
CORBIN LABOR MARKET AREA



Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers is protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data is compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for eleven regions of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Commerce, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The state rate is \$0.315 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100.

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100.

RECREATION

Local

Public recreation facilities available in Corbin include a swimming pool, two mini-parks with playground equipment and picnic areas, six tennis courts, four ball fields, seven outdoor basketball courts, a football field, and a recreation center.

The Corbin Recreation Commission offers a year-round recreational program for all ages. A supervised playground program is available during the summer months and sports enthusiasts may participate in leagues for baseball, softball, T-ball, football and basketball. Classes in karate, judo, and disco dancing and a recreation program for senior citizens are offered at the recreation center. A \$350,000 city park is under construction with two multi-purpose fields and three tennis courts to be completed by the fall of 1980. A multi-purpose court, picnic area and camping area, and three shelter houses with restrooms will be added during the next three years.

Facilities at the Tri-County Country Club in Corbin include a golf course, swimming pool and two tennis courts. Other private facilities include a bowling facility, skating rink, miniature golf course, golf driving range and one indoor and one outdoor movie theater.

The Nibroc Festival (that's Corbin spelled backwards) is observed each summer and includes parades, folk music, square dancing, a midway and horse show, and the coronation of a queen. Arts and crafts and gun and coin shows, and old-fashioned bargain days are also a part of the festivities.

Laurel River Lake, located in the Daniel Boone National Forest, is a 5,600-acre lake that offers camping, fishing, boating, and swimming. Several areas around this new lake are now under development. A 28-acre site picnic area, picnic shelter, playground area, hiking trail, and restroom facilities, only 2 miles from Corbin, are nearly complete. A 50-slip marina, vehicle-access campground, and an amphitheater are to be constructed approximately 5 miles from Corbin.

Area (Within 50 miles)

Cumberland Falls State Resort Park is located 10 miles southwest of Corbin in the Daniel Boone National Forest. The park is famous for Cumberland Falls which drop 68 feet over a rock precipice and show one of only two known "moonbows" in the world at full moon. Little Eagle Falls, a mountain creek which tumbles 125 feet into the Cumberland River, is also located in the 1,794-acre park. The park offers lodge and cottage accommodations, camping, fishing, swimming, hiking, horseback riding, picnicking, tennis, backpacking, horse shows, shuffleboard, a playground, a dance pavilion and an amphitheater.

Levi Jackson Wilderness Road State Park, 10 miles north, is an 815-acre park located where the Boone Trace and Wilderness Road pioneer trails converge. In addition to a reproduced pioneer settlement, the park offers a pool, bathhouse, hiking trails, horseback riding, shuffleboard, camp sites, picnic area, playground, and an amphitheater. The Wilderness Road is thought to be the first state-built road in the United States (1796-1875) and a section of the original road is preserved in the park.

Dr. Thomas Walker State Shrine, 22 miles southeast, is the site of the cabin built by Dr. Walker, who led the first documented expedition through Cumberland Gap around 1750. This 12-acre park contains a replica of the cabin, a playground, a picnic shelter and an amphitheater.

Pine Mountain State Resort Park, approximately 35 miles southeast of Corbin near Pineville, is a 2,500-acre park, located in the Kentucky Ridge State Forest. This park includes a 35-acre lake and is the scene of the Mountain Laurel Festival in the spring. The park also features swimming, hiking, horseback riding, shuffleboard, picnicking, playground, golf, camping, and a nature center.

General Burnside State Park, 45 miles west of Corbin, is a 400-acre park on Chandler Island in Lake Cumberland. This resort park has a bathhouse, beach, dock, fishing, 18-hole golf course, picnic area, camping facilities, and a playground.

Cumberland Gap National Historical Park is located 50 miles southeast of Corbin and is the largest national historical park in the United States. Features in this 20,816-acre park include: a frontier museum, Pinnacle Mountain that overlooks three states, three caves, an old iron furnace, and Hensley Settlement, a restored mountain village.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Industrial and Commercial

Joint efforts are under way to develop the Corbin-Tri-County Industrial Park, a 450-acre tract of land located 2 miles southeast of Corbin in Knox County.

The Louisville and Nashville Railroad has consolidated the Knoxville and Cincinnati district offices in Corbin. An office building and a communication tower have been constructed.

The coal washing plant of the U. S. Steel Corporation has completed a multi-million dollar expansion of its facilities.

The American Fidelity Bank and Trust Company has opened an office in a newly constructed building. A 23,000-square-foot expansion of the First National Bank and Trust Company of Corbin is under way at a total cost of \$2 million.

New commercial establishments in Corbin include a medical center, a pharmacy, a department store, a boat dealership, two restaurants and two car dealerships.

The size of the Trademart Shopping Center has been increased and a shopping center for small businesses and offices is being developed.

Utilities

The City Utilities Commission has constructed a 500,000-gallon storage tank and has installed a 12- and 16-inch water main to increase distribution pressure to South Corbin. A 1,000,000-gallon ground storage tank as well as 32,000 feet of 16-inch and 5,000 feet of 12-inch water line are under construction in East Corbin to the Corbin-Tri-County Industrial Park.

The City Utilities Commission is also ready to advertise for bids to upgrade and expand the sewage treatment plant to a capacity of 4.5 million gallons per day. Construction is under way to upgrade the main sewer pumping station and to install 10,500 linear feet of 24-inch sewer line and 700 linear feet of 10-inch sewer line, which will provide sanitary sewer service to the Corbin-Tri-County Industrial Park.

Phase I of the Sewer System Evaluation Study (SSES), a study designed to locate and correct sewer line problems, is nearing completion. Phase II will begin as soon as the interim report is approved by the state and the EPA.

Transportation

Officials at the London-Corbin Airport recently acquired 160 acres of land to improve facilities. A new flight service station has been constructed and a flight terminal building, additional ramp space, and a parallel taxi route are under construction and due to be completed by the fall of 1979.

Local Government

The city of Corbin is in the process of completing four flood improvement projects to correct drainage problems at Lynn Camp Creek, Bacon Creek, Rose Branch and Moore's Branch.

A major annexation program is under way which will more than double the population and triple the land area of Corbin.

Corbin city officials are negotiating for the purchase of a building which they plan to renovate for use as a new city hall.

The Cumberland Valley Area Development District is conducting a study to determine the feasibility of constructing a civic center complex in Corbin. Tentative plans for the complex, which would be developed in conjunction with a 100 to 150 room motel, include recreation and convention facilities.

The zoning ordinance and the subdivision regulations for the city of Corbin have been updated and revised. A new comprehensive plan has been completed and accepted by the city commission.

Education

The Corbin Independent School District is renovating the former high school building which will be used as a middle school. The \$1,018,000 project will provide 10 new classrooms and is scheduled to be completed by the fall of 1979. School officials are studying a new curriculum for the middle school.

An addition to the Whitley County Middle School, which will include 18 classrooms and a 2,000 seat gymnasium, is under construction and is scheduled to be completed by August 1979. A new office building for the Whitley County Board of Education is under construction and is due to be completed by June 1979.

Health

Southeastern Kentucky Baptist Hospital has recently met the requirements as a Level II neo-natal care hospital and hospital officials have requested that it be designated as such.

Recreation

A five-year plan for the development of a \$350,000 city park is under way. Two multipurpose fields and three tennis courts are scheduled to be completed by the fall of 1980. A picnic area, multipurpose court, camping area, and three shelter houses with restrooms will be developed during the next three years.

Several areas are under development near the Laurel River Lake. A 28-site picnic area, picnic shelter, playground area, hiking trail and several restroom facilities, only 2 miles from Corbin, are nearly complete. A 50-slip marina, vehicle-access campground, and an amphitheater are to be constructed approximately 5 miles from Corbin.
