Salary is also another aspect in nursing, the minimum you will make as a Registered Nurse, in May 2016 was \$68,450 (www.bls.gov). Not only does the type of industry you choose to work in affect the type of pay range, specialty and experience on the job play apart in that area too. (www.bls.gov). If you were categorized by percentile, on a minimal pay you should receive based off of a 10% rating is \$21.62 hourly (<u>www.bls.gov</u>).
