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

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FULTON COUNTY, KENTUCKY - A RESOURCE PROFILE

Fulton County, covering 209 square miles, is located in the Jackson Purchase Region of extreme west Kentucky. The county is bordered to the south by Tennessee; to the northeast by Hickman County, Kentucky; and to the northwest by the Mississippi River, which separates Fulton County from Missouri. The county had a 1990 population of 8,271 persons.

Fulton, the largest of two incorporated cities in Fulton County, is located on the Kentucky-Tennessee state line, adjacent to South Fulton in Obion County, Tennessee. Fulton is 49 miles southwest of Paducah, Kentucky; 126 miles northeast of Memphis, Tennessee; and 214 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri. Fulton had a 1990 population of 3,078 persons.

Hickman, the county seat of Fulton County, is situated on the Mississippi River. Hickman was designated an enterprise zone in 1984, allowing eligible businesses to qualify for tax incentives, utility rate reductions, and certain other forms of federal, state and local government assistance. Hickman is located 20 miles west of Fulton and had a 1990 population of 2,689.

The Economic Framework - The total number of Fulton County residents employed in 1991 averaged 3,113. Manufacturing firms in the county reported 1,115 employees; wholesale and retail trade provided 797 jobs; 396 people were employed in service occupations; state and local government accounted for 480 employees; and contract construction firms provided 20 jobs.

Labor Supply - There is a current estimated labor supply of 6,893 persons available for industrial jobs in the labor market area. In addition, from 1992 through 1996, 3,702 young persons in the area will become 18 years of age and potentially available for industrial jobs.

Transportation - Fulton County is served by the Purchase Parkway at Fulton, a multi-lane highway which connects with Interstate 24, 50 miles to the northeast. The county is also served by U.S. Highways 51 and 45, plus Kentucky Highways 94, 125, 129, 166, 239 and 307. The Hickman-Fulton County Riverport, a major riverport of the Mississippi River, is located in Hickman. The Illinois Central Railroad provides main line rail service to Fulton, while Tennessee-Kentucky Railroad directly serves Hickman. Twenty-one common carrier trucking firms provide interstate and/or intrastate service to the county. The nearest scheduled commercial airline services are available at Barkley Regional Airport near Paducah, Kentucky, 55 miles north of Fulton; and at Memphis International Airport in Memphis, Tennessee, 135 miles southwest of Fulton. The Everett Stewart Airport in Union City, Tennessee, 13 miles southwest of Fulton, maintains a 5,000-foot paved runway; and the Fulton Municipal Airport has a 2,700-foot paved runway.

Power and Fuel - Fulton Electric System, Hickman Electric System, and Hickman-Fulton Counties Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation each provide electric power to Fulton County. The City of Fulton and Hickman Natural Gas System each provide natural gas service in the county.

Education - Primary and secondary education is provided by the Fulton Independent School System and the Fulton County School System. Four institutions of higher learning are located within 50 miles of Fulton. Two universities provide masters level degrees. Vocational education is available at the Fulton County Area Vocational Education Center in Hickman; and at the West Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School in Paducah, Kentucky, 49 miles northeast.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES 1991





AVERAGE PLACEMENT WAGES


Fulton County is served by the Mayfield local office of the Kentucky Department for Employment Services. The focus of the following data is on job placements made by the Mayfield local office and may therefore be used as an indicator of the wages which employers in the area pay new employees. During the twelve months which ended on June 30, 1990, the local employment office filled 2,823 job openings in various occupational categories. TRANSPORTATION

Highways

Fulton is the southern terminus of the Purchase Parkway, a multi-lane highway through extreme western Kentucky. Hickman is located approximately 20 miles west via Kentucky Highways 166 and 125. The Purchase Parkway connects with Interstate 24, 50 miles northeast of Fulton, and locally with U.S. 45, U.S. 51, and Kentucky 166, all "AAA"-rated (80,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways. Kentucky 125, a "AAA"-rated highway, serves Hickman. "AA"-rated (62,000-pound gross load limit) trucking highways serving Fulton County include Kentucky Highways 94, 129, 239, and 307.

U.S. Highway 51 connects Fulton and Fulton County with Interstate Highways 40 and 55 near Memphis, Tennessee, 126 miles southwest; and with Interstate 57, 48 miles northwest. U.S. 45 provides four-lane access to Interstate 24, 45 miles northeast of Fulton, and to Interstate 40, approximately 61 miles south of the city.



The Mississippi River bounds Hickman on the west. The Hickman-Fulton County Riverport Authority has a 30-acre general cargo facility on Hickman Harbor, a still, warm-water harbor on the Mississippi River.

The heart of the port is the transfer facility, consisting of three 16-foot diameter mooring cells, two 20-foot diameter mooring and conveyor cells, one mooring dolphin, and a 30-foot diameter crane cell which supports a 9,720 American pedestal-mounted crane rated at 125 tons.

The transfer facility is linked to the storage and processing portion of the facility via an 86-foot truck bridge with paved roadway over the levee. Also linking the transfer facility is a conveying system rated at 450 tph. The conveying system can be used for direct transfer to rail as well as truck.

The port can also transfer bulk materials to outside storage via a 1,254-foot, 350 tph conveying system to a 125-foot radial stacker stockpiling up to a five barge storage capacity.

Providing more efficient trans-loading of waterborne commodities, the Hickman-Fulton County Riverport comprises an area designated as one of Kentucky's first enterprise zones.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Structure

The City of Fulton and the City of Hickman are each governed by a mayor, four commissioners, and a full-time city manager. The mayors are elected to four-year terms while the commissioners each serve two-year terms. Fulton County is governed by a county judge/executive and four magistrates. Each county official serves a four-year term.

Local Fees and License,

The City of Fulton levies a one and one-half percent occupational license tax on the wages of individuals. An occupational license tax of gross receipts is levied on businesses and is based upon the type of business. Manufacturers pay only an annual fee based upon number of employees: less than 50 - \$100, 50 to 100 - \$150, and over 100 - \$200. The City of Fulton also levies an unloading license fee of \$75 annually and a city vehicle license fee of \$10 annually.

The City of Hickman levies a one percent occupational license tax on wages, salaries, and commissions of individuals. Business license fees range from \$40 to \$800 and are based upon total net profits for the previous year.

PROPERTY TAXES

The Kentucky Constitution requires the state to tax all classes of taxable property, and state statutes allow local jurisdictions to tax only a few classes. All locally taxed property is subject to county taxes and school district taxes (either a county school district or an independent school district). Property located inside of city limits may also be subject to city property taxes.

Special local taxing jurisdictions (fire protection districts, watershed districts, and sanitation districts) levy taxes within their operating areas (usually a small portion of community or county).

Property assessments in Kentucky are at 100% fair cash value. A 15% reduction is automatically granted for accounts receivable.

Customized Training

The Kentucky Tech system, through its Training and Development Coordinators, will provide technical assistance and will identify and develop low cost customized training programs and services for existing, as well as new and expanding businesses and industries. Assessment Services

Kentucky Tech Career Connections offers to business, education, and government agencies customized assessment in career inventories, interest inventories, psychomotor skills and academic potential as well as pre-hire assessment.

Adult Basic Education

Adult education programs are available to adults who want to develop new skills, improve basic skills or earn a high school equivalency diploma. In Fulton County, adult basic education is provided by the Fulton County Board of Education and the Fulton Independent School System. Adult literacy is provided through the Fulton County Literacy Program.

Bluegrass State Skills Corporation

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation, an independent public corporation created and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, provides programs of skills training to meet the needs of business and industry from entry level to advanced training, and from upgrading present employees to retraining experienced workers.

The Bluegrass State Skills Corporation is the primary source for skills training assistance for a new or existing company. The Corporation works in partnership with other employment and job training resources and programs, as well as Kentucky's economic development activities, to package a program customized to meet the specific needs of a company.

RECREATION

Local

Fulton County provides an array of recreation facilities including: Fulton's 35-acre public park which contains baseball diamonds, double tennis courts, picnic shelters and playgrounds. Supervised baseball activities are offered here in the summer. A park in east Hickman offers three tennis courts, two basketball courts, a large playground area, a walking/jogging trail, a picnic area, public shelters, concession areas, and restrooms. Sanger Field at Fulton County High School, contains two baseball diamonds and a football field. Hickman also features an historic courthouse, and numerous antebellum buildings. Other swimming and tennis courts are available for public use.

The Hickman Country Club offers private recreational facilities including a nine-hole golf course, a swimming pool, and a tennis court.

Fulton County is located on the Mississippi River in a prime hunting and fishing area. Numerous Indian mounds and historical sites are nearby. The scenic Great River Road runs along the Mississippi River through Fulton County from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico, offering the traveler a diverse Mississippi River experience that is both enjoyable and educational.

The International Banana Festival is held annually in Fulton and draws thousands of visitors. This festival, celebrating the area's historic role as a center for the redistribution of bananas, is a tribute to the community's warm relationship with Latin America as well as with its sister community, South Fulton, Tennessee, which also participates in the festival.

Other annual events in the area include the Mississippi River water festivities which are the highlight of the Fourth of July "Spirit of America" celebration at Hickman and the Great River Road/U.S. 51 Festival held annually on Memorial Day weekend, which features 102 miles of antiques, arts and crafts, yard sales, and town events of music and food.

Restoration of the Old Carnegie Library was recently completed in Hickman. The 405,000 project will provide space for the proposed Great River Road Museum.

Area (Within 50 miles)

A Confederate cannon, a network of earthen trenches, and a massive chain and anchor are all featured at the Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park in Columbus, 23 miles northwest of Fulton. Other attractions at the 156-acre park include a 38-site campground, a gift shop, a historical hiking trail, miniature golf, a picnic area, and a playground. The museum is located in a building that served as a Civil war infirmary. It offers a display of Civil War relics, early Indian artifacts and an audiovisual slide program on the Battle of Belmont.

Reelfoot Lake and Kentucky Madrid Bend are approximately 25 miles from Fulton. Reelfoot Lake is a 70-square mile lake in Tennessee known for its fishing. Kentucky maintains a 2,000-acre wildlife area near the lake for hunting. The Kentucky Madrid Bend is land totally separated from the state by the Mississippi River.

Charm and serenity exemplify Kenlake State Resort Park which is located on Kentucky Lake, 45 miles northeast of Fulton. The park offers hotel and cottage accommodations and an efficient camping site. Other facilities include a nine-hole golf course, pool and lake swimming, horseback riding, hiking trails, fishing, boating, picnicking, planned recreation, an activities room, and one of the finest tennis complexes in the area.

Paducah is located 49 miles northeast of Fulton. As Kentucky's seventh largest city, Paducah provides many recreational opportunities. Points of interest include the Alben Barkley Museum; the Market House Square-Museum; quarter horse racing at the Bluegrass Downs; Whitehaven, an 1860 antebellum home; Museum of the American Quilters Society; and many other attractions.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Fulton re-certified as a "Kentucky Certified City" in 1992, and is distinguished as a gold award winner recognizing ten consecutive years of certification. Re-certification is based on achievement in the following areas: existing industry assistance, small business assistance, educational resources, and community development factors of health care, public safety, arts and culture, recreation, governmental awareness and resources. The Certified Cities Program is sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

Recent

Excel Manufacturing of Kentucky, located in Fulton, recently expanded its operations. The \$3.1 million project created 150 new jobs. In addition, Excel is in the process of engaging in another expansion which will create 30-40 new jobs with an investment of \$2 million.

The Hickman-Fulton County Riverport Authority recently completed a port-rail interface project which consists of a elevator and conveying system rated at 450 tons per hour, thus allowing direct transfer between barge, rail and truck.

The City of Fulton recently expanded its wastewater treatment plant from 540,000 gallons per day to 940,000 gallons per day. Additional improvements were made to enhance the overall efficiency of the sewerage system. Total cost of the project approximated \$2 million.

Both Fulton County and Fulton Independent School Systems currently have access to interactive television which enables each school system to share courses via this telecommunications linkage. In addition, both school systems are on line with several area colleges and universities for college level courses and teleconferences.

The Citizens Bank in Hickman recently invested in the future of Fulton County by constructing a new bank facility including a community room. Total cost of the project was \$1.2 million.

Restoration of the Old Carnegie Library was recently completed in Hickman. The \$405,000 project will provide space for the proposed Great River Road Museum.

Several communities in the Fulton County vicinity through a joint effort, provide fire protection for major fires.

Under Way

Fulton County is in the process of organizing a county-wide economic development group which will encourage a more concerted effort in attracting industry for the community.


The City of Hickman is currently expanding and renovating its existing wastewater treatment system which will expand the system from 160,000 gallons per day to 340,000 gallons per day, plus the installation of several new lines. The \$2.1 million project is scheduled for completion by August 1993.

Fulton County School System, in accordance with its ten-year plan, is in the process at the high school: constructing six new classrooms, renovating the gymnasium, and creating additional space for art and music. Three additional construction phases at the high school will follow over the next ten years.

A downtown restoration project is under way in Fulton. The \$350,000 project will involve the renovation of several old buildings, construction of new facades, new sidewalks and lighting, and development of a mini-park including a railroad museum which would depict the early railroad heritage of Fulton, and a walking trail.

A recent Kentucky Infrastructure Authority grant is helping in the establishment of a three-county recycling center in Fulton County.

Fulton County is in the process of implementing the enhanced version of the "911" emergency dispatch system.
