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

BREMEN

GERMAN-AMERICANS SETTLED THE AREA AROUND 1880.

It wasn't located in the right place and didn't have a name. Finally the name came-Bremen-from the Old World.

The village never boasted a railrod depot in town or have a river at its door or even a hard surface road. It did have a flour and grist mill, a college and some bright, energetic, hard working German-AMericans who propelled it into the 20th. century by human force. It worked and is still working well.

The first settlement in what was later to be called Bremen, was located on the present KY 181, near the McLean County line. Some of the pioneers who settled there between 1795 to 1812 included John WHITMER,Lot STROUD,Jacob NOFFSINGER, Daniel and Dr. John NOFFSINGER, Susan H. STONER,Jacob KITTINGER,John GOSSETT,Mary NOFFSINGER,Christian GISH,Jacob GARST,Reverend Samuel DANNER and Benjamin COFFMAN.

On February 9,1832, a post office was established in the settlement and called Bremen in honor of the first postmaster's (Pete SHAVER) father's home city, Bremen,Germany. The post office was located in a residence near the county line.

On March 10,1857, Benjamin F. ARNOLD became postmaster. Then around 1860,the post office was moved about a mile and a half south to Andrew BENNETT'S store and blacksmith shop. It was first called Bennettsville but later the name changed to match that of the post office.

In the early days Bremen was sometimes called the "Dutch Settlement." That probably came about as a result of the proud German-Americans who settled there and when asked where their decentants came from, answered "from Deutschland"(Germany). Some mistook it to mean "Dutch Land," thence "The Dutch Settlement."

On February 12,1861, John W. MOREHEAD became the postmaster. Then on August 27,1861, B.F. ARNOLD took on that job. Again in that same year, October 3,1861, Thomas MARTIN was installed as postmaster.

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On January 24,1866, Jesse S. HILL became postmaster. Near the end of the year, on November 9,1866, David W. GRUNDY became the seventh postmaster of the village.

In 1869, the town was incorporated and listed a population of approximately 75. There were two stores, two tobacco factories and a blacksmith shop in Bremen at the time.

On January 12,1870, Richard D. SIMMONS was appointed postmaster, then later that same year,on September 19,1870, David GRUNDY again became the village postmaster. About a year later on Sept. 14,1871, John E. RHOADES took over the job as postmaster. On July 1,1872, Richard B.SUMMERS inherited the job as postmaster. During the same year,on November 14,1872, the job changed hands again and James N.CALHOUN was installed as the Bremen postmaster.

On April 21,1876, John Henry **FROST** took on the postmaster's job. Then on November 27,1876, storekeeper Andrew **BENNETT** became the fourteeth postmaster of Bremen. On June 28,1881, Joseph A. SHAVER took office of postmaster and on March 19,1886,E.R. **RUST** was selected postmaster. On February 12,1889,Joseph C. SHAVER took on the postmaster's job.

On September 9,1889, The Bremen College and Perryman Male and Female Academy was opened, with Milton T. BROWN as president.

The first trustees were Joseph SHAVER, John HUMPHREY, Peter SHAVER the Reverend John PERRYMAN and Joseph WHITMER.

The object of the school was to offer a preparatory course to those intending to enter the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church and to offer general education courses to others.

What was known as the college building later became a public school. However, the school buildings (Bremen grade and high school) used today are in a different location.

On November 20,1893, Jesse MILLARD became the nineteenth postmaster. A year later on December 10,1894, Clarence WOODBURN became the postmaster. Four years later, on December 12,1898, William M. LEWIS was appointed postmaster. Then William J. STIRSMAN became postmaster on August 29,1907.

Beginning in 1908, the Madisonville,Hartford & Eastern (MH&E) Railroad was being constructed through the Bremen area. The job of clearing the right-of-way and laying the dirt roadbed was laboriously accomplished with mules,slip scrapers and shovels. One of those help build the Bremen-Mogg section of the line was Tom SIMMONS,100,of Drakesboro.

The contractors for the portion of the railroad was Lewis and Zollie KIRKPATRICK of Greenville and Penrod. The job was completed in 1910.

ORIGINAL MUHLENBERG SETTLERS

The following article appeared in the Nov. 11,1971 issue of the Times-Argus.

Editor's Note-- The following article is part of Chapter XI of "Two Centuries of Brothervalley" by the Rev. H. Austin COOPER. It concerns the migration to Muhlenberg County from Pennsylvania of members of the Church of the Brethren, commonly called the Dunkers. The migration was headed by Capt. Henry ROTH,Jr., who changed his name to RHOADS. He became Muhlenberg's first representative in the Kentucky General Assembly and named this county for Gen John Peter Gabriel MUHLENBERG, his commanding general in the Revolutionary War.

The Kentucky Migration: 1785

The terrible winter of 1784-85 all but depleted the hopes of the frontiersmen who had faith in the crops of the spring and summer. The snows began early in October and continued almost without letup until after Easter. This is not uncommon to the area as the storms both in summer and winter come quickly and violently and often last for long periods without diminshing in force and fury. The altitude and the formation of the mountains to the west and east cause the storms to funnel into this area. As related to the former section on Brothers Valley, the area is like an inverted saucer or dish lifted up above the surrounding countryside. Thus the storms beat heavily upon the land and temperature drops quickly and holds on for many weeks sometimes without varying much either way. On Easter Monday when the sun shined warmly, the snow measured 85 inches on the level. This was one of the contributing factors for so many people leaving the area. However, this was only one.

Perhaps the other factors that induced the settlers to seek more pleasant settlement in the southern wilderness were the stories of some of their relatives such as Capt. Henry **ROTH** Jr. and Phillip **ASWALD** who had traveled extensively in the Ky country. They came back with glowing tales about the rich and fertile grasslands of the "blue grass region." At that early time most of the land was unsettled and there seemed to be room for all to settle in a more temperate climate. No doubt, the determing factor for their departure from Bruedersthal in the summer of 1785 was the dual fact that the State of Virginia offered free land to her soldiers who fought in the Revolution.

Many of the young men who had joined the Brothers Valley Militia and followed General George WASHINGTON throughout his campaigns against the British, recieved large land grants in then what was called "Western Virginia", which was the Kentucky County.

Capt. Henry ROTH, Jr. led more then 100 to Kentucky from Pennsylvanis, Marland, Virginia and what is now West Virginia. Several from New Jersey joined the band at New MArket, VA. in the early part of the summer of 1785 and preeeded to the new "promised land."

For the most part the people in the party were listed as heads of families. To be sure, there were many children in the group. It seems that they went by way of Wichester, VA. and tere met a group from Maryland, especially from Washington and Fredrick counties. It is know that at least a dozen from the Pipe Creek country, in what is know Carroll County, met them at Winchester and accompanied them to New MArket, VA. Here they rested for several weeks before going on to the Roanoke Settlement where many others met the band and proceeded on their way.

The other reason for so many going along with the small band of leaders who recieved "military grants" were those who were termed later in Kentucky as "squatters" on the land. These people had the approval of these who recieved the grants. They were the workers and the tillers of the soil for these large landholders. Many of them later bought tracts for their homes and seettled permanently in Kentucky. About 1800 there was another movement from Kentucky across the Ohio River into Ohio, Indiana,Illinois,Missouri and into the Black Hawk country of Iowa. Now for the heads of families in Captain Henry's band:

Elder George BOONE, brother of Daniel, elected to the eldership in Stony Creek Church in Pennsylvania,1770;also became active elder in Kentucky and Ohio. 4. Daniel ARNOLD, ordained, Brother Valley, 1780; moved to Bever Run, West Virginia. 5. David MARTIN, son of Elder George Adam MARTIN, became an elder in Ky,after 1785. 6. Jacob MILLER, elected to ministry Stony Creek Church, 1764, went to Beaver Dam, Md., 1771; to Virginia, 1785. 7. Jacob MAUGEN 8. John HUBER, elected to ministry, 1774, Stony Creek Church, ordained 1784; settled in Logan Co.Ohi., first resident Elder of Stony Creek Church, Ohio. 9. Jacob LANDIS, brother of Elder John LANDIS, of Brothersvalley settled in Rockingham Co. Va. 10.Daniel LEATHERMAN Jr, became an elder in Kentucky. 11. George STOY, settled in southwest Kentucky, near Louisville. 12. John GARVER (GARBER), ordained, Stony Creek Church 1771, went to Beaver Dam, Md., 1771, went to Virginia, 1785, son of John Sr. 13. John FRAZER (FRAZIER), settled in Muhlenberg Co. Ky., which was them Logan. 14. Henry MOORE (MOHR) settled in Logan Co. Ky., thence to Logan

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Ohio. 15. George STAUFFER, settled in Ky, near Greenville. 16. John ZIGLER (ZIEGLER) went to Southern Ohio. 17. George LEHMAN, settled in Lower Miami, Ohio county. 18. George NOFFSINGER, went to Tennessee and on to settle near Greenville,Ky. 19. George Henry LONG, from near Meyersdale, Pa., to Logan Co. Ky. 20. Jacob ENGLE and wife Catherine, from Pipe Creek, Md., settled in Logan Co. Ky. 21. John BOWMAN, (see Henry Winterberger Fort enlistees, 1774) ordained minister, Stony Creek Church, Pa. 1778; led a group to Ky. 1780, went with this group, 1785. 22. John MEYERS, settled at Flat Rock section, Va. 23. Jacob HERTZLER (HARTZLER), settled in Logan Co. Ky. 24. George CASSEL, from Eastern Pennsylvania, settled in Ky., thance to Southern Ohio. 25. William KNEPPER, settled in western Logan Co. Ky., now Muhlenberg. 26. George BERKLEY (BARCLAY), settled in Southwestern Ky. 27. George NEWMOYER (NEWMEYER), claimed military land in S.W. Kentucky. 28. Philip ASWALD (OSWALD) these two were of the "Original 17 Members", claimed military land in Kentucky. OSWALD went on to Indiana after 1800. 29. Jacob KIMMEL, became as elder in 1785, in Kentucky, went to S. Ohio. Lived in Tennessee before going to Ohio about 1805. 30. Henry WINTERBERGER, one of the "originial 17" and wife Mary, settled near Greenville, Ky.; fought in Revolution. 31. Samuel HARSHBERGER, settled in Logan Co.Ohio; sons became Monnonites. 32. Jacon NEWMILLER and wife settled in S.W. KEntucky. 33. David GEBEL (became CABLE in Kentucky). 34. David BERKLEY (BARCLAY), settled near Blood River on TN-Ky. line. 35. Henry BERKLEY (tradition in Pennsylvania says the Berkley Creek was named for him). 36. William BUEGHLEY (BEEGHLEY), settled in Logan Co. Ky. went to Southern Ohio. 37. George LEATHERMAN, son of Elder David LEATHERMAN, became an Elder in S.Ohio. 38. Peter BAKER (BECKER) settled in Logan Co., later called Muhlenberg Co. 39. Peter SHAVER, father of the famous Judge Benjamin J. SHAVER, Muhlenberg Co. Peter had been an Indian trader in Brothers Valley Pa.; settled in Bremen, Ky. (Muhl. CO.) 40. Daniel STONER, (STOVER), from Pipe Creek, Md. settled on Logan Co. Ky. 41. Jacob and Barbara STONER, from Pipe Creek, Md., brother of Daniel. 42. Peter SHULL (SCHOEL), known in early Logan Co. Ky.,as "squire", for his penmanship. 43. John VAUGHT and wife Elizabeth: Will Book 1,1813, Muhlenberg Co.; from Lancaster, Pa. Children: Margaret, Smith, Jacob, b. 1759

(Lancaster, Pa.), his wife, Catherine HOFFMAN. Their children: (Born in Muhlenberg Co. Ky) Anna, John, Jacob, Barbara, George, Catherine, Mary, Margaret (called Sally), Abraham. Children of Jacob: Anna, born 1780, became wife of Elder George WOLFE, Union Co. Il. (second wife). Catherine married Daniel KIMMEL, of Logan Co. Ky. (Elizabeth VAUGHT was the daughter of Elder Francis STUMP, Logan Co. Ky.) 44. Gilbert VAUGHT and wife Mary. 45. Elizabeth VAUGHT 46. Tobias PENROD, from Brothers Valley Township, Pa., near Berlin north line, moved to Ky.1785-d.1800. 47. James MARTIN, son of Elder George Adam MARTIN. Became an Elder in Ky. about 1800; was a soilder in Revolution, secured military land in KY. 48. Peter and John HAHN (HON OR HAN); John died, 1838, Muhlenberg Co. Ky. 49. Daniel ROTH (brother of Capt. Henry), first wife, Eva FAUST, died in Nelson Co. Ky. Second wife was Elizabeth NEWMAN, married March 10,1794 daughter of Thomas and Mary NEWMAN. 50. Jacob STUDEBAKER, moved to Miami Valley, Ohio; fom Lancaster, Pa. 51. John STUDEBAKER, became an elder in Brothers Valley, Pa. 1770, moved to Miami Valley, Ohio. about 1805, died 1833. 52. Henry HARSHBERGER, presumably son of Samuel HARSHBERGER, moved to Donnel's Creek, Ohio. 53. Bishop Francis STUMP and wife Rachel MARTIN, daughter of Elder George Adam MARTIN. The Elder STUMP had been in Augusta Co. VA. as early as 1764, when Elder MARTIN paid a visit to Augusta CO. Elder STUMP was in Kentucky as early as 1770.Presumably he moved back to Va and finally settled in Ky,1785. 54. Solomon ROTH (RHOADS) and wife, Racheal, daughter of Elder "Squire" BOONE. 55. Andrew SHAVER, brother of Peter SHAVER, of Somerset Co. Pa. At Roanoke Settlement, Va., the known pioneers joined the party: 56. John DENNIS, of Yadkin Valley, N.C. 57. David RHOADS, brother of the famous "Capt. Henry"; David married Elizabeth VAUGHT Dec. 2,1798. 68. Daniel KIMMEL and wife Catherine HUNSAKER. 69. William VAUGHT, married Elizabeth BELL, 1808, daughter of

William BELL, od Virginia.

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70.Simon VAUGHT, married Elizabeth ZIMMERMAN, 1799. 71. John VAUGHT, Jr. wife, Eleaner. Children: Polly, married Adam HUNSAKER, Francis, Simon, became a minister, Martin, Christopher, Samuel F. 72. Hartman HUNSAKER, from Lancaster Co. Pa. and wife, Anna. Children: John HUNSAKER, wife, Magdalena BERG(BIRG). She was the daughter of Nicholas and Barbara BERG of North Carolina. Children: John, Jr., Barbara, Nicholas, Hartman, Jacob, Joseph, Abraham, George, Catherine, Magdalena, Andrew, Samuel (all of these joined the company from North Carolina). Andrew married Mary RHOADS, whose full name was Mary Catherine RHOADS. Samuel married Hanna RHOADS, children of Joseph RHOADS, Will recorded, 1799, Muhlenberg Co. KY. Other daughters of John HUNSAKER married HUBER (HOOVER), of Virginia, SNYDER of Stony Creek, Ohio, MOZIER, HUFFMAN of Muhlenberg Co. Ky. 73. The following moved from Brothers Valley, Pa. to Shenandoah Co. VA. 1783, and to Kentucky, 1785, with the company; Abraham, Simon, Christian VAUGHT. 74. Philip MYERS (MIRES) , and wife, Mary, from Pipe Creek, Maryland. 75. Thomas GRUBB, from near Hagerstown, Washington Co., Md.to near Staunton, Va., 1783, to Ky. 1785; believed to be brother of John GRUBB, printer of the Hagertown Almanac. 76. Thomas NEWMAN and Mary, and daughter Elizabeth who married Daniel RHOADS (second wife). 77. George FUNK, had lived near Strausberg, CVa. formerly from Brothers Valley, about 1763. Elder George Adam MARTIN attemped to organize an Ephrata Cloister at the FUNKS home as early as 1764. FUNK settled in Logan Co. Ky. (that part later became Muhlenberg Co). 78. Henry PENROD Family; Jonathan, Peter, Solomon, Henry, Ann, Allen, Samuel, Jane. Jane married Jacob KIMMEL, July 10, 1798. Allen m. Patty KIMMEL Feb.31,1802. John married Martha JOHNSON Sept.1,1806 Ann married John GILBERT OCt. 20,1808. 79. Benjamin BIGGS (from Pipe Creek, MD). went to Brothers Valley, Pa. 1770 and led a group of some 20 families into that settlement. Thomas GRUBB, born in Hanover Co. Va, Dec.11,1768; moved to near Hagerstown, Md. when a small boy. Moved to Waynesboro, Va about 1780. Moved to Kentucky 1785. His family had formerly lived in Germantown, Pa. community among the first Brethern

It seems evident that this company must have numbered well over 100 in number. The reader can see that for most part only family heads are listed. This list has come about through research across 12 years and we have listed names from many sources where it had been gleamed that these people came along with Capt. ROTH to Kentucky. However, it must be said that the first 48 names were given this author by Mrs. W.H.NEWMEYER, of Pittsburg, Pa. on Aug.23,1952, the day before the celebration at Brotherton, Pa. of the 190th. anniversary of the founding of the congregation.

Possibly George was Emily's child? Anyhow, this is all I have on William. I am sure that this is the correct family. I can find no other CRAWFORD'S in Todd at this time. First Central City School was known as Gallilee School

In the earliest days when Central City was still known as Stroud City, the school building was located at a point or near where the Gulf Refining Co. now stands. The street north was then known as Main Street and led to the Galena Mine. It was sometimes called the Gallilee School. The building was two stories high, with the primary grades on the first floor and the upper grades on the second. Some of the earlier teachers were Mr. **GRUNDY**, Mary **HELSLEY**, Ollie **ELSON**, Annie **MCCAULEY**, Mr. **LANDRUM**, Mr. **BENNETT**, and Catherine **MILLER**. The students sat on long benches and the school hours were from 8 until 4 p.m.

The second school was located on the same site but was one story high with two rooms. Prof.WILLIAMS and his daughter Miss Lizzie WILLIAMS, were the teachers.

The North Central School was on North Second Street and was built about 1908. The last school was held there in 1926.One of the teachers was Mrs. Lula **BOYER**. When the building was torn down,the lumber was used for the Pilgrim Holiness Church on North Third Street.

An earlier school on the site of the grade school had two small rooms and one large room. The seventh and eighth grades were in the large room. Profs.SPENCER and SCHULTZ and Mrs. Mary HENDRIX taught at this school.

In 1903 a new re-organization plan was drawn up. The old school district 33 was changed to dist.81. Trustees elected were M.T. CAIN, Joe ARMSTRONG, Ed FROST, C.W. JOINES, Geo.SMITH and C.W. MOULDEN.

Other teachers mentioned were R.O.PACE,Lula RICHARDSON,E.W. GIBSON and Ida HENDRICKS.

The author has source documentation with his files, and reference notes, etc. may be seen included with HENRY family history records which he is sending to the Harbin Mem.Library, Greenville, KY and to the Central City Public Library, Central City, KY. The author does not claim that this history is complete, nor free of errors. Many persons, family group records, events and dates have been omitted because there was no information known to the author, or insufficient information known to them. Some may have simply been overlooked. The author hopes that relatives and others will contact him and/or The Muhlenberg Co.Genealogical Soc.to fill in the gaps, add data, and correct any errors.

Family tradition says that Wm.HENRY was born in Ireland. His parents are not known. It is said that he was Catholic,that as a young man,he was studing for the priesthood,married,pro bably was excommunicated,was disowned by his family,and left for America. His date of birth is not known,but the 1850 U.S. Census of Bracken Co.KY lists his age as 58, which would make him born about 1792. His wife's name is uncertain, but this researcher believes she was Teressa SULLIVAN,born pro.in Ireland,daughter of William SULLIVAN and ??.

The date of this couple's emigration to the U.S. is not known. The point of entry into the U.S. is not known. Futher research could probably reveal these facts. There is some indication that he might have settled in Southern Ohio, before moving to adjoining Bracken Co., KY about 1847. He died intestate about 1858, apparently in Bracken Co., KY, although the place of death is uncertain. A Terry C. HENRY, daughter of Wm.SULLIVAN of Madison CO., KY, died 13 OCT 1854 in Bracken Co., KY.

Bracken Co., Ky court records list the following heirs of Wm.HENRY James HENRY and Samuel HENRY of Muhlenberg Co., KY, and Mary E. MITCHELL, Amanda H.APPLEGATE, Narcissa HENRY (later SMITH), and Elizabeth APPLEGATE, all of Bracken Co., KY. (Evidently the two brothers moved to Muhlenberg Co, and their sisters, if they are their sisters, remained in Bracken Co., KY.

The **HENRY** brothers might have settled first at Ceralvo,Ohio County,KY,before moving to Muhlenberg County,KY.

In Vol.2, No.16 page 48 Anne McClellan WILLIAMS, 360 Dixie Manor, Harrodsburg, Ky 40330. Placed the following query: The 1870 census of Muhlenberg Co., Ky.lists the members of the Andrew MCCLELLAN hh as Andrew 57, Unity 12, Geo.10, Grant 4, and Malinda 3. Heirs named in Andrew's 1881 will are daughters Unity F., Malinda Z., and sons Calvin, Geo. M., and Ulysses. The 1880 census lists Andrew 65, Malinda 14, in one hh; G.B.MCCLELLAN 20 in hh of Calvin 'MCALLEN' as a brother; Grant 15, is listed as brother living in hh of Lois MCCLELLAN 22. On the microfilm "Lois" could be read Lou or Lon. I have been told that Unity MCCLELLAN m. William Hallock VICK and the 1900 census lists his wife as Francis b.1858. Leiu VICK 1858-1935 is buried in Carter Creek Cemetery. It would seem that Unity F. is the same as Lois/Lou/ Lon MCCLELLAN/VICK. Is there anyone who can confirm this conclusion? I can find no futher mention of Malinda Z.daughter of Andrew. By the census she was b.circa 1866. In 1855 John BIVIN m. Jennie MCCLELLAN. This couple is buried in Joines Chapel Cemetery and Jennie's b. is 1866. I have been unable to find any record of Jennie before her marriage to BIVIN.Is it possible that Malinda and Jennie MCCLELLAN are one and the same?

CORRECTION: The marriage date was written 1855 (eleven years before the bride was born) which made it a little confusing. Not sure whether the typo was my fault or yours but would appreciate your reprinting this part.
