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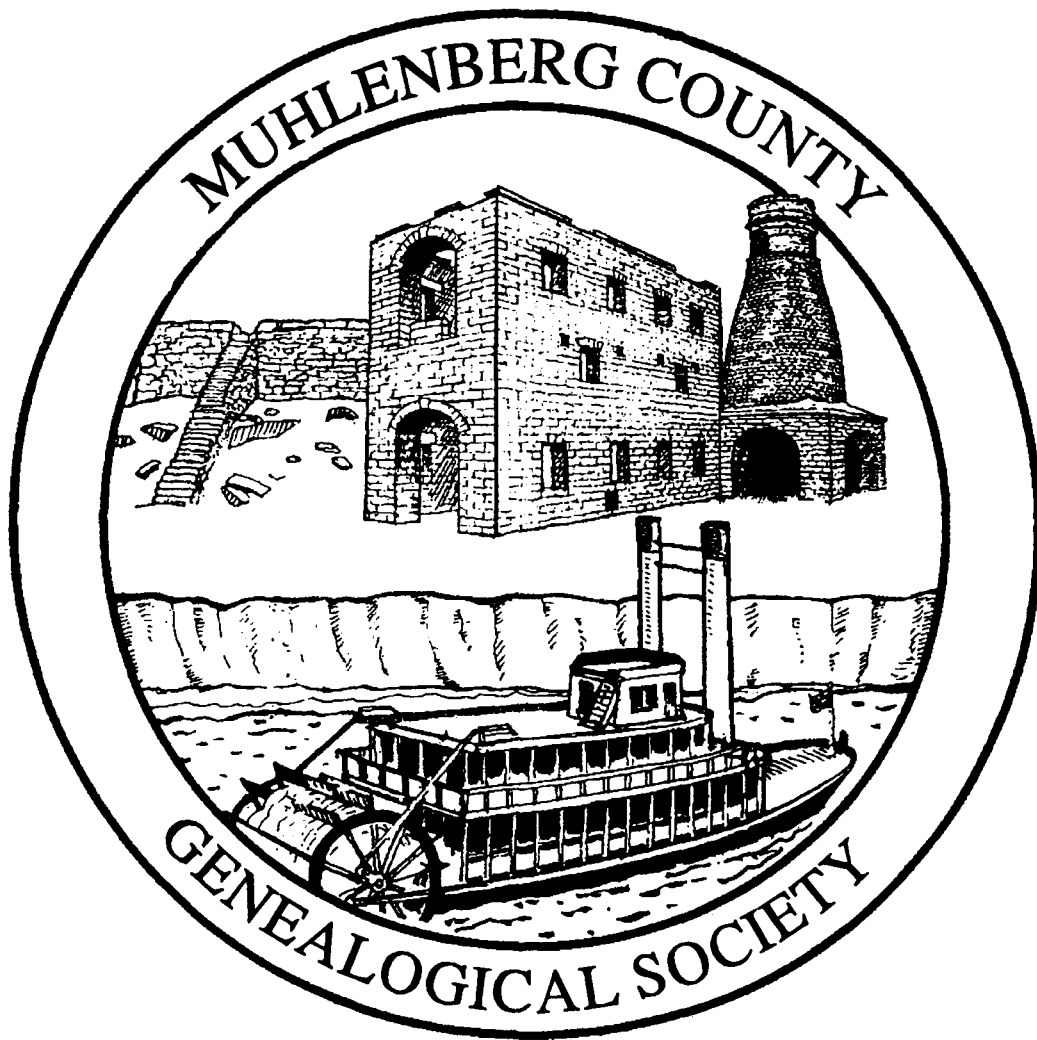

NIGHT RIDERS

Make Their First Visit to Muhlenberg County Monday Night

Barn of Louis Kirkpatrick at Penrod Burned, and 13,000 Pounds of Tobacco of H. N. Martin

NO CLEW TO THE BURNERS

Muhlenberg, which has heretofore escaped the visits of the night rider bands, can no longer claim this distinction, as the barn of Louis Kirkpatrick, at Penrod, containing about 13,000 pounds of tobacco bought from the local union of the growers' society by the H.N. Martin Leaf Company of Louisville, was destroyed by fire started by a band of night riders about 1 o'clock last Monday night. The deal for the tobacco had been made by Mr. H.N. Martin with the local union, and he had agreed to take the whole poolings at the get price, the frading to be done by the appointed agents of the association, the whole matter being agreeable to all parties concerned. So far as known there had been no protest, and the affair was agreeable to all parties interested, apparently. The action of the local union appears to have been irregular, however, and there had been some talk that the sale outright, in the manner made, was not in accord with the adjoining unions. No protest had been made, however, and it was not thought that there was opposition to the consummation of the deal. It is not known how many men were in the band, as nobody knew anything about the affair until the fire aroused the village, and the land had by the disappeared. A notice was found, warning all members that unless all tobacco went through regular channels it and the warehouses would meet a similar fate. This is construed to mean that some one considered the members of the local union as "dumpers" and hence subject to punishment.

The Martin Leaf Co. was protected by an insurance of \$2,000, which will cover them, but Mr. Kirkpatrick had no insurance on the barn in which he was handling the tobacco, and his loss of \$5,000 on the building will be complete.

There is no clue as to who set the building on fire, as the deed was committed without anybody being aroused, and when the fire had gained sufficient headway to arouse the inhabitants, the night riders had disappeared, without leaving any evidence as to the number engaged or the direction taken as they departed.

The contract covered some 100,000 pounds of tobacco, the holdings of all members of the local union, but the destruction of the warehouse will probably cause the cancellation of the contract, as there will be no place to handle the product, at that point.

Bond Bros., who bought the timber on the "Old Furnace" tract from the Rotherts, recently, now have operations in full swing, and are removing the timber at a very rapid rate. Much of the timber is being hewed and sawed into ties, and for some time 1,500 ties a day have been put on the yards here. From now on it is expected that at least 2,500 ties will be the tldaily average. Large crews of "huckers" are at work, and seven saw mills are being used in cutting up stock of various kinds. Besides, all the best logs are being shipped, so there is a vast haulage through town from south. It is estimated that it will require two years to remove the timber, there being some 3,500 acres in the contract.

UNION SERVICE FOR SIX MINE VICTIMS

Nelson Creek Mine Resumes Operation After Burial of Blast Victims

Funeral services for six of the Nelson mine disaster victims were conducted at the Nelson Baptist Church at 2:00 p.m. last Friday by Rev. Elbert Winkler, of this city. The six bodies were then interred in the nearby cemetery.

The bodies of Peter Huter, age 55, and his sons, Archie, age 29, and Leonard, age 27, were placed in one grave; the bodies of George Brandon, age 42, and his son Carl Brandon, age 19, in another, and the body of Mathew King in the third.

Members of the Masonic fraternity had charge of the burial of the elder Huter; the burial of the elder Brandon was in charge of the Knights of Pythias, and the burial of Mathew King was in charge of the Junior Order of United Mechanics.

The burial of Gabe Woodruff had been conducted on the previous Wednesday and that of Tom Richardson on Thursday. Rev. Winkler preached the funeral of the former and Rev. Stuart, of Drakesboro, the latter.

The mine is now operating on about the same schedule as before the disaster and the injured men are rapidly recovering.

DEATH OF MRS. TOOLEY

Mrs. Tooley, widow of Mr. Hall Tooley, died at the home of her son-in-law, J.R. Doss, near Powderly, last Friday night. The remains were buried at the Withers Grave Yard on Saturday afternoon with services by Rev. Gill, of the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Tooley was severely burned on Thursday evening by her clothing catching fire, though the exact circumstance are not known as she was at the time in the room alone, whither she had fallen in the fire or her clothing ignited by passing before the open fireplace is not known, but so severe were the injuries sustained that she died about thirty hours later.

Mrs. Tooley was a good, true Christian woman, having been united with the Baptist Church at an early age in life, and was loved and respected by all who knew her.

She was the mother of twelve children - six boys and six girls - all of whom survive her with the exception of one daughter. She was 73 years of age, and has about 74 grandchildren and several great grand-children.

She is survived by her husband; two daughters, Mrs. Charles M. Roark and Mrs. Hubert Meredith, both of Greenville; one brother, Wm. Eades, of Kuttawha.

The funeral was preached at the Baptist Church in Greenville by the pastor, Rev. G.B. Bush, and her former pastor; Rev. Tandy, Louisville, at 10a.m. Tuesday and the body was laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery at 11:30 the same day. An immense gathering of her friends were present at both services.

THREE ARE INJURED FATALLY IN CRASH OF CAR AND TRUCK

Several Others Also Injured In Accident Which Occurred Near Penrod On Sunday

BROUGHT TO THE HOSPITAL

Three persons were fatally injured and 12 others were hurt, some of them seriously, when an automobile crashed into a truck, near Penrod, about 4 o'clock last Sunday afternoon.

Ambulances were rushed to the scene of the accident, and the injured were brought to the Greenville hospital. Leslie Pearson, Route 3, Belton; Mrs. George Mahan, Belton, and Mrs. Roy Mahan, Beech Creek, died after being admitted to the hospital.

Others brought to the hospital were: Ethel Tooley and Rebecca Tooley, Penrod; Roy Mahan, Shirley Mahan, Anna Mae Mahan and Nancy Sue Mahan, Beech Creek; Larry Tooley, Mona Ruth Tooley, and Mrs. Annie Tooley, Belton; B.J. Wynn, Dunmor; Thomas Yonts and Neville Howard Rust, both of Route 2, Greenville.

According to reports the passenger car, which was driven by Thomas Yonts, struck a truck in which several persons were returning from a baptizing that had been conducted near Penrod. Roy Mahan was driving the truck. It was reported that the truck was moving into the highway when it was struck by the passenger car.

An Inquest was conducted on Wednesday afternoon by Coroner Howard Harkins, but blame for the accident was not fixed by the Coroner's Jury.

Thomas Yonts was arrested on a warrant charging manslaughter. He waived examining trial and was held to the grand jury on \$1,500 bond. A warrant charging manslaughter also was issued for Roy Mahan, who is still in the hospital.

This Indenture made this 24th day of November in the year of our Lord, One thousand, Eight hundred & twenty two, between Jacob Rhoads & Sally, his wife, of the County of Union & State of Illinois of the one part & Samuel Hunsaker formerly of the same county & state of the other part. Witnesseth that the said Rhoads & wife for & in consideration of the sum of one hundred & fifty dollars, to them in hand paid & secured to be paid, have granted, bargained, sold, conveyed & confirmed unto the said Samuel & by these presents do grant, bargain, sell & convey & confirm unto him the following tract of land situate, lying & being in Muhlenberg County, State of Kentucky, to wit: Beginning at two white oaks on John Stones line, thence with the same S30 E100 poles, passing Stones corner at 84 poles, to a red oak, the gum being down, thence N66 E70 poles to a gum, thence S65 E40 poles to a gum, thence N55 E78 poles to a white oak & walnut, thence N80 poles to a beach & red oak, thence 85W154 poles to a beech & white oak in Stones line, thence with the same S40 W75 poles to the beginning, lying on the waters of Jacob's Creek & containing ninety five acres. To have and to hold the said tract of land above described to the said Samuel, his heirs & assigns forever to their only proper use & benefit & behalf, together with all & singular the appertinances thereunto, belonging or in any wise appertaining & the said Rhoades & wife covenants & agree to & with the said Sam'l. to warrant & defend the said premises from the claim of them, their heirs & assigns & all persons claiming by (from) through or under them but against the claim of one other person whatever.

On testimony whereof the said Rhoads & wife have hereto set their hands & affixed their seals, the day & year above written.
