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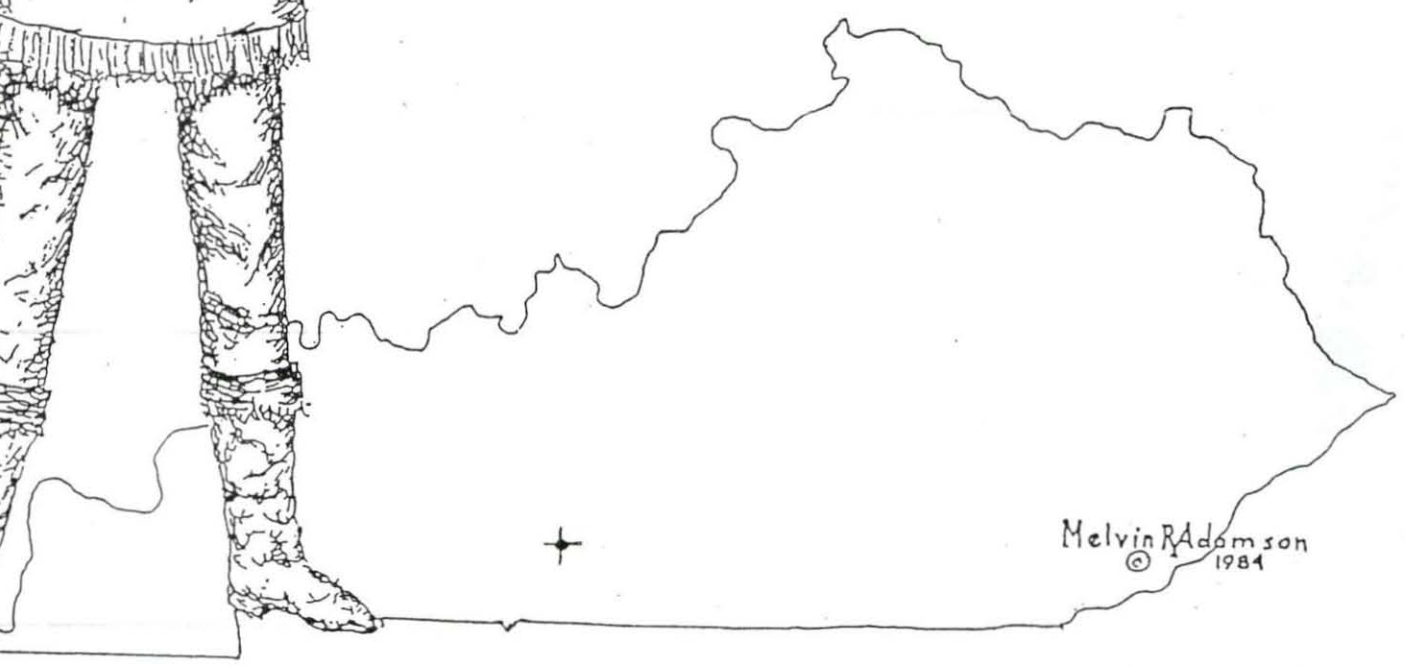

CARTER CLARIFICATION

Van A. Stille, 3812 Sweetbrair Rd., Wilmington, NC has shared some information on Frances E. (Chilton) Jenkins Carter, the wife of Elihu Carter which will be of value to all those working on the Carter line. For many years Mr. Stille thought her maiden name was Jenkins and despaired of finding her parents but he then discovered she was the widow Jenkins when she married Elihu Carter.

Frances, born 11 Feb 1778, died 18 Jul 1860, buried Mt. Olivet Cem, was the daughter of John and Elizabeth Chilton. She married ca 1798 Sampson Jenkins and bore him six children. Sampson died in Jun 1810 in Loudoun VA and six months later Frances married Elihu Carter there. By 1814, this couple, with some of her Jenkins children and their Carter children, her mother Elizabeth [who md 2nd Thomas Mews/Muse] and a number of other in-laws and relatives had relocated in Warren Co KY.

Joseph Moore was born 06 May 1776 in North Carolina and died in Warren County KY 21 Apr 1863. His first wife was Elizabeth _____, born 21 May 1790, died 19 Aug 1841. He married second in Warren Co 20 Oct 1842 Rebecca Wantland, b KY. Joseph and Elizabeth are buried at Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Matlock & Plano Rds, Warren Co. Deeds recorded in Warren Co: BK 6, P 205; BK 7, P 293; BK 15, P 280; KY 16, P 325; BK 17, P 361; BK 24, P 155.

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 REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION APPLICATIONS

JAMES R. ALEXANDER

W 2901 MD
 Dorcas

Allen County KY 14 May 1833 before Judge of Circuit Court. James R. Alexander, aged 76, deposes: I was born in the state of Pennsylvania and was living in Cecil County MD when called into service. Have since lived in Mecklenburg County NC and Allen (late Warren) County, Kentucky and in 1776 was student in Nassau College, NJ. On 01 Aug 1776 enlisted as private in the company of Capt. Walter Alexander in the "Maryland Flying Camp." Was immediately appointed sergeant for his company.

Discharged about 01 December 1776 and commenced the study of medicine; returned to father's in NC. In May 1780 volunteered as a surgeon to care for those who had survived the taking of Charleston, SC and the Massacre of Colonel Buford's VA Regt. by Tarlton. Continued in the service till 15 October 1780 and then was appointed surgeon to a regiment of militia raised in Mecklenburg Co NC commanded by Colonel William L. Hudson, Dandson. Served until about February or March of 1781.

Refers to Mark Garrison, John Salon, Edmund Waggoner, who can testify as to his character and veracity. Peyton Welsh, a clergyman, and Willis Mitchell testify as neighborhood witnesses.

Asher W. Graham, Judge of Allen Circuit Court. May 1839 before William Foster, Justice of the Peace for Allen Co., Dorcas Alexander, aged 72, deposes: She is widow of James R. Alexander and she married him 26 November 1789 in Mecklenburg County NC and he died 11 March 1836.

09 May 1830 in Allen County. Mary S. Alexander, Dorcas Reese Alexander, John G. Alexander and Joseph T. Wilson swore under oath to knowing said Dorcas Alexander to be the widow of James Alexander, and they now have before them a family Bible record of the marriage, which took place 26 November 1789.

Sworn before William Foster, J.P. On 01 September 1848 in Allen Co., Dorcas Alexander, aged 82, makes an affidavit before A. C. Alexander, Justice of the Peace.

Parke Co., IN, 20 May 1839, Mark Garrison swears an oath that James R. Alexander of Allen Co KY, who was an acting surgeon in the army of the U.S.A. was married to Dorcas Garrison in York County SC in 1789 and that he died in Allen County KY in 1836.

Sworn before Robert M. Gikleson, J.P.: On 05 June 1856, Mark Alexander, son and heir of James and Dorcas Alexander, deceased, does in his own right and in the name of Silas, Charles G., Mary S., Abigail B., James R., John G., and Dorcas R. Alexander, who are the only surviving children of the said James and Dorcas Alexander appoint James G. Austin, Esq. of Washington City their lawful attorney.

On 10 May 1834, James R. Alexander writes to Mr. Lewis Cass, Sec'y of War, Washington: I wrote to two of my good brothers in Mecklenburg County, NO, one of them I know, if living, could testify to my services. The letter to my two brothers being directed to my eldest, my third and younger brother informs me, was not taken out of the post office, he being dead to whom it was directed. . . Enclosed I send you deposition of Capt. William Alexander and Robert Robison. [Note: It is not clear that this Capt. William Alexander is a relative.] Truth to me is, sir, very precious; I would not forfeit my character as a man of truth for all

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the pensions in the world; what would it profit me to gain the whole world if gained by falsehood, and lost my own should? [Note: He is in his 78th year when he writes this letter and he writes clearly and legibly in his own hand.]

Mecklenburg County, NC. On 22 March 1834 William Alexander swears to personal knowledge of the service of Dr. James R. Alexander, late of said county of Mecklenburg and now as he believes of Allen County.

Mecklenburg County, NC. 22 Mary 1834. Robert Robison swears he was intimately acquainted with Dr. James R. Alexander and of his own personal knowledge declares he served as a sergeant in the hospital in the Waxsaw and also in Charlotte, perhaps in 1780.

FAMILY BIBLE RECORDS

Covering Jacket:

Dorcas Alexander, widow of James R. Alexander, inscribed on Roll at \$103.33 to begin 04 Mar 1843, certificate of pension issue 29 June 1843. #4654 --- Kentucky.

Dorcas Alexander inscribed on Roll of Kentucky at the rate of \$103.33 per year to begin 11 March 1836. Certificate of pension issued 26 November 1839.

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REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION APPLICATIONS

ISAIAH ALLEY

PRIVATE VIRGINIA MILITIA

PENSION BEGAN 3/4/1831

Placed on Pension Roll 3/27/1833, at age of 84.

Pension # S 1939

Warren County, Kentucky. On this the 6th day of September 1832 personally appeared the applicant in open court before the Judge of the Warren Circuit Court now sitting, Isaiah Alley, a resident of the county and states aforesaid, age about 82 years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration:

States that he volunteered into the Revolutionary War service from the County of Hanover, and State of Virginia, under the command of Capt. Dabney (he thinks) and in the regiment of Col. William Boyce on a 6 months tour. He rendezvoused at Richmond where he remained some days. He was then detached into the light infantry and marched in the service between the enemy then stationed in their ships on the James River and our army. He was engaged in this description of service about one third of his tour or two months.

He then left and joined the Main Army, then commanded by General LaFayette and marched through various counties of the state and as high as the "point of Fork on James River," guarding the county against the ravages of Cornwallis' Army. From "Point of Fork" he marched down again to Richmond, the enemy having just passed through the town. He pushed on after them to Jamestown--he being under the command of General Wayne. He was in the engagement that took place then. The battle started in the afternoon and continued till night. He saw Wayne (General) have his horse shot from under him. In the engagement Col. Boyce behaved disgracefully and cowardly. He lay down behind a big tree and begged his men to do so, too. Your applicant informed on him. Boyce was tried by a court martial and your applicant was a witness of the fact above stated. He thinks Boyce was broken for his misconduct. Your applicant was on the right wing of the army and the regular on the left in the engagement when a circumstance occurred, which is thought worthy of mention and was seen by your applicant. A British light horseman had for some time been engaged in endeavoring to ascertain the number of the American forces and for that purpose would ride rapidly both around and in front of the extremity of our lines and in the rear of our company. Some of our officers observing this sent for a couple of riflemen. They were asked if they could shoot while flying or remencing. They answered they could, and when they asked for their objective, they were shown the dragoon then moving at the height of his horse's speed. They fired and brought both him and his horse to the ground.

After the battle he crossed the river and remained stationed a few miles from the river until expiration of his tour. This however, was not immediately after this battle.

Your applicant, before the Battle of Jamestown, was in a battle at a place called "Hot Water," just after he had passed through Richmond.

The service just mentioned was performed in the years 1781. He joined the spring (say May) of that year. He was discharged just before the

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capture of Yorktown. He remembers that he was overseer of Col. William Danbridge and that two crops were made during his absence in the army. He also remembers having gone out on some service below Richmond for Col. Danbridge but he does not remember its particulars. He feels free to swear that he served at least a year and has entire evidence that he served longer but will not swear it. He has forgotten nearly all of the events of his service and campaign and his recollection is much impaired. His discharge has been lost. From Virginia he moved to Tennessee and from there to Kentucky. He has no record of his age. He hereby relinquishes all claim to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on a pension roll or agency of any state. He later moved to Tennessee because his son had moved to Tennessee as stated in an application for transfer of pension.

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THE PRICE THEY PAID

Washington Dateline

Have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

Five of the signers were captured by the British, treated as traitors and were tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army; another had two sons captured. Nine of the fifty six fought and died either from wounds or from the hardships of the Revolutionary War.

What kind of men were they? Twenty four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners. They were men of means and well educated, but they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts and died in rags.

Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him and poverty was his reward.

Vandals and/or soldiers looted the properties of Ellery, Clymer, Hall, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Rutledge and Middleton.

At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. The owner quietly urged General George Washington to open fire, which was done. The home was destroyed and Nelson died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their thirteen children fled for their lives. His fields and his grist mill were laid waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart.

Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the leaders of the American War for Independence. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. They were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more. Standing tall, straight and unwavering they pledged: "For the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor."

They lost their lives. They lost their fortunes. They never lost their sacred honor.

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WILLOUGHBY HISTORY

At this time the earliest known **Willoughby** ancestor is **William**, of Dorchester Co MD. It is believed he was born in England and is somehow connected with the Willoughbys that had large land holdings in Virginia, but that is yet to be proven.

MARYLAND WILLOUGHBYS

WILLIAM WILLOBY, b ca 1623, d 1713; married first Hannah _____, married second Anna _____. He was a very large landholder in Dorchester Co MD, and is mentioned in the early records, having imported others into Maryland.

Through research by a local Dorchester County historian, Durward Willoughby was able in 1981 to locate one of the plantations owned by this William Willoughby. The land is now divided. One of the present owners had a high fence with no trespassing signs, but another owner was thrilled that a descendant was interested and gave him permission to go anywhere and take pictures.

We know very little more about this man than:

Andrews's children were: 1) William; 2) John; 3) Francis; 4) Ann Mary (some believe this is Mary Willoughby who md 1784 in VA to William Hardcastle; if so, b. 1730, d. 1782); 5) Richard [see later]; 6) Andrew.
2. SAMUEL md Elizabeth Skinner/Beckwith. Had 1) Martin, b 1712 who had sons Samuel and Titus; and 2) Job.
3. EDWARD.
4. SARAH (youngest daughter).

NORTH CAROLINA WILLOUGHBYS

RICHARD WILLOUGHBY, son of Andrew, born ca 1735 MD, died Aug-Nov 1780; married Margaret _____. Her last name, date and place of marriage not yet found, but marriage took place before the move to North Carolina. Some believe her name to have been "Vincent," as that name was used in several branches of the family.

In 1774 Richard bought land in Johnston Co NC, paying for it with "proclamation money of Maryland," being "late of the province of Maryland."

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In Nov 1780 his will was probated in Johnston Co, leaving everything to Margaret until her death or remarriage, then to the following children:

KENTUCKY WILLOUGHBY'S

SOLOMON WILLOUGHBY, son of Richard, was born before 1766 in Maryland and died 15 Oct 1825 in Allen Co KY. He married first 01 Jan 1785 in NC Martha Clark, b NC ca 1765; married second Sarah _____.

We know he was in Johnston Co NC in 1787 and 1790 and in Allen Co KY in 1820. His will was probated in December 1825 in Allen Co.

It is believed that Solomon came to Kentucky and settled in what is now Allen County a few years after his brother Anthony settled in Warren County. Solomon had only one son, but his Willoughby descendants are many.

John was paying taxes in Warren Co KY in 1799, the year he received a land grant. The next year he bought land from Peter Boucher, and again in 1805 he bought 100 acres from the same Peter Boucher. He is believed to be in the home of Anthony Willoughby in 1810. In 1817 he received KY land grant and in the same year he sold as heir land of his father. In 1818 he sold land to Reubin Osborne and in 1823 he bought land from heirs of Richard A Maupin. The 1830 Census lists John as between 50 and 60 with female same age range, his daughter Mary, his widowed daughter Susanna Lynn with her five children. In 1833 John Sr. sold property to John A. Jr.

He is listed on 1840 Census with wife and male 15-20, possibly a grandson. In 1846 he deeds land to sons Vincent, Hiram, William and John A. Willoughby.

There is no record of John in Kentucky from 1847 to 1859. Some believe he went to Missouri and that Elizabeth died there. In 1860 he is back in Warren County next door to John A. He died 15 May 1867 and is buried across from Bays Fork Church on the Corbitt farm.

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CIVIL WAR DATA BASE CAN TRACE FAMILY TIES

SHILOH VISITORS FIRST TO EXPLORE FILES

Visitors to Tennessee's Shiloh National Battlefield this summer are among the first in the nation to be able to find out if their ancestors, or anyone else for that matter, fought in the Civil War.

The National Park Service and the Civil War Trust unveiled plans to enter information on 3.5 million soldiers on a computerized data base, the Civil War Soldiers Syster, that visitors to battlefields across the country will have access to by 1996.

"Not only genealogists but the high school student who is doing research on a particular battle or unit can use it," said George Rea es, chief of interpretation and resource management at Shiloh National Military Park.

The lone terminal currently in place in the park's visitor center, about 10 miles southwest of Savannah TN, is one of two in the country and is almost constantly in use, park officials said.

Visitors who use that terminal or the one at tehAntietam National Battlefield in Maryland have access to some 58,000 names already entered. An army of volunteers is being recruited from across the country to enter additional reams of information gathered from the National Archies and other sources.

"Volunteers will save the park service about \$4.5 million by entering what amounts to 5.2 million names--not once byt twice--to ensure that there are no omissions or mistakes," said John Peterson, the project manager with the National Park Service.

Since some of the soldiers are listed in the federal records more than once or under different names, there will eventually be more names on the computerized role than soldiers who fought in the war.

"I don't know that anything like this has ever been done before," Peterson said.

The Mormon Church, which has an extensive genealogical data base, will supply volunteers with software and guides for entering the names, park service officials said.

Once the names are entered, other information such as battlefields on which the various units fought and the burial sites of soldiers will eventually be added to the database. The Civil War Trust will raise the money from corporate and other donors to install the terminals at battlefields across the country.

"Tracing your Civil War ancestry provides a tangible link with the past," said Devereaux Cannon, Tennessee Commander of Sons of Confederate Veterans.

"It gives you a more intimate feeling becuae you're dealing with your own family," said Cannon, who has traced his family back to 1066. "It makes history more personal," he said.

Peterson said he thought the "goose-bump effect" of walking over the same ground that your ancestors fought over could spawn a new campaign to protect Civil War sites. "People make a personal connection and feel they have a personal stake in saving Shiloh or a battlefield not currently protected."

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D O W E R R I G H T S

Dower is a term genealogists often encounter in their research but find foreign and confusing. Today, most states have abolished dower. Yet, when genealogists learn the laws that affected dower rights, they have a valuable tool to use in the genealogical research. This article will provide an introduction to some of the principles of dower rights and how the laws can be applied to genealogical problems.

First, a definition. Dower: the provision by law which entitled the widow to a life-estate in the lands and tenements of her husband at his death. This was valid if he died intestate or if she dissented from his will. By English common law, the amount was 1/3 of the real property. Dower represented the minimal right of a woman to her husband's estate. A man could devise his wife **more** than the law required—he could give her his entire estate—but he could not give her less than her dower. If a husband ignored the dower rule in his will, or if the widow was unhappy with his provisions, she could renounce the will and demand an "assignment of her thirds." Dower was for the protection of the widow.

They term "dower" must be contrasted with "dowry." Dowry is the property which a woman brings to her husband in marriage; sometimes called her "portion." One may find a husband referring to a woman's "portion" in his will and **restoring** that property to her at his death.

Now you understand the difference. Unfortunately, many of the clerks who recorded legal transactions in the 18th and 19th centuries did not! They often confused the terms so you must be careful not to do the same. A good example comes from the Dunnigan family of Polk Co MO. William Dunnigan died intestate and letters of administration were issued on 14 February 1842. Two days previous, the widow Rodah Dunnigan relinquished her right to administer by saying, "I hereby renounce all my wright to said letters and prey you would grant said letter to Francis Dunnigan." She then signed a receipt for her "dowry" on 2 March 1843. Rodah Dunnigan did not receive a "dowry" but rather her "dower" rights. This clerk could not spell very well!

The statutes of one state reads: **Every widow shall be endowed of the third part of all lands, whereof her husband was seized—of an estate of inheritance at any time during the marriage to which she shall not have relinquished her right of dower—to hold and enjoy during her natural life.** If the husband does not leave children, she is entitled to 1/2 of real and personal estate which came to the husband.

A number of questions immediately arise for the astute genealogist. The common ones are addressed below, but there are always complications. You will have to consult the statutes in force at the time and in the place you are researching.

(1) If there are no children of the decedent and the widow receives one-half, who receives the other half? Those entitled by intestate law, probably parents, brothers and sisters.

(2) If dower is for her **natural life**, what becomes of the land when **she** dies? The land goes to the heirs of **his** body. If all of the children are theirs together, there is no confusion. But, if the marriage is a second one for her, only her children **by the deceased** will inherit the real property.

(3) Does the wife have to release "her dower" every time her husband sells real estate? Technically, yes. Her private examination agreeing to the sale is designed to insure that her husband has not coerced her into selling the property that by right of dower, she holds a one-third interest.

(4) What happen if the wife did **not** release her dower when property was sold? First, what was the law? In some states in the early 19th century, there was no requirement that the wife release dower. In others, if she didn't protest, the sale went through. The wife could go to court and insist the sale was not legal. To protect himself, the buyer could insist on a bond from the husband or payment to the wife to insure dower release.

(5) Can a researcher assume the wife is probably dead if she **does not** release dower? Unfortunately, no. First, people did not always conform to the letter of the law. Examples have been found where a woman did not release dower, but was still alive. The buyer simply purchased the land and took a risk. Usually, however, if the wife was alive the clerk was sure her dower release was included to clear the title. If the property was mortgaged rather than sold outright, it was not necessary for the wife the release dower.

(6) What if the husband died, but did not own land? What did the widow receive. One third of nothing is nothing.

(7) What if the husband died owing lots of money? In almost all states, dower was assigned to the widow **before** creditors were paid. Therefore, it was guaranteed she would receive something and not become dependent on the state. Have you ever seen an example where a husband left a wife nearly all he owned, but she renounced the will and took her dower-- or thirds--instead? The legacies of a will are subject to the debts being paid; dower is not. One-third of the real property before the debts are paid may have brought her more than all the estate after the debts were paid.

(8) Could the widow sell or pass dower by her will? No, it was for her lifetime use only.

(9) Did a wife receive dower if there was divorce? If he was the one guilty of misconduct, she retained her right of dower. If she was found at fault, she lost her dower rights.

As you research, watch for that significant term "dower." Read the passage carefully to ascertain what is meant.

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T H E L A S T W O R D

Wills may be an important source of genealogical information; contested wills can be particularly useful. All interested parties may appear in the suit, including the husbands of female heirs. Wills may specifically state how people are related, may be available for an ancestor at a time when few other records were maintained, give residences or clues to residences, lead to other records such as land records, religious affiliation and thus church records, military records, date of death. Executors and those signing as witnesses may be relatives, searching records concerning them may lead to information, including the family Bible of the deceased. However, care must be taken when securing relationships from wills. A man may have been married more than once; a wife named in the will may not be the mother of the children.

WAR OF 1812

In Warren County the declaration of war against Great Britain was greeted with great political and patriotic approval. Three companies of volunteers enlisted in the month of September 1812.

To further calls the men responded enthusiastically. Considering the small male population at that time, it appears from the records that this war must have been the most popular ever experienced in this county.

Some of the same names appear several times in various companies, showing that they re-enlisted.

DELAYED BIRTH CERTIFICATES

One may check courthouse records for delayed birth files. Birth certificates have been filed many years after the event by people who did not have an original one on record. Affidavits are sworn to by a family doctor or relative who was present at the birth. Proof of baptism or family Bible records are also used to certify the event. Many delayed birth records were needed to certify birth dates for Social Security.

MELUNGEON DESCENDANTS UNCOVERING HERITAGE

Sneedsville, TENN: Brent Kennedy had always been curious about the dark features that run in his family. A battle with a crippling genetic disease - sarcoidosis - two years ago led him to an answer: Kennedy is a Melungeon. "That's a great breakthrough, but what's a Melungeon?" he says.

The mysterious Melungeons have long been a curiosity in the southern Appalachians. John Sevier, the first governor of Tennessee, found them in the early 1800s in what is now Hancock County in northeastern Tennessee. Melungeons also live in southwest Virginia and western North Carolina. They are not American Indians, black or white, but no one has really been able to say where they came from. Some theories were that they were descendants of the Lost Colony of the Roanoke islands or Lost Tribes of Israel.

Scott Collins, Hancock County clerk and master, is a Melungeon who became curious after seeing a play on the Melungeons in 1969. Since then, he has been trying the find out all he can about his ancestors.

Now, DNA testing by a group of researchers, including Collins and Kennedy, shows that Melungeons were from northwest Africa, and later moved to Portugal and Spain. Kennedy says the DNA testing has shown that Melungeons are a combination of Portuguese, Spanish, Berber, Arab, Jewish and Black. Research has revealed that the blue eyes and long skulls of some Melungeons are common characteristics of some Mediterranean people. Through generations in the New World, Melungeons are also part Native American.

The Melungeons arrived in South Carolina in the 1580s - before the Pilgrims settled at Plymouth, MASS. - and eventually moved to the mountains. Collins and Kennedy say about 250 soldiers and their families settled in four forts in what is now South Carolina. Later, English and French settlers forced the Melungeons (which is a Berber word for "white people") westward. During the years, Melungoens were harshly treated. They were not allowed to vote or own land.

Kennedy estimates some 100,000 Melungeon descendants are living today, although there probably are not any pure Melungeons left.

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Q U A K E R I N F O R M A T I O N

Those of Quaker descent all too often change Quaker plain dates to pagan form. They fail to realize that prior to 1752 the tenth month was December, ninth month was November, eighth month was October and seventh month was September. March was the first month. One should learn the difference in "old style" and "new style" dates as well as double dating. There is also a need to be aware of the loss of eleven days at the time of the change when the day after September 3, 1752 became September 14, 1852.

BOOK REVIEWS

LOGAN COUNTY, KENTUCKY, DEED ABSTRACTS 1792-1813; ABSTRACTS OF DEED BOOKS VOLUMES A1, A, B, C, abstracted by Joyce Martin Murray. Published by Murray, 1993, soft back, 176 pp., full-name index, place index, slave index. Price \$30.00, plus \$3.00 postage & handling (Texas residents add 8.25% tax). Order from Joyce Martin Murray, 2921 Daniels, Dallas, TX 75205.

This latest volume by Murray has caused more than a little jubilation in this Society, as it has long been needed. The area which Logan County encompassed at the time of these abstracts took in a large portion of southcentral and southwestern Kentucky.

Logan County was formed in 1792 and from 1797 to 1819 the following Kentucky counties were formed from the original Logan area: Warren (1797), Christian (1797), Barren (1798), Muhlenberg (1798), Livingston (1799), Henderson (1799), Hopkins (1806), Caldwell (1809), Butler (1810), Union (1811), Allen (1815), Simpson (1919), and Todd (1819).

In these 176 pages are over 1500 abstracts of early deeds, done in Murray's traditional excellent manner--giving all pertinent data from the deeds, including all names mentioned in the various deeds. Murray also included her usual index of places, making it convenient to seek neighbors of the ancestor, and her usual slave index.

This volume is a "must" for every library. It is Murray's eleventh genealogical book--her third on the Logan-Warren area. LOGAN COUNTY, KY, DEED ABSTRACTS 1792-1813 will provide hours of entertainment for any genealogist with roots in the area, so get this on your Christmas list now.

To list your ancestor, society or event in future editions of this book, write to Mrs. Jennings.

The bulk of this book is a surname and subject index, with listings from various countries, including some from the United States. A number refers the reader to a person who is researching a surname, particular name or subject in a particular period and country. An impressive list of over 28,000 referrals is listed here.

A sample from the surname listing is "CONKLIN 1840-1900, OH, USA (26323)." By turning to the back of the book and finding No. 26323, one finds the name and address of a researcher in New York, who wishes to correspond with other researchers who have knowledge of the Conklin family during the latter 1800s.

Also listed here are over 1900 subject topics, by people who wish to contact others with a similar interest. The topics run the gamut of various people in history, various parish records, military regiments, church records, emigration patterns, occupations, etc. Whatever your topic, you should find a research correspondent here. Or perhaps you have information you might share with a researcher.

Other international research tools included in this volume, which will help those reasearching outside the United States, are (1) a directory of genealogical societies in other countries, (2) an international calendar of genealogical events, (3) a listing of international research repositories, (4) ads from researchers in various countries, and (5) tips on how to properly address international mail and enclose proper return postage.

The purpose of this letter is to inform your organization, that for many years I have assembled data from various village church books, in the general area between Cuxhave, Bremen and the old city of Stade. This area has been the ancestral homeland of many Americans whose German ancestors immigrated to America in the 19th and early 20th Century.

My genealogy expertise centers primarily in the northern region of Germany, specifically in the northern sector of the former province of Hannover between the Weser and Elbe Rivers, north of Bremen. I Have collected extensive data on over 40 villages.

I have also published an "Ortssippenburh" (village lineage book) for the village of Misselwarden. The volume is 334 pages and contains all families between 1680 and 1900.

I have assisted many Americans who have searched for ancestral data from the aforementioned region. Specific village names are included with this letter.

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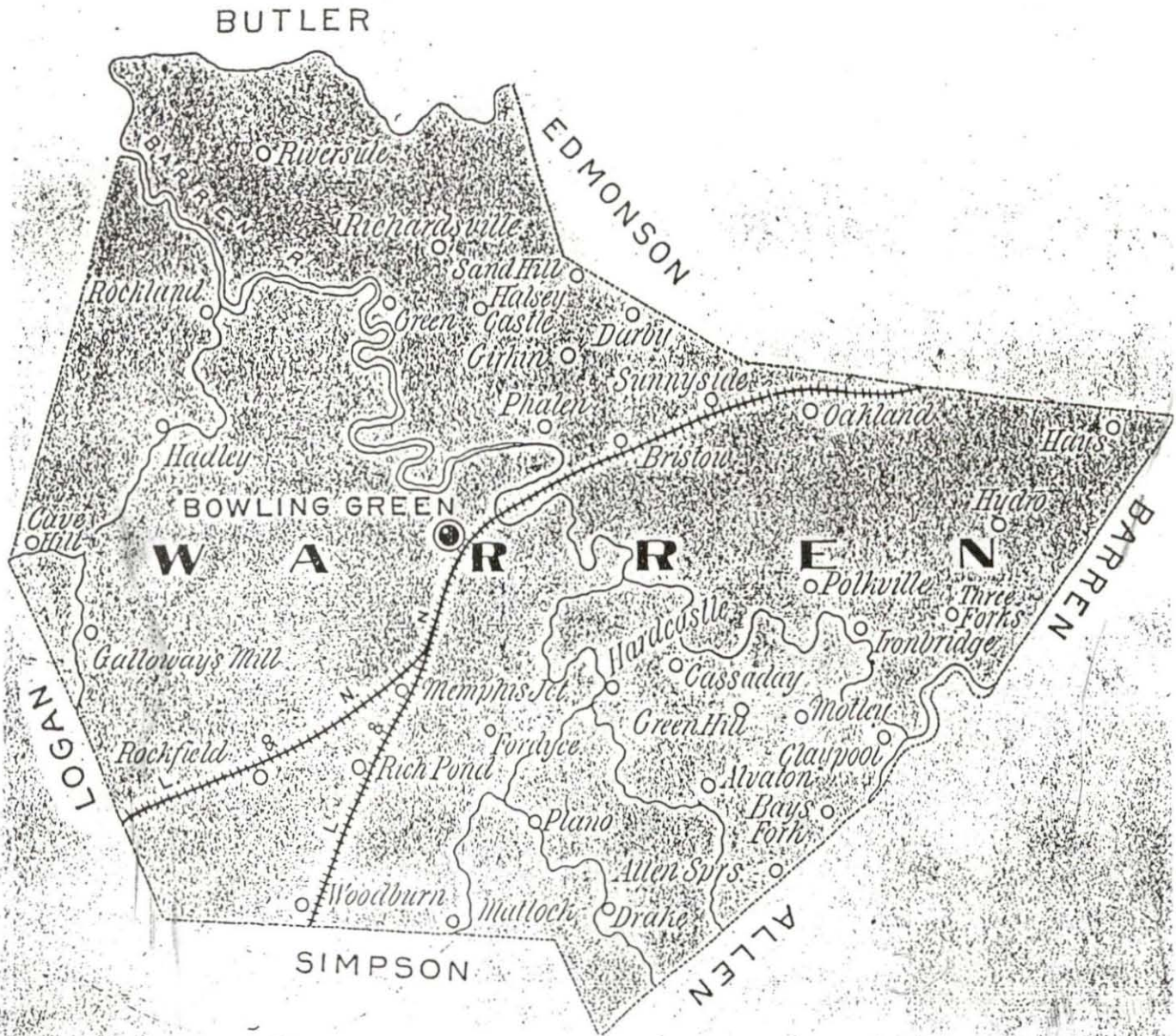
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
