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We reprint here the final segment of what Mr. R. T. Martin titled

PIONEERS

Another craze was started about the beginning of the civil war, in 1860, by a man by the name of Baldwin. Baldwin was a fine writer and an ingenious fanatic and crank. He published a book on the prophesies of the scripture, concerning the coming of Christ, and gave a very explicit and plausible exposition of the prophesies; in his book he adroitly pretended to prove that the second coming of Christ was near at hand and would take place in about 1866 and that the millennium era would begin and Christ would come to reign on the earth for a thousand years, and that then Satan would be let loose for a short season and the Judgement would follow. Now whether Baldwin really believed what he taught in his book or whether he did it for effect, we know not; however it did have an effect, for many persons believed the doctrine of his book and were advocates of its teaching and reasoning and preached it with all earnestness and confidence.

Two of the most prominent disciples of Baldwin in Muhlenberg were The Rev. Isaac Bard and Adlie Boyd. Bard was born during the last years of the 18th century, came to Muhlenberg when a young man and became a preacher of the Old Presbyterian church. Boyd was born during the commencement of the 19th century and became a preacher of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Bard posed as being a Hebrew, Green and Latin scholar and as one who could properly interpret and explain the prophesies of the scriptures. He preached and taught that Christ would come to the earth about 1866 and the millinium would commence, but before this could take place a great battle would have to be fought, known and denominated in the scriptures as the battle of the Armegeaddon. Bard argued that this battle would be fought between the North and South and would take place in the Mississippi valley and that the North would prevail over the South. Boyd in his preaching agreed with Bard, except that he contended that the battle of Armegeaddon would take place in Kentucky and that the South should prevail. Now the teaching of Baldwin, Bard and Boyd were a little off of what actually happened.

Instead of Christ coming, it was Abraham Lincoln; the millinnium turned out to be the inauguration of the Republican administration; the battle of the Armegeaddon must have been that of Gettysburg, the turning point of the war. The thousand years must have been the thirty-one years of the Republican national rule, and the short season that Satan was turned loose to go out and deceive the people must have been represented by the four years of Cleveland's administration from '92 to '96.

Now the two old pioneer preachers, Bard and Boyd, were honest in the views they entertained about this matter; they were good men and reputable citizens; they spent their lives in Muhlenberg county, devoted their time and energies to the building up of the moral and religious influence in the county with their songs and sermons. Bard was regarded as a scholar, a reasoner and a logical sermonizer. He lived in the Western part of the county on Pond river and owned a large tract of very fine land; he raised a respectable family, and has one son living, who is nearly eighty years old. Bard was pastor of the Presbyterian church in Greenville and other points in the county for many years. Boyd was regarded as a first-class preacher and an orator of his day. He was pastor of the Cumberland Presbyterian churches in the county for many years. He also raised a large family. Those living have gone to other counties and other states. The lives of both of these men were devoted to leading men and women to higher planes of life and living. They both lived to old age. The last works of Boyd, when dying, were: "I am recognized in Heaven."

Under all the disadvantages and circumstances of the times and age, the old pioneers lived and enjoyed themselves in exercising their simple methods and means in laying the foundation for what now exists and the improvements of the county that they once claimed their own. They were ignorant of the value of their possessions; their children have lived and most all have passed away; their grandchildren have become old; their great-grandchildren are now in active life. Scattered over the county are many graveyards:

Where heaved the turf of many a mouldering heap,  
Each in his narrow cell forever laid,  
The rude pioneers of the county sleep.  
Oft did the harvest to their sickle yield,  
Their furrow oft the stubborn glebe has broke;  
How jocund did they drive their teams afield,  
How bowed the woods beneath their sturdy stroke.  
Let not ambition mock their useful toil,  
Their homely joys and destiny obscure,  
Nor grandeur here in disdain smile  
At short and simple annals of the pioneer.  
The boast of heraldry, the pomp of power,  
And all that beauty, all that wealth e'er gave,  
Await, alike, the inevitable hour --  
The paths of glory lead but to the grave.

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 Many years after Mr. Martin wrote his article on PIONEERS, the last part of which was on the preceding page, he wrote a supplementary article which appeared in The Greenville Leader sometime in the 1920s. In order to have his series complete, we are reprinting that article here. This was copied from an undated clipping in one of Mr. Martin's scrapbooks. He titled the article

THE SONS OF PIONEERS

We wish in this article to take note of the sons of four early settlers in Muhlenberg County, Henry Black, Kennard Hay, Samuel Allison and Richard Reynolds, who came to the county during its early history and located not far apart in what is known as the Friendship Church neighborhood, about three miles southwest of Greenville.

These four early settlers reared and furnished to their country and to the world thirteen noble sons whose aspirations appertained to the high calling and honorable positions in life. The most of them became men of good size and had attractive appearance and personalities. Six of the thirteen sons became first class and eminent ministers of the Gospel, some of whom gained the honor and distinction of DD., and two of the thirteen became able lawyers and noted attorneys, and one became a popular statesman, one a progressive farmer, three of them were honored with high county official positions, two of them most of their lives. Five of the thirteen died from 45 to 65 years of age, eight reached and passed three score years and ten. Their descendants lived in different states.

We are of the opinion that these sons of the early settlers of the Friendship neighborhood have never been duplicated, excelled in usefulness, morals and distinction by any group of families in any other neighborhood or place in Muhlenberg County.

The sons of the four pioneers were near the same age; some having been born during the last years of the Eighteenth Century, and some in the first years of the Nineteenth. They were associated together as they grew up in manhood. They were partly educated in the neighborhood, at a log church schoolhouse, known as Hickorywithe, which stood in a nice woodland grove between the Green Jackson place and the Pannell farm. It was built long before these farms were established, and before the Friendship church house was built.

I remember seeing it in dilapidated condition when I was but a boy, more than seventy years ago. Kennard Hay was the school teacher, and taught the school at Hickorywithe. The young pioneers would attend these schools. They had singing and debating clubs at Hickorywithe. After they had completed their education at Hickory they attended a higher school at Greenville and elsewhere, after which they entered the conquest of life.

The sons of Henry Black were Felix Black, who became an eminent Methodist preacher and located in Cincinnati where he gained a fine reputation. I once read a very able sermon of his that was published in a book of select sermons. The second son, Henry Black, Jr., became an able Cumberland Presbyterian preacher, who preached in different parts of Kentucky. The third son, Nathan Black, became a lawyer and located in the Western part of Kentucky, where he gained the distinction of an able judge and jurist. I heard him make an eloquent and forcible political speech at Greenville, Ky., during the spring of 1886. He was then about sixty years old.

The sons of Samuel Allison were William D., Young E., John A. and Samuel H. Three of them, William D., Young E. and Samuel H. located in Henderson county, where they became popular and influential, and leaders in the county affairs, and were honored with high county official positions. John A. Allison remained in Muhlenberg County, where he became a progressive farmer and had a good reputation. He was a theologian, historian and humorist, and had it not been for his timidity and lack of self-confidence, he might have reached a high station in life.

The sons of Kennard Hay were Wiley who became a leading politician and statesman. He was a man of fine sense. He represented this county in the State Legislature and Senate. Kincheon Hay became a noted Baptist preacher, and located in Kentucky and Illinois. Charles Hay became an able Cumberland Presbyterian preacher and located in Kentucky and Missouri.

The sons of Richard Reynolds were John T., Thomas B. and George W. John T. became a lawyer of prominence and located in Hopkinsville, Ky., and during his life time was a leading attorney. Thomas B. Reynolds became a Methodist preacher and located in Louisiana, where he became prominent. George W. Reynolds also became a prominent Methodist preacher and located in Illinois.

Now we have made a brief comment in regard to the sons of the four early settlers of Muhlenberg county. These sons were reared and grew up to manhood during the rude and rustic age of the county and the state. They had to combat with the unfavorable conditions and deprivations now unknown. They did not realize the many facilities and achievements of the present time. They went forth into the conquest of life amid the adverse conditions of the age in which they lived. They fought a good fight in the conflict of time and became shining lights of moral force, integrity and intellectual ability which gave them merit and prominence. They devoted their time and talent for the betterment and improvement of their country and people. Much could be written in regard to the achievements and deeds of these men, but suffice it to say they played a noble part in the drama of life. Although they have long since passed from sight to the silence of the grave, they left to posterity examples of life worthy of imitation. Their names may be lost from the memory of the living amid the waste of years and ravage of time, but what they did in life for their generation and for mankind shall live on.



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The pioneer generation of Friendship neighborhood was its morning star that has never been eclipsed by any succeeding one. The generation following it was composed of Walkers, Turners, Staples and Rices. John Staples was the Solon and Reason Rice the Socrates of that generation, which has been followed by two other generations, the last of which is now on the stage playing the role of life.  
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A NEW HISTORICAL MARKER

On Thursday, May 3, a dedicatory program was held at the Courthouse, Greenville, for a historical marker honoring and listing the names of the known Revolutionary War soldiers who settled and died in Muhlenberg County. The marker was sponsored by The Elizabeth Campbell Russell Society, DAR and The Kentucky Historical Society. The names of forty-three men are on the marker and they are as follows: Josiah Arnold, Elisha Atkinson, John Bone, James Craig, Albritain Drake, David Edwards, Joshua Elkins, David Engler, Matthew Ganey, Sikes Garris, Andrew Glenn, Isaiah Hancock, John Harper, Nathan Harper, Michael Hill, Richard Hill, Hardy Hines, William Hopkins, John Hunt, Edward Jarvis, Peter Kincheloe, John Littlepage, Ephraim McLean, John McMahon, Hugh Martin, Benjamin Neal, Abraham Newton, Jesse Oates, William B. Rice, Richard D. Reynolds, Henry Rhoads, Michael Roll, Thomas Tetterton, Abraham Unsell, Jr., Frederick Unsell, Henry Unsell, Lewis Webb, Arrington Wickliffe, Britton Willis, William Worthington, William Young and Matthew Zimmerman.

It is probably that other names will be learned later, but unfortunately they are/were unknown in time to be included on the marker. One such name has already been reported. It is that of William Campbell, who gave the land for Greenville, but who, because of an accident, died in Lexington, Ky. Should any readers know of others, we would like to have the information, with proof of Revolutionary War service.
