As is shown in the Procedure Manual of ABWA-"If a member misses three consecutive meetings Without a valid excuse, her name, and recommendation that she be contacted by the Chapter President. shall be presented to the Recording Secretary, the committee sponsor, for action by the Executive Board. The President shall caontact the member, and it is determined that the member is no longer Anterested in active chapter membership, the Executive Board shall declare the member a memberat-large and the President shall notify her by letter that her name has been dropped from the chapter's membership roster. A copy of this letter is to be sent to National Headquarters. The member's status is that of a member-at-large so long as her annual national dues are paid, and she does not affiliate with a local chapter."

"Any member in good standing nationally, whose name has been dropped from the roster of a chapter, and who desires reinstatement, shall be required to obtain approval of the Membership Committee of the chapter, pay chapter dues, and attend two consecutive meetings before regaining active chapter membership status."


So that each member will thoroughly understand the policy pertaining to membership status, it is recommended that once a year the Shapter Bulletin carry the above two paragraphs from the Manual.

A big THANK YOU to each one who helped in any capacity.


We had a net profit of \$125.00 for our Scholarship and Education Fund.

7 STEPS TO ACTION

Do you consider yourself to be a prudent person? Asking these questions may help you find an answer:

1. Do I learn from past experience and mistakes,

both my own and those of others?

2. Do I put first things first? Or do I allow careleseness or pleasure to divert me from seeking my own best interests and those of my neighbor?

3. Do I have clear, logical reasons for myu actions? Or do I allow emotion to cloud my judgment?

4. Do I recognize my own inadequacy and willingly learn from those wiser than myself?

5. Am I decisive? Do I act when I am reasonably sure I am right?

6. Do I carefully gauge the consequences of

my actions? Or do I blindly blunder ahead?

7. Do I make false prudence a cloak for apathy, timidity or refusal to sacrifice my own comfort to protect the God-given rights or others? Or do I realize that true prudence often involves courage and self-denial?
