IRH Offers Employee Health Screening Services to Local Businesses

The **Institute for Rural Health (IRH)** has started collaborating with local business/industry to offer employee health screening services. Since the creation of the IRH, faculty and students within the School of Nursing have been involved in the outreach offered through the IRH. The School of Nursing utilizes the IRH's Mobile Health and Wellness Unit as a community clinical site for BSN Prelicensure students enrolled in NURS 449-Community Health Nursing. Recently, IRH staff and BSN Prelicensure students from the School of Nursing provided blood pressure, cholesterol, glucose and bone density screenings for the employees at Delta Faucet of Morgantown over a period of six days.

Nursing Students Participate in Hispanic Community Health Fair

On April 6, 2013, a health fair was held at St. Joseph's Catholic Church for the Hispanic Community of Bowling Green. In partnership with the **Institute for Rural Health, WKU School of Nursing, WKU Dietetics Students**, the Barren River District Health Department, **South Central Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC), WKU Public Health Association**, and many community members, students collaborated with faculty to create an event that addressed the main health and safety concerns of the Hispanic community. The event provided various educational materials as well as screening services; including blood pressure screening, lipid panel screening, consults with local physicians, dental screenings, teeth cleaning, hearing testing and HIV oral testing.

The event was a marked success. There were at least 40 participants who received lipid screening and over 20 children who received teeth cleaning (many other adults and children receiving free screening). After receiving screening services, participants visited various health promotion booths and community tables. They also received a free healthy lunch (homemade chips and salsa, vegetable and fruit trays, chicken soup and more) prepared by WKU dietetics students.

This busy day was well received by the community. Participants completed evaluations with suggestions for future fairs. Without the assistance of the many departments, schools and organizations within the College of Health and Human Services, the fair would not have been as effective and the Hispanic participants would not have received the many health promotion and screening services that day. Much gratitude is extended to the CHHS!

South Central AHEC at WKU awards Edmonson Co. 5th/6th Center grant

The Edmonson County 5/6 Family Resource Center was given a grant by the **South Central Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC)** to purchase educational science software for the Edmonson County 5th/6th center. This opportunity is provided to rural areas that traditionally have shortages of many health professionals. One of AHEC's goals is to promote math and science to rural students and encourage students to choose a career in health. This is being addressed by implementing the Science and Math for Rural Teachers and Students (SMARTS) program. This strategy seeks to help students become more proficient in these subjects and entertain the idea of choosing a health career as their profession.

The award winning software purchased is called Digital Frog. Students have interactive activities including virtual dissection of a frog and get to compare the frog's anatomy to that of a human. They also learn about the skeletal system, muscles, cells and our environment. Digital field trips are taken to rain forests, wetlands and deserts. The program promotes life-long meaningful learning for young minds. Lynette Saling, with the 5/6 Family Resource Center says this software would not be available without the grant money. Teachers are excited, as well as the students, to interact with Digital Frog. Mrs. LaNetta Skaggs, 5th grade math and science teacher states, "We would like to thank South Central Kentucky AHEC and the 5/6 Family Resource Center for providing our school with this program. The Digital Frog is a valuable resource to supplement our science program." The program has been in use since September till present and can be used in the future because the program is now licensed to the 5th/6th center.
