#### THE SOUTHERN FURNITURE SYMPOSIUM IS SOLD OUT!

The Shaker Museum at South Union will host a Southern Furniture Symposium, "Close Ties: The Relationship Between Kentucky Shaker Furniture Makers and Their Worldly Contemporaries," Saturday, October 1st. The day-long seminar will address the stylistic similarities and differences found when comparing Kentucky Shaker furniture with the antebellum vernacular furniture traditions of Kentucky and Tennessee. Experts in the field will give presentations on the subject, including Nathan Harsh, co-author of The Art and Mystery of Tennessee Furniture; Jean Burks, co-author of The Complete Book of Shaker Furniture; and Marianne Ramsey and Diane Wachs who are currently researching for an upcoming book on Kentucky furniture.

In conjunction with the Southern Furniture Symposium. The Shaker Museum will open an exhibit of antebellum Kentucky and Tennessee furniture that will include pieces from the museum collections of South Union and Pleasant Hill and from fine private collections in the region. Many of these pieces will be on display to the public for the very first time. The exhibit will be the focus of a walking tour given by the symposium speakers who will give commentary and analysis. The exhibit will be in place through November 1st.

The Southern Furniture Symposium is funded in part by Oak Hill Antiques, Russellville and Irene's Gallery of Antiques. Elizabethtown. The exhibit catalog was funded in part by Emerson Electric. Jean Burks' presentation is underwritten by the Kentucky Humanities Council and is free to the public. Ms. Burks' presentation begins at 1:00 p.m.

# THE SOUTH UNION SHAKERS AND GEORGE WASHINGTON

Over the past several months, staff member Mike Sisk has been corresponding with the Mount Vernon Ladies Association concerning a George Washington land grant found in the Morton family manuscripts recently donated to the museum. Apparently George Washington received land for his service in the French and Indian War (1756-1763) that included property in Grayson County and Logan County, Kentucky. Copies of the deed, along with an 1818 map showing the location of the survey, have been donated to Mount Vernon and to the Alderman Library in Charlottesville, Virginia where all known Washington documents are currently being compiled. The 1818 map indicates that the Washington survey of 666 1/3 acres was a few miles southeast of present day Auburn, Kentucky. Included on the map is the South Union out-family located at Black Lick (formerly the farm of Deedy Hall), only a short distance from the land claimed by George Washington.

We have enjoyed an active summer of programs and are looking forward to a busy schedule this fall. I would like to thank all those who donated time, materials, and financial support to educational programs this summer. Many children and adults have benefitted from your generosity. We still need volunteers to assist with many of our fall programs. If I have not called you to help, please call me! I continue to meet new people who volunteer at South Union. Thanks!

The 2nd annual Summer Day Camp recently completed five full weeks of fun and learning. Fifty-nine children spent days learning about the Shakers and creating memories that will last a long time. We had a number of children return from last year because they enjoyed it, and they tell me they can't wait to come back again in 1995. Thanks to Allison Fuqua and Trent Spurlock for sponsoring day camp scholarships. These allowed many children to attend who might not have been able to otherwise.

The South Union Spinners and Weavers Guild has organized and had several meetings since April. We have washed fleece and are sharing skills of carding, spinning, dyeing, knitting and weaving. If you have skills or an interest in learning, please join us for some fun and fellowship. Call the museum for details.

Fall is here and area school children will soon be returning by the hundreds to South Union. In addition to a program that focuses on "Shaker Gift Drawings," students will also be able to learn about manuscripts and journals, 19th century lighting practices, and the use of herbs for domestic, culinary, and medicinal purposes. I will also be offering some presentations in the schools. Please call the museum to have your school participate.

Marge Sterling and I recently attended the Bicentennial Celebration at Sabbathday Lake Shaker Community in Maine. We were warmly received and spent three incredible days interacting with our Shaker friends and learning more about their history and mission from Shaker scholars. One highlight was Saturday evening's singing of Shaker songs by candlelight in the 1794 meeting house. Sunday morning everyone gathered for meeting, bringing together the spirit of the celebration for all who attended. I returned to South Union renewed.

# MAJOR ACQUISITION

The museum recently purchased an extremely fine piece of South Union furniture with excellent provenance. The tall walnut chest of drawers, ca. 1850, has two small drawers over four graduated drawers and an original finish, and will be exhibited as part of the Southern Furniture Symposium, beginning October 1st and running through November 1st. The chest also has pear and ring turned feet, a typical South Union feature. The Shakers gave the chest to their farm manager, Joe Wallace, prior to 1920 and it has remained in the same family ever since. The museum purchased the chest from a descendent of Wallace.

The walnut chest was acquired in part with acquisition endowment funds, but because of the expense, private donations are being solicited to retire the debt. We have already received donations from Kit Cress, Mansfield, Ohio; Edie Bingham, Glenview, Kentucky; and Mrs. W.L. Lyons Brown, Harrod's Creek, Kentucky. Approximately \$4,200.00 is needed to complete the purchase.

#### A WORD FROM THE DIRECTOR

I hope that each of you will attend one or more of the fall events that we have scheduled. The Southern Furniture Symposium is full, but we still have space available for the Shaker Breakfast and the Candlelight Dinner, a new event. The traditional Candlelight Tour and our Christmas at Shakertown do not require reservations. Events have been well attended this year, although weather dampened our spirits a bit during the Shaker Festival in June and Autumn Days earlier this month. Both events are being restructured for 1995. Your suggestions would be appreciated.
