camping, swimming, fishing, boating, hiking, a buffalo herd on a 250-acre range, an Environmental Education Center for school study groups, an educational farm and a central station with films and displays are among the attractions. Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley are among the top fishing and water sport recreation areas in the southeastern United States. The Land Between the Lakes area is approximately 55 miles northeast of Fulton.

Lake Barkley State Resort Park, 63 miles northeast of Fulton near Cadiz, is located on an embayment of Lake Barkley. The magnificent lodge includes 130 rooms, five suites, 13 cottages, a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, two meeting rooms, and a recreation room. An activities center with a capacity for 1,000, a complete fitness center, and an 80-site campground are located near the lodge. A lodge pool, a beach and a bathhouse, an 18-hole golf course, a pro shop, tennis courts, a riding stable, a trapshooting range, a basketball court, hiking trails, playgrounds, and a picnic area round out the recreational facilities. The marina near the lodge has everything for the "boat lover": covered and open slips, a launching ramp, and rentals for fishing boats, skiing boats, and pleasure ride pontoons. An airport, including a 4,800-foot lighted airstrip, is available.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Recent

Excell Industries and the Liggett Corporation have recently expanded their operations in Fulton.

The Parkway Regional Hospital (a \$6 million, 70-bed facility) was completed in 1985 and is now in the process of making a \$400,000 expansion of its facilities.

The Fulton Electric System recently completed construction of a new substation, a new brick office building adjacent to the downtown area, and finished converting the system from $4\ KV$ to $12\ KV$.

A \$2 million middle school addition to the Fulton County Elementary School was recently completed. An all day, every day kindergarten program was recently instituted. A \$45,000 Fulton County High School computer (funded with school/community partnership) was recently installed.

Under Way


A downtown revitalization and beautification project is currently under way in Fulton.
