Prelude to Charm

In some ways, becoming charming and attractive is like learning to be a good secretary. You can acquire some beauty skills just as you mastered the touch system. On the other hand, being a good secretary involves many abstract qualities

-personality, intuition, pleasant disposition, etc.

If you're a happy person, chances are you're charming, even if you're not pretty in the usual sense. Many of the fabled beauties of history seem disappointing to modern tastes, yet surely they must have radiated an indefinable magnetism. Think of ordinary-looking stage actresses who, on stage, glow with a beauty that can't altogether be explained by grease paint. It's part presence, part voice, part personality, part posture and bearing, part confidence and verve. Mix well, season to taste, and voilá—a lovely woman. It can be you!

And if you're lovely, charming, attractive and interest-

ing, there will be many who will find you beautiful!

Step 1 is fun. Look in your mirror. Stand tall and straight. Practice smiling—and learn how to smile with your eyes, too.

Do you know how to smile? The wrong way is the tense smile that barely opens the lips. It creates a slight tightness in the chest that you can feel even in your stomach. An open smile is the real smile. Open your lips, dilate your nostrils, smile until you feel the muscles move over your cheekbones.

This trick may be harder than you think, especially if you're shy. You may feel a bit foolish the first few times you try it. But keep it up, not only to improve the appearance of your smile and flexibility of your mouth, but also to feel more alive, more relaxed.

Catch yourself in the mirror from time to time as you walk down the street. Don't just look to see if your hat is on straight. Check your smile, your posture and the light in your

eves.
