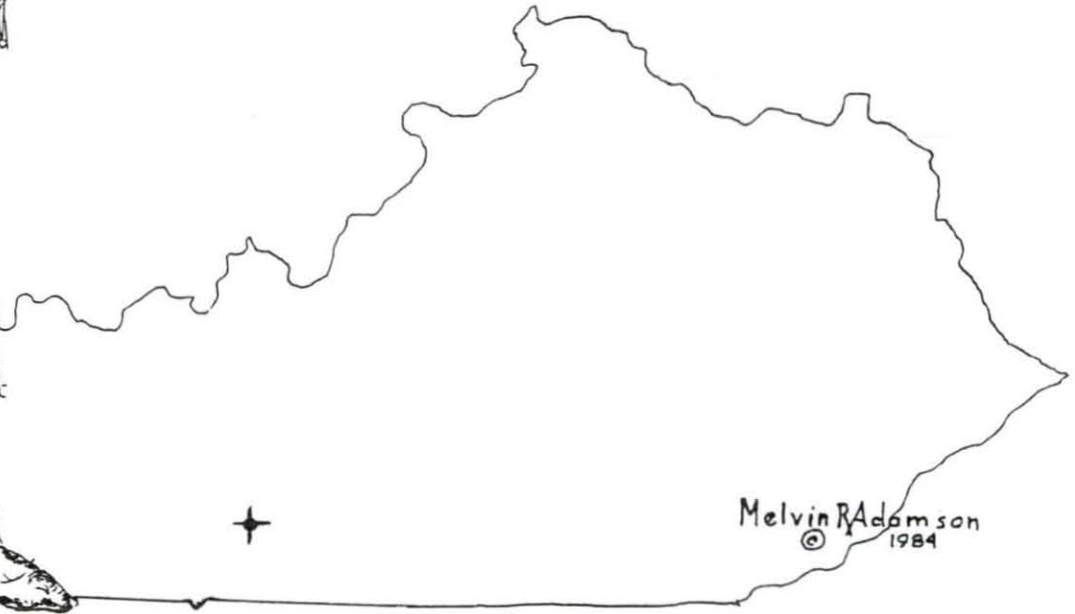

HISTORY OF BOWLING GREEN, KENTUCKY

(This article is based on a newspaper clipping entitled "Clippings by the late Rev. F. M. Thomas: Interesting History Bowling Green Furnished by P. M. Perkins." It was found among the keepsakes of Mrs. Zula Hendrick Garrison, born 12 Feb 1888 and died 14 Dec 1983. She lived in the same house four about 75 years in the Polkville area of Warren County, Kentucky. Contributed by her daughter Rose Garrison Allison.)

On last March 6 [1936], the city of Bowling Green celebrated its 138th anniversary. The land on which the first court house was built was given by Robert Moore in 1798. The town was first known as Boling Green, on account of the beautiful greens, where the first settlers bowled. Later the name was spelled as it is today.

Through the courtesy of P. M. Perkins, the following clippings belonging to the late Frank M. Thomas, who was at one time secretary of the Warren County Historical Society, have been furnished the Times-Journal.

One hundred years old last Sunday. On last Sabbath, March 6 [1898], the City of Bowling Green rounded out the hundredth year of existence. So quietly and gracefully did she accomplish it that few persons were aware of the noteworthy event. Perhaps the fair old girl was somewhat diffident about proclaiming her age to her sisters. Such modesty, while becoming, is unnecessary, as all her children at home and abroad are proud of her hundred years of motherhood and declare she grows more beautiful as the years go by. And she must present quite a different appearance now from that of March 6, 1798. She was born in a log court house just built of hewn logs, one story and a half high and twenty-four feet long by twenty wide. This building was situated somewhere in the present public square and had for its neighbor a log jail, sixteen by twelve feet.

Preparations for the little girl's arrival were made by the county court January the 2nd, 1798, and on the 6th of March following, the trustees John Curd, James Stuart, Gladin Gorin, Robert King, George Moore and James Campbell christened the tender babe Bowling Green, and said christening appears on record in the present court house.

There is a tradition that the first town was laid off near the river, where the colored public school [old State Street School] is located. It might be interesting to trace the history as it appears from more trustworthy sources--the records of the County Court. The land on which the first

court house was erected was given by Robert Moore who lived in a log house just back of the present residence of Mrs. C. Moore on State Street. Near his house was a splendid spring known even at that early date as the public spring. It is now closed up, but the site is well marked, being now covered by Carr's stable. On May 1, 1798, the County Court ordered that "Prison Bounds for the county be laid off in a square not exceeding ten acres, the Public ground and spring included. This seems to fix the site beyond question, especially so since the limits of the town were not extended to the river until November, 1805.

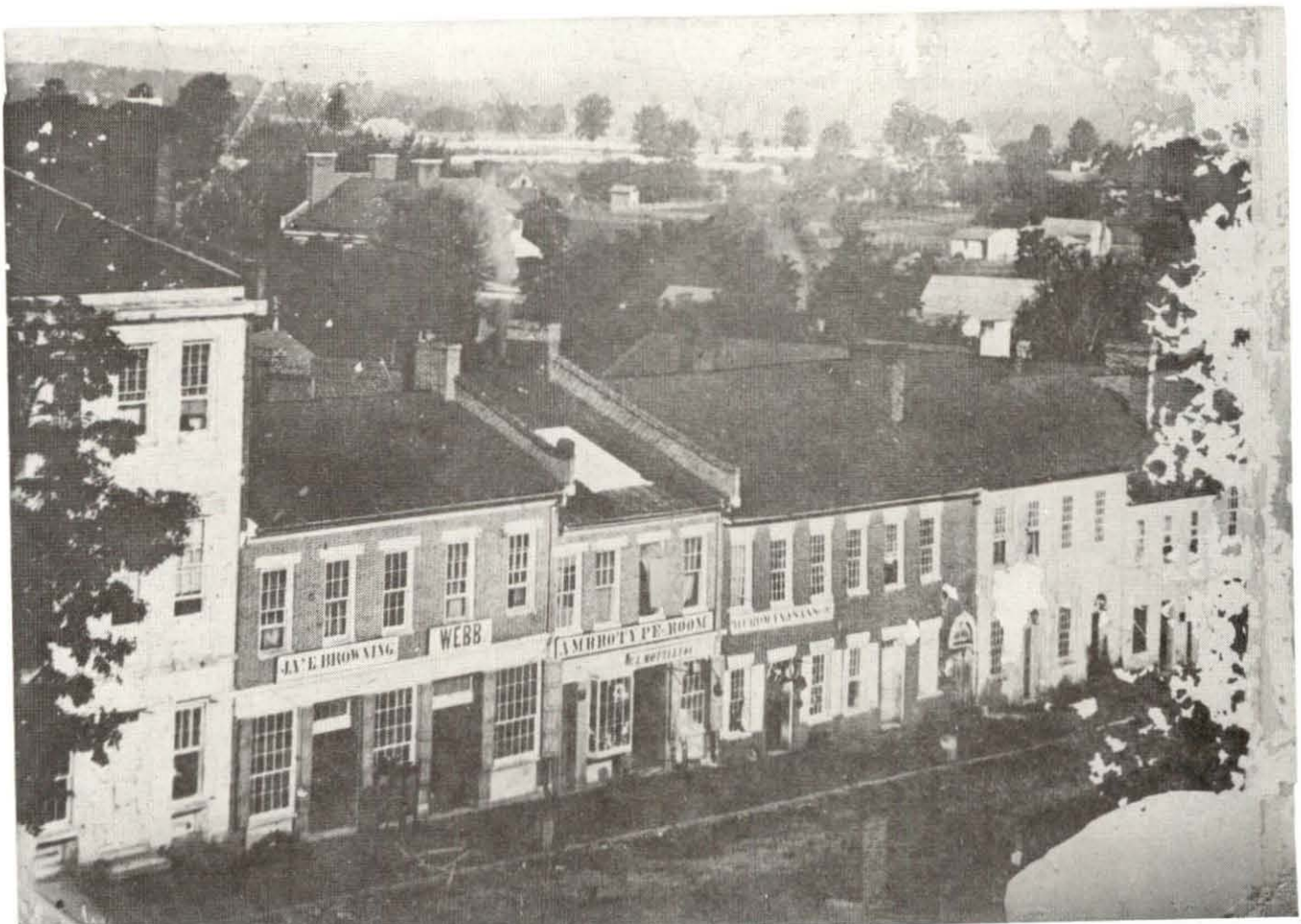
The tradition as to the first location being at the river arose from the fierce fight between Bowling Green and Jeffersonville over the location of the permanent seat of justice. The town of Jeffersonville was laid out in 1808 and extended from near the colored public school to Strange's Ford. Its trustees were Jacob Skiles, Gladin Gorin, James Brown and Maxwell Sharp, but its founder was John McNeal, who owned property in the proposed town of Jeffersonville. The first move to change the court house was made in the County Court in June, 1808, but was defeated. The records say that Gladin Gorin, James Hall, Peter Tyler and George Moore dissented. The court then ordered that Samuel Work, Maxwell Sharp, Francis Johnson, Thompson Briggs and Abel Hinna be appointed commissioners to let new public buildings in the extended part of the town of Bowling Green, i.e., toward the river and in the vicinity of Jeffersonville. It seems that the commissioners were won over by Jeffersonville and in July following recommended the removal of public buildings to Jeffersonville. However the court refused to adopt the recommendation over the protest of Gladin Gorin, George Moore, James Hall, William Mitchell and Peter Tyler. In September, however, the Jeffersonville crowd had a majority and carried the removal resolution over the protest of John Ray, John Beckham, James Atwood and John Rountree. So in the fall of 1808, the court house and jail were removed to Jeffersonville. For removing the court

house McNeal was given the benefit of a subscription of \$295.00 and fifty gallons of whiskey. The Bowling Green crowd fought to the last but were bought off and outnumbered. _____, who was thought to have been the ringleader in the removal scheme, was appointed sheriff in January, 1809 and his successor seems to have friendly to Bowling Green's interests. The removal seems to have been carried by only one majority and Bowling Green began work to have the public buildings brought back.

April 4, 1809, Francis Johnson came into court with Thomas Chapman, William Gatewood, Thompson Briggs and Abner Evans. They promised under bond that if the court would order the removal of the public buildings from Jeffersonville to the

public square in Bowling Green, the citizens of the later place would erect a handsome court house of bricks, 40 feet square, two stories high and containing ample accommodations for all times to come.

The court agreed to the propositions and ordered the removal of the buildings back to Bowling Green. Before it could be accomplished the court house was carried away by "parties unknown" and Benjamin Lawless, on whose land the jail was located, refused to give it up and it remained until a few years ago, a silent, but impressive memorial of a fierce struggle, which if successful would have caused Bowling Green instead of Jeffersonville to be only a memory sleeping in the dusty records of the past.

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

At James Stuarts in the County of Warren on Tuesday the 7th day of March 1797

Commissions directed to William Marrs, John Marshall, Price Curd, John Garnete, James Campbell, George Moore, James Stuart, Robert Wallace, Phenias Cox, Bailey Anderson & James Dougan, Esquires, appointed them Justices of the peace for the said County of Warren. James Dougan Esq. first Justice named in the Commission having administered the Several Oaths prescribed by Law to the Others named in the Commission, and one of the said Justices administed the Several Oaths etc. to the Said Dougan. A Court was then held for said County of Warren.

[Page 2] Elijah M Covington Gentleman produced a Commission from his Excellency the Governor for the time being, appointing him Sheriff of this County, who took the several Oaths prescribed by Law, and together with John Cox & Phenias Cox, his Securities entered into and Acknowledged Bond in the penalty of 3000 Dollars conditioned as the Law Directs.

William Chapline upon his producing a Certificate from the Judges of the Court of Appeals, and Attested by their Clerk which reads in the following words towit, "State of Kentucky Towit" We do hereby Certify that William Chapline [Page 3] hath been examined by our clerk in our presence and under our direction and that we judge him to be well qualified to execute the office of Clerk to any County Court or Court of Quarter Sessions in this Commonwealth. Given under our hands and seals this 25th day of February 1797 George Muter (Seals) Caleb Wallace (Seals) Attest Tho Todd. The Court doth appoint him their Clerk who took the several Oaths prescribed by Law and together with Price Curd his Security entered unto & acknowledged Bond in the penalty of One thousand pounds Conditioned as the law Directs.

The Court doth appoint John Cox Commissioner of the Tax for this County who took the several Oaths prescribed by Law. [Page 4] The Courts are of oppinion that the several Courts to be held in the County of Warren shall be at Robert Moores in the County aforesaid.

On the Motion of Robert King Ordered that the sheriff summon a Jury to meet on his lands in this County where he has erected a Water Grist mill on the last Saturday in this month and make report thereof to the next Court, etc.

Ordered that the Court adjourn till Court in Course. The minutes of the proceedings were signed.

"James Dougan"

May the 2nd 1797

At a County Court held for the County of Warren at the house of Robert Moore on Tuesday the 2nd of May 1797.

Present George Moore, James Campbell and James Stuart Gents

[Page 5] Rowland Madison Gentlemen produced a Commission from his Excellency the Governor for the time being appointing him Surveyor of this County who took the several Oaths prescribed by Law. And together with Edwin L Harris and William Chapline his Securities entered into and Acknowledged Bond in the penalty of 1000 pounds and Conditioned as the Law Directs.

Absent James Stuart Esq. Present Phenias Cox & Bailey Anderson Esqrs.

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

An Indenture of Bargain and Sale Between Andrew McFadin of the one part and George Madison of the other part was Acknowledged by the said Andrew McFadin to be his Act and Deed & Ordered to be Recorded.

[Page 6] Ordered that Gladin Gorin, Joseph Snodgrass, John Cook and George Frayzer or any two of them being first sworn do view the best and most convenient way for a road from John Shannons to Frayzers Mill from thence to Warren Courthouse and from thence to the dripping Spring and make report thereof to the Court etc.

Report of Robert Kings Mill seat towit, "We the Jurors find that no person or persons of his or their property will be injured by Robert Kings erecting a Water grist Mill on the aforesaid place. Witness our hand and seals this 24 day of March 1797." John Cox Jr. (seal) John Cox Sr (seal) [Page 7] Thomas Chapman (seal) Lemuel Sugg (seal) Freeman Jones (seal) Hardy Allard (seal) James Mobberly (seal) Jos Dillinder (seal) Saml Cox Jr (seal) Fulker Cox (seal) Saml McGown (seal) Obidiah Chisom (seal) which being read Examined and allowed of established & Ordered to be Recorded.

Ordered that Thomas Chapman, Frederick Barns, Richard Glover & William Smith or any three of them being first sworn do view the best & most convenient way for a Road from Robert Kings Mill to Andrew McFadins Ferry and from thence to Kellys in the twelve mile grove on the Nolin trace and make report thereof to the Courts.

Ordered that John Cole, James Berry, John Moss, and John Hall or any three of them being first sworn do view the best and most [Page 8] convenient way for a road from Amos's Ferry on Green River to Joseph Locks on Beaver Creek and from thence to James Berries on Skaggs Creek and report thereof to the Court.

Robert Kings Stock mark a cross and slit in the right ear and Cross and hole in the left and Ordered to be Recorded.

On the motion of John Campbell the Court doth appoint him Constable of this County who took the Several Oaths prescribed by Law & together with James Stuart his Security entered into & acknowledged Bond in the penalty of 500 pounds conditioned as the Law Directs.

On the Motion of John Marker leave is granted him to keep a Tavern at his house in this County who together with Joseph Snodgrass his Security [Page 9] entered into and acknowledged their Bond in the penalty of one hundred pounds & conditioned as the Law Directs.

Ordered that Vaultentine Dickerson & Samuel Doughty be appointed as Commissioners for the purpose of possessioning lands agreeable to an Act of Assembly in the following Bounds towit, Beginning at Campbells and running up Barren to the head.

Ordered that Court Adjourn till Court in Course. The minutes of these proceedings were Signed

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

July 4th 1797

At a Court held for the County of Warren at the house of Robert Moore on Tuesday the 4th of July 1797

Present James Dougan, James Stuart, [Page 10] George Moore, James Campbell, Phineas Cox, Bailey Anderson, John Marshall & William Marrs Esquires.

Andrew Alexander Gentleman produced a certificate from under the hand of James Dougan Esq of his having taken the Oath of a Justice of the Peace for this County the Oath of fedility to the Commonwealth and the Oath to the United States.

Present Andrew Alexander Esq.

This Power of attorney between Jonathan Boone & Mary Boone his wife of the one part and Philip Burk of the Other part was acknowledged by the Said Jonathan Boone & Mary Boone his wife to be their Act & Deed & Ordered to be Recorded.

[Page 11] Ordered that Robert King, Gladin Gorin, & John Cox or any two of them be appointed Commissioners for the purpose of letting the publick Buildings for the County to the lowest Bidder viz, a Courthouse of hewn logs twenty four by twenty, one Story and an half high, two Rooms up Stairs, likewise a Log Jail Sixteen feet by twelve, the logs to be one foot square with a partition. And it is also Ordered that the aforesaid Commisssioners advertise that they will let the aforesaid Buildings on the first Tuesday in August next.

Report of a road from John Shannons to the Drippings (towit) Agreeable to an order of the worshipped Court of the County of Warren, We the Subscribers being appointed by the said Court for the Purpose of reviewing the way for a road from Major John Shannons to the Dripping [Page 12] Spring did meet on the 28th day of June 97 and viewed & marked from the said Shannons to Frayzers Mill from thence through the Lands of Hardy Allard, Thomas Lowry, & Gladin Gorin with their Consents from thence to Warren Courthouse: from thence to James Stuarts Ferry on Big Barren River and from thence to the dripping Spring, and we conceive it to be the best and nearest way for the said Road given our hands this 4th day of July 1797 Gladin Gorin, George Frazer, Joseph Snodgrass, John Cook which being read Examined and allowed of Established & Ordered to be Recorded.

Ordered that George Frazer be appointed surveyor from John Shannons to Thos. Lowrys, Gladin Gorin to Stewarts Ferry on big Barron River and James Stewart from thence to the Dripping Spring and that they with the hands alloted do keep the same in repair.

On the motion of John Curd and James Stuart they are allowed be keep a Ferry on big Barren River on their Lands.

[Page 13] Ordered that the Surveyors of Warren County do meet the surveyors of Logan County on the nineteenth of this Instant in order to run the County line between said Counties according to Law and make Report thereof to the next County Court.

On the motion of David A Stuart he is appointed as Constable for this County who took the oaths and together with John Cox his Security entered into and acknowledged their Bonds in the Penalties as the Law Directs.

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

An Indenture of Bargain and Sale between William Croghan of the one Part and James Amos and John Steal of the other Part was Proved at June Court of Quarter Sessions 1797 by John Brook & Charles Amos two Subscribing witnesses thereto and ordered to be certified and at July County Court 1797 was fully Proven by George Brooks another subscribing witness thereto be the Act and Deed of William Croghan and Ordered to be Recorded.

[Page 14] Prepose of a Road from Kings Mill to the twelve mile Grove on the Nolin trace (towit) "Agreeable to an order of the Worshipful the County of Warren, we the commissioners being appointed for the Purpose of viewing a road from Kings Mill to Kellys in the 12 mile grove on the Nolin Trace did meet on 1st day of the Instant and marked a way for the said road from Kings mill to Andrew McFadins Ferry on Big Barron River from thence to the Trunk Spring from thence to Sinking Creek thence running with Andrew McFadins trace to the forks of the road leading from the dripping Spring to Nolin Road & we conceive it to be the best and nearest way for the said Road given under our hands this 4th day of July 1797 R. Glover, William Smith, Fred Barns being read Examined allowed of Established & Ordered to be Recorded, and ordered that Robert King be appointed [Page 15] Surveyor of said road from his mill to Andrew McFadins and Gladin Gorin from thence to the twelve mille grove on the Nolin Trace and that they with the hands alloted them do keep the Same in Repair.

On the Motion of John Cox Commissioner Samuel Coker and George Moore is appointed Commissioners for this County to take in a List of the Taxable who took the Oaths Prescribed by Law.

On the Recommendation of Elijah M Covington high sheriff Samuel Coker is appointed his Deputy who took the several oaths Prescribed by Law.

[Page 16] On the recommendation of Rowland Madison, Surveyor of the County, ordered that Richard Glover, Daniel McNeel, Jonathan Rossel and Jonathan Oneal do view the best and nearest way from Andrew McFadins Ferry to Holmes on Big Barren Rived from thence on a Direction to the Highlands Salt works etc.

On the motion of John Robertson leave is granted him to keep a Tavern at his house in the County who entered into Bond and Security as the law Directs.

On the motion of William Chapline Clerk, Daniel Curd is appointed his Deputy who took the oaths prescribed by law.

Ordered that Thos Hendricks, David Wallis and John Bailey or any two of them do view the best and nearest way from Charles Lucus's to Jones's Ferry on Big Barren [Page 17] River from thence to the twelve mile grove from thence to Amos's on Green River being first Sworn to and make report to the next County Court.

Ordered that Gladin Gorin, Robert King and Freeman Jones do view the best and nearest way from the cave mill to strike the nashville Road on the nearest Direction to Nashville and make report thereof to our next County Court.

Ordered that Thomas Hendricks, John Bialely and David Wallace or any two of them do view the best and most nearest [way] from Jamersons to Jones's Ferry on Big Barren River and from thence to the Courthouse and make report thereof to the next County Court.

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

Ordered Frederick Scaggs and Henry Pennick do view the best and nearest way for a road from the Elk lick to John Robertsons in the blue spring grove and make report thereof to our next Court.

[Page 18] Report of a Road from Amos's ferry on Green [River] to James Berries [Berry's] on Skaggs Creek (towit) "To the worshipful Court of Warren County Gent in Obedience to your Order. The road viewed by John Moss, James Berry & John Hall. Beginning at Amos's Ferry thence with Philip's Trace to a point N. 13. W. from the crossing of Beaver Creek runing through state Lands, a tract of Wm Formans & 2 tracts of John Halls, thence from said ford of Joseph Locks through State lands or Claims unknown to the South fork Thence to Boyds Creek crossing in a Survey of Greyars [Greer's] thence to James Berris Crossing Skagg's Creek at the Sand lick in a Survey of Blufords, Jno Moss, Jas. Berry, Jon. Hall which being read Examined allowed of Established and Ordered to be Recorded.

Ordered that Jacob Lock be appointed Overseer of the said Road from Green River to the ford on Beaver Creek and Will Maxy from said [Page 19] ford to Berries on Skaggs Creek and that they with the hands to them to be allotted do open and keep the Same in repair.

Robert Moore gratuitously give two acres of land for the Publick Buildings to be Erected on being the Place appointed by the County Court for the Public seat of Justice.

The Court Proceeds to fix the Tavern rates as follows (to wit)

August the 1st 1797

At a Court held for the County Warren at Roberts Moore's on Tuesday the 1st day of August 1797. Present James Stuart, Geo. Moore & Robt. Wallace Gent.

On the motion of William P. Anderson he is admitted as a Practicing attorney in the Court he having produced a Licence agreeable to Law who took the oaths Prescribed by Law.

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

[Page 21] Report of a road from Andrew McFadins to Holmes on Barren River on the nearest direction to the highland salt works (to wit) "Agreeable to the within order we have viewed the Road (to wit) From Andrew McFadins through Jacob Smiths Plantation by consent through John McNeels Plantation by consent from thence South of the Sulpher Lick 30 Poles from thence South of Jonathan Oneel's Plantation by Mr. Ramseys Plantation on a Direction to Mr. Homes's given under our hands July 1st Day 1797 Jonathan Oneel, Daniel McNeel, Jonathan Rossell, which being read Examined allowed of and Established & Ordered to be Recorded.

On the motion of Edwin L. Harris Gent it is ordered to be certified that he is a person of Honesty probity and good Demeanor.

[Page 22] After reading the act of Assembly for the Division of Logan County it is the opinion of this Court that the Settlement known by the name of the Geo[r]gia Settlement is included in this County of Warren, and ordered to be Transmitted to the County Court of Logan.

Ordered that David Jones, Simon Sugg and Thos Ford or any two of them do view the best and nearest way from Warren Courthouse to David Jones Ferry on Big Barren River and make report thereof to the next County Court.

Ordered that Harmon Reed, Leonard Hall and Abel Hanon or any two of them do view the best and nearest way for a road from Warren Courthouse to Leonard Halls on Bever Creek and make report thereof to the next County Court.

[Page 23] Ordered that Phenis Cox and George Moore Gent do proportion the hands allotted to Capt Frazer and Capt. Gorin as overseers of the road from James Stuarts Ferry to Major Shannons.

Ordered that Samuel McFadin and John Bailey do allot the hands to James Stuart as overseer of the road from his Ferry to the Dripping.

On the motion of Mary Rose it is ordered that her son John Rose be Bound as an apprentice to Elias McFadin until he is twenty one years of age and that Indentures shall be made out by the clerk of the Court and the said Indentures shall be good to all intents and purposes, the said McFadin is to give Security for the true performance of his Duty.

[Page 24] Report of a road from Charles Lucus's to Jones Ferry and from thence to the 12 mile grove and thence to Amos's on Green River (to wit) Agreeable to the within order of Court we have viewed the best and nearest way from Charles Lucus's to Jones's Ferry from thence to the 12 mile grove and from thence to Amoses Ferry. Given under our hands this the 1st Day of August 1797. John Bailey, David Wallis which being read Examined allowed of Established and Ordered to be Recorded.

We have viewed the same, & Direct it from the Dripping Spring to Mr. Peter Simmons's thence to Vincent Andersons thence to Joel Holcombs, thence to Reubin Blackfords, thence to Jonathan Rossels & from thence to the said Spring branch given under our hands October 1797. John Neel Anderson, which being read Examined allowed of & Established & Ordered to be Recorded.

Ordered that Vincent Anderson be appointed overseer of the said road from the Dripping Spring to Saml. Thomas's and Will Marchbanks from said Thomas's to Reason Mobleys spring branch. Ordered that Jonathan Rossel and Saml. Thomas allow hands to work of the said road.

[Page 28] Report of a road from the cave mill to the Nashville road (to wit) Marked and viewed by Gladin Gorin & Robert King. Not Interferred with no plantations all State Lands, which being read Examined allowed of Established and Ordered to be Recorded.

Ordered that David Boyles be appointed Overseer of the said road and that Robt King & Gladin Gorin allot hands to work on the said road.

Ordered that John McNeel be appointed Overseer of the road from Andrew McFadins to the Buffalow gap and Issac Rounsfer from thence to Bozmans Plantation and Elias Holmes from thence to the County line on a Direction to the high land Salt works and that Vincent Anderson and Harvey Oneal allot hands to work on the said road.

ORDER BOOK A - WARREN CO KY - MARCH 7, 1797---JUNE 15, 1801

[Page 29] Robert King & Henry Gorin were by the Court appointed to lay off the boundaries of the hands to work under Gladin Gorin and George Frayzer Surveyors of the road from Stuarts Ferry to John Shannons (To wit)--Beginning at Stuarts Ferry and running with the river to the mouth of Gaspers River and running up the said River to Thomas Parkers so as to include the said Parker thence up the dividing ridge between Salt lick and Cox's Creek thence along the said ridge to the road thence along the said road so as to Include Means thence Down the river to the Begining will compose Gorin's Destrict.

Geo. Frayzers Destrict, Begining at the ridge between Lowrys and the said Frayzers from thence to the whipperwil Trace at the Deer Ponds then with the whipperwill Trace to Bullers Cabbin thence to Col. Dougans [Page 30] from Col. Dougans to the County line down the County line to Green River and up Green River to the mouth of Barren and up Barren to the mouth of Gasper and from thence to the begining will compose Frayzers Destrict.

Ordered that Vincent Anderson, Samuel McFadin & Mitchell Oneal being first Sworn do view the best and most nearest for a road from Warren Courthouse to Mitchell Oneals on Green River and report thereof to the next Court.

On the motion of John Nancarow he is app. Constable of the County who took the Oaths etc. and together with James Mobley his Sec'ty entered into and acknowledged their bond conditioned as the Law Directs.

Ordered that Andrew Quigley be appointed Overseer of the road from Andrew McFadins to the twelve mile grove instead of Gladin [Page 31] Gorin who is Exempt. Ordered that Thos. Chapman and Freeman Jones do allot hands to work on the Said Road.

On the motion of Toliver Craig adq. [acquisition] is granted him view the Place for a mill seat. Ordered that the shff. Summon a Jury to meet on the first Saturday in this month and make report thereof to the Court.

On the petition of Andrew McFadin leave is granted him to keep a Tavern at his house in this County who together with E. W. Covington his Security entered into Acknowledged, Bound & Certified.

This Deed of gift made between Elkin Taylor Senr. of the one part and Elkin Taylor Jun. of the other part was acknowledged by the said Elkin Taylor Senr. to be his act and deed & ordered to be recorded. (Continued in next issue.)

ROLLA ROHRER, PIONEER STAGE DRIVER, HAD COLORFUL CAREER, NARROW ESCAPES

From: The News-Democrat, Russellville, Logan Co., Kentucky

Thursday, April 13, 1967

(Contributed by Drucilla Jones.)

(The following account of Rolla Rohrer, a pioneer stagecoach driver of Logan County, is taken from a story which appeared in the Russellville Herald of February 6, 1895. The article had been preserved in a scrapbook by Perry Gooch, a great-grandson of Mr. Rohrer. At the time of publication, Mr. Rohrer was 87. He lived to be 95.)

Seventy years ago last month (1825) the first stage coach rolled into Russellville, then little more than a thicket, but there yet lives just east of town the man who drove it, and the story of his life is full of romantic details.

Probably not another single person is still alive who remembers the first blast of that stage horn, or who gathered about the coach, which excited great curiosity and wonder when it pulled up before the only tavern the hamlet afforded.

The man referred to is Mr. Rolla Rohrer, who was born October 22, 1807, within a stone's throw of his present home, one and one-half miles east of the city, on the Russellville and Franklin Pike. He is still hale and hearty with apparently many years of life before him. There is probably not another man alive of his age today in the whole country who has gone through the hardships he has passed.

Seven Hours to Nashville

Mr. Rohrer commenced carrying the mail on horseback between this city and Nashville in January 1824 and continued one year. The distance is 50 miles, and the trip was made in seven hours, with several changes of horses. He was assisted on this route by Robert Willis, who was for many years constable in the district. On Jan. 2, 1825, Uncle Rolla drove the first stage coach into this city from Bowling Green.

He says when he drove up before the Russellville Hotel, which stood on the spot where the Grand Central Hotel now stands, that people gathered round and looked at it in wonder and admiration, and asked him any number of questions about the new vehicle.

The next day he commenced driving it from this city to Hopkinsville, and continued for four years without missing a single trip. He would leave this city at two in the afternoon and reach Hopkinsville, 35 miles distant, at six. Returning, he would leave Hopkinsville at 7 a.m. and reach here at noon.

At the beginning of 1829 Mr. Rohrer was changed and put on the route from Hopkinsville to Clarksville, over which he drove the stage for more than a year. He was put on this route because there were several rough and dangerous places on it, and several other drivers had met with numerous and costly accidents. Uncle Rolla drove the stage between these two places, a distance of 25 miles, for a year without an accident. He left Hopkinsville at 7 a.m. and reached Clarksville at 10:00 and, returning, reached the starting point at 2 p.m. At this time there was but one tavern in Hopkinsville, called the Budzard Roost, which was run by a man named McGrew. Hopkinsville was at that time a village of about 500 inhabitants.



The tavern at Clarksville, which contained about the same number of people as Hopkinsville, was the best at that time in the section, and was run by Professor William Murrell, who before going to Clarksville taught at the academy in this city which was on the site now occupied by the Logan Female College, one of the best institutions of learning in the South.

Uncle Rolla was again transferred in January, 1830 and drove the stage from this city to Bowling Green, and continued for four years. A job such as this was in that day called a "contract." He left the city at daylight and arrived in Bowling Green at noon. Returning he left the latter city at 3 p.m. and arrived here at 9 p.m. The distance is 30 miles.

Near the end of 1833 Uncle Rolla's employer, Major John Gray, one of the best and most popular men who ever lived in this section, died, and in Jan. 1834 Uncle Rolla took a contract from Bowling Green to this city. After driving two years between these points he sold out because he had driven over the road nearly every day for six years and had grown tired of it.

In 1836 Uncle Rolla commenced driving the stage 85 miles from Nashville through Springfield, Russellville and Elkton to Hopkinsville. He left Nashville at 12 midnight and arrived at Hopkinsville at 6 p.m. The horses were changed seven times, or every 12 miles. Breakfast was taken at Springfield at a tavern run by George Cheatham, who was succeeded after his death by Mr. Palmer. Dinner was taken here at the Russellville Hotel, which was then run by G. Byrne, father of Dr. J. Byrne, who for several years was superintendent of the Anchorage Asylum, and who still lives in this city, hale and hearty at 73 years of age. Supper was taken at Hopkinsville at J. P. Campbell's tavern. On the return trip he left Hopkinsville at 3 a.m.; had breakfast at Elkton at a tavern run by a Mr. Crabbe, took dinner in Springfield and arrived at Nashville at nine.

Crossing the Ohio

The next contract Uncle Rolla took was in 1838 from Centerville, Caldwell County, now Fredonia, to Equity, Illinois, a distance of 40 miles. Because of the rough roads, severe weather, inconvenience and dangers of crossing the Ohio, he sold this contract at the end of a year, and retired to private life on his farm near this city where he has lived ever since.

He is one of the pioneer stage coach drivers and the oldest one living the the state, and perhaps in the U. S. He never weighed more than 150 pounds in his life, and tips the scales now at 132. He frequently walks to town and back again. When he starts to town he says he hasn't time to ride, and as soon as he attends to business he returns home.

He's very fond of the young people and seems never better pleased than when he has a number around him. He is as fond of talking as a 16 year old girl, and never tires of relating his stagecoaching experiences. Railroads, he says, have ruined the country. People are not so well contented now as they were before the advent of the iron horse and money is scarcer.

Mr. Rohrer is one of the most remarkable men of the state. His father was born in Germany and came to this country, arriving in Baltimore, about the time of the Declaration of Independence. The Rohrer family is a long-lived one. His grandmother on his mother's side lived to 110. His father, John Rohrer, died at 91 from the affects of an accident.

Uncle Rolla was sick but twice in his life. In 1847 he had a slight attack of fever and three years ago he had a wrestle with the grippe, which came near downing the old gentleman. For four weeks he had to sit in a chair. The physician who attended him during the last illness says he has the most remarkable constitution of any man he ever saw.

Mr. Rohrer has never had a headache, never had the toothache until he was 83 and still cracks hickory nuts with his teeth, of which he has lost but one. His

hair is grey and his beard is perfectly white. His appetite is good, and he eats heartily three times a day. Nine o'clock is his hour for retiring and he sleeps soundly until about 4:00 when he rises and sits around the fire until breakfast. A week or so before Christmas he plowed an acre of ground just to be doing something.

It is impossible to keep him in the house, even in the most disagreeable weather. He says he can't stand to be housed up.

He is a little deaf, but his eyesight is good, and he can see a chicken a quarter of a mile. A physician told him 50 years ago to begin chewing and smoking tobacco. He took up the use of the weed at once, and still continues it, smoking and chewing. For medicine he chews sassafras roots and peach tree bark, which he firmly believes keeps him in good condition.

The Biggest Eater

In his balmy days Uncle Rolla had the reputation of being the biggest eater in this section. He was always hungry, and never missed an opportunity to eat. He could easily clean up a turkey hen, he says. Long years ago, when the old market house stood on the Square here, a free Negro woman was in the habit of selling chicken pie, and one day, when he had just come in from one of his trips, unusually hungry, he concluded he would go up and make his dinner off of chicken pie.

He asked the old colored woman the price of a meal. She told him 25 cents. He told her he would give her a dollar for all he could eat. She accepted the proposition and he cleaned the platter. As he was finishing up the old woman said: "Law sakes boss! Dat pie had six chickens in it!" That finished him with that woman, for she would never sell him anything afterwards. Uncle Rolla delights in telling of this instance.

Escape from Death

The most remarkable escape from death Uncle Rolla ever had was one Monday morning in June, 1830, while driving the stage from Hopkinsville to Clarksville. He had driven his coach and horses onto the ferry boat at the point where the Red River empties into the Cumberland, near Clarksville. The boat was of the old time pattern, with gunnels about 12 inches high, without railings, and propelled by oars.

After he had gotten into the stream a short distance he got his bucket and was going to give the horses water, as was his wont. While thus engaged, he called to a Negro, dressed in white and lying in front of the horses, to get up. The Negro jumped up so quickly frightened the two front horses. They jumped over the side of the boat, carrying Mr Rohrer with them.

When the two lead horses went over they pulled the other two with them; but the high gunnels prevented the coach from following them. The four horses struggled hard to free themselves, and in pawing the water with their feet in their frantic efforts they badly cut Uncle Rolla's head and shoulders.

He finally succeeded in getting out from under the horses, and, in spite of his crippled condition swam to the boat, cut the horses loose, and they swam ashore. Everyone who witnessed the sight thought the horses would surely kill him, but his escape was due to his presence of mind. He drove the stage on the Clarksville, where his wounds were dressed, and sat out on his regular trip the next morning.

Still in the Ring

Uncle Rolla had many varied experiences, and many close calls for his life while carrying the mails and driving stagecoaches, and always came out a little disfigured but still in the ring and ready for duty.

The grim master, Death, came near overtaking Uncle Rolla while crossing the Ohio River in 1838 at Fords Ferry, which, by the way, still retains the name.

He was on the Illinois side and started across in a small skiff. When about in the middle of the river he was overtaken by floating ice, which carried him down several miles before he could make his escape. He said he thought his time had come.

One winter morning in 1828 Uncle Rolla left Elkton for Hopkinsville in a heavy rain. His big coat and all of his clothing were soon wet to the skin. The weather suddenly turned cold and when he reached Hopkinsville his clothes were frozen stiff and he had to be taken from his seat more dead than alive. A pint of brandy was poured down him at one time, but it had no more effect than water would have. Chances looked against him for some time, but after a few hours he was brought around all right.

At another time Uncle Rolla came near freezing to death while carrying the mail from this city to Princeton for another mail carrier with whom he had swapped trips. He left this city about midnight, and just before day a heavy snow began to fall and seemed to fall thicker and heavier the further he went. It was hard work to get his horse to move on in the blinding snow, which fell to a depth of six inches while he was going twelve miles. When he reached Princeton he had to be taken from his horse and restoratives applied.

Never a Fine

When the mail carrier failed to make connection with another stage or carrier he was fine \$50, but Mr. Rohrer was fortunate never to have a fine assessed against him.

When asked if he remembers the cold weather of 1835, to which our older citizens refer to so often, he said, yes, but that was mild compared to the cold snap just before Christmas in 1826. A heavy rain fell one morning and made the ground quite soft. Shortly afterwards a regular Northern blizzard set in and the weather got very cold in a short time.

He said that sheep huddled together in the field to keep warm. They actually froze to the ground and had to be chopped out and taken to the barn. In spite of the bitter cold Uncle Rolla drove the stage the same day to Hopkinsville in four hours.

Uncle Rolla has never taken membership with any church, but leans toward the Cumberland Presbyterian denomination, to which his wife adhered. He has been a church goer all his life, and still attends the services at the different churches in his vicinity.

ROLLY RHORER CEMETERY

This cemetery is located about 1/2 mile from the Russellville city limits on the Franklin Road (KY 100). It is in a field across the road from the house owned in 1981 by Mr. Perry Riley. Tombstones were read 18 Oct 1981 by Mrs. Drucilla S. Jones, Mr. Joe Rohrer and Mr. & Mrs. Hershel E. Russell.

THE SAGA OF THE YANKEE PEDDLER
(continued from previous issue)

How did you know that a peddler was honest and reliable? If he had the nerve to make a return trip you could usually depend upon his integrity. Unfortunately there were those peddlers whose credibility was in question. A good example was the clock peddler who entered the main street of a small town where he readily sold a clock to each resident on both sides of the street. As he neared the last house he realized that it was a dead end street and he then remembered that not one of the clocks would work. Here creativity prevailed and in making his exodus had but one clock left and as each resident confronted him with a defective clock he would say, "I have but one left which I will exchange with you." Through this leap-frog process he hastily retreated from the little community.

The Yankee peddler must have had an all-consuming desire for financial profit or an overwhelming thirst for adventure. The hardships endured in traversing the dim pathways were incredible. Today ribbons of hard surfaced roads take us anywhere in the country that we desire to travel. Rivers and streams are crossed without a thought of slowing down.

In the 1700's cartographers exhausted the language in a quest for the appropriate descriptive terminology for the most superior roadways of the time. Pleasurable excursions were unheard of, there being hardly anything you could even walk along. The peddlers' need for roads gave birth to our modern highway system.

Who were the original road builders? The Romans, of course! Stone roads were built utilizing the larger stones in the hollows and the smaller stones on higher ground. Crevices were then filled with crushed stone made by slaves and enemy captives.

Our first roads were paths worn by wild animals in search of food, water and salt. Inadvertently the Indians gave the white man the only human assistance in blazing new trails. Having no knowledge of the wheel the Indians carried all goods on their backs traveling single file through the dense woodlands. Thus evolved the well-known Indian trails.

This ingenious entrepreneur gave us the origins of a now defunct institution called the general store. In each area an accessible location was secured where the peddler temporarily set up shop. Here persons came from the more remote settlements to purchase their wares. Rivers and lakes were also vital links in the roadways of the peddler. Many of this breed had floating stores on rafts and as they floated down the water would toot their horns to alert prospective customers, hence the old expression "a whole raft of goods."

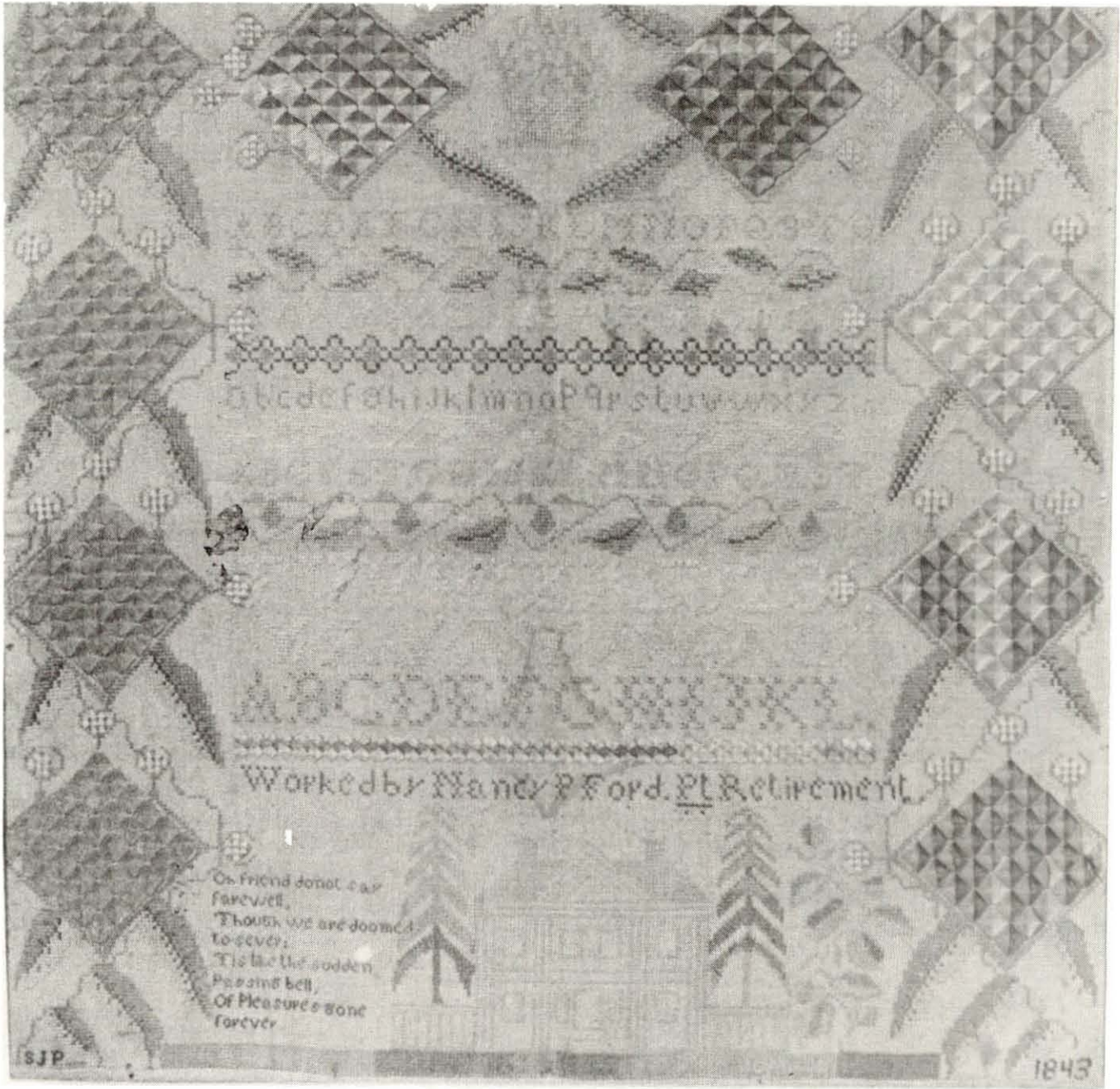
The limitations of waterways made it imperative to find alternate routes by land. Gradually Indian trails became wider, trodden by leather boots and horses' hooves. The first horses in the eastern United States arrived in 1635 and were Flemish horses called Narragansett pacers. This breed was adapted to saddle use rather than for pulling purposes.

In the aftermath of the Revolution until the beginning of the nineteenth century a thirst for adventure was evidenced. No longer were there trade restrictions on the former colonists and young peddlers were breaking loose from the old provincialism. A continuous chorus of voices now demanded new and better roads.

In 1785 Virginia began building the first turnpike in the country which ran from Alexandria to the Shenandoah Valley. The great Thomas Jefferson was a moral and financial backer. The fever spread to Maryland and by 1787 a road with tollhouses was constructed from Baltimore to York.

In England Loudon McAdam built roads of small gravel spread over a crowned surface, unmixed with soil, clay and sand. This "macadamized" process was soon widely used in this country. (To be continued-"How Peddlers Lived.")

ADDENDUM TO JAMES AND ELIZABETH (JOHNSON) PEART FAMILY CHART:

James PEART's obituary in the Clarksville TN Weekly Chronicle, Jul-Aug 1865, said that he was born at Waxhaw, SC 25 Dec 1782, and was taken in 1783 to Fayette Co KY where he was reared by someone named F. BENNING, whose relationship to James is not given. The BENNING family of Fayette Co KY had recorded transactions with people named JOHNSON and SUMMERS who are identified relatives of Elizabeth JOHNSON, whom James PEART was to marry in January 1806. Additionally, Elizabeth (JOHNSON) PEART's uncle Samuel JOHNSON was an adjoining Fayette Co landowner and neighbor of Leroy PEART and also of Griffin PEART, who is the most likely candidate for father of James. Griffin and Leroy had a brother Francis PEART, who was then living in adjacent Woodford Co KY. The PEART brothers were all born in Northumberland Co VA to the Rev. Francis PEART and his wife Sarah GRIFFIN. This compiler has never found anything to suggest why James PEART's mother was in The Waxhaws, bisected by the Union Co NC-Lancaster Co SC line, at the time of his birth. If his mother was in fact Elizabeth RICHARDS, wife of Griffin PEART, she was about 50 years of age in 1782. Perhaps she died giving birth, which could account for James having been reared by strangers.

From Goodspeed's History of Cooper Co., MO, Biographical Sketches: "(The father of) W. S Parson, who came to Missouri in 1839, married Miss Sarah A Wilkerson, daughter of James G. and Elizabeth Smith Wilkerson, pioneers of Cooper Co."

History of Cooper County, Missouri, by Henry C. Levens and Nathaniel M. Drake, St. Louis: Perrin & Smith, 1876, pp. 165-6: "Thomas Parsons, born in Virginia 1793, moved to Franklin, Simpson Co KY about 1819, emigrated to Cooper Co MO 1826, settled at Otterville. In 1826 there were only three families west of Lamine: James G. Wilkerson, William Reed, and William Sloan. . . . James G. Wilkerson was from Kentucky and settled the farm now owned by George W. Smith one mile west of Otterville." (Thomas Parsons married Polly M Wilkerson 21 July 1817 in Logan Co KY.)

Cooper County, Missouri, Cemetery Records, Vol VII, published 1981 by Elizabeth P. Ellsberry, Box 206, Chillicothe, MO 64601, p 73: "One mile west of Otterville MO, on farm owned by George W. Smith in 1919 (is the Wilkerson Family Plot). The old graveyard was a few yards south of the old mansion where the Wilkerson family spent many years of their lives. (James G. Wilkerson, from Kentucky, and several members of his family are buried there.)"

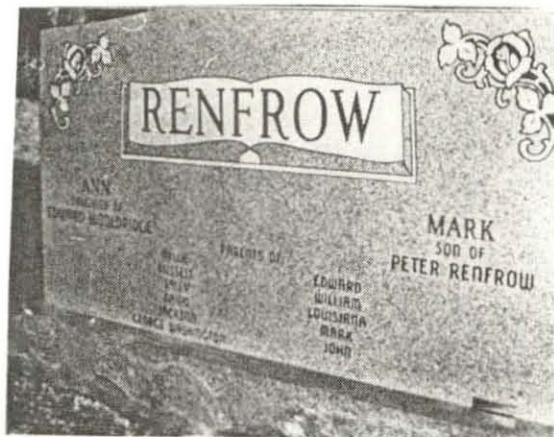

The Mt. Pleasant school in 1896 was a log building that stood next to the Mt. Pleasant Church of Christ. The old log building was replaced about 1902 by a frame one room building. At this time the school was called Indian Creek. The Mt. Pleasant Church is located about 10 miles north of Bowling Green (Warren County) in the Anna community. It is adjacent to the Richardsville-Anna Road (Highway 185), and near Green River.

BOOK REVIEWS

Marriages of Some American Residents and Guide to Documents, Volumes I through VIII - compiled and published by William Yates, Yates Publishings Co., P.O. Box 237, Ozark, MO 65727. These books are 8 1/2 by 11, softbound, and contain, in aggregate, over 2,000 pages - over 150,000 marriages. These marriages are listed alphabetically by both bride and groom and each marriage gives name, date and place of birth of both bride and groom, place and date of marriage, document from which data was taken, type of document, and number of pages. Names and addresses of person submitting documents are included. These books are set up so that a researcher may write Yates Publishing Company and for a modest fee (25 cents per page plus \$2.00 mailing and handling fee per order) obtain xerox copies of the original documents or write for information directly to the person who submitted it. The Record Book of the Christian Church, Hustonville, Kentucky, 1858-1944 transcribed here is a hand written record of some of the affairs of the Christian Church in Hustonville (Lincoln County), Kentucky over a period of time from 1858 to 1944. The compilers have preserved, in so far as possible, the character of the record and have not attempted to correct spelling or punctuation. A first name index has been compiled and added of all of the 1100+ people named. Over 250 different surnames are listed.

This book could prove valuable to researchers seeking records of pioneer families who settled in the Lincoln and Casey Counties, Kentucky area in the late 1700's and early 1800's. Many of these families moved on later into Western Kentucky, Western Tennessee, Southern Illinois, Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas and points west.
