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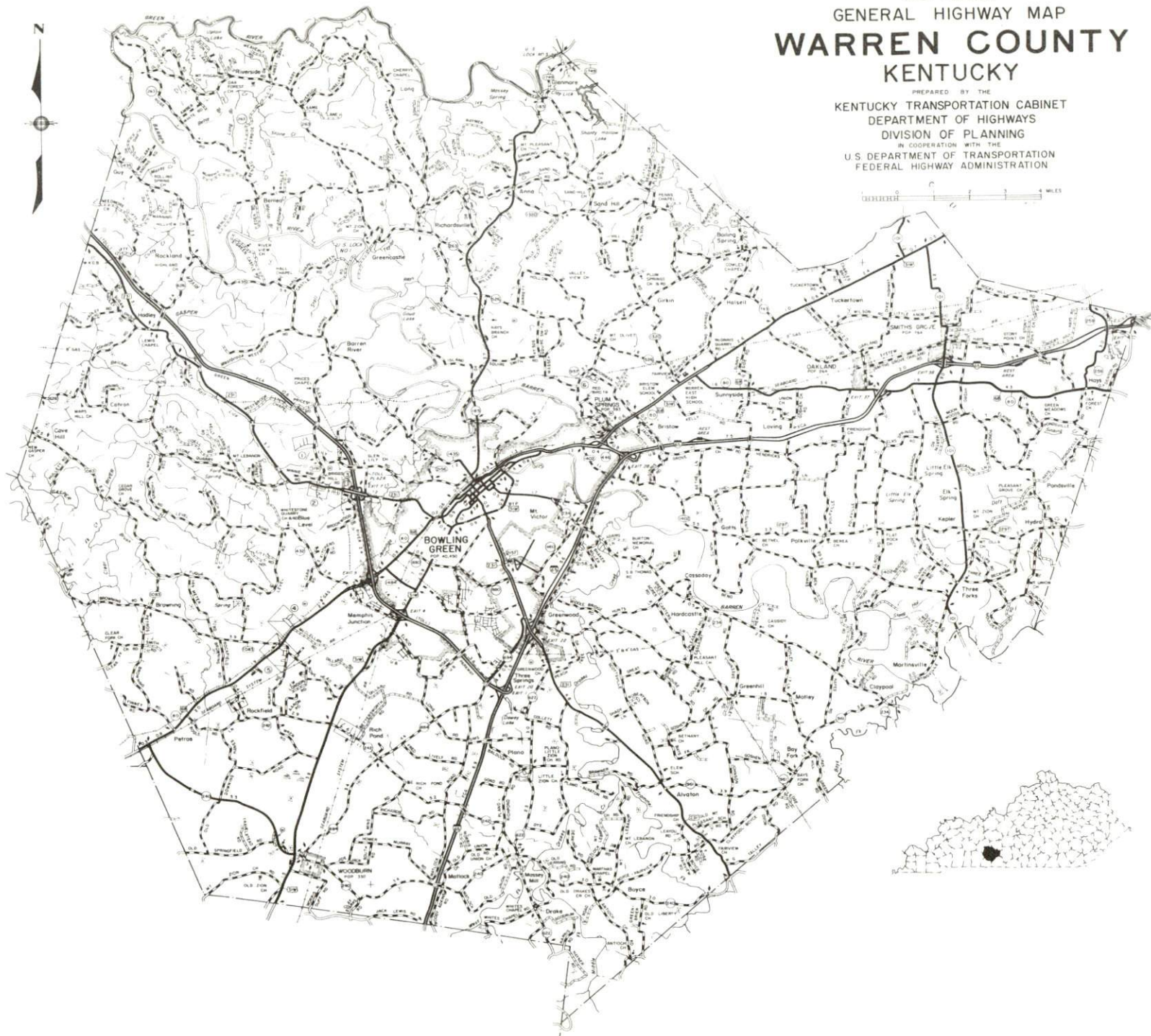

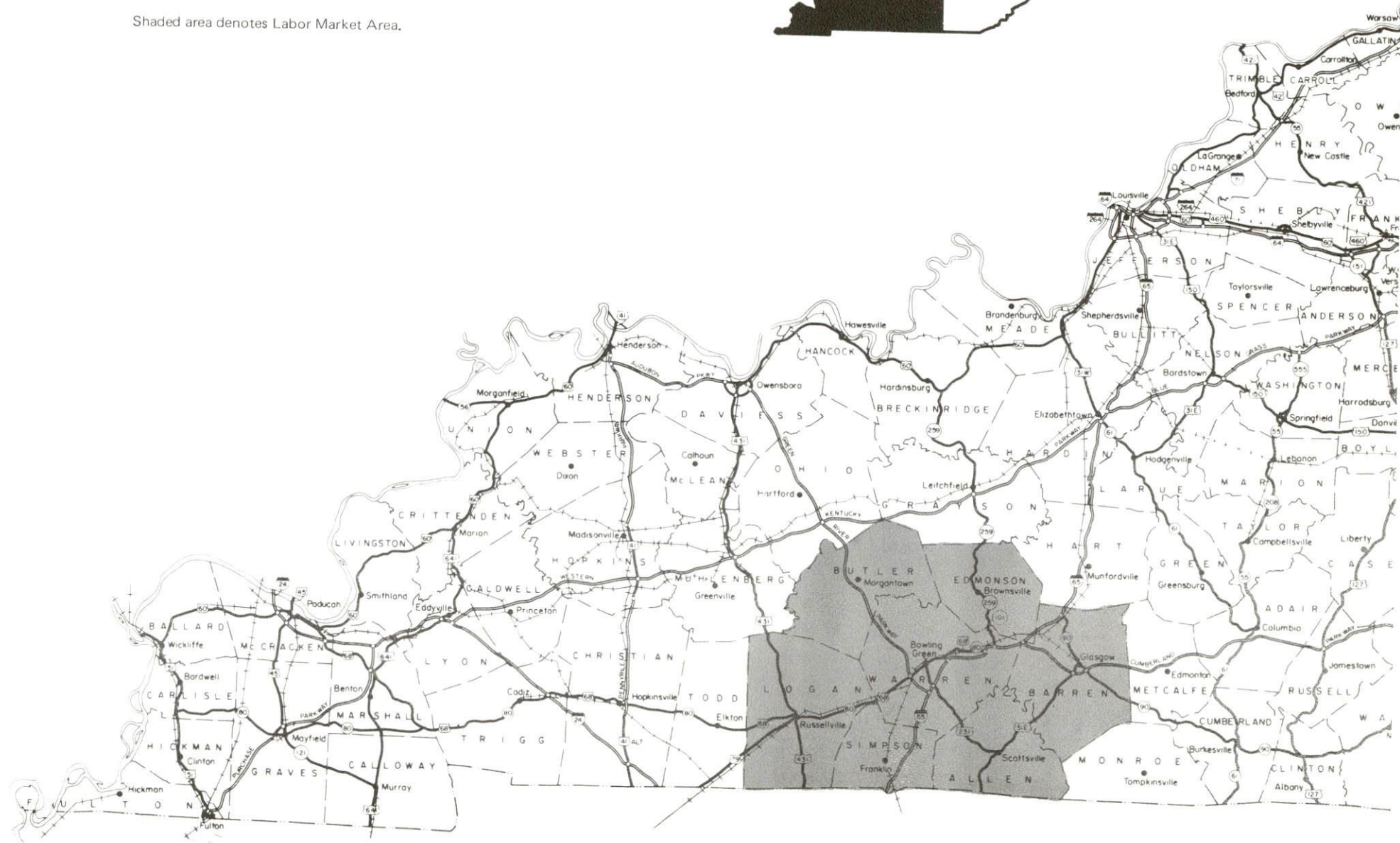
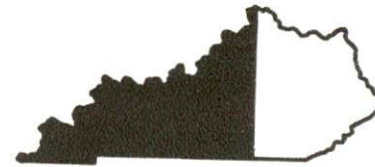
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# BOWLING GREEN LABOR MARKET AREA

## **BOWLING GREEN, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE**

Bowling Green serves as the educational, commercial and industrial center of south central Kentucky. Situated on the banks of Barren River, Bowling Green is Kentucky's fifth largest city with an estimated 1984 population of 43,899. Bowling Green is the home of Western Kentucky University and is the county seat of Warren County.

Bowling Green, 64 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee; 113 miles southwest of Louisville, Kentucky; and 278 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri is located within 600 miles of three quarters of population of the United States.

Warren County covers a land area of 547 square miles in Kentucky's Pennyroyal Region. The Pennyroyal Region is noted for its gently rolling plain and agricultural production. Warren County had an estimated 1984 population of 80,703.

### **The Economic Framework**

The total number of Warren County residents employed in 1984 averaged 36,750, with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 35,490 workers. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 8,470 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 8,095 jobs; 5,100 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 4,240 employees; and contract construction firms provided 1,130 jobs.

Per capita personal income in Warren County in 1983 was \$8,090. Between 1979 and 1983 per capita income increased by 21 percent.

The Bowling Green labor market area which includes Warren and the adjoining counties of Allen, Barren, Butler, Edmonson, Logan and Simpson. The total number of residents employed in the labor market area in 1984 averaged 84,555 with nonagricultural jobs accounting for 77,920. Manufacturing firms in the area reported 21,850 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 14,230 jobs; 8,500 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 8,200 employees; and contract construction firms provided 2,430 jobs.

### **Resources for Growth**

1. Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 12,720 men and 10,680 women available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1986 through 1990, 6,902 young men and 6,750 young women in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for work.

2. Transportation - Main line rail service is provided to Bowling Green by Seaboard System Railroad. Interstate 65, a major north-south route, serves Bowling Green with three interchanges. Bowling Green is also served directly by the Green River Parkway, a multi-lane toll road. The Cumberland Parkway, also a multi-lane toll road is 20 miles east of Bowling Green via I-65. Seventeen trucking companies maintain terminals in Bowling Green. The Bowling Green-Warren County Airport has two paved runways, 6,500 and 4,000 feet in length. The nearest scheduled commercial airline service is available at Nashville Metropolitan Airport, 70 miles south of Bowling Green.

3. Power and Fuel - Electric power is provided to Bowling Green and Warren County by the Bowling Green Municipal Utilities. Warren County is also provided electric power by the Warren Rural Electric Cooperative. Both Bowling Municipal Utilities and Warren Rural Electric Cooperative are supplied by Tennessee Valley Authority. Natural gas service is provided to Bowling Green by the Western Kentucky Gas Company which is supplied by the Texas Gas Transmission Corporation. Two distributors of propane and five distributors of distillate fuel oil are located in Bowling Green.

4. Education - Primary and secondary education is provided by the Bowling Green Independent School System and the Warren County School System which are both accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Western Kentucky University is located in Bowling Green. The university's undergraduate division offers a bachelor's degree in 89 academic majors plus 30 associate degree programs. The Graduate College offers six masters degree programs, the specialist degree and Rank I and II programs. The Fall 1985 enrollment was 11,259.

The Bowling Green Junior College offers thirteen business-oriented programs through seven academic departments. The Fall 1985 enrollment was 600

In addition, eleven institutions of higher education are located within 65 miles of Bowling Green.

The Bowling Green State Vocational-Technical School offers training in 33 courses.



## THE LABOR MARKET AREA

The Bowling Green Labor Market Area includes Warren County and the adjoining Kentucky counties of Allen, Barren, Butler, Edmonson, Logan and Simpson.

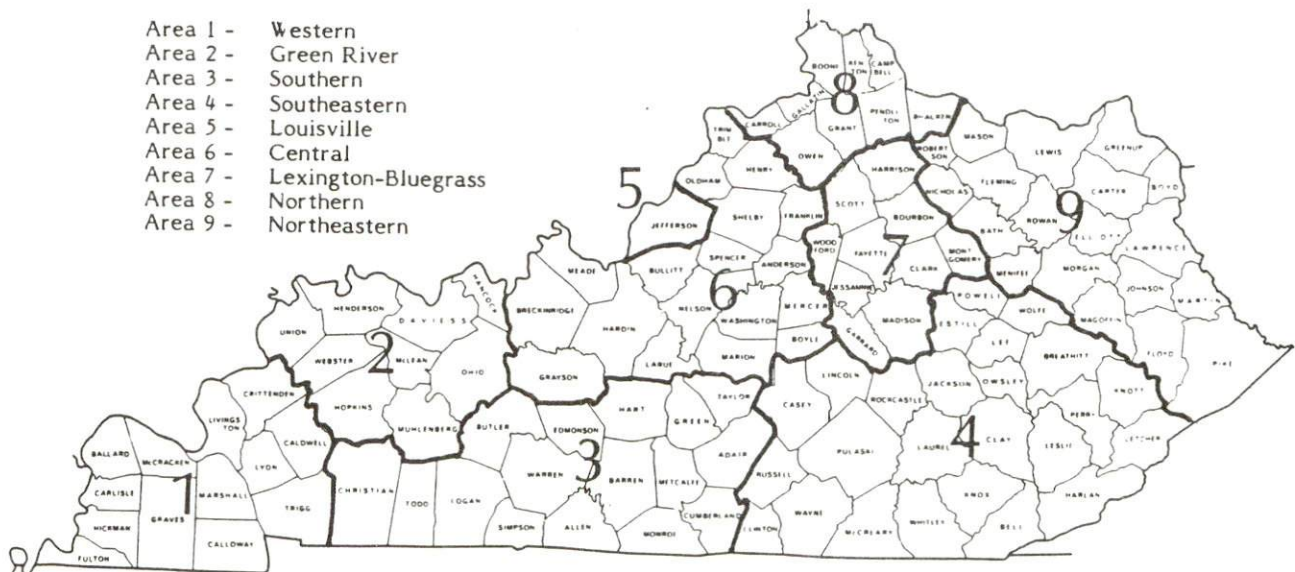

Occupational wage rates for specific industries are usually not available to most government agencies, and wage data furnished to state employment agencies by individual industrial employers are protected from disclosure by federal law. The most reliable up-to-date wage information can be obtained by direct contact with local employers.

Associated Industries of Kentucky, a voluntary organization of Kentucky businesses, regularly collects occupational wage rates and fringe benefits data from participating member firms. Data are compiled for over 127 clearly defined office, production, and service occupations. Tabulations are published for nine geographical areas of Kentucky, as shown on the map below. It should be noted that the data may be weighted by the preponderance of firms in the larger cities and may be somewhat higher than the rates paid in the smaller communities. Data from these tabulations are available, upon request, from the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

### Highways

Bowling Green is served by an excellent highway system. Interstate 65, a major north-south highway, serves Bowling Green with three interchanges. The Green River Parkway, a multilane toll road, directly serves the city with three interchanges and provides access to major east-west routes, including the Western Kentucky Parkway, 37 miles northwest of Bowling Green. Access to the Cumberland Parkway, another multilane toll road, is only 20 miles northeast of Bowling Green via Interstate 65.

Other major highways serving Bowling Green are U.S. Highways 31W, 68 and 231, all "AAA" rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways.

Several highway construction projects are planned in the Bowling Green area. Turning lanes are to be added on Scottsville Road, from Ashley Circle to I-65, in 1986. The widening of Cemetery Lane and addition of a new interchange with I-65 are planned for 1986-87. Victoria Boulevard, a north-west connector is planned for 1988.

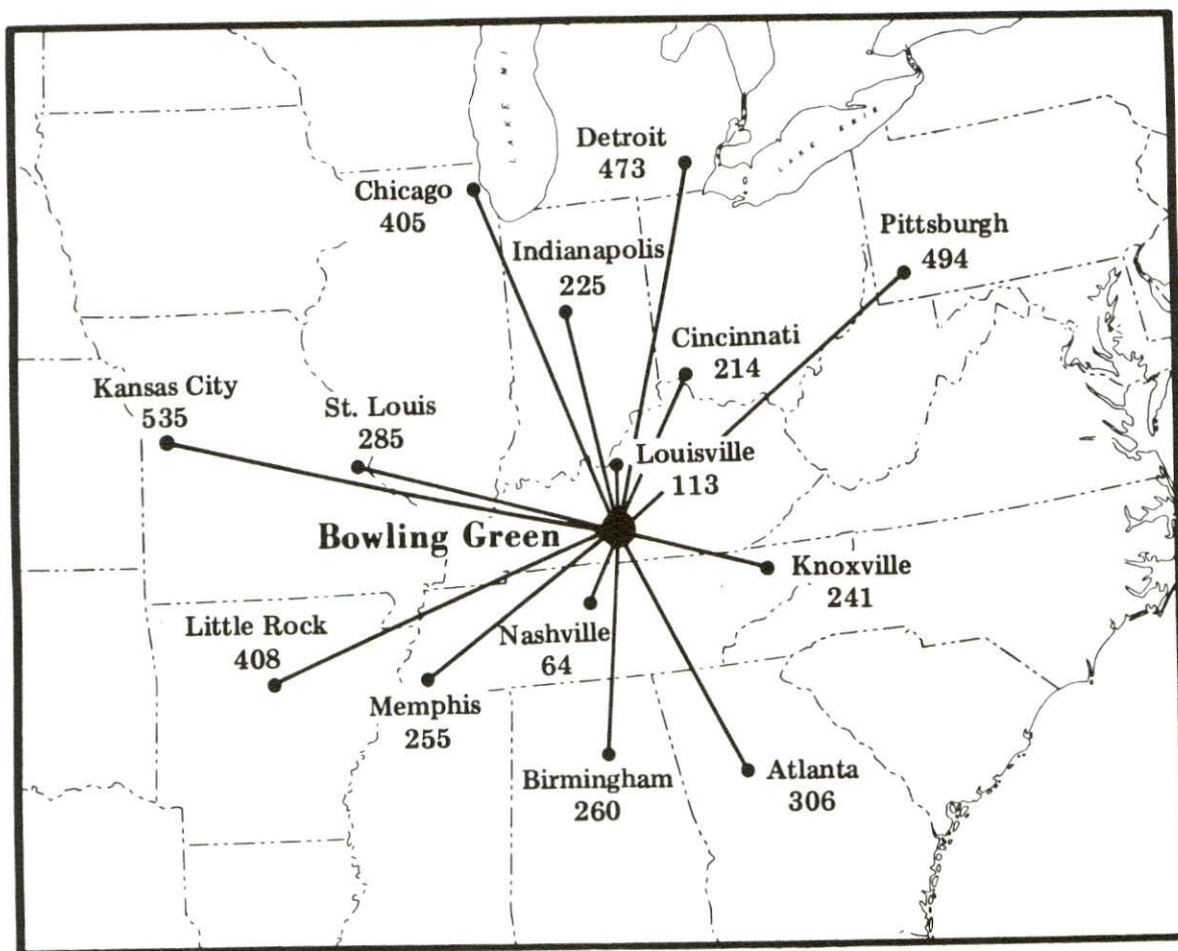

## Property Taxes

All property in Kentucky is assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value.

Land and buildings are taxed by the state and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. The 1985 state rate is \$0.22 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Manufacturing machinery, raw materials inventories, pollution control equipment, and goods in the process of manufacture are not subject to local taxation. The state rate is \$0.15 per \$100. (**Note:** Effective January 1, 1986, the state rate for raw materials and goods in process will be reduced to \$0.001 per \$100.)

Other tangible personal property owned by manufacturers (automobiles, trucks, finished goods, office furniture, office equipment) is taxed by the state at \$0.45 per \$100 and may be taxed by local jurisdictions. (**Note:** Effective January 1, 1986, the state rate for finished goods will be reduced to \$0.001 per \$100.)

Intangible personal property located in Kentucky (money in hand, shares of stock, notes, bonds, accounts receivable, and other credits) is taxed by the state at \$0.25 per \$100, and is not subject to local taxation.

Property stored in public warehouses in a transit status is not subject to local taxation. The state rate is only \$0.015 per \$100. (**Note:** Effective January 1, 1986, the state rate will be reduced to \$0.001 per \$100.)

Private leaseholds in industrial facilities owned by cities or counties and financed by industrial revenue bonds are subject to a state tax of \$0.015 per \$100 of value (essentially the lessee's equity, adjusted for appreciation or depreciation). Local taxation is not permitted.

Western's undergraduate division provides four-year programs leading to the Bachelor of Arts, the Bachelor of Fine Arts, the Bachelor of Science, the Bachelor of Science in Nursing, and the Bachelor of Music degrees. Eighty-nine academic majors and areas, sixty academic minors, and twelve pre-professional programs are available. Thirty associate degree programs are offered leading to the Associate of Arts degree, Associate of Science degree and Associate of Liberal Studies degree.

The Graduate College offers the Master of Arts, Master of Arts in Education, Master of Business Administration, Master of Science, Master of Music, and Master of Public Service. Western also offers the Specialist Degree in Rank I and Rank II programs. Joint doctoral degree programs are offered in cooperation with the University of Kentucky and cooperative doctoral degree programs are offered with the University of Louisville.

The Department of Industrial and Engineering Technology at Western Kentucky has established a baccalaureate degree program in Computer Integrated Manufacturing Technology. The program encompasses the aspects of computer intergration currently in progress in industry with a special emphasis on production techniques.

## **Bowling Green Junior College**

Bowling Green Junior College is also located in Bowling Green. Thirteen programs are offered through six academic departments including Secretarial Science, Accounting and Finance, Medical Administration Assistants, Business Administration, Fashion Merchandising and Computer Programming. The Fall 1985 enrollment was 600.

## **Vocational Schools**

Both the state vocational-technical schools and the area vocational education centers are operated by the Kentucky Department of Education. The state vocational-technical schools enroll persons full time who are at least 16 years of age and not in school. These students attend classes for six hours each day. The area vocational education centers are designed to accommodate high school students who are at least 15 years of age. These students attend vocational school for three hours each day. In Bowling Green, the high school program and the adult program are both taught at the state vocational-technical school. The state vocational-technical schools and the area education centers offer courses to enable working adults to upgrade current job skills.

## RECREATION

### Local

The city of Bowling Green and Warren County each maintain full time recreation departments which provide over 650 acres of public parks and facilities. Both parks' departments provide various leagues, tournaments, instructional programs, crafts and other activities.

The Bowling Green Parks and Recreation Department maintains 500 acres of parks and facilities which include two 9-hole golf courses, tennis courts, softball/baseball fields, volleyball courts, basketball courts, swimming pools plus picnic and playground facilities and a community center.

Renovation of Covington Woods Park was completed in Fall 1985. The \$175,000 project included lighting of two tennis courts, one basketball court and a playground; the installation of handicapped playground equipment, handicapped restrooms, and water fountains; and the enlarging of the parking lot.

Resurfacing of the volleyball courts, tennis courts and basketball courts at Lampkin Park was completed in Spring 1985. Also, plans include renovation of restrooms, new lighting for softball fields, a new basketball court and a new basketball court.

Refinishing of ten tennis courts at Keriakes Parks was completed in Spring 1985. Also included in the \$25,000 project was improvements to the existing pavilion.

The Warren County Parks and Recreation Department oversees 165 acres of parks, 45 acres of which are community parks maintained by the county. Facilities include softball/baseball fields, tennis courts, football/soccer field, BMX track, junior archery range, junior rifle range, picnic areas, playgrounds and a community center.

The Capitol Arts Center presents live theatre, dance and music by professional touring companies and local art groups. The renovated movie theatre has a 850-seat capacity as well as being the home of the Houchens Art Gallery.

Places of historical interest in Bowling Green are Mariah Moore House, built in 1818 by the city's founding father, Robert Moore; Fountain Square Park, the original hub of community activities; and Hobson House, used as a Confederate munitions magazine during the Civil War.

Other facilities open to the public include ten movie theaters, two bowling alleys, and Beech Bend International Raceway. Beech Bend International Raceway, an NHRA sanctioned track, hosts several national drag racing championships.

The City of Bowling Green has plans to build a 18-hole municipal golf course. The opening of the course will be sometime in 1988.

Construction of a PGA sactioned 18-hole golf course is currently under way at Warren Meadows.

Two private country clubs are located in Bowling Green - each has an 18-hole golf course, swimming pools, and tennis courts. Other private facilities include two private swim clubs, a racquetball club, tennis club and several spas.

Western Kentucky University is the focal point for many cultural and educational activities. Hardin Planetarium, the largest in the state, is located at the university. The Kentucky Building houses an outstanding colletion of materials on the history of Kentucky and its contiguous states. Lecture series and university drama and music productions are popular attractions. The art gallery in the Ivan Wilson Center for Fine Arts has outstanding revolving exhibits.

#### **Area (Within 65 miles)**

**Barren River Lake State Resort Park**, 27 miles southeast of Bowling Green near Glasgow, is a full-facility resort park offering a resort lodge, a coffee shop, cottages, a lodge pool, a beach, riding stables, nature trails, open and covered boat slips, a 9-hole par-3 golf course, lighted handball and tennis courts, shuffleboard, park camping with a service building, a restaurant, fishing and pleasure boat rentals, picnic areas, and a playground. Barren River Lake, which covers 10,000 acres, is a popular area for skiing, sailing, fishing, and swimming.

**Mammoth Cave National Park** is located 33 miles northeast of Bowling Green near Cave City. Beneath 51,000 park acres, Mammoth Cave is among the major tourist attractions of all times. It is one of the largest cave networks ever discovered, with at least 150 miles charted on five levels and vast areas not yet mapped. Some famous sights are Snowball Dining room (267 feet below surface), Frozen Niagara, Crystal Lake, and Bottomless Pit. The park also features scenic boat trips on the Green River and nature and hiking trails. Park accommodations include a hotel with distinctive gift shops featuring native Kentucky and Southern Highland handicrafts, a motor lodge, hotel cottages, woodland cottages, and a hotel annex with budget accommodations and craft shop featuring live exhibits of broom making and weaving. Other park facilities include the hotel dining room and coffee shop, a service center, group meeting facilities, a campground, a picnic area, and tennis and shuffleboard courts.

**Nolin River Lake** is just north of Mammoth Cave National Park. The lake has a surface area of 5,800 acres and offers facilities for camping, boating, and fishing.

**Jefferson Davis Monument State Shrine** is located 54 miles west of Bowling Green at Fairview. The shrine is at the site of the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, a former U.S. Senator, Secretary of War, and the only president of the Confederate States of America. The 16-acre park contains a 351-foot obelisk with an elevator to the top for viewing, a museum, a gift shop, and a playground with picnic tables.



Noteworthy for its spaciousness, **Rough River Dam State Resort Park** at Falls of Rough is 60 miles north of Bowling Green. The 377-acre park on Rough River Lake has a 40-room lodge with a dining room, a coffee shop, a gift shop, and a meeting room. Cottages and camping sites are also available. Recreational facilities include a launching ramp, a dock with open and covered slips, fishing and pleasure boat rental, a 9-hole, 3-par golf course, a swimming pool, a sand beach with a bathhouse complex, tennis courts, an archery range, hiking trails, picnic and playground areas, and planned recreation. Cruise boat excursions on Rough River Lake are available on the "Lady of the Lake" in season.

**Lake Malone State Park**, located in southern Muhlenberg County, 66 miles northwest of Bowling Green, offers camping facilities, swimming, fishing, and boating on a 788-acre lake. Playground facilities and picnic shelters are located in a beautiful scenic cliff area. Located across from the entrance to the park is an inn featuring luxury rooms, a restaurant, a swimming lake, a beach, boating, fishing, tennis, and nature trails.

**Old Mulkey Meeting House State Shrine**, 66 miles southeast of Bowling Green near Tompkinsville, offers picnic areas and playgrounds. The house was built in 1804, and is the oldest log meeting house in the state. Daniel Boone's sister is buried in the graveyard and authentic records written in pokeberry ink are on display.

**Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historic Site**, located 69 miles northeast of Bowling Green near Hodgenville, features the log cabin which was the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln, enclosed within a granite memorial shrine. The grounds include 116 acres of the original Thomas Lincoln farm and a visitors' center with audiovisual programs and exhibits on the Lincoln family.



## COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

### Recent

Bowling Green was chosen as a "Kentucky Certified City" in five consecutive years. The award is based on achievement in the following categories: economic development, transportation, public affairs, utilities, health, commercial development, housing, education and recreation. The Certified Cities Program is sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

American Sunroof Company (ASC) has recently located in Bowling Green. Construction of the 27,500 square-foot facility was completed in Summer 1985. ASC employees approximately 45 people and manufacturers convertible tops for automobiles.

J. P. Enterprises recently completed construction of a new 40,000 square-foot facility. J. P. Enterprises, which manufactures retread tire painting machines, opened in Summer 1985.

Detrex Chemical Company completed construction of a new 13,300 square-foot laboratory-show room in Fall 1985. Also, there was a 12,000 square-foot expansion of the manufacturing division.

Dibrell Kentucky, Inc., completed an expansion of a 60,000 square-foot building in 1984. Also, \$400,000 of new equipment was purchased in 1985.

Southwestern Tobacco Company began operation in October 1984 in a new 110,000 square-foot facility.

Lord Corporation recently completed a \$4 million expansion of its production lines. The expansion increased employment by 75 people.

Eaton Corporation recently completed expansion of a new product line which manufactures electric motor controllers.

The Morning Messenger, a biweekly newspaper, began operation in Bowling Green during Summer 1985.

The News Publishing Company completed a 9,000 square-foot expansion of its existing facility in Fall 1985.

Country Oven Bakery completed an expansion of its production line in Fall 1985.

The Bowling Green Municipal Utilities Electric Division recently completed construction of a new 161/69/13KV substation. The \$1.3 million project, which also included the installation of 1.1 miles of 161 KV transmission line, was completed in Fall 1985.

Renovation of Covington Woods Park was completed in Fall 1985. The \$175,000 project included lighting of two tennis courts, one basketball court and a playground; the installation of handicapped playground equipment, handicapped restrooms, and water fountains; and the enlarging of the parking lot.

Resurfacing of the volleyball courts, tennis courts and basketball courts at Lampkin Park was completed in Spring 1985. Also, plans include renovation of restrooms, new lighting for softball fields, a new basketball court and a new basketball court.

Refinishing of ten tennis courts at Keriakes Parks was completed in Spring 1985. Also included in the \$25,000 project were improvements to the existing pavilion.

The Bowling Green Independent School System recently implemented two new programs which included a string music program and a remediation program.

Construction of a \$2.3 million 12,500 square-foot same-day surgery center, at Greenview Hospital was completed in November 1985.

WBKO T.V. Station moved into a 15,000 square-foot facility in Fall 1985.

### **Under Way**

Hills Pet Products, Inc., has started construction of a 160,000 square-foot facility in Bowling Green. Employment will start out at 70 and will increase to 125 within two years. The \$18 million facility will be completed in January 1986.

Construction of a new 37,000 square-foot psychiatric hospital facility, Rivendell of Kentucky, is currently under way. The 48-bed facility will be specifically designed for the emotionally disturbed between the ages of 5 and 21. The \$4.5 million facility is to be completed in January 1986.

The Bowling Green Municipal Utilities Sewer Division is currently replacing four wastewater lift stations. The \$120,000 project will be completed Spring 1986.

United Parcel Service is currently under going an expansion, which will double the size of its facility and make it a Regional Distribution Center.

The Bowling Green Main Street Project is an ongoing project which promotes reinvestment and building conservation in the Downtown Historic District. A total of more than 40 projects have been completed with an investment of approximately \$1,000,000 since 1980.

An old grocery store is currently undergoing a \$1.1 million renovation and will be converted into a City Hall Annex. The project will be completed in March 1986.

Construction of a \$500,000 public safety training facility is currently under way. The facility will be completed in 1986.



Thorobred Square, a 67,000 square-foot retail and office complex, is under construction. The \$5 million facility will be completed in Spring 1986.

Construction of a PGA sanctioned 18-hole golf course is currently under way at Warren Meadows.

### **Planned**

Plans are under way for a new Warren County Jail. The \$5 million facility will be completed in February 1987. Also, there are plans for a \$2.2 million Justice Center, which will be completed in January 1987.

Expansion of the water treatment plant by the Bowling Green Municipal Utilities is to start in April 1986. The \$3 million project will increase the treatment capacity to 23 million gallons per day, with provision to go to 30 million gallons per day. The estimated completed date is Fall 1987.

The Warren County Water District plans to build approximately 30 short extension water lines. The total cost of all the lines, which are to be completed in 1986, will be \$1,200,000.

Several highway construction projects are planned in the Bowling Green area. Turning lanes are to be added on Scottsville Road, from Ashley Circle to I-65, in 1986. The widening of Cemetery Lane and addition of a new interchange with I-65 are planned for 1986-87. Victoria Boulevard, a north-west connector, is planned for 1988.

The Warren County School System has plans to build a new high school, three middle schools and one elementary school. Total cost of all the projects, which will be completed within the next three years, will be \$18.5 million.

The Bowling Green Independent School System has plans to build a new central office building. The \$450,000 building will be completed by Summer 1986.

The City of Bowling Green has plans to build a 18-hole municipal golf course. The opening of the course will be sometime in 1988.
