He also spoke briefly on the special called session of the Kentucky Legislature for the purpose of reapportioning the state.

1971 SOUTHEASTERN DISTRICT MEETING

Nautical Norfolk was the site of Action for March 12-14.

140 Chapters were represented by 677 ABWA's from the Southeastern District. Our Chapter was well represented by Jean, Florence, Barbara, Cindy, and me. We had more than any other Chapter from Kentucky. The official activities got underway on Friday evening with a reception for National representatives, National President Marilyn Tucker, National Woman of the Year, Betty Krenzer, Southeastern District Vice President, Daisy Connelly, who also served as Chairman of the meeting.

Saturday morning we were welcomed by a Presentation of Colors under the direction of the 17th Artillery Group and Councilman R. Braxton Hill, Jr. Mrs. Connelly presided over the Symposium. "SWEET WILLIAM BLAIR" and "THE GRAND DUTCHESS" Florence Barrett told us how to "PUT YOUR PERSONALITY IN YOUR PAY CHECK". Mr. Blair advised desire and self evaluation. Mrs. Barrett advised appearance, health, courage, imagination, environment, and mental health as the foundation for your personality.

The Workshops followed the Symposium. (1) Opportunities and Scholarships stressed the advantage of the loans for junior and senior students. At the beginning of each year the amount available is divided between grants and loans 50-50. This year each had \$56,227. Today, ready for May scholarships \$15,635 is available for grants and \$29,000 for loans. (2) Three Ways to Go with Glorine Toohey, introducing us to TFE, three kinds of new chapters-Torchbearer...Friendship...Expansion. She informed us that now perfect attendance is carried over to new chapters and the installation of the new Chapter would count as your monthly meeting for that one month. For expansion, 25 from the present Chapter is enough to charter, no longer is the ten new members required, but it is encouraged. National does not have a hard and fast rule, but when a Chapter reaches 70 they suggest expansion--this gives more members an opportunity to feel active and it holds members better. (3) Setting Goals was led by three District advisors, masine youngs, & & D advisor, Sally Swarty, and

She has served as Publicity Chairman and Membership Co-chairman. Special committees included Auditing and the Fall Hand of Friendship Tea.

Arlene was employed by the Bowling Green City School System and has taught English and Journalism as well as sponsored many activities for the student body.

Arlene was a member of the First Baptist Church of Bowling Green. She was a graduate of Bowling Green High School and Western Kentucky University. Her interests and hobbies were writing, drawing, and reading."
